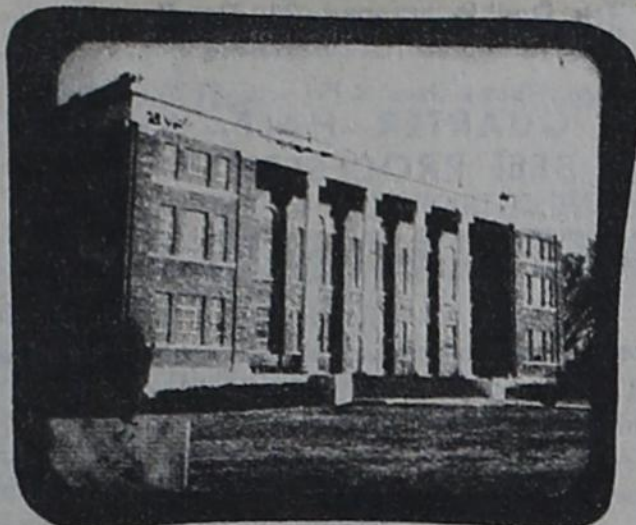

KPDR-FM JOINS AIR WAVES

250-300 Attend "Sign On" Celebration

Last Sunday was a day of celebration and praise in Wheeler as KPDR-FM went on the air waves, meeting the target date that had been set for the first broadcast of Wheeler's radio station. The goal of 3:00 p.m. on August 31, was met in spite of difficulties that complicated the process. The transmitter that has been purchased in order to broadcast at 3000 watts is not ready yet, so a stand-by transmitter of only 300 watts was brought. This transmitter began smoking and become inoperative at about 1:00 p.m. Sunday, only 2 hours before the station and "Sign On" rally was to begin transmitting. In addition to this problem, a problem was discovered at the tower itself which made it impossible at this time to place the antennas at the proper height and in the proper number on the tower. The antennas for the station are to be ultimately at a height of about 370-375 feet. For now, one antenna has been placed at approximately 50 feet. So, the station is presently operating at only about 1/7 of the height on the tower that it will be and with only 1/6 of the antennas, in a test mode of operation at very low

wattage. Yet, in spite of all this, excitement is high, and numerous people are receiving the programs with a good signal as far as 15 miles from the studio.

It is estimated that 250 to 300 persons assembled at the Wheeler High School auditorium where the Royalheirs Quartet sang, the Scriptural sounding of the horn announced the proclamation of this new Christian radio station, and the official dedication of the station to God's glory was made. There was a period of simulcast of 2 radio stations as KSWP in Lufkin, Texas celebrated their 1 year anniversary of broadcasting there. That Christian station went on the air August 31, at 3:00 p.m. last year. Pastor Calvert there and Pastor Ricky Pfeil here visited over the air on both stations. All in all, there was a lot of celebrating, a lot of enthusiasm, a lot of anticipation regarding the radio station.

The Royalheirs have a song recorded on one of their record albums entitled "Turn Your Radio On" which is the song used as the main theme song for KPDR. When 3:00 arrived,

Also, bring your child's immunization record; it must be signed by his/her doctor. If your child's immunizations are not up to date, Wheeler I.S.D. is conducting a free immunization clinic under the direction of Mrs. Jim Wright, On Thursday, Sept. 11, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. in the auditorium.

Monday, Sept. 8, date to apply for admission to Pre-kindergarten.

If you wish to fill out an admission form early and have it ready, when you come, please see the secretary in the main office of Wheeler I.S.D. She will be happy to give you a form.

Local Teachers Attend State Conference

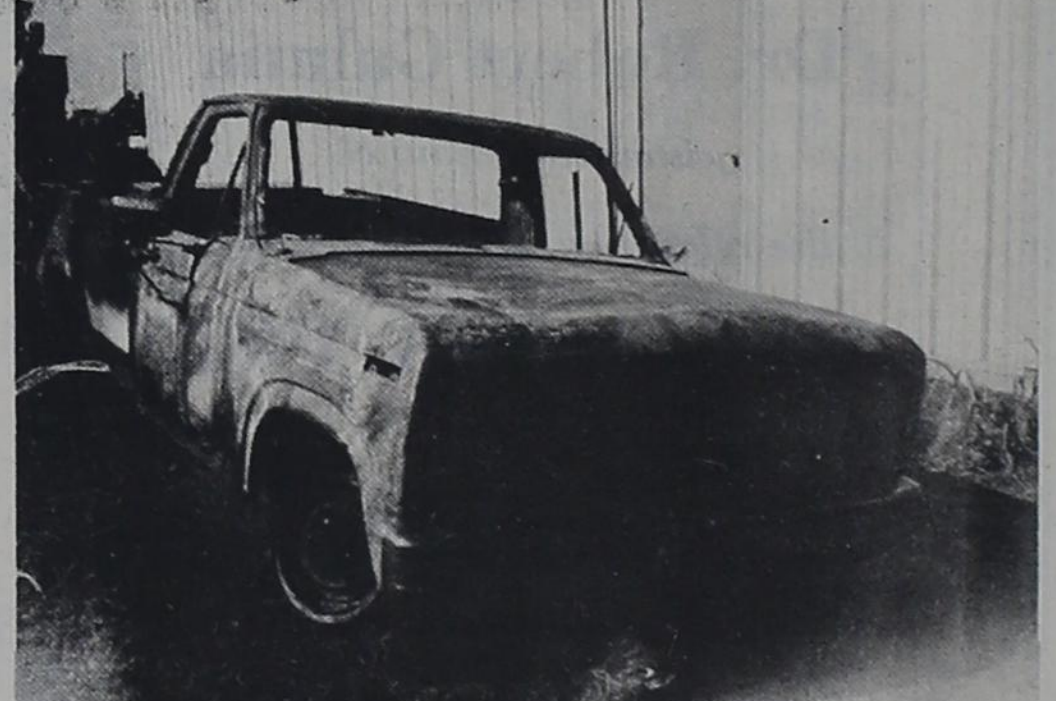

STRATEGIES FOR MAKING ENDS MEET

The mortgage, car payment, and utility bills still have to get paid, even when money is tight. So for most of us, that means "making ends meet" is a matter of reducing household living expenses for food, clothing, and home maintenance.

There must be 1001 ways to cut these expenses, certainly more than could ever be listed in this space -- or that you could remember.

But there are some general strategies for cutting household expenses that you can apply to your own situation.

First, try trading time for money. Cut up your own chicken, make cookies instead of buying them, prepare a casserole from scratch instead of a box and use slow cooking methods to cook some less expensive cuts of meat. The same thing applies to many home cleaning products, substitute generic products or make your own all-purpose cleaner from vinegar and water, or ammonia and water, at home.

Trading time for money extends to careful shopping: making lists, checking ads for the best prices, coupon clipping, comparison shopping and sticking to the budget. However, be careful about using coupons to save money on things you don't need or using up more money on gas than you saved by driving across town to get a "bargain."

Another good strategy is to think in terms of recycling or repairing anything before you consider buying. If you sew, mend or update clothes that can be worn for another season of "handed down" to a younger child.

Rewire your old lamp, repair your own washing machine or fix the cracked plaster yourself. You can get step-by-step instructions on home

repairs from Extension publications, library books and free pamphlets on display at many hardware and home improvement stores.

Sharing is another excellent strategy for stretching dollars. Many families commonly share some items, such as baby furniture or maternity clothes, with relatives or friends.

But also think in terms of sharing other infrequently used items. For example, if you and your neighbor both garden, you could share the cost of a needed tool. Sharing applies to skills too. If you have a friend who knows how to change the oil on a car, you could babysit one evening in exchange for this service.


The last strategy is to simply cut back. If you've got two rented phones, take one back to the phone company. Turn the air conditioner up or the heater down and dress accordingly to cut down on utility costs. Try to work out carpooling arrangements so you won't need a second car.

Take a careful look at your lifestyle and hunt for those things you could cut out or reduce.

You may be surprised how much money you can save by substituting time for money, recycling and repairing, sharing and cutting back. You may even enjoy some, if not all, of a simpler lifestyle.

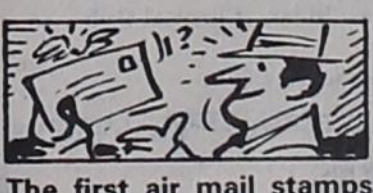

I think one of the major factors is that almost all of the streets in Wheeler are paved and curbed and guttered. Many of the houses and lawns were no better kept than those in Wellington, but when they sit on a paved street their appearance is greatly improved.

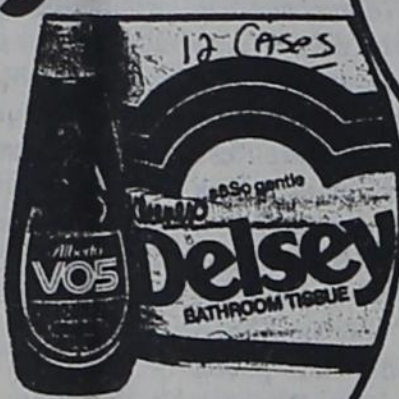
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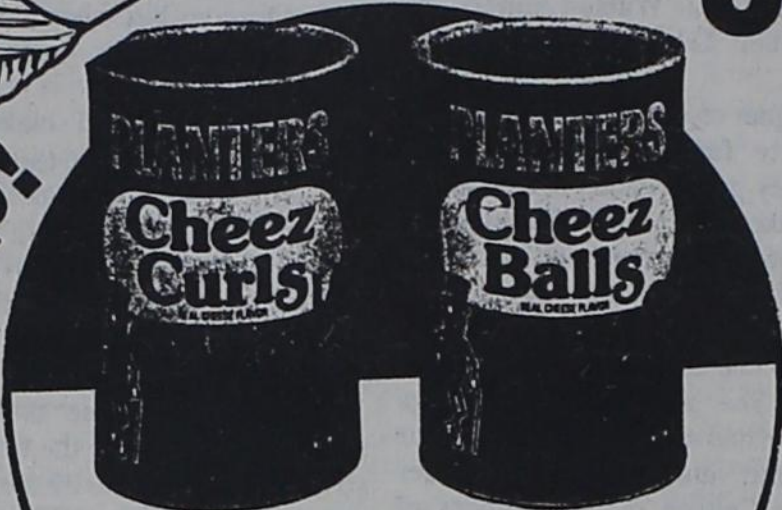

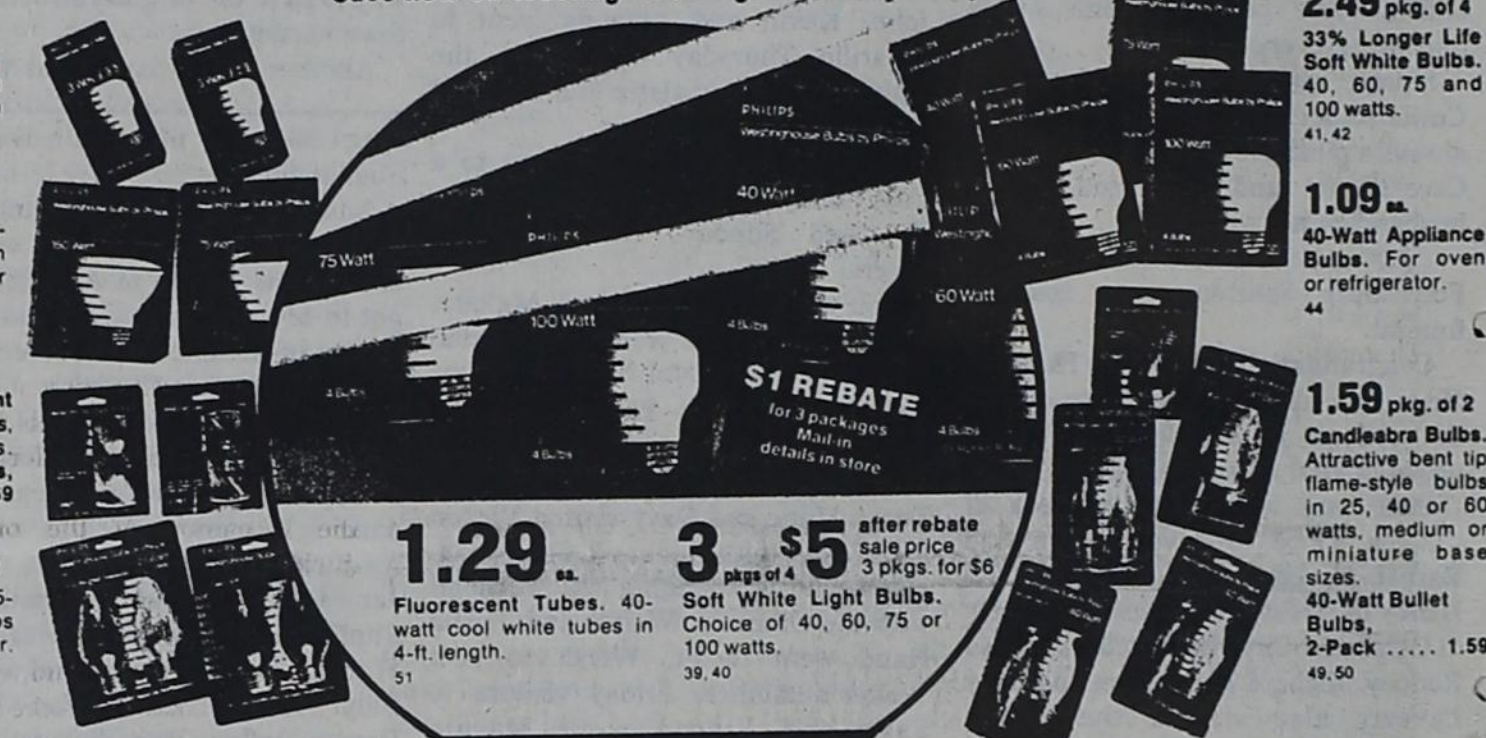

MAGIC CITY REUNION

An event of some historical and sentimental importance to many current and former residents of Wheeler County and particularly former teachers and people who resided in Magic City in its heyday was observed at the Hilton Inn in Amarillo on August 1-2 at the ninth annual observation of the Magic City Ex-Students Reunion. About fifty former students, teachers, or people who lived in Magic City attended the meeting and others sent their regrets about not being able to attend this year.

The organization was formed in 1978 through the urging of T. Gordon Phillips, a former teacher and coach in Magic City to whom the school and community had come to mean a great deal in terms of loyalty and affection for the school and its students, faculty members, and former residents of the booming little city located in the southwestern part of Wheeler County. Dr. Charles Harmon and June George Zitterkob were instrumental in contacting former students and teachers of the Magic City School and the organization has been a success from its outset. The late Azel S. Wharton and B.T. Rucker, both former principals of the school, were prominent in the formation of the organization during its early years.

Hubert Bentley (now deceased) moved to Magic City in 1917-nine years before the oil boom, which came in 1926. Hubert recalls the first school was called "Carpenter", the post office was named "Exum" and the town was Magic City. As oil wells were completed in 1926 and years afterward, Magic City grew by leaps and bounds. At its peak, Magic City consisted of three carbon black plants, three gasoline plants, a hotel, a cafe, a drug store, a railroad, and three churches. Many survey crews, seismograph crews, drilling crews, and many pumpers, switchers, and roustabots, casing crews, and various types of construction crews made up the population.

A new brick school was built in Magic City during the early thirties which included all grades. Magic City was blessed with many good athletes and the school competed successfully with teams from Mobeetie, Wheeler, Shamrock, McLean, Texola, Pampa,

Alanreed, Heald, Dozier, and Many others. The football teams as well as the basketball and track teams produced some outstanding individual performances by the students which attended the school. Many students have become successful as teachers, engineers, coaches, businessmen and women, and all of them have proved to be good citizens who made many worthy contributions to the American society as a whole.

In 1936-37 the high school students of the Magic City schools were bused to Wheeler to attend school. In later years, the students were also transferred to Shamrock and many of them chose to attend the McLean schools. The class of 1935-36 was the only one of the Magic City classes which graduated from an eleven grade school. Dr. Charles Harmon of Alice, Texas and Nora Pearl Bentley Delozier of Spearman are the sole survivors of that class.

With the coming of gas and oil conservation measures and regulations which were enforced by the Texas Railroad Commission, in 1941 the carbon black plants and the gasoline plants were shut down and many of the populace began to move away. The school house was torn down in the mid-fifties.

But Magic City lives on the hearts and memories of the ex-students, teachers, citizens and friends of the flamboyant boom town of the twenties and thirties. The memories and traditions of the community are enhanced and extended through the many reminiscences of events which occurred so long ago in this Wheeler County community.

Duane George of Perryton, Texas is the current president of the Magic City Ex-Students Reunion. There are about 200 registered members of the organization. This year the O'Gormans had the most family members present with the Harmons being next in number. June George has attended all nine meetings. Among those attending were: Cliff and Ken Young, Cotton Green and Lois, Perlina Box Rogers, Minnie Lee Phillips, R.T. Melvin and Marie Crawford Stephens, and Everette and Clara Cole.

TOOLS FOR LEADERSHIP

It's not necessarily true that, "Leaders are born, not made." Everyone is born with a certain set of tools, and it is up to each individual to develop and use these tools.

Studies of leadership activities show that, in most cases, what a person does to get ready for a leadership job is far more important than any personal characteristic that he or she may have been born with. Leadership is not a mystical trait that one individual has and another has not. It is learned behavior that anyone can improve by study and application.

Anyone can be a leader if he or she has the determination to develop the abilities that make a leader.

A good leader, like a good mechanic, needs good tools. Basic tools to develop leadership, such as in the 4-H program, include the following:

- * A genuine liking for boys and girls.
- * Ability to work with others and to get their cooperation. This involves developing qualities of friendliness, patience, sympathy, confidence, and trust.
- * Enthusiasm for 4-H club work and its basic ideals and beliefs. Enthusiasm is contagious.
- * Ability to organize and plan. Leadership will require a certain amount of time in your schedule. How much time you devote to your project will depend upon your individual situation.
- * Initiative. A good leader tries new ideas, offers suggestions and continually strives to reach goals set by the group.
- * Vision. A good leader has the ability to look ahead and share with the group suggestions for broadening the program.
- * Faith in others and their abilities. Although younger 4-H members may have limited abilities, good leaders recognize what they can do and have faith in them.

Being a 4-H leader will help an individual grow as he or she watches

the growth of and development of young people.

The growth, experience, and great feelings that a 4-H leader merits from his or her efforts will definitely be a plus.

4-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and focuses on the needs, interests, and concerns of the boys and girls between 9 and 19 years of age, regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, religion, handicap, or national origin.

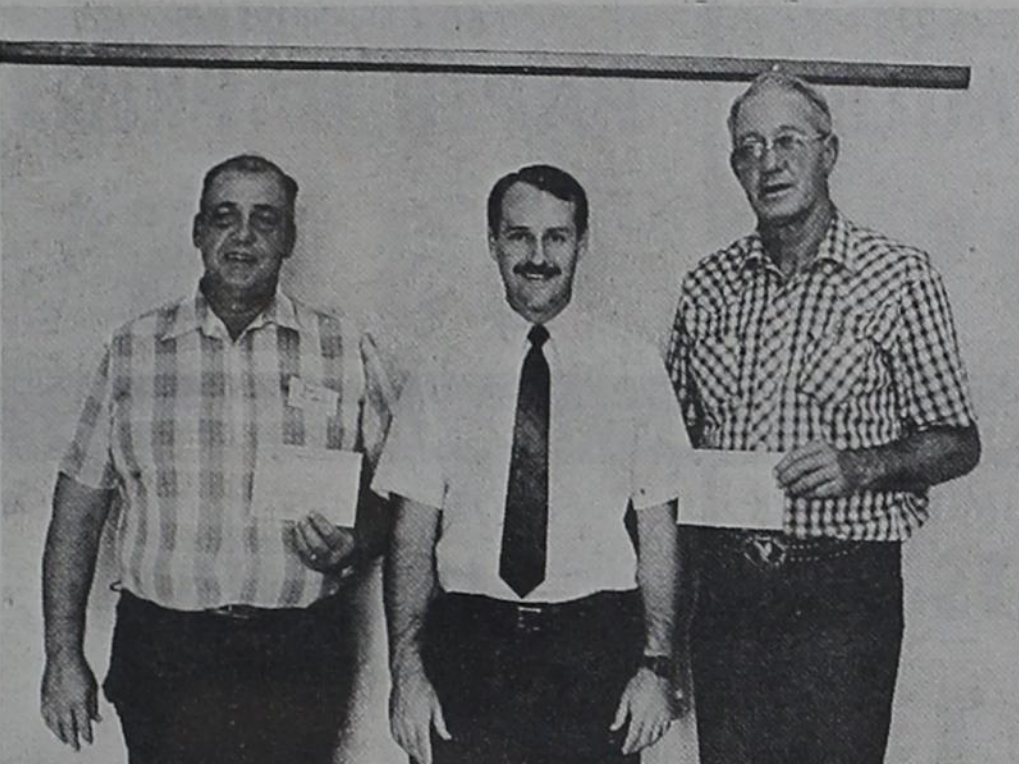

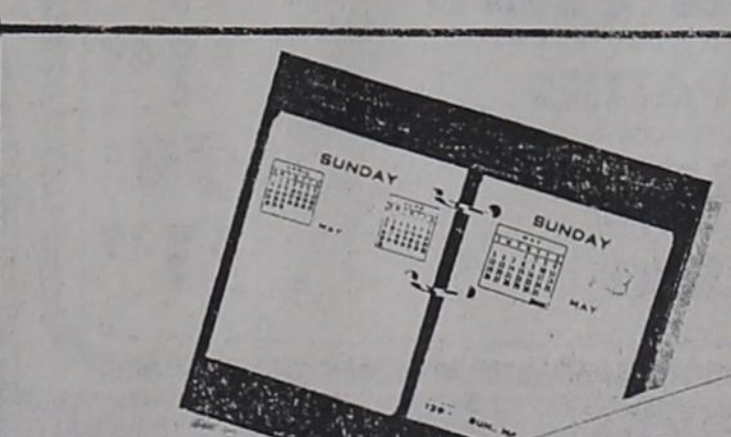
