

With a little resourcefulness, you can economically coordinate a ward-

robe that will help achieve the "look" you want. Although it may be hard to pinpoint the type of clothing most needed, one way to start is to list all the activities you recently participated in during a typical 2-4 week period or longer, and what you wore.

You will also want to consider the special activities on your calendar throughout the year. The list can help determine the type of garments worn most often and where some changes are needed.

Any general inventory begins by assessing your present wardrobe. You may begin by sorting the clothing into four categories: discards; repair or crevole; wearable as is; or items to build on.

Once you have a completer picture.

four categories: discards, repair or recycle; weather as to build on a complete picture of your needs and of the wearable clothing in your present belongings, you can begin wardrobe planning. Decide first on what you can afford to spend on new clothing. Also consider your personal preferences in colors, lines, textures and styles. Adding to your present vardrobe requires a plan. And a good way to begin is to build around a few garments. The life expectency of a garment can help you determine how much you want to invest. You may want to buy the best you can afford in such basic garments as coats and suits which can be worn through several seasons. However, you may not want to invest much money in "fun" garments that may be the latest fad his season, but gone the next.

Classics are always good investments, because they do not vary with seasonal fashion changes. For example, shirtwisst dresses and blazer jackets are popular through many fashion seasons. A good plan also builds around a few key becoming colors with which you're comfortable. Key colors do not have to be dark, but can be in any color range you like.

Also select a few good accessories, such as shoes, purses, scarves, belts, and jewelry in your key color ranges. This will allow you to mix and match basic garments with accessories to form many different outfits.
