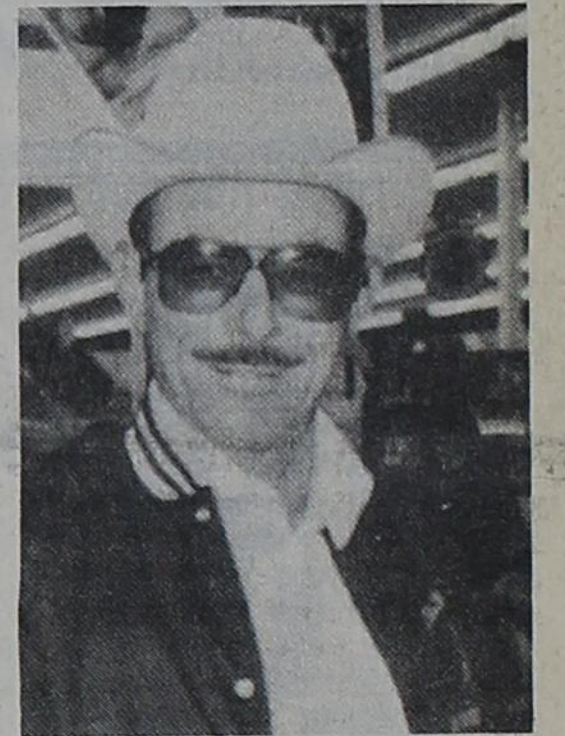
Tom Christner Rites Saturday, Aug. 16

Wheeler County Range, Pasture Tour Tues.

Farmers, ranchers, and other interested people in Wheeler County are invited to take part in the Wheeler County Range and Pasture Tour on Tuesday, August 26. The tour will begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Bill Caswell farm, 1 mile west of Mobeetie. The tour is being sponsored by the Wheeler County Agriculture Committee, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District.
At the first stop, the group will look at an established field of Plains Bluestem grass, as well as a seeder and seed harvesting equipment. Other stops will include a shinnery control demonstration plot on the Joe VanZandt ranch and a sagebrush control plot at Chuck Hogan's. The final stop will be at Bill Atherton's to compare new stands of Plains Bluestem planted into living wheat and on a clean till site.
Lunch at Maxey's Steakhouse will be furnished by T.J. Bluestem Farms of Fargo, Oklahoma, and Seright Enterprises of Elk City, Oklahoma.
After lunch, there will be short presentations by two Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialists. Dr. J. F. Caddenhead, Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist from Vernon, will give information on the importance of weed and brush control in rangeland and on chemicals that can be used in various situations. Dr. Michael Hickey, Extension Soil Chemist from Lubbock, will discuss pasture fertility programs that can increase the quantity and quality of forage produced.
Producers are also invited to an open meeting of the Eastern Panhandle Cattlemen's Club at 8:00 p.m. in Maxey's Steakhouse, on August 26. Following the "Dutch Treat" dinner, Dr. Hickey will discuss more about pasture fertility and wheat fertility. He will also talk about soil testing and interpreting the soil test reports. Dr. Hickey is in charge of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock and is responsible for making the fertility recommendations on the soil test reports.

MEXICAN VANILLA: IS IT SAFE?

The following material was written by Al B. Wagner, Jr., Extension Food Technologist, Department of Horticultural Science, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This summer more than ever Tourists may be traveling to Mexico to take advantage of bargain prices. But one bargain may not be in your best interest. I am referring to vanilla purchasing in Mexico. The kind that is an extract of tonka beans or better known as coumarin is no bargain and may damage your health. This product smells like real vanilla and usually sells for \$1.50 - \$2.00 a bottle.

The genuine vanilla bean **Vanilla Fragrans**, is a native of Mexico, but is not cheap, even where it is grown. The vanilla plant is an orchid in a vine form that grows in the subtropical areas of southeast Mexico and nearby countries.

The tonka bean, **Dipteryx Odorata**, is a native of South America, but grows in Mexico. It is a tree that grows up to 150 feet tall that belongs to the pea family. It smells enough like vanilla to satisfy all but the experts. However, in 1954, this impostor was prohibited by FDA for use as a food or food additive because it was determined to be a poisonous and deleterious substance.

It is interesting to note that a derivative (dicumarol) of coumarin is used in certain blood thinning medicines (anticoagulants). This derivative, also known as warfarin, is used in rat poison as well, causing the rodent to die from hemorrhaging. There has been no evidence that coumarin itself has a blood thinning effect in humans.

The Food & Drug Administration (FDA) standards for vanilla extract specify that 13.35 to 15 ounces (depending on moisture content) of vanilla beans be used per gallon of extracting fluid. The extracting fluid consists of ethyl alcohol (35%) and water (65%). There are other standards for vanilla flavoring, (which is a more dilute solution); for mixtures with artificial vanilla (vanillin); and for concentrates and powders.

The chances for deception in buying vanilla would be lessened if everyone bought the whole bean. Vanilla beans are long (7-10 inches) and thin (1/4 inch) like a pencil. They turn dark brown to black when cured. The entire

pod can be ground and used for flavoring, or the flavoring can be extracted with ethyl alcohol an water. Tonka beans, on the other hand are oval in shape, about 5 inches long by 3 inches wide. Only the seeds are used for flavoring. These are about 1/2 x 2 inches in size. the pod is not used for all.

Verifying the presence of coumarin in vanilla type products is relatively easy using a fairly simple laboratory procedure. FDA has tested many vanilla type products from Mexico and has found coumarin often and in varying amounts. But how does the average consumer know before they buy? There is no good way to tell. Stay away from the real cheap bottle of vanilla (\$1.50 - \$2.00) is one suggestion. The best way to avoid coumarin in your vanilla is to not buy it in Mexico.

Ushers were Hunter Hartsfield, brother of the groom, and Shawn Everett of Canadian, nephew of the bride.

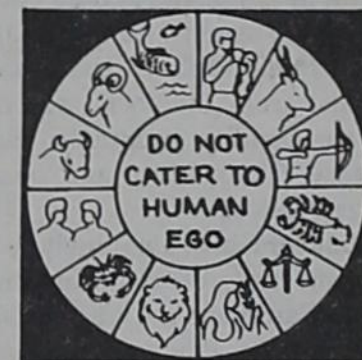

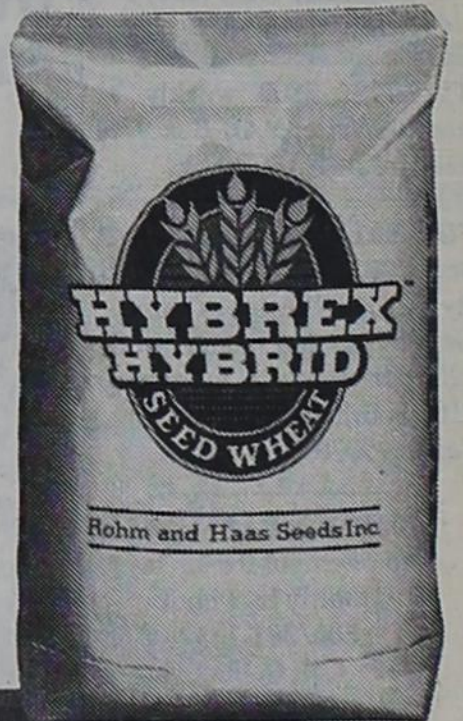

The Sesquicentennial Monument has been in the planning stages for over two years and will require several additional months to complete. When finished, it will be transported across the State in four large flatbed trucks.
