HOBART HOBBLER MUSTANGS, 20-7

The Hobart Bearcats brought a #2 ranking in Class AA football in Oklahoma into Nicholson Field last Friday night and the near capacity crowd understood their ranking after

they put down Texas' #1 ranked Class A Wheeler Mustangs, 20-7.

The loss was the Mustangs first in regular season play since the 1983 season but as hard as the loss was, it

was simply a case of the better team going off the field victorious. Getting beaten by a stronger team can sometimes be a blessing on down the road in fighting for a district crown and a spot in the playoffs.

Hobart's 195 pound senior fullback

was just too much for the Mustangs to contain all night and it will be awhile before they forget the name of James Hamlett. Hamlett broke open a close game in the fourth period as he gained 56 of the 80 yards the Bearcats drove and scored from the 1 to cap the drive.

Only 3:10 remained in the game when Hamlett scored his second TD of the game. The Mustangs were forced to punt after gaining only four yards following the kickoff and the Bearcats ran out the clock and crossed back into Oklahoma with their second win of the year.

Wheeler took quick advantage of a big miscue on the part of the Bearcats to jump into a quick 7-0 lead. A high snap on fourth down sailed over Hamlett's head and Drew Thomas recovered at the Hobart 4.

An indication of how tough Hobart might be came quickly as it took the Mustangs four tries to get to paydirt with Bubba Smith jumping over left guard for the Mustangs only touchdown of the game. Richard Smith booted the extra point.

The Wheeler Colts blasted the Sunray Bobcats last Thursday 20-6 to win their first football game. The Colts fell behind 0-6 in the first quarter after fumbling on their own five yard line. The Colts scored twice in the second quarter to take a lead at halftime 14-6. The Colts last touch-

down came in the third quarter.

Scoring the Colts first touchdown was Ronnie Hungate returning a punt for 38 yards. The Colts second touchdown came before intermission with Jason Wood passing to Brandon Chick from 20 yards out. In the third quarter Hungate blasted the right side of the line behind Gabe Ellisor, Brandon Childress, and Tommy Saucedo blocking to score his second touchdown from 6 yards out. Funeral Services Held For Mattie Eubanks

Funeral services were held in Tucson, AZ., recently for Mattie Eubanks, who died September 1st, at the age of 97. She was preceded in death in 1956 by her husband of 53 years, John C. (Bud) Eubanks.

Mattie Eubanks (nee Love) was born April 16, 1889, in Texarkana, TX. She married John Eubanks in 1903 at Illinois Bend, Texas, and lived near Temple, Oklahoma until moving to Mobeetie in 1915, where they lived for most of the next thirty years. In the late forties they sold their home and moved to Pampa, and were vacationing in California when Mr. Eubanks was struck by a car, suffering fatal injuries. Mrs. Eubanks then moved to Arizona to be near some of her children; first living in Phoenix, then moving to Tucson in 1965 after suffering a severe stroke. Her miraculous recovery was typical of her strength and positive attitude toward life.

While residing in the Mobeetie area, the family lived in two houses that later became historical landmarks. In 1921 their seventh child, Mildred, was born in the Old Rock House on Sweetwater Creek. During the early and mid thirties they lived in the Old Jail in Old Mobeetie, which was owned for many years by Mattie's parents, Joseph and Betty Love, who both died there in 1925. The property was later owned by his son, Ollie Walker. Five of the eleven Eubanks children were born in the Mobeetie area.

Three of these sons served in World War II: J.C. (John) in the Army, Walter, in the Marines, and Joe in the Navy. John was awarded the Order of The Purple Heart for duty in the Aleutians.

Surviving Mrs. Eubanks are five daughters and six sons; Ann Wester, Hemet, CA.; Opal Hughes and Pauline Hays, Tucson, AZ.; Mildred Bonca, South Gate, CA.; Cecil Eubanks, Cypress, CA.; Cecil Eubanks, Wheeler, TX.; Lloyd Eubanks, Glenwood, NM; Farris Eubanks, Conroe, TX; John Eubanks, Phoenix, AZ.; Walter Eubanks, Arcadia, CA; and Joe Eubanks, Gloucester, NJ.

Also surviving are 35 grandchildren, 66 great-grandchildren, and 41 great-great grandchildren. At the time of her death, there was five sets of five-generation families.

Final services were conducted by Rev. George Haase and Rev. Win Mac of the Eastside and Grantway Assembly of God Churches, with interment at East Lawn Cemetery in Tucson, beside her husband.

U.S. Dept. Of Agriculture Bids Accepted

Bids on 827,991 acres of land in Texas were accepted by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's latest Conservation Reserve Program sign-up for 1987. Bids were accepted from 2,953 farmers.

The state was divided into seven bidding pools. The highest bids accepted from pools 1 and 2 was \$40.00 per acre on 769,656 acres. These two pools make up the western one-third of the state.

Bids of up to \$35.00 per acre were accepted on 33,025 acres in pools 4, 5, and 6. This area includes the Texas Blacklands, East Texas, and part of Southwest Texas.

Bids up to \$55.00 per acre were accepted from pool 7 on 20,923 acres; this pool covers the Coastal Prairie and the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Bids have now been accepted on a total of 4,086 farms totaling 1,137,454 acres. The latest sign-up period, August 4-15, followed earlier ones held in March and May.

Cropland that is in Land Capability Class VI, VII, and VIII or land that appeared to be eroding at greater than

3.5 times the tolerance level at sign-up time is automatically accepted. Land that appeared to be eroding between 2.5 to 3.5 times the tolerance level was declared questionable; Soil Conservation Service personnel will determine final estimated erosion rates on a field by field visit to this land.

Any questionable land that is determined to be eroding at an estimated rate of more than three times the tolerance level with an

Summertime Water Supply Problems

At least 40 cities and other authorities serving more than 780,000 people in the state had experienced summertime water supply problems by September 1, according to the Texas Water Development Board.

Many of the problems were caused by the inability to produce water from wells at a high enough rate to meet peak demand, while others involved inadequate water treatment and distribution capacity. However, most water utilities in the state reported that water levels in wells and lakes were adequate.

Of the 40 areas reporting problems, at least 15 had imposed mandatory water use restrictions and another 20 had put into effect voluntary restrictions.

Most of the areas were in North Texas near Dallas and Fort Worth and in Central Texas in and near Austin.

Through provisions of the state's new water plan approved last November by Texas voters, the Water Development Board can now provide financial assistance for regional water projects that serve more than one city or district. To date, the Board has authorized more than \$35 million in construction loans and \$750,000 in planning grants for regional projects.

The Board also continues to offer low-interest loans for local water-related projects to smaller governmental entities that cannot otherwise finance such facilities. Since it was created in 1957, the Water Development Fund, which is administered by the Board, has provided more than \$420 million in loans to more than 420 local governments in the state.

acceptable bid will be placed in the reserve.

In determining estimated erosion, SCS personnel use the Universal Soil Loss Equation for water erosion and the Wind Erosion Equation for wind erosion.

SCS conservationists are now in the process of preparing conservation plans on land accepted in CRP. Cropland will be planted to grasses and legumes, wildlife plantings, windbreaks, or trees.

For land accepted into CRP, farmers will receive their per acre bid annually for ten years. They will also receive 50 percent cost-share assistance for establishing permanent vegetation or trees.

Lavon Williams, District Conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Wheeler reports that 130 bids on 26,666.9 acres has been tentatively accepted in Wheeler County.

The 1987 district champion will go to Washington, D.C. in early June to compete in the National Spelling Bee. The trip, for two, will be provided by the Amarillo Globe-News.

There will be other awards for some of the top district finalists.

SPS Announces Early Retirement Program

In response to an economic slowdown in its service area, Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) will institute for a limited time a voluntary early retirement program that could trim its company-wide workforce by 148 employees, or about 6%.

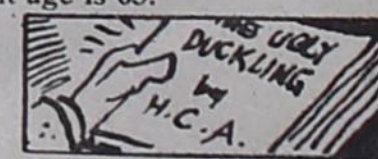
SPS has 2,320 employees throughout its service area, which comprises parts of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas.

"We feel this is the best way to handle a situation in which we must respond to a reduction in new construction requirements, but still be fair to our employees," said W.R. Esler, SPS president and chief operating officer.

Company workloads related to expansion projects have been reduced because of the sluggish economy, Esler said. In particular, he said, a leveling in the growth in demand for electricity has put off indefinitely the need for new power plants and related facilities.

"The early retirement program is the best strategy we can have in our efforts to prevent layoffs, which thus far have not been necessary for SPS," Esler said.

All details have not been finalized, but under this program, employees age 60 or older may retire and receive their full retirement benefits, said J. Bryan Austin, SPS senior vice-president-administration. Normal retirement age is 65.
