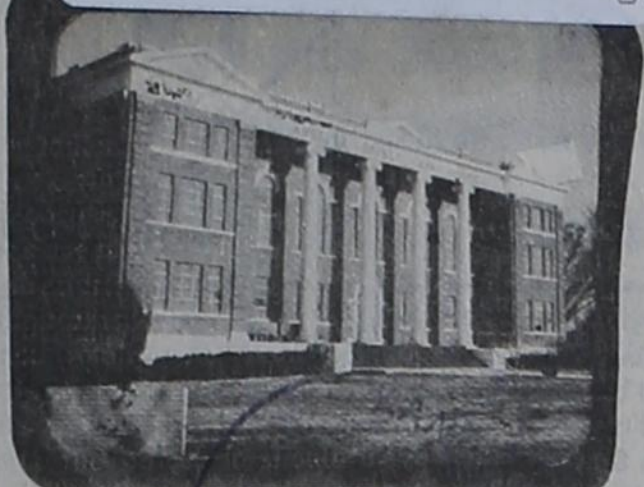

Saturday, October 18. In referring to the "Friendship Quilt", Mrs. Sabbe said, "The quilt is friendship and we are mighty proud of it".

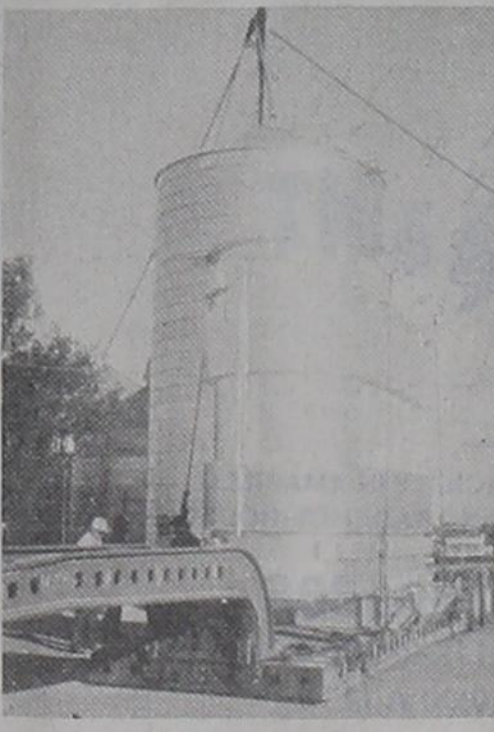
### Services Held For Mattie E. Eubanks

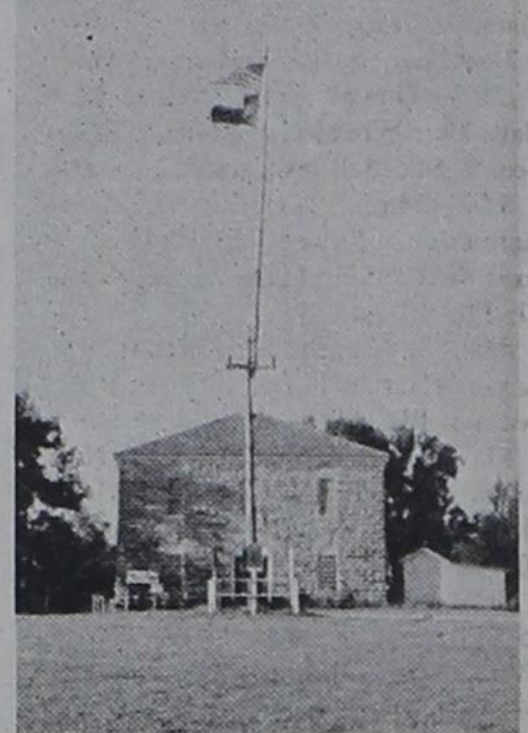

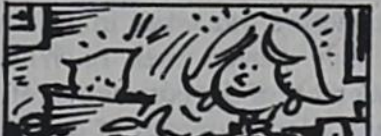

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

**PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED  
**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**  
GENERAL ELECTION  
NOVEMBER 4, 1986

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

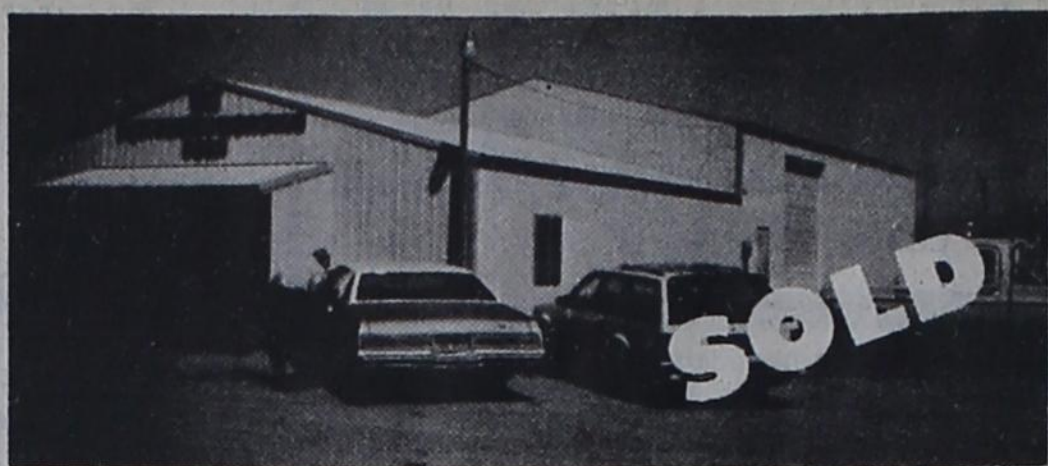

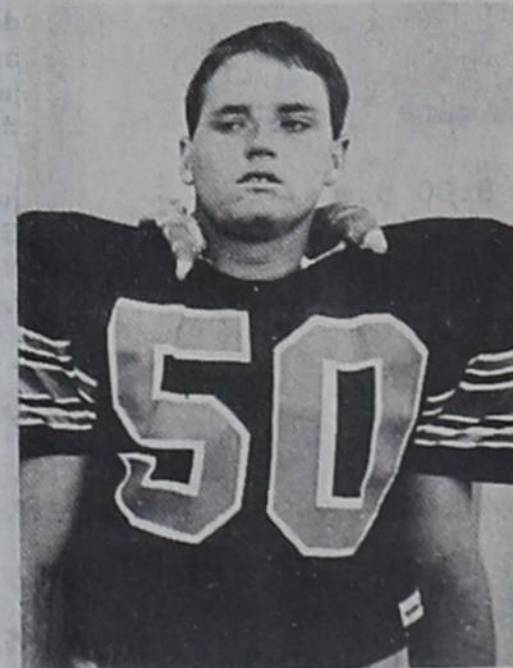

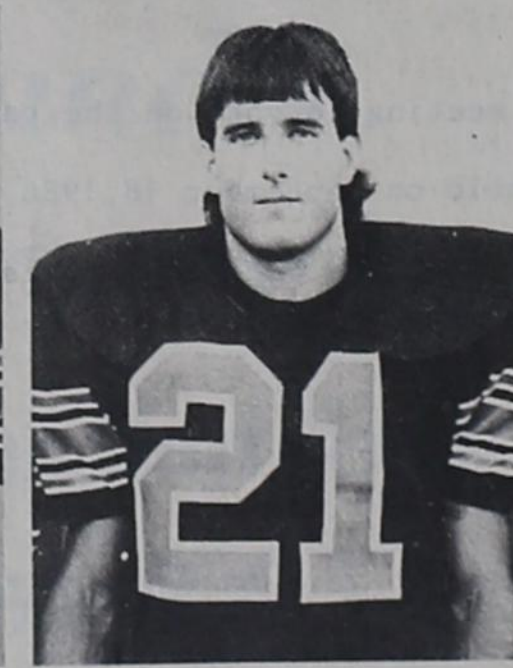
JUSTIN HUGHES

In reference to the ad campaign being staged by Gov. White, Mrs. Clements stated, White "is desparate to be conducting a negative cam-

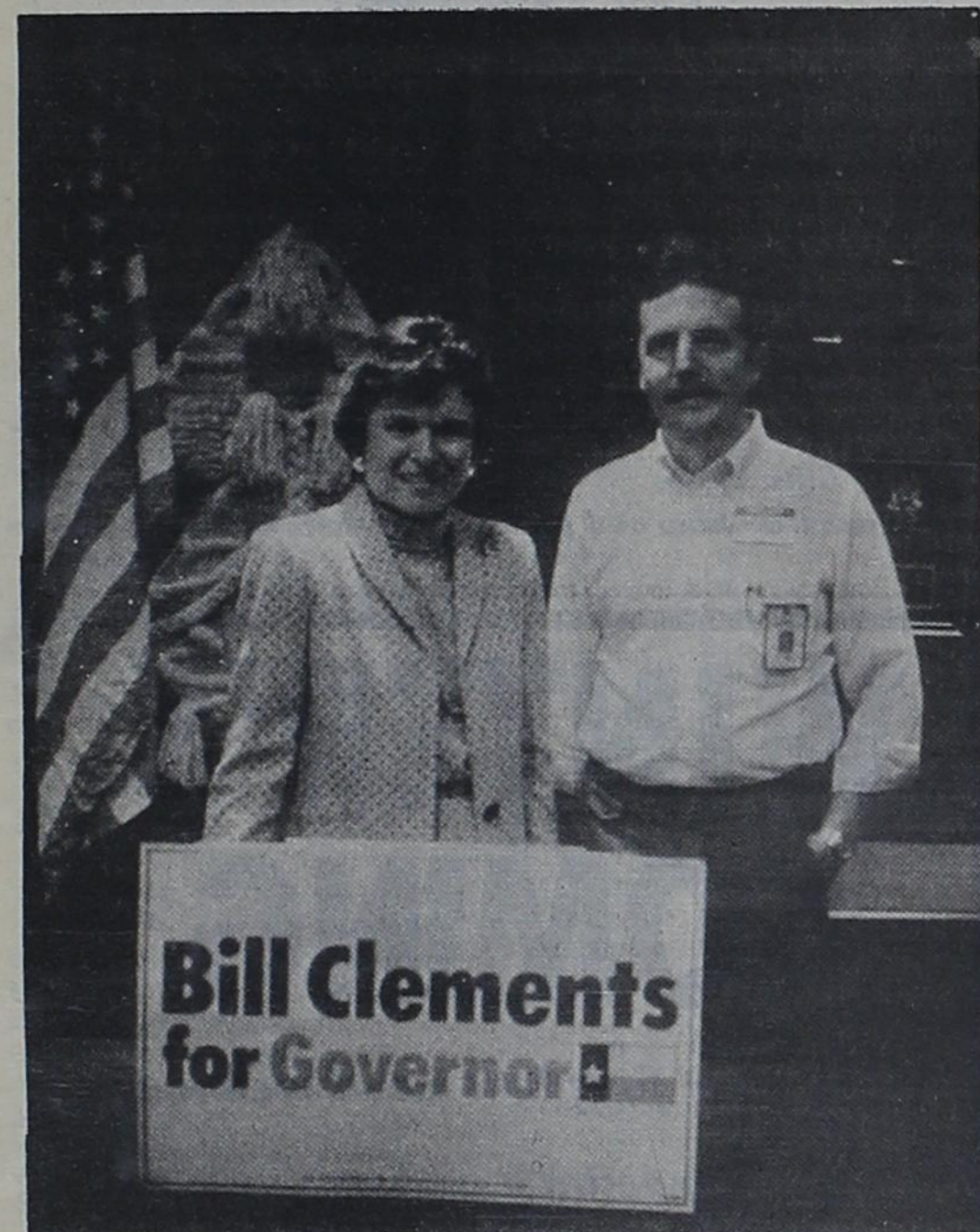
paign" instead of campaigning on the issues.

**TEXAS GARDENER TIPS**

Not many plants thrive during Texas winters, and even fewer do well in the shade during a Texas winter. The columbine, a fall-planted native annual, is an exception. It will survive and grow during the winter in most of the state and produce beautiful blooms in early spring.

Many types of columbines are native to Texas but, unfortunately, are relatively uncommon in Texas gardens. The three most common species are *A. Canadensis*, *A. Chrysantha* and *A. Longissima*, but many other varieties also do well here. Most are located in Central or West Texas, along shaded creeks, but they are adapted to protected sites in most of the state.

Many people start their own transplants from seeds in midsummer, but transplants can be obtained for September and October plantings from some mail-order

nurseries. Even though columbines aren't long-lived perennials and most varieties die out after the first year's bloom, some natives may persist for several years and even re-seed prolifically. If you think of columbines as fall-planted annuals, though, you'll be less likely to suffer the agony of horticultural defeat.

Columbines grow to a height of about 1 foot and should be spaced in beds about 9 to 12 inches apart. The *A. Canadensis* variety, commonly called wild or red columbine, likes acid or limy soils and must have good drainage. Those of you who have clay soils should work sand and organic matter into the soil before planting. This plant will die back when the first frost hits but will start putting on new leaves almost immediately.

Other types of columbines, such

as the longspur or McKana varieties, are not as winter hardy but grow naturally in rocky areas near running water.

**TEXAS GARDENER TIPS**

To begin a successful gardening season you must properly prepare your soil before planting time.

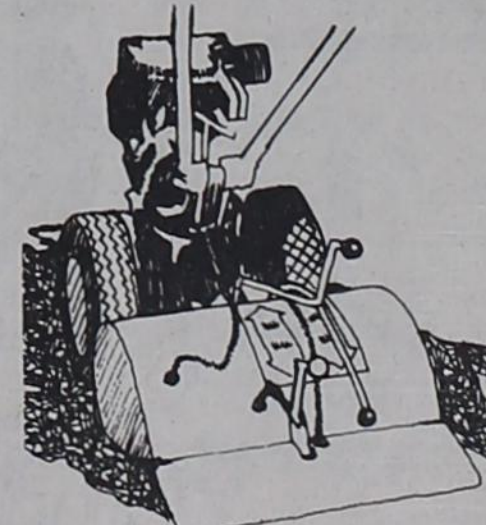
If your soil has never been "worked" or if you have had a garden but never paid attention to soil improvement, the following guidelines should be of help.

1. **Get an early start.** For ideal results, start to prepare your soil four to six weeks before planting time.

2. **Do a soil test.** This is one of the most basic—and most ignored—steps to successful gardening. How well your crops do hinge on whether your soil is acceptable. For most crops to thrive, the pH should be somewhere in the range of 6.5 to 7.5.

3. **Treat with a soil fumigant.** If the area has never been worked before, or if you have a continual problem with grass, weeds or nematodes, you may want to treat the area with a soil fumigant such as Vapam. Be sure to follow the label instructions.

**Prepare Gardens Ahead of Time**



Most gardens will perform better if you add proper amounts of commercial fertilizer. Though these requirements vary somewhat depending on your soil and the crops you plan to grow, it is generally advisable to use moderate amounts of a complete fertilizer. The equivalent of 1 to 2 pounds per feet of row should be adequate.

6. **Till your garden deeply.** After adding the organic matter and fertilizers, your soil should be tilled to a depth of at least 8 to 10 inches, the deeper the better.

7. **Keep your soil healthy and productive.** Now that you have developed healthy, fertile garden soil, be sure to maintain it by regular applications of fertilizer and organic matter.

4. **Add organic matter.** Virtually all soils will be improved significantly through the addition of organic matter. Incorporate a 2 to 3-inch layer or more of materials such as well-decomposed leaves, grass clippings, hay or other compost materials to the soil.

5. **Add fertilizer as needed.**
