

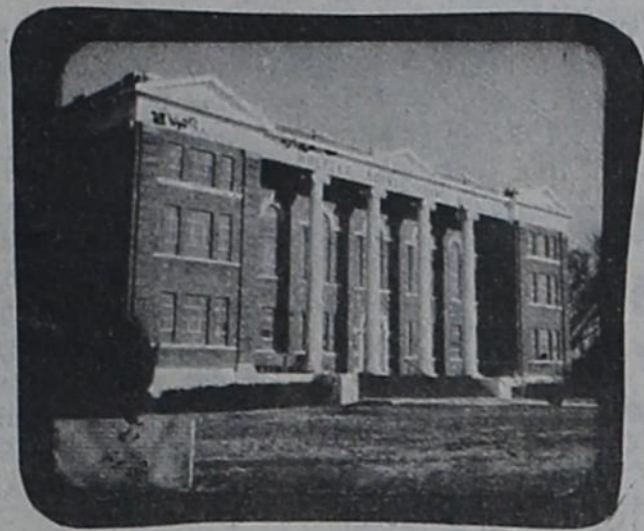
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**Plans Underway For

A special meeting of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce was held Tuesday evening in the City of Wheeler meeting room. President Dan Kenney opened the meeting and addressed each item on the agenda. Discussion concerned a covered area for the park, the Wheeler county show barn, the softball field project, Co-op Program at the school, the fall festival, a membership drive and the calculation of dues.

Covered Area for City Park
The committee for the construction of a covered area at the park, headed by James Verden, had met and proposes metal structure be placed in the southeast corner of the city park with a sidewalk and bridge leading from Grove Street to enable direct access. Trees located on the property ad-jace shade for the structure by noon and trees to the west will provide shade in the afternoon. This area would allow a structure as large as 30'x50' with a minimum of dirtwork and is clear of any trees.

The committee intends to build the park shade through donations and make it available to the public through reservations with the city office. Addition information will be reported as the project progresses.

Wheeler County Show Barn
The Wheeler County Show Barn was placed on the agenda for the purpose of discussing the flooring of the building to make it suitable for more uses. Don King, County Agent, was present for the meeting.

King reported: a floor in the building would be detrimental to its use as a live stock show barn. Other show barns in the area have been floored for the same reason and in one instance it has been necessary to build another building for stock shows. The original plans for the show barn to have a 50x100 addition with a kitchen. The present structure is 100x200 and the existing concession stand at the show barn needs improvement. The Chamber's interest in the building will be reported to the show barn board at its next meeting.

Softball Field
Kent Sims and Charles Carter represented the Softball association and reported on the progress. The dirtwork is completed, main lines for watering have been laid and the fertilizer has been applied and turned under. With the sprigging of the grass, watering will get underway.

An additional \$40,000 is needed for the project. This amount would enable the construction of a concession stand with restrooms and storage, the lighting for one field and fencing. Bill boards will be located around the playing area and the association hopes to sell this advertising for additional funds.

The progress to this point is due largely to volunteer work. Wheeler County Precinct 1 and 2 are largely responsible for the dirt work. Beef Cattle Company has been responsible for the spreading and covering of the fertilizer and will do the sprigging. The City Council will furnish water to keep the new grass watered for three weeks; it is planned to drill a well for additional water.

The softball field is expected to be in use next spring and with the field at the park, it is hoped to shorten and improve the little league season.

The Softball Association will do some further study on the concession stand and report back to the Chamber at the special meeting Tuesday evening. At this time the Chamber is expected to make a commitment toward the project.

Fall Festival
Nancy Pierce reported on the activities of the committee working on the Fall Festival. The group has set the date for Saturday, October 18, and the official name will be "Fall Festival '86". In addition to booths for the sale of 'handmade items' a meal of Polish Sausage, beans, cornbread and pie will be served; it is intended to have the cornbread and pies donated. The booth space will be limited and the

cost will be \$15 per space. The Senior Citizens will make a quilt for the occasion. A drawing for the quilt will be held at the end of the day.

Membership
A list of present Chamber members was handed out; the list showed the need for a membership drive. A committee was appointed to discuss prospective members and the dues and report back to the Chamber at the special meeting Tuesday evening.

Membership in the Wheeler Chamber is open to any business or individual interested in the progress and growth of the area.

Chamber Meetings
The regular meeting of the Wheeler Chamber will be the first Tuesday of each month.

A special meeting was called for Tuesday evening, August 19, to discuss the concession stand for the softball association, Chamber dues and the membership drive. The dinner meeting will be at 7:00 P.M. at Maxey's; the meal is 'dutch'.

An agenda will be drawn for each meeting in an effort to 'keep the meeting moving'.

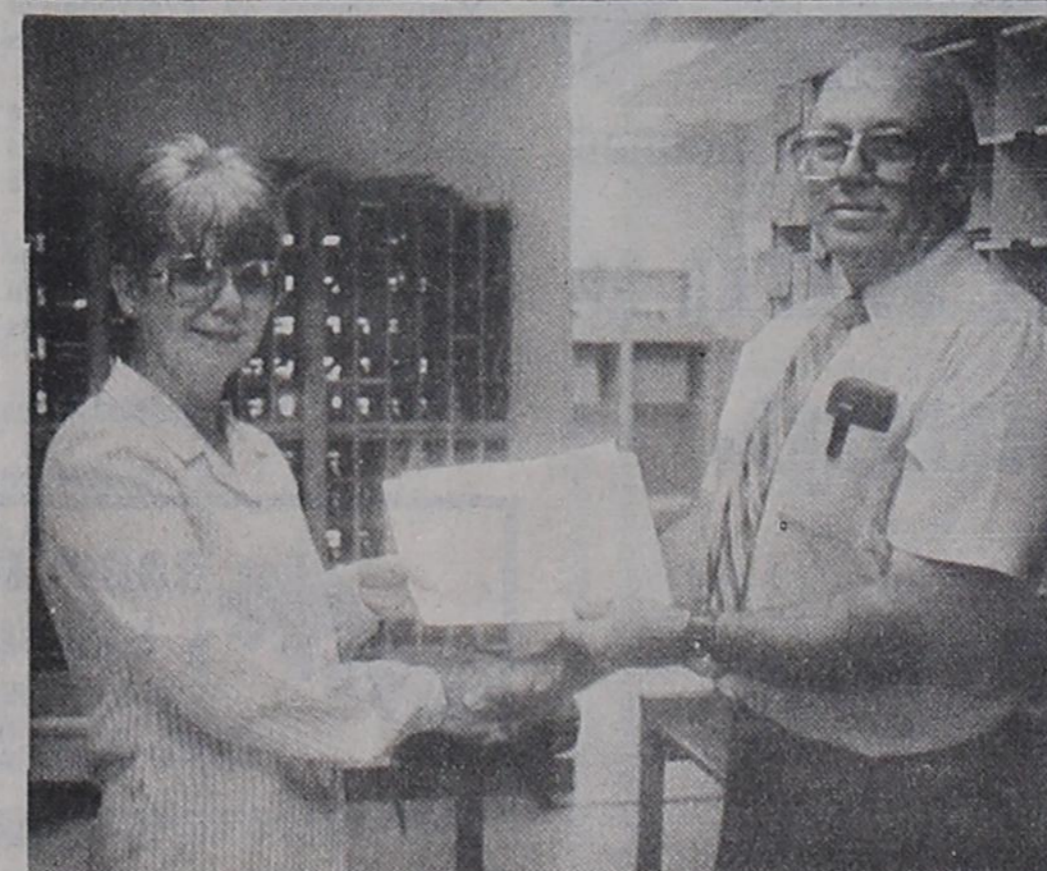

Chairman Grayson welcomed Mr. Leonard to the Board as a new director and asked the Administrator to administer the Oath of Office.

Upon completion of the Oath of Office the new director was properly seated.

Chairman Grayson asked for authority to pay the bills.

It was moved by Dean Tipps, second and voted that the bills be paid as presented.

Chairman Grayson asked for the financial report which was given by the Administrator.

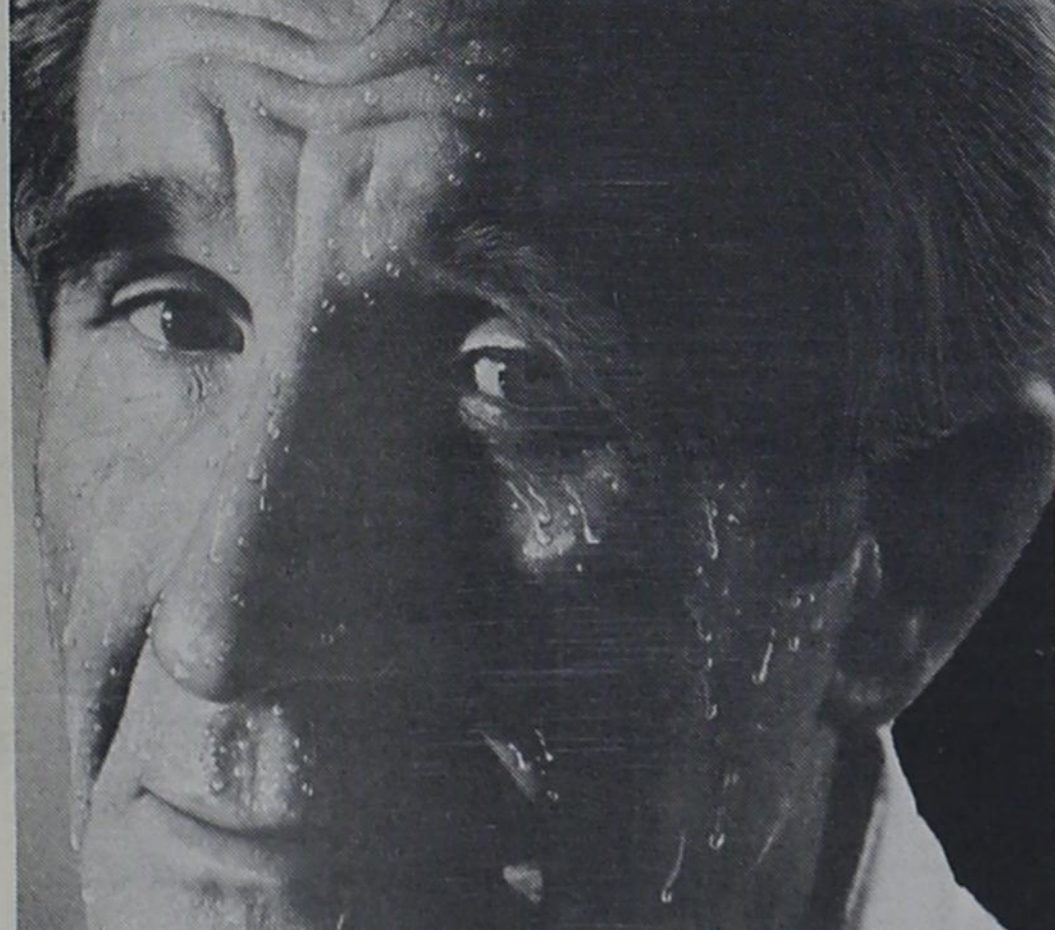

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was taken from "The Upper Room" Monday, June 2, 1986, brought in by Verna Richardson.)

Most people think of prayer as an audible activity which calls for the cessation of all other activities. There can also be an inwardness of prayer which produces no outward, visible indications that it is taking place, continual prayer of the heart and mind which does not interrupt our daily routine. There can be such a profound prayerfulness at the center of our beings that our entire lives are saturated with prayer.

There is a way of praying that goes deeper and requires more of us than most of our efforts at prayer. It is the prayer of the innermost self, the prayer of the heart that never stops resonating to the vibrations of Jesus' own spirit of prayer. The mind can sometimes cooperate with the spirit in prayer. At other times the conscious mind is preoccupied with outward duties and responsibilities. The prayer of the heart is a way of bypassing our conscious thought processes and preoccupations so that we can pray from within the deeper levels of our personality. It is not altogether the result of conscious effort or strength of will. Rather, it arises from the inner spiritual promptings that we experience with varying degrees of intensity. It is in a very real sense the outpouring of our spiritual energy flow.

The prayer is prayed continually, consciously, while doing other things. It is prayed in rhythm with breathing until it becomes the prayer of the heart and spirit.

Prayer is something more than that which we do with our minds. It also involves our hearts and spirits—that deeper part of our personalities to which only the Spirit of Jesus has access. Prayer in its highest form requires more than conscious effort. It also requires the surrender of our innermost selves to Jesus, giving Him permission to make our lives a continually flowing fountain of unceasing prayer. When we have learned how to do that, we will have discovered the secret of the prayer of the heart.

Air Show To Be Held At Pampa Aug. 16

A major air show will be held at Pampa, Texas, Perry Lefors Air Port, Saturday, August 16, 1986. The show is sponsored by the Pampa Army Air Field Reunion Association in celebration of the 44th Anniversary of the Advanced Twin-Engine Pilot Training School opening in 1942.

There will be over forty WW II vintage and EAA aircraft flying in the show and many other WW II and EAA aircraft will be on display.

One of the rare planes featured will be the Curtiss P-40 Warhawk. It was between December, 1941, and July, 1942, that the Flying Tigers, American volunteers in China, made the P-40 fighters famous. Large quantities of these planes were subsequently built during the aircraft's long career. A total of 13,733 planes in a dozen

versions came off the assembly lines between 1939 and 1944. They were used on all fronts in Europe, Africa, the Pacific and on the Russian front.

The famous shark-jaw symbol painted on the fuselages of the P-40's flown by General Clair Chennault's Flying Tigers was based on that of the RAF's Desert Air Force Squadron 112's planes. The first 100 P-40's sent to China were part of an order for Great Britain. In little more than six months of operations, the Flying Tigers downed 286 Japanese planes. Only 23 Flying Tiger pilots were lost in this period.

The P-40 shown in the above photo was flown by Frank Tallman and used in several Hollywood movies. This plane was flown in the movie Tora Tora and was used as a pattern to make wooden models for that movie.

There are only 25 P-40's in existence in the world today and only 7 of these are flying.

The P-40 that will participate in the Pampa show will be flown by Col. Skip Trammell. Skip is a member of the Confederate Air Force and lives in Dallas.

Gates will open at 9 a.m., parking will be free. Opening ceremonies will begin at noon with a flag raising ceremony accompanied by the Pampa High School Marching band. Congressman Beau Boulter will be the guest speaker.

Admission will be \$3.00 for 12 years and older, \$1.00 for ages 6 to 12 and under 6 free. There will be lots of food, drinks and PX booths.

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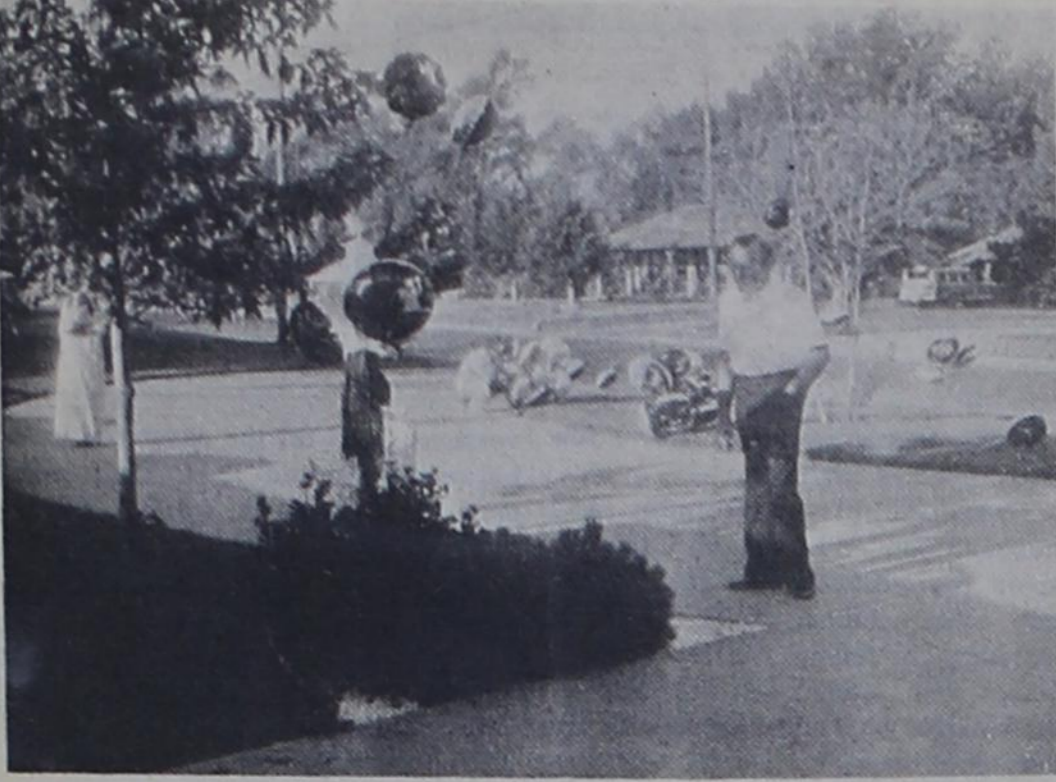

TOP BILLING AT LAST

After splitting time with Toby Collins last season, Dicky Salyer steps into the spotlight trying to lead perennial Panhandle power Wheeler to its first state title since 1979.

Dicky Salyer won't be sharing marquee billing with anyone this season.

A year joining forces with co-star/tailback Toby Collins in a scaled-down version of SMU's Pony Express backfield, the Wheeler full-back moves solo into the Friday night spotlight this fall.

The 6-foot, 210-pound Salyer and Collins teamed for 2,570 yards and 45 touchdowns to lead Wheeler to a 12-1 finish last season. Each had exactly 151 carries, with Salyer accounting for 1,220 yards and 20 TDs.

"In most of our games last year, we weren't even challenged, so those two only played in the fourth quarter in one or two games," said Wheeler coach Preston Smith. "This is only conjecture, but if either one had been our only ballcarrier and had played every down last year, he would have gained 3,000 yards."

Salyer will be in that position this year for a team that has gone 23-2 over the last two seasons. He won't exactly be a one-man attack, "but I don't want to plan on taking the field without him either," Smith said.

Salyer has the size, the speed (4.65 in the 40 yard dash) the instincts to be perhaps the best running back in the Class 1A Mustangs, state champions in 1977 and 1979 and a perennial Panhandle power, have had three all-state running backs in the last few years—but Smith said Salyer may be the best.

"He's probably a more complete back than we've had," the coach said. "In class 1A, you usually put your best athlete in the backfield. He's our best athlete, but Dicky's also a running back. We've had backs who were tough, but Dicky can do so many other things."

"Of course, he's good at running the ball, but he can do a lot of other things, too. He's got good hands, can block and can throw the ball if we need him to."

Salyer's legs, timing and coordination, which took him to state track meet in the long jump, make him different than many 200-pound running backs that would prefer to smash would-be tacklers rather than juke them. Salyer, Smith said, can do both. Despite his size, he's not a power runner," Smith said. "The thing about Dick is he's good at avoiding the tackler. At the same time, he's big enough that he can wear out a linebacker in the course of a game."

Salyer got an early taste of what this season may be like in the Mustangs' quarterfinals loss to Munday, 14-7. Collins was slowed by a knee injury in

the first half, and Dicky responded with 90 yards against a Moguls defense that had shut out nine of 12 previous opponents.

This fall, Salyer will operate behind one of Wheeler's smaller offensive lines in recent years—but one of it's best, Smith predicts. And with wing-back Cody Wiggins showing flashes of talent last season, opponents won't be able to key solely on Salyer.

"Now that we've got just one of those backs, people will say if they key on Dicky, they can come close to stopping us," Smith said. "But I don't think so. We've got others who can do the job, too."

Still, there's little doubt to whom the Mustangs will turn on Friday nights.

"He'll be our leader," Smith said. "The success we have is going to depend a lot on how well Dicky does."

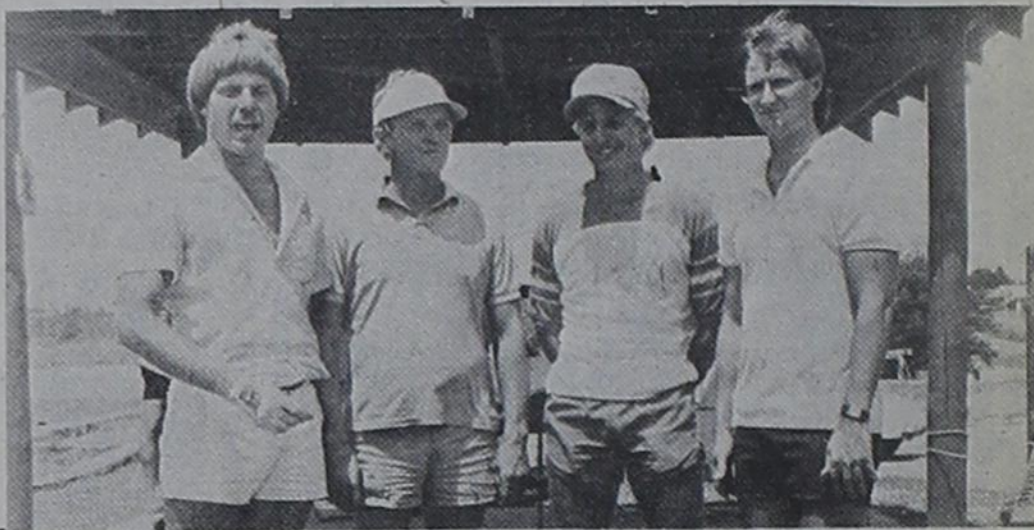
Collins Performed Under Pressure

 After rushing for nearly 4,550 yards and scoring 77 touchdowns as a Wheeler running back, Toby Collins didn't figure on having to put all of his marbles into one game for a college scholarship.
 But he did, or he had to, in Friday night's 37th Annual Greenbelt Bowl All-Star Football Classic in Childress. The pressure to perform well was on almost all of the players, but Collins came through just fine. The 5-9 1/2, 178-pound running back and linebacker paced his East team to a 14-3 win. He scored both of the game's touchdowns, and had game-high figures in yards rushing, 51, and carries, 14. He received the game's outstanding running back award.
 "I think anybody who gets that

award in a football game like that, size doesn't matter or it shouldn't matter," Collins said. "I think I'm as good as anybody else. I don't know what the difference is between me or anybody else. They might be a little bigger, a little stronger, but that doesn't mean they can gut it out every play."
 "I think I'm just as good as anybody else. I think for some other guy who can get a full ride with not near the statistics that I have, then I should deserve at least half of that. I'm not that big-headed, but I think I can run just as tough as anybody else. I think I proved that last night. I was the smallest back out there."
 Collins, who made the 1985 Globe-News Super Team as a linebacker after earning a spot as running back on the '84 Super Team, played one series at linebacker Friday. He made an impressive openfield tackle on Electra's Edward Willis.
 "I didn't want to play any defense, I wanted to play running back," Collins said. "One reason is size does make a difference on the other side (defense). Whenever you go up tackling a 210-pound back, there's a lot of difference with 175 pounds trying to slow him down when he's full speed ahead. That's the difference between being big in the backfield or big in the defense."
 His performance persuaded the McMurray College football coach to contact Collins. Panhandle State University head coach Jim Phillips scheduled to call Collins Monday morning.
 Collins said he's seeking to play college ball in Texas, not because he wants to stay close to home, but because he doesn't want to pay out-of-state tuition in case he doesn't receive full scholarship.
 "I hope (to play) somewhere in Texas, but I'd take almost anything right now, maybe Panhandle State if I get a pretty good offer," Collins said. "It would almost have to be a full ride for me to go to Panhandle State."
 "I don't really know what to go out of state. One reason's because of tuition. I don't want to pay that high tuition to get into an out-of-state school. I think I can play somewhere in Texas. But I don't think I'll end up at McMurray either. One reason's because they don't give scholarships, it's just grants. Shoot I'd end up paying for most of that before it's over with."
