Translator System Is Still In Need Of Funds

The Wheeler Translator System remains off. Some of the rural residents of the county have been without television since Monday, July 8. The system was turned off in an effort to get needed funds to pay

expenses and make improvements. Dues for use of the system is \$48 per year or the amount the individual feels they can afford. Some 800 bills are sent each year to individuals known to be using the signal provided by the system. An estimated 2/3 of those billed pay.

There is no way of knowing the exact number of homes receiving the signal. One simply has to erect an antenna to tie into the system. The signal provides the only television available to some individuals in the





NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and

These proposed rates are applicable to customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, excluding hotel/motel customers, who provide local exchange telephone service of General Telephone Company of the Southwest to their tenants or patrons on a resale or shared use basis. This resale or sharing arrangement is normally provided utilizing a customer-provided PABX or other similar stored control switch capable of common

control processing or other features commonly associated with a PABX "Smart" switch. These proposed rates are designed to recover costs on a usage basis for local exchange telephone service access and are identical to General Telephone's "Optional Measured Service" rates. The monthly access rate will be \$28.95 per trunk line and the usage rates



Water for Wildlife

Texans are aware of the often shortage of water but some species of wildlife are constantly in a water shortage. Certain animals in West Texas have adapted to this situation by manufacturing water within their own bodies. This is known as metabolic water. Animals such as mule, deer and quail can utilize dew and the moisture contained in their food. Other animals such as dove and turkey must drink water regularly in

order to survive. Wildlife make use of many different water sources. Farm ponds and stock tanks are primarily for livestock, but also serve as wildlife water. When pastures are being deferred, windmills should remain operational to keep water troughs and overflow areas full for when the pasture is grazed again. In the meantime, wildlife will utilize this water. "Gallinaceous guzzlers" and similar water catchment facilities have been used in the West for many years to provide water for livestock and wildlife. A "guzzler" collects precipitation and stores it in a tank to prevent evaporation. The tank if often stored underground to keep the water cool.
