


Ft. Elliott was well represented at the Canadian U.I.L. competiton. Students competing and their





Greenbug infestations are very heavy in some fields in Carson and Gray Counties. A few sample sites have infestations at or near 1000 greenbugs per foot of row. Fields being checked in Ochiltree County experienced a dramatic increase in greenbug numbers this week. Infestations increased from less than 10 per foot of row to nearly 50 per foot of row. A similar increase occurred in the Dallam County area. Fields being checked in Collingsworth County have no greenbug infestations.







#### SHOPPING FOR LEANER BEEF

When we as consumers go to the grocery store to pick out our beef purchases we should begin by checking the outside fat on the cut of meat. Extra trim cuts should have less than about 1/3 inch outside fat.


Marbling, the intramuscular fat varies with the individual cut. In general your leaner cuts of meat will include flank steak, top and bottom sirloin steak, top loin steak, top round steak, beef tenderloin steak, round tip roast and bottom round roast.


Lean cuts of beef become tough if dry heat methods, such as broiling or grilling are used. To help ensure tenderness try marinating the meat first. Marinating helps break down the connective tissue rendering the meat more tender.

Another way to prepare your beef for tendernass would be to stir fry with a minimum of oil or pan broiling which is similar but uses no fat or water.


Also avoid overcooking lean beef As it cooks, water and fat cook out. To prevent a dry texture, cook to rare, or medium - browning the exterior of the meat quickly also helps hold in the juices.

How to store your beef purchases? After you have made your meat purchases, it is very important that you store the food to maintain optimal quality if you do not intend to use it right away. Fresh beef cuts should only be stored for 3 to 4 days in the refrigerator and 6 to 12 months in the freezer. Ground beef should be stored no longer than 2 days in the refrigerator and 3 to 4 months in the freezer. Cooked meats should be wrapped or placed in tightly covered dishes or containers and refrigerated within two hours after serving.





1/3 cup dry sherry 1/3 cup lime juice 2 tablespoons cooking oil I tablespoon minced ginger root 1 tablespoon honey 2 cloves garlic, minced

Combine soy sauce, sherry, lime juice, oil, ginger root, honey and garlic. Place roast in utility dish or plastic bag; add marinade, turning to coat. Cover dish or tie bag securely and marinate in refrigerator 6 to 8 hours ( or overnight, if desired), turning occasionally. Remove roast from marinade. Place roast on rack in open roasting pan. Insert meat thermometer so bulb is centered in the thickest part. Do not add water. Do not cover. Roast in a slow oven (325 degrees Fahrenheit) until thermometer registers 135 degrees Fahrenheit. Allow 20 to 22 minutes per pound. Brush roast with reserved marinade during last 20 minutes of cooking. Carve into thin slices. 8 servings.


## **Greenbugs Have Been** Found in Carson, Gray

Greenbug infestations are very heavy in some fields in Carson and Gray Counties. A few sample sites have infestations at or near 1000 greenbugs per foot of row. Fields being checked in Ochiltree County experienced a dramatic increase in greenbug numbers this week. Infestations increased from less than 10 per foot of row to nearly 50 per foot of row. A similar increase occurred in the Dallam County area. Fields being checked in Collingsworth County have no greenbug infestations.



#### Fort Elliott

The Texas Panhandle was one of the last frontiers in the United States occupied only by Native American Indians and wildlife. Soldiers, scouts and employers reported the rich and vast resources that were undeveloped. It was inevitable that the empty rolling plains would be the focus of the United States government after the Civil War to employ the soldiers and to provide homes for the rapidly growing population.

On December 22, 1874, John Hancock who served on the Committee of Appropriation in the United States House of Representatives wrote W. W. Befknap, Secretary of War, concerning the need of a military post on the Wichita River or one of its tributaries in Texas. Hancock

#### From The Minister's Desk:

There is a popular nursery rhyme says:-

"Pussy cat, pussy cat, where have you been? I've been to London to look at the

queen.

Pussy cat, pussy cat, what did you there?

I frightened a little mouse under her chair.

An important truth is emphasized in this little rhyme. This truth is that it is extremely easy to allow an unimportant fact to distract from an important fact. And this is a truth that more Bible students should recognize.

In my opinion, there are too many Bible students who have a purely academic attitude about the Bible and its great truths. For example, I once heard a man boast of his knowledge of the Bible, saying: "There are 919 chapters in the Old Testament which consist 23,545 verses and 603,584 words. And there are 260 chapters in the New Testament which consists of 7,756 verses and 170, 551 words."

merely knowledge. The Apostle Paul declared that the Word of God is "-inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness-" And then he added: "-That the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work." (II Timothy 3:16-17) While this text is usually a "proof

text" for the inspiration of the Bible, it also emphasizes that the purpose of the Bible is to produce a godly life not merely a knowledgeable life. For this reason, serious Bible students will ask some questions about any Biblical text that they study. These question are:---

1. What problems of life does this text solve?

2. What needs of life does this text meet?

3. What course of life does this text recommend?

With these questions, Bible students will not allow the unimportant facts of the Bible to distract from the important. Then they can be godly people not merely knowledgeable people.

proposed that the post be located at a point on the main Wichita, or branch thereof some distance above its confluence with the Red River so as to prevent incursions of the hostile bands and tribes of Indians that frequented the head waters of the Brazos, Colorado, Prairie Dog, Red and the Canadian Rivers. Reports by experience frontiersmen of Texas had convinced the Committee that the location of a military post in this locality would be effective since it could cover the section of country between Fort Sill and Fort Richardson and be about halfway between the two localities.

The Committee on Appropriations recognized that it had been the habit of the Indians for many years to make raids upon the frontier settlements of north western Texas, crossing the Red River from the east or coming south down the Wichita and from that vicinity direct their attacks either along the border countries on the Red River or along the countries on the sources of the Trinity River and further south on the Brazos. When the raiding Indians were pursued they invariable sought the valley of the Wichita as a means of escape to the broken county on the Pease River and across to the water of the north or main Red Rivers where an abundance of food and water could be found.

On January 19, 1875, a letter from the Headquarters Department of Texas in San Antonio endorsed The committee letter saying that it was unquestionable true that the establishment of a military post in the locality indicated would be of very great emporium to the frontier of northwest Texas. It had been discussed with Lieutenant General Sheridan the question of moving Fort Griffin or Fort Richardson to a point on Beaver Creek or a tributary of the Wichita for the proposed post. Fort Griffin had been an important post for settlement purposes and a change in the location could only be made if the new post would cover the same country and protect the same interests of the United States. Settlers were already moving in advance of Fort Griffin and if it were transferred to Beaver Creek, there was much fine country between that would soon fill up. It was perceived that Beaver Creek was about the limit of probable settlements and a post there would be in advance of any considerable settlements probably for many years.

Additionally, Fort Griffin could be abandoned without any considerable loss or inconvenience to the government as the grounds was leased and there were no buildings of any value.

In a report by General Nelson A. Miles, 5th Infantry, Department of the Missouri, dated March 4, 18/5, published in the April 17, 1875, issue of Army and Navy Journal, Miles recounted the events of an expedition led by Miles and subordinate officers in northwest Texas being in the early part of August of 1874 and continuing throughout the winter of 1875. The many encounters with large bands of hostile Cheyenne, Kiowas, and Comanches Indians in the Texas Panhandle near Beaver Creek, Kiowa Creek, Palo Duro Creek, Chicken Creek, Sweetwater Creek, McClellan Creek, the Washita, the Red River and the Canadian River no doubt influenced the decision to establish a military post in the Panhandle of Texas to protect the settlers from the Indians. The campaign of Miles has come to be known as the Red River Indian Wars of 1974. After the numbers and strength of the Indians had been greatly reduced by November of 1974, Miles reduced his forces by ordering to Camp Supply, Fort Dodge, and Fort Bascom, all of his Cavalry except a few companies and four Infantry companies. From reports regarding the position of the remaining hostile Indians, Miles determined they could be found in the breaks of the Red River. Miles moved in that direction during the last of November. He proceeded as far as Adobe Walls on the Canadian, when

instructions were received directing him to establish a winter Cantonment at some point south of the Washita, to withdraw the remainder of his force, except the garrison for the Cantonment, and authorized Miles to make one or two scouting parties. Miles established a suitable position on one of the northern tributaries of the North Fork of the Red River, which was an important point, since the entire favorite treats of the Indians in that section would be accessible. The weather during the winter of 1874-1875 was particularly harsh with constant "Northern" lasting for long periods of time with the temperature often 25 degrees below zero. The ground was often frozen solid and at time covered with snow The ice on the streams was strong enough to bear up the loaded military trains.

Because of Miles experiences during the winter of 1874-1875, he concluded that the military posts were too far east. Miles thought it would be better to keep a sufficient force of troops out where the Indians would be likely to live with their families and herds when hostile, than along the




