Townhall Meeting Monday Evening

A townhall meeting has been set for Monday evening, February 9, at the Wheeler High School auditorium. The purpose of the Chamber of Commerce sponsored meeting will be the discussion of an effort to obtain a medium security prison for the Wheeler area. The opinions of the citizens of Wheeler is necessary to determine whether to further pursue the project. The time of the meeting will be 7:30.

The need for more prison facilities in Texas is a much publicized problem at the present time. According to news reports, a census of the Texas prison systems is taken each day to determine population; whether any more inmates can be housed by the state. It has been mandated by the Federal Courts that Texas expand their prison systems. The "Panhandle" has been targeted for the location of the expansion.

The first step in expanding the system will be the building of a medium security facility to house 500 to 1,000 inmates. This would mean the employment of 250 to 325 people with an annual payroll of between \$2 and \$2.5 million. Upon hearing the plans to locate a prison facility in the "Panhandle" area, Mayor Wanda Herd contacted State Representative Dick Waterfield. In response to her letter, Rep. Waterfield furnished information and requirements of the planned expansion.

The townhall meeting Monday evening is important to the community. Be there and let your opinion be heard. The meeting will be at 7:30 in the high school auditorium.

The "old home town", Hinton, Oklahoma, is in the process of obtaining a minimum security prison in the hopes of boosting their economy. Hinton is a city of approximately 1500 and has no industry, other than farming, oil and gas.

Mark Frankenberry has filed with the city secretary, Mildred Ramsey for

the placing of his name on the April 4, 1987 ballot. Three members will be elected to the council. Filing will continue through Wed., Feb. 18.

Three places are to be filled on the city council in the April 4 election. Any qualified voter residing within the city is eligible to file for any of the three seats on the council. Places 1, 3 and 5 are each open for 2-year terms.

City Of Mobeetie Gets New Water Well

The City of Mobeetie like many small communities in the Texas Panhandle has had to struggle to keep a viable water system and supply. We needed a new water system. So the city obtained a loan from Farmers Home Administration in 1982 for a new well, standpipe storage tank, water lines and improvements.

During the construction of the new well the old well, which only produced 40-50 gallons per minute was in use and the city planned to use it as a second well for backup but it was out of service several times. The city spent over \$9000.00 on the old well and decided to abandon it after the new well was in operation. The city still needed a back up well and additional water storage to provide adequate water to the families, during a break down, repairs and adequate pumping capacity in case of fire.

The existing facilities consist of one well, 185 gallons per minute, 110 ft. tall (standpipe) 51,000 gallon standpipe. The well pumps directly into the standpipe to provide pressure for the system. Present water consumption averages 26,000 G.P. day peak days 67,000 gal. per day. The well serves 235 persons of which 148 were low to moderate income. The need of this grant was for additional water rights, well, ground storage and a booster station.

Needs were established by a community survey, public hearing and repeated water shortages.

Girl Scout Cookie Sales Extended

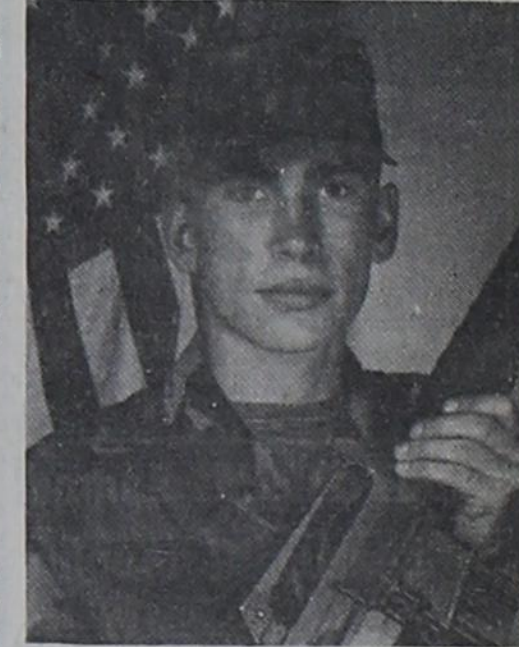

Ambulance Report Is Given For December

The following is from computer data compiled by the TDH, EMS Division, in Austin. They receive our monthly reports on each run.

In Dec. we answered 25 calls. The time for response in the town was, call to dispatch 2.0, Dispatch to scene, 2.0. Dispatch to scene on rural calls was 9 minutes, giving an overall average of 4.8 on getting to the scene. Wednesdays were the busiest days of the month, receiving 7 calls, Thursdays and Fridays were tied with 5 each. There were 12 cardiac calls, 4 respiratorys, 2 gastro-intestinal, 1 allergic reaction and 6 fractures and or dislocations. 75% of these calls were code 3 in nature. Louis Stas answered 5 calls, M.K. Christner, 21 calls, Mark Frankenberry 10 calls, Lee Hibler 8 calls, Joel Finsterwald 3 calls, Kyndall Murray 3 calls, Dwight Tipps 2 calls, Mark Gill 1 call, Jon Sullivan 5 calls, and Pam Hibler 1 call. There were 10 transfers to Amarillo and 1 to Pampa.

The dispatcher is busy with the ambulance channel and does not have time for unnecessary phone calls. You are interfering with the emergency traffic and could cause problems for the dispatcher, the ambulance and the person needing help. All this to satisfy one's curiosity? This could be a high price to pay, just to find out what's going on. Please don't jeopardize someone's precious life. The ambulance service and the Sheriff's office, are striving to give the best service possible. We ask for every one's help. It just takes one person to mess everything up. 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PROSM TEXAS

A NEW OPTIONAL CALLING PLAN FROM AT&T

On November 13, 1986 AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. ("AT&T") filed with the Public Utility Commission (PUC) of Texas to introduce a new intrastate, optional calling plan, PRO Texas. A comparable interstate plan, known as PROSM America, is currently available to Texas customers.

PRO Texas gives Texas consumers an opportunity to save money on direct dialed in-state long distance calls. Customers who choose this new AT&T plan will receive a 10% discount on all AT&T intrastate direct dialed station calls by paying a monthly charge of \$15.00.

The PRO Texas discount applies to calls placed during all rate periods and all days. The discount is in addition to the AT&T intrastate evening discount of 25% and the night/weekend discount of 40%. A one time charge of \$6.00 will be billed to initiate the service. However, this charge will be waived during the first 90 days that the offering is available.

PRO Texas will be available to all Message Telephone Service customers in Texas. AT&T estimates that it will generate revenues in the first year of almost \$8 million, which is .7% of AT&T's annual revenues for all Texas intrastate service.

The PUC has assigned Docket No. 7194 to this proposed service offering. The proposed effective date for PRO Texas is March 16, 1987. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the PUC as soon as possible. What's Up Doc?

Allergies

Question: Doctor, I feel that several of my family members have problems with allergies. I've thought about having allergy testing done, but I hate to go through such an uncomfortable procedure. Aren't there any other ways to test for allergies that avoid the inconvenience and discomfort of conventional methods.

Answer: In the past, the "Patch" testing was about all that was available. Many people avoided being tested and treated for allergies because of the perceived discomfort of the test. Just recently, a new generation of the allergy testing was born. There is now available an in-office allergy screen. It is much less expensive than conventional methods, and has almost no ill effects on the patient. A sample of blood is drawn, and it is used as the testing ground rather than your skin. In approximately two days, the preliminary results are returned. If these are positive for certain broad areas of allergies, the remainder of your blood sample is mailed to a reference laboratory for specific testing. They will also formulate, for you, the allergy shots used for desensitization. The initial in-office screen is inexpensive compared to specific testing or conventional patch testing. If the initial screen is negative, no further testing is needed. If only one of two areas need specific testing. There is potential for real savings, plus a one time blood sample offers convenience and a minimum of discomfort. So, if you and your doctor feel that allergy testing is in order, there are new methods that eliminate many disadvantages of the conventional means.

The Eastern Panhandle Commercial Vegetable Seminar will be held at 7:00 p.m. in the fine arts auditorium at Clarendon College, said County Extension Agent, Don King. Conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Wheeler County Agricultural Committee, it is especially tailored to vegetable production and marketing in Collingsworth, Donley, Gray, and Wheeler Counties.
