## SPS To Seek 'Minimal-Change' RATE ADJUSTMENT

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) today filed informational packets giving advance notice of a request to restructure rates for retail electric service in the Texas communities the utility serves.

The company emphasized the restructuring will barely change prices customers pay for electricity.

"Prices to our customers will hardly increase or decrease under our rate proposal," said SPS president and chief executive officer Bert Ballengee.

"We have had some costs to the company go up, and some costs come down," Ballengee said. "Now we must restructure our rates to reflect those changes. But the prices customers pay for Texas retail electric service will continue to be stable."

SPS last sought, and was granted an increase in base rates for retail electric service in Texas in mid-1982, Ballengee noted.

The proposal to restructure rates in rural areas of Texas served by SPS will be filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, probably in early September.

The proposed restructuring, Ballengee said, "On the one hand, would increase the base-rate portion of the electric bill, and, on the other hand, would generally offset that increase by lowering the boiler fuel-cost portion of the bill. The net effect should be only slight changes in prices."

Ballengee credited decreasing costs of some SPS operations primarily to the utility's coal-fueled power plants, a softened natural gas market in the United States, and to lower interest costs. Increased costs to the utility included construction of coal-fueled power plants, a softened natural gas market in the United States, and to lower interest costs. Increased costs to the utility included construction of coal-fueled power plants and distribution facilities, and higher costs of most other materials and services, he said.

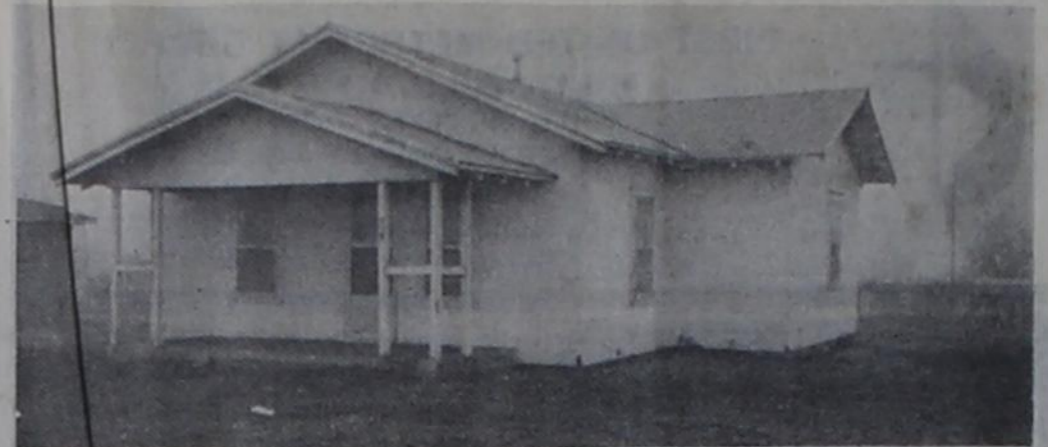

Dear Editor,

In last week's Shamrock Texan an article was printed concerning the budget of Wheeler County. County Judge Wendell Morgan said, "We have tried our best to hold the line on spending this year. I think the budget reflects a great deal of hard work and fiscal conservatism." The article stated that Wheeler County will spend \$3.5 million and will only receive \$2 million from tax receipts. The difference will come from existing county funds. The budget is based on a beginning balance of \$1.8 million and an ending balance of \$500 thousand. How will this level of spending be maintained in future years if the county savings are depleted and the Commissioners' Court approves budgets that spend 75% more income than the county now receives? The only answer will be huge tax increases. Not even the federal government with all its money problems approves budgets with expenditures 75% above its income. I believe Tip O'Neill or Jim Wright would even oppose such an outlandish proposal as the budget approved by the Wheeler County Commissioners' Court.

Part of the increase in the budget was attributed to increasing the salaries of elected officials. Salaries were increased \$200 per month. Increases in filing fees for candidates seeking re-election was the excuse used to justify the salary increases. The law permits candidates to file for a place on the ballot by either paying a filing fee or by obtaining a required number of signatures on a petition. Either way is acceptable according to the law, however, some of these same elected officials have criticized people who gained a spot on the ballot by petition. These county officials have told me that failure to pay a filing fee is unfair to the taxpayers. Now that they are elected, they want a salary increase to pay filing fees. Is it fair for the taxpayers of Wheeler County to pay the filing fees of elected officials? What about the people that lose? I guess these elected officials believe that if you lose the election, you should lose your money, but if you win, the taxpayers should pay you back. The salary increase of \$200 per month total \$9,600 on a four year term. If the filing fees have been doubled from \$300 to \$600, how do the county commissioners justify raising salaries \$9,600 per term to pay for a \$300 increase? Not even Tip O'Neill or Jim Wright could have thought up a better deal than that.

I can't understand why a person would pay a filing fee if he can get on the ballot by petition. The Presidential candidates use a petition. Why would a person pay up to \$1,000 to get on the ballot when he can do the same thing by getting a petition signed by his friends and supporters? If a person will not save his own money, how can we expect him to save the taxpayers' money? The taxpayers of Wheeler County should not have to pay the filing fees of the elected officials that the officials themselves did not have to pay in the first place. Wheeler County pays a great deal of money to the state in various forms of taxes. The state in turn, funds the primary elections. By paying the filing fees of elected officials, the people of Wheeler County are actually being double taxed.

Commissioners voting for salary increases were: Hanner, Harrison and Henderson; voting against was Commissioner Bill Atherton.

The Republican candidates in the past election got on the ballot by petition. They wanted to save their own money and I believe they would have tried to save the taxpayers' money had they been elected.

Isn't it time to make a change in Wheeler County? Tip O'Neill is going to retire at the end of this term. Isn't it time to retire some of these big spenders in the Wheeler County Court House? Let's clean house.

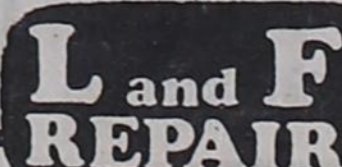




