Taff underwent reconstructive surgery on his face and had his jaws wired shut. He lost the teeth on one side of his mouth. For a time it was feared he would lose the vision in one eye, but it is reported he will regain the vision in the eye.

Funny How you think back over the years and all the things you think about. I was raised here in the Panhandle and at one time or another had quite a few kinfolk that live here or near here and now most of them are gone, makes you sort of wonder what little mark they have left to show their existence here on the Earth.

Bluestem Harvested
 Ted Harvey of Fargo, Oklahoma has recently harvested Plains bluestem on the Bill Caswell farm west of Mobeetie. According to Harvey this is the first harvest of the grass in Wheeler County. Caswell planted the grass last year. He baled the field several times for weed control. Caswell now plans to bale the grass to put it back into the vegetative state. (He points out that the grass still has a good seed crop on it due to the different maturity dates and that feeding the hay in different spots of a field is a good way to get some of the grass started in sparse stands of other grasses). 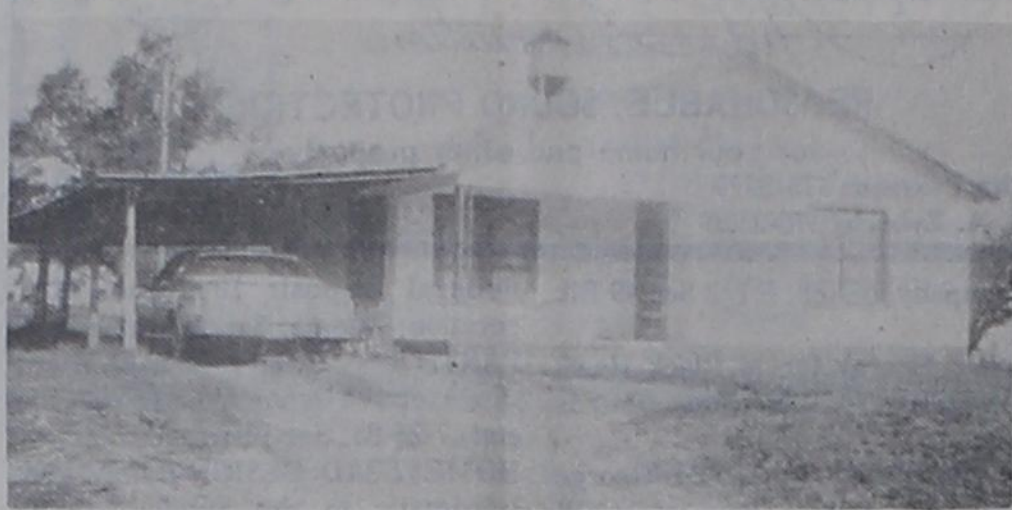
