The Mobeetie City Council entertained six special guests, Thursday evening, at 8:00 p.m. on a very joyous occasion. Refreshments were served by the City Mayor and secretary to guests: Austin and Bernice Caldwell, Glenn Sherrell, Calvin and Leola Stuart and their grandson Chad Stuart who lives in Sayre, Okla.

Following refreshments, Leona House, the city mayor handed Austin Caldwell the final payment on the old water system Mobeetie purchased from Mr. and Mrs. Caldwell in July 1975. At this time Mr. Caldwell touched the first sheet of the mortgage and the payment sheet with a torch, thus the "Burning of a mortgage" was witnessed.

After a time of visiting the City Council meeting was convened for the regular July meeting. The mayor and her daughter, Carol Kidd, spent most of the day, Thursday in Amarillo where the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission had convened for a review on the needs of a grant where more than thirty claimants had assembled. At news time the fate of the claim put in by Mobeetie for a grant to install a backup well for the present system unknown, the mayor reported.

Following reading of minutes on the June meeting and the current finance report, both being accepted upon motions of council members, monthly bills were reviewed, accepted and paid by members of the City Government.

At 1:45 the meeting was adjourned.

Ages 13-14: Bareback Ponies, Steer

Riding, Breakaway Roping, Ribbon Roping, Goat Tying, Pole Bending, and Barrel Race.

Ages 15-19: Bareback Riding, Bull Riding, Calf Roping, Ribbon Roping, Breakaway Roping, Pole Bending, Barrel Race.

There will be a jackpot steer saddling Friday and Saturday night for all ages. The younger contestants will have a calf scramble each night.

### Translator System Is Still In Need Of Funds

The Wheeler Translator System remains off. Some of the rural residents of the county have been without television since Monday, July 8. The system was turned off in an effort to get needed funds to pay expenses and make improvements.

Dues for use of the system is \$48 per year or the amount the individual feels they can afford. Some 800 bills are sent each year to individuals known to be using the signal provided by the system. An estimated 2/3 of those billed pay.

There is no way of knowing the exact number of homes receiving the signal. One simply has to erect an antenna to tie into the system. The signal provides the only television available to some individuals in the

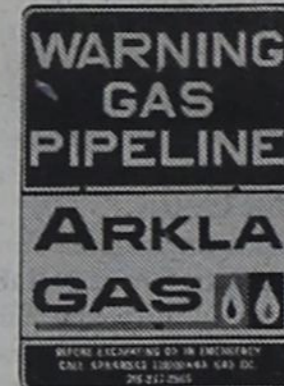

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### NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and tenant resale services.

These proposed rates are applicable to customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, excluding hotel/motel customers, who provide local exchange telephone service of General Telephone Company of the Southwest to their tenants or patrons on a resale or shared use basis. This resale or sharing arrangement is normally provided utilizing a customer-provided PABX or other similar stored control switch capable of common control processing or other features commonly associated with a PABX "Smart" switch.

These proposed rates are designed to recover costs on a usage basis for local exchange telephone service access and are identical to General Telephone's "Optional Measured Service" rates. The monthly access rate will be \$28.95 per trunk line and the usage rates are as follows:

As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently, there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

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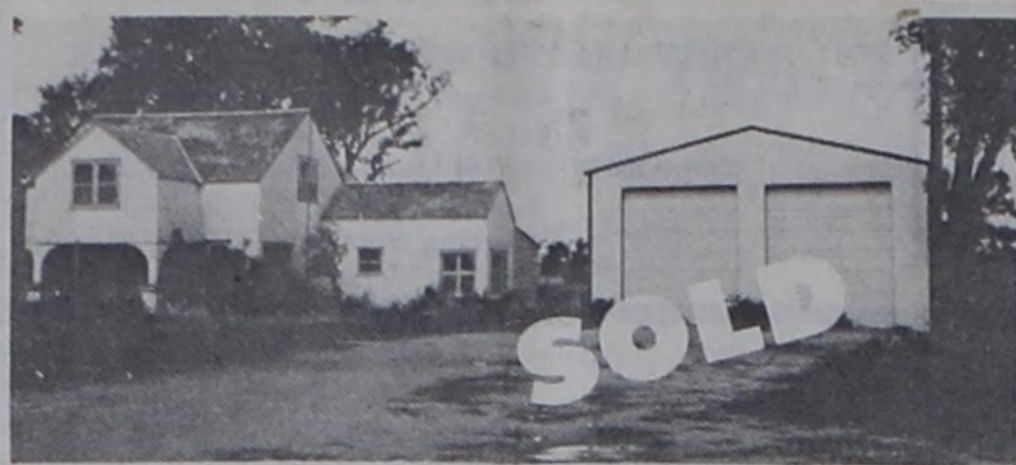

**Water for Wildlife**  
 Texans are aware of the often shortage of water but some species of wildlife are constantly in a water shortage. Certain animals in West Texas have adapted to this situation by manufacturing water within their own bodies. This is known as metabolic water. Animals such as mule, deer and quail can utilize dew and the moisture contained in their food. Other animals such as dove and turkey must drink water regularly in order to survive.

Wildlife make use of many different water sources. Farm ponds and stock tanks are primarily for livestock, but also serve as wildlife water. When pastures are being deferred, wind-mills should remain operational to keep water troughs and overflow areas full for when the pasture is grazed again. In the meantime, wildlife will utilize this water. "Gall-inaceous guzzlers" and similar water catchment facilities have been used in the West for many years to provide water for livestock and wildlife. A "guzzler" collects precipitation and stores it in a tank to prevent evaporation. The tank if often stored underground to keep the water cool. A trough is provided for distribution. Watering facilities do not have to be expensive and extravagant, just effective. Contact the Soil Conservation Service for assistance in developing or improving a plan for your wildlife.

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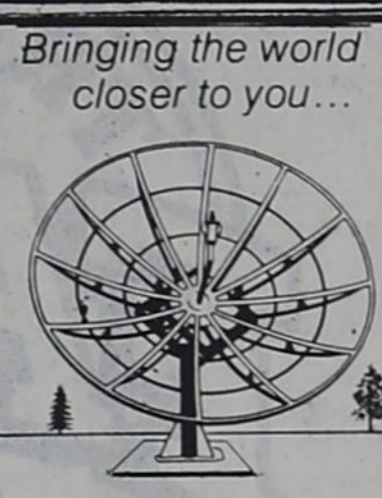

## Hearings Scheduled For Tax Appraisals

Taxpayers in the Wheeler County Appraisal District will have an opportunity to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. Protest hearings by the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) begin on July 25, 1985.

When the ARB concludes its hearings and approves a final roll of local Real Estate and Personal Use Property appraisals, and the Oil, Gas, Mineral, Utilities has previously been approved, local governments will levy their taxes against values from those two certified rolls.

Marilyn Copeland, R.P.A. Chief Appraiser for the District, said that a taxpayer who wants to lodge a protest of a proposed value must file a written "notice of protest" with the ARB.

According to Copeland, the ARB is a group of appraisal district residents appointed by the district's directors to see that property values are equal and uniform.

Property owners need appear before only the review panel, the chief appraiser noted, instead of one for each taxing unit.

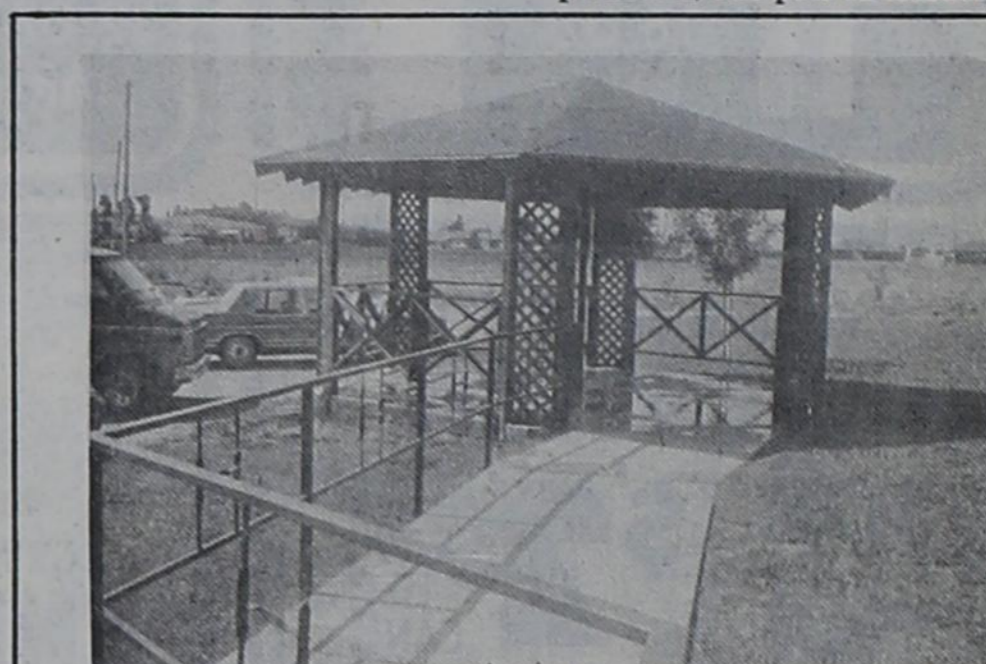

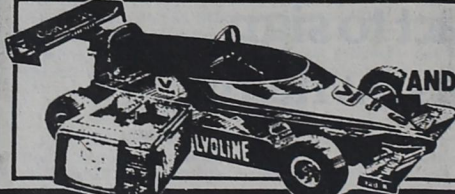
