A traffic accident claimed the life of Becky Brooks before she could become a missionary.

But as long as Southern Baptists send out missionaries, she will have a part in training them through a

memorial scholarship. Miss Brook's parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Brooks of Paris, have established the Rebecca Ann Brooks Endowed Scholarship for Missionary Students at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. 'Becky was a very spiritual person who loved to give to others and who always prayed through her decisions," her mother said. "Her call to missions was the end product of a lot of prayer and searching."

Though no one in their immediate family has ever attended Southwestern, the Brookses chose to give the scholarship to Southwestern because "we wanted to help people who were going to be missionaries," her father said. "And since we have gotten to know what kind of people will be administrating the scholarship funds at Southwestern, we are even more sure we made the right decision."

Southwestern, one of six seminaries affiliated with the Southern Baptist Convention, is the largest theological seminary in the world. One-third of Southwestern's 5,000 students are mission volunteers.

That spirit which will touch mission students throughout the future continues to influence her parents today.

Unlike most other garden vegetables, such as corn or tomatoes, greens are not immediately recognizable to

everyone, probably because there are so many different kinds of greens. The most familiar of this leafy group of vegetables is mustard greens but collards, spinach and turnips also are included. All are members of the Cruciferae family of vegetables, ex-

cept for spinach, which belongs to the

Chenopodiaceae family. All the greens

are cool-season vegetables and have

needs of all greens.

All greens will do best when planted on raised beds, though it is more important with collards and turnips than with the other greens. It is always a good idea to use raised beds if your garden soil is heavy or drains poorly. To form raised beds, use your shovel or tiller with a bedder to form ridges and furrows that measure about 30 to

36 inches apart from the top of one ridge to the top of an adjacent ridge. Then, use your rake to form and smooth the ridges into raised beds, which should be 16 to 20 inches wide and approximately 6 inches high. The lower areas can serve as furrows to make watering easier and to provide good drainage.

All greens will benefit from the addition of organic matter to the soil. Generally, it is a good idea to incorporate 2 or 3 inches of well-decomposed leaves, grass clippings, hay or compost into the soil 8 to 10 inches deep.

Well-aged barnyard manure, worked into the soil before planting, will help provide greens with all the fertility they need. For turnips and spinach, use 50 pounds of manure per 35 feet of row or for each 100 square feet; for mustard greens and collards, use 100 pounds of manure. Depending on your soil type and the level of fertility, you may also need to add a small amount of commercial fertilizer to the soil. Generally, a fertilizer with a 1-2-2 ratio, such as 10-20-20, is suitable if you live in East Texas or on the Gulf Coast. In most other areas of the state a fertilizer with a 1-2-1 ratio, such as 10-20-10, is satisfactory. Greens generally will do best on soils with a pH of between 5.5 and 7.0.


The butterfly has a brilliant flash of yellow, orange or blue as it flutters about the garden. For the outdoor gardener, this spectacle is a fascinating amusement. The butterfly leaves behind eggs that develop into hungry larvae which become pests in the vegetable garden and sometimes in the flower garden.

Adult butterflies generally provide benefits by transmitting pollen as they travel from flower to flower, sucking nectar. But the larvae of some types

of butterflies can do damage. Often what appears to be a butterfly actually is a moth. Most moths are relatively dull colored and prefer to fly at night, but some are as colorful as any butterfly and visit flowers by day. Butterflies differ from moths in that they fold their wings straight up over their bodies, while moths rest with their wings spread flat.

Most of what you will see in the garden are the bright moths. What can

be done to deter these moths from harming your garden? They are so highly mobile, there is not much you can do to stop them from laying eggs on the plants. All you can do is keep a close watch on your garden.

Some registered insecticides to use are carbaryl, commonly known as Sevin, or malathion, an organic phosphate insecticide with low toxicity to plants and animals. Baccilus thurigienesis is also a good control for butterflies and is cleared for more crops than Sevin.

The type of insecticide used should take into account the type of crop being sprayed and the timing of the harvest. If there are not too many caterpillars in the garden you can try and pick them off by hand. Some gardeners then dispose of them by dousing them with gasoline, drowning or

the insects yourself, find a young "bounty hunter" to do the work for you at a small fee per insect.

planted sparingly in a garden can deter some pests, although this has not been proven. Sage, rosemary, hyssop, thyme, mint, wormwood and southernwood are believed by some to deter the cabbage worm.
