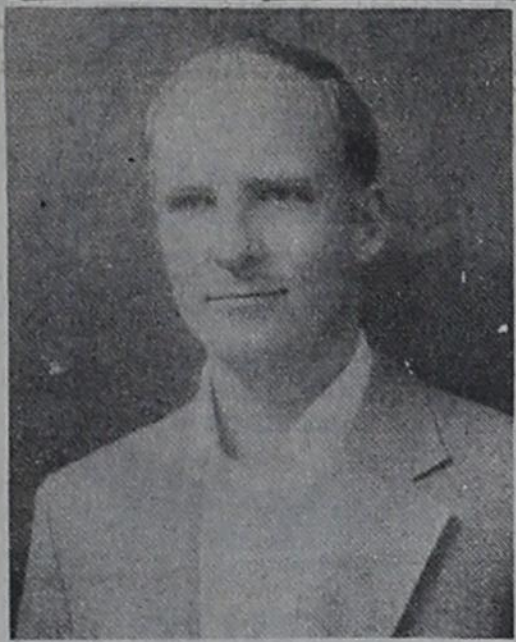
No special recipe is necessary, just your favorite cream pie filling recipe and make the crust with half white

Fortune was traveling west and struck the Laverty vehicle broadside. H. G., 81, was

treated for a broken nose and two broken jaws, upper and lower. Agnes Fortune, 79, was treated for two broken ribs. Laverty was kept over night at Parkview for observation and released. The Borger couple was wearing their seatbelts at the time of the accident. This is the first major traffic accident in the area since Nov. 2 (Major is accident with injuries.).

GROUP FAVORS PRISON

Opposition, If Any, Not Represented

The "Townhall Meeting" called by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce drew a crowd of 70 people Monday evening, February 9. The county was well represented at the meeting to determine the feelings of county citizens on pursuing the issue.

The meeting was called to order by Chamber President, Dan Kenney. Mr. Kenney told those in attendance of the reason for the meeting and how the Chamber came to call the meeting. If as a result of the meeting, the Chamber feels the majority of the citizens are for the project, they will continue in an effort to obtain a minimum security prison for the area, if and when the state decides to build. Kenney admitted the details available to the Chamber were sketchy and limited to the information in a letter from Representative Dick Waterfield to Mayor Wanda Herd.

It was further emphasized the prison would not be located in any town and would be of benefit to a larger area. A prison would offer employment to a regional area and would boost the economy.

Jimmy Adams was introduced to the group. Adams offered some additional information and helped field questions proposed by the gathering. Pampa, Borger, Booker and Canadian have all expressed a desire for a prison to be located in their area. A minimum security prison to house 500-1000 inmates would provide employment for 250 to 325 people and would have a payroll of approximately \$2 to \$2.5 million.

It was explained that minimum

security means the inmates would be non-violent offenders. In answer to the question, "Could the minimum security prison be changed to a maximum security facility?" Adams explained that the cost of construction to change status would be prohibitive.

In the list of needs for such a facility, three sections of agricultural land, and adequate water were named.

Julie Colver of Rep. Dick Waterfield's office in Canadian came forward at the meeting and offer a few facts for those in attendance. Ms. Colver stated it was unlikely the facility would be located near one

town. Medical facilities, Highway system, use of land and distance from Huntsville would be considered in the location of any facility. The distance from a state line would be a consideration for this particular area. According to Ms. Colver, Rep. Waterfield would be more than happy to visit with the voters about the issue and urged everyone to voice their opinions in letters to some eight individuals, who will have a say in the building of a prison.

A vote was taken; those in attendance were "FOR" the continued effort to get a minimum security prison located in the area.

3 Places To Be Filled On Wheeler Council

The filing deadline for placing a name on the ballot for city council is Wednesday, February 18. Eddie Richardson and Berniece Hall have each filed for Place 3 on the council. Mark Frankenbery is still unopposed for his re-election to place 5. Place 1 on the ballot is still without a candidate; this place is presently held by Bobby Vanpool.

Three places are to be filled on the city council in the April 4 election. Any qualified voter residing within the city is eligible to file for any of the three seats on the council. Places 1, 3 and 5 are each open for 2-year terms.

The positions to be filled are presently being served by Bobby Vanpool, Berniece Hall and Mark Frankenberry; places 1, 3 and 5 respectively.

Vanpool will be completing his first full term on the council, having been appointed to fill an unexpired term before seeking re-election in 1985. Mr. Vanpool is undecided as to seeking re-election.

Mrs. Hall will be completing her ninth year on the council. She was elected in 1978 to fill an unexpired term and re-elected in 1981. She has been working with the park and swimming pool. Mrs. Hall announced her immediate plans were to not seek re-election.

Mark Frankenbery will be seeking his second term on the council, having been elected to the council in 1985.

DO YOU WONDER WHERE THE MONEY WENT?

Going over last year's receipts, cancelled checks, W-2 forms and other papers to get ready for tax time is never much fun. But it's even more bothersome when it creates some nagging doubts about how well last year's income was spent.

You might avoid the problem next year by establishing a family spending plan for 1987 while the year is still young. Whether you have a lot of money or a little, a sound plan for spending is the key to having dollars for what is needed and wanted before the money disappears in unexpected ways.

It's fairly simple to set up a spending plan. First calculate your 1987 income from all sources. Then, while you've got all your 1986 financial records out, use them to estimate your expenses for next year.

So you don't miss items or underestimate what you spend, look at your weekly, monthly, and yearly expenses. Some of the things we buy with "pocket money" such as restaurant meals or recreation expenses, often get overlooked. And don't forget to include irregular expenses, such as semi-annual insurance payments or car servicing.

When you have these two sets of figures, you can plan ahead for what you will spend each pay period, and how much you should set aside in savings to meet irregular bills and unexpected expenses.

Having a spending plan also allows you to "bill" yourself for a certain amount each pay period which can go into savings to meet long-term financial goals. That goal might be a downpayment for a new house or car, college expenses, a vacation or a retirement nest egg.

It takes practice and patience in keeping financial records so that you can use fairly accurate amounts for planning rather than estimates. But good records can help you see where you might want to cut your spending plan in some areas and increase it in others.

We have a number of Extension publications which contain worksheet and logs to help keep track of family spending. These publications and other programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve veterans and people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, handicap, religion, or national origin. PRO™ TEXAS A NEW OPTIONAL CALLING PLAN FROM AT&T

On November 13, 1986 AT&T Communications of The Southwest, Inc. ("AT&T") filed with the Public Utility Commission (PUC) of Texas to introduce a new intrastate, optional calling plan, PRO Texas. A comparable interstate plan, known as PRO™ America, is currently available to Texas customers.

PRO Texas gives Texas consumers an opportunity to save money on direct dialed in-state long distance calls. Customers who choose this new AT&T plan will receive a 10% discount on all AT&T intrastate direct dialed station calls by paying a monthly charge of \$15.00.

The PRO Texas discount applies to calls placed during all rate periods and all days. The discount is in addition to the AT&T intrastate evening discount of 25% and the night/weekend discount of 40%. A one time charge of \$6.00 will be billed to initiate the service. However, this charge will be waived during the first 90 days that the offering is available.

PRO Texas will be available to all Message Telephone Service customers in Texas. AT&T estimates that it will generate revenues in the first year of almost \$8 million, which is .7% of AT&T's annual revenues for all Texas intrastate service.

The PUC has assigned Docket No. 7194 to this proposed service offering. The proposed effective date for PRO Texas is March 16, 1987. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the PUC as soon as possible. 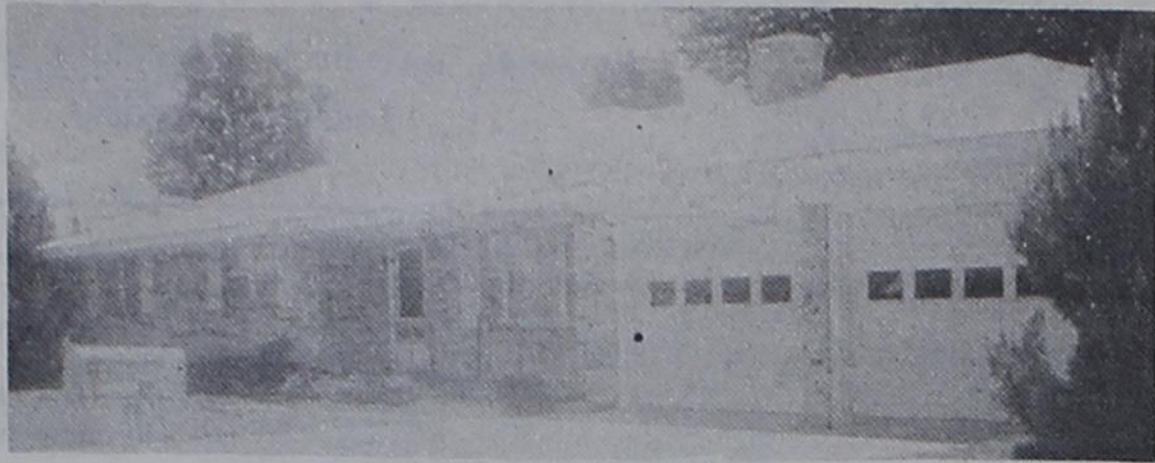

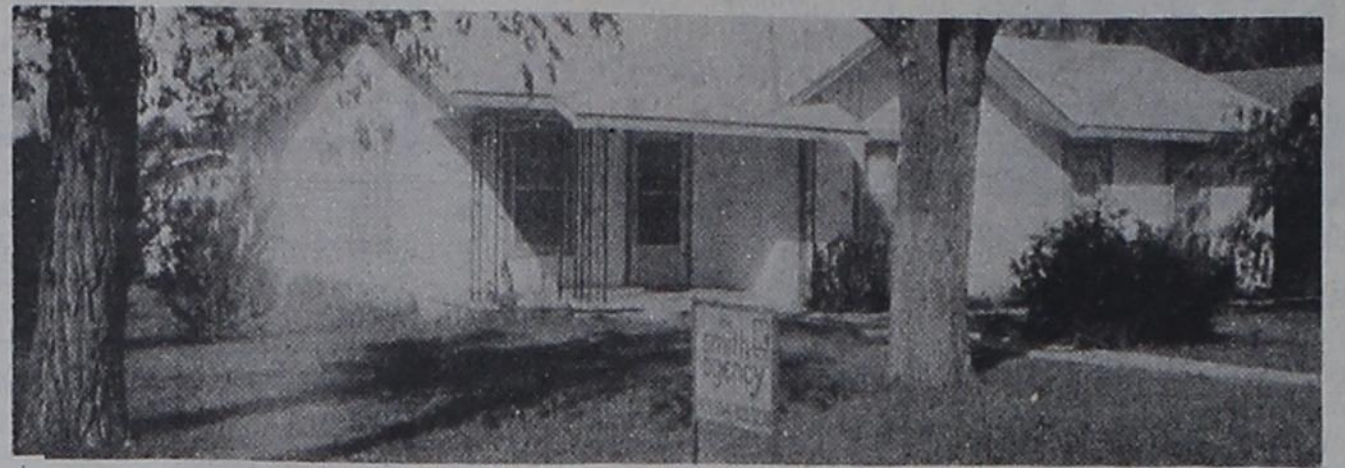

What's Up Doc?

Heart Disease

Question: Doctor, what are the significant risk factors for heart disease and is there anything I can do to avoid it?

Answer: There are several risk factors that have definitely been linked to heart disease. Some of these can be reduced or eliminated. The very well established risk factors include family history, age, sex, smoking, high blood pressure, (Hypertension), high cholesterol or triglycerides, diabetes, and obesity.

Family history of early heart disease (60 years old) is one of the most important risk factors. The older a person is, the more likely they are to have heart disease. Males are more susceptible than females, especially at an early age. Obviously, there is not a lot that can be done to affect your family history, sex, or age.

High Blood Pressure increases your chance of a heart attack. The lower your Blood Pressure (within normal limits), the longer your life expectancy. People at ideal body weight to 10% over ideal body weight have the longest life expectancy. A diabetic is seven times more likely to experience a heart attack this year than his non-diabetic counterpart. High cholesterol &/or high tricyclerides also alter your chances in favor of heart disease. Smoking may possibly be the single most important risk factor.

There is indeed much that you can do to prevent heart disease. Everyone past 20 years old should have their blood tested for cholesterol & tricyclerides. Everyone should be periodically screened for high blood pressure and diabetes. If you smoke, there are methods available to help you stop. There is also help available for those who demonstrate motivation to lose weight. Aerobic exercise, in moderate amounts, conditions your heart and lungs, and will afford some protection.

If you need help in any of the above areas, see your physician. A heart is a terrible thing to waste.
