## WORLD CHAMPION TEAM ROPER TITLE WON SUN

The new World's Champion Junior Team Ropers are Larry Trimble, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Trimble of Briscoe, Texas and George Harlan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Harlan of Southland, Texas. Larry was named champion header on Sunday, August 3, 1986 at Bill Duncan's Arena in Allen, Oklahoma. Larry and George partnered to win the prestigious awards and defeated 306 other teams including 2 former Junior World Champions. Their time of 52 seconds on 5 steers was the third fastest time ever recorded in the history of the championship.

The winners split \$1,834.00 in cash, and were awarded World's Champion trophy saddles, trophy buckles, satin jackets, gift certificates totaling \$260 and other awards. Larry also teamed with Shane Goad of Briscoe, Texas to win breast collars.

The 307 teams in the open roping were from 12 different states and included several state champions and reserve champions.

Previous winners of this prestigious award reads like a who's who in team roping. Clay O'Brian Cooper, who is the PRCA defending World Champion Team Roper, won at Allen in 1976. Other people to win and place at Allen include Scott Laramore, Monte Petska, J.D. Yates, Bret Tonzzi, Jackie Stephenson, Rick Branch and Sid Price.

Larry has been competing for 13 years and this was his fourth trip to Allen competing for the championship.

A lot of people dream about being the best in the World, but only a few achieve the award. Congratulations to Larry and his parents for being named "World's Champion".

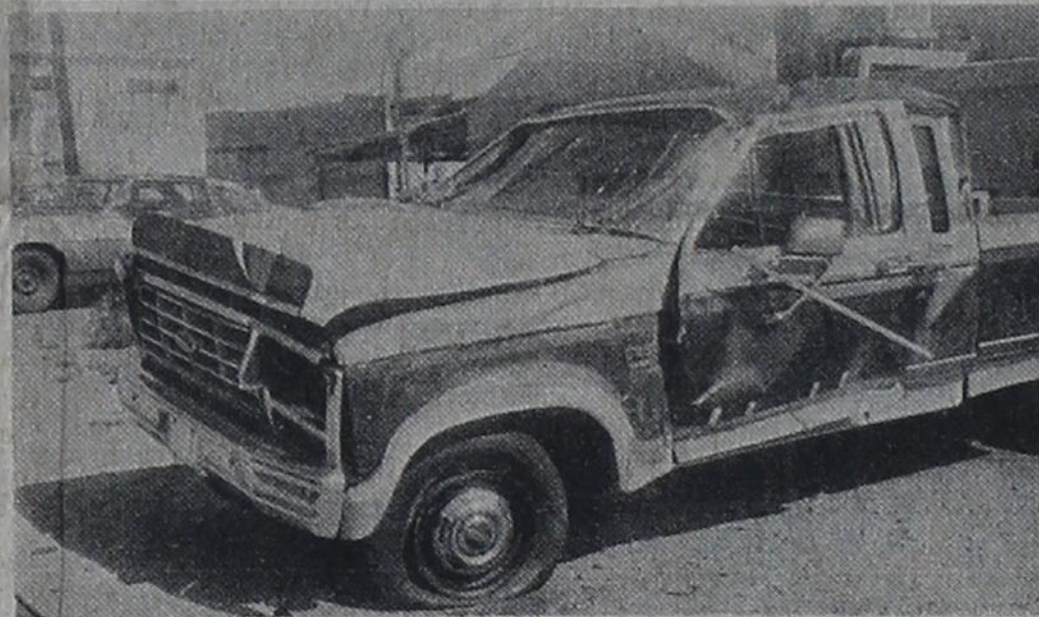
## Services Held For Eugene H. Dobbs

He was a member of Willis Chamber and served on the Point Aquarius Water Board.

Survivors include his wife; and two daughters, Deborah Dobbs of Austin and Margaret Dobbs of New Waverly.

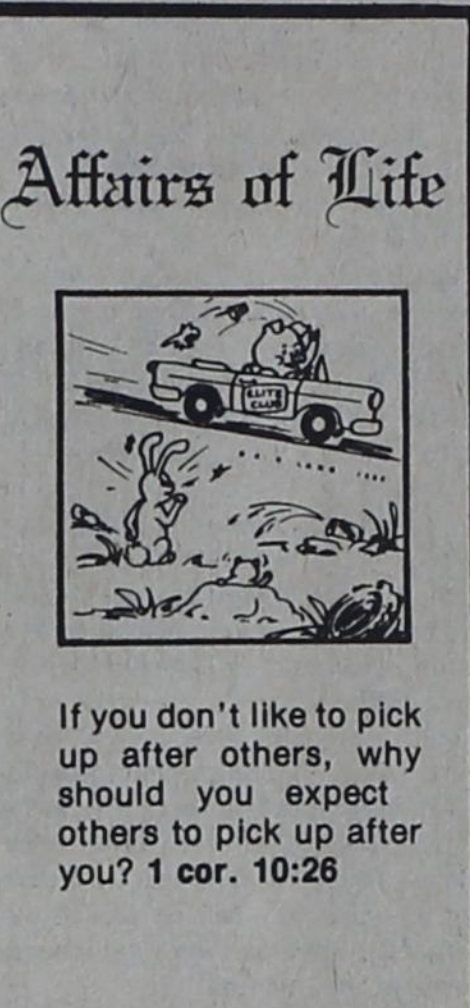

No rest in the washroom of course, For towels and wash clothes are scarce; How we scramble for clean stuff, The fight is something fierce.

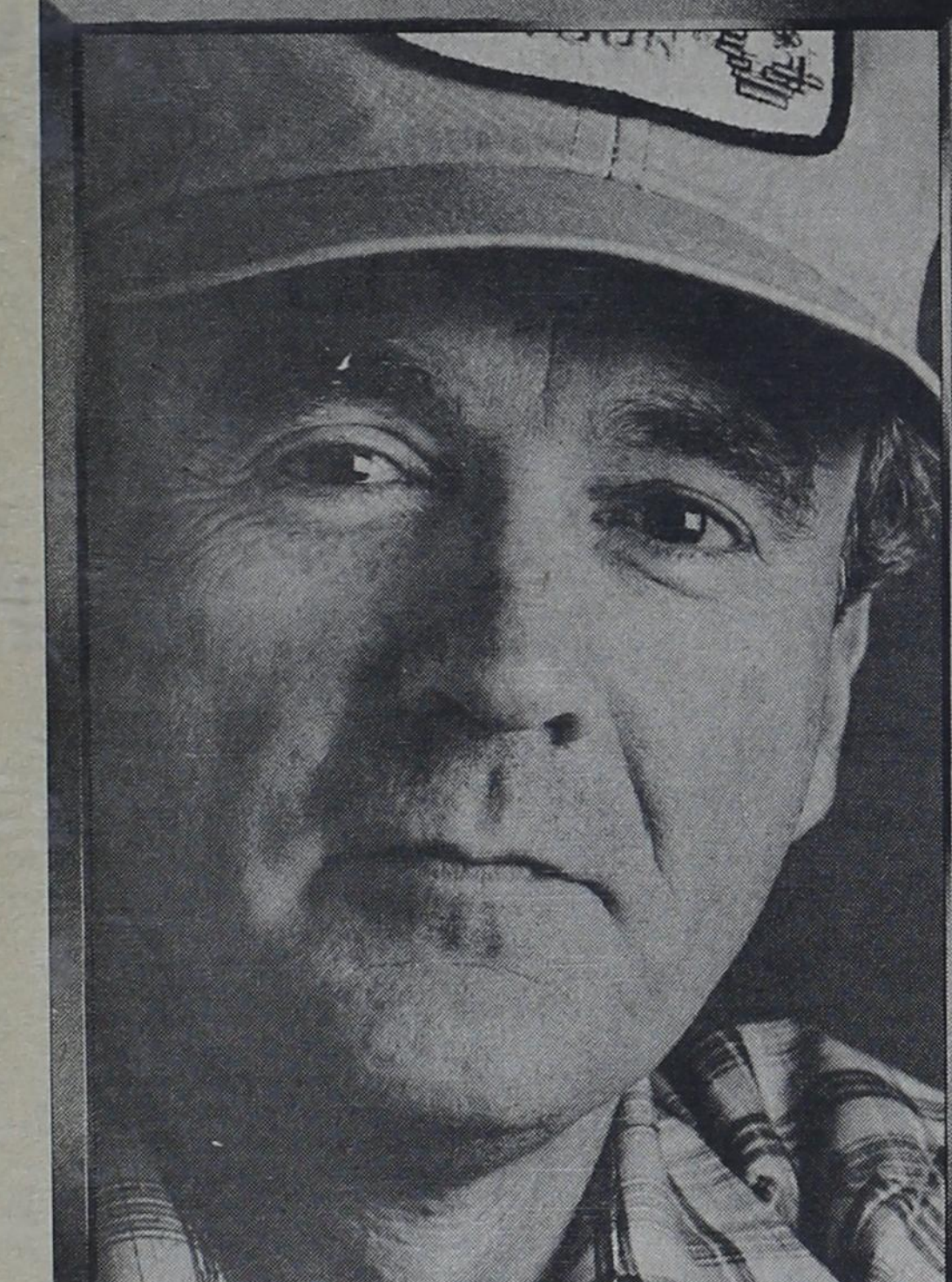

## REBECCA ANN BROOKS SCHOLARSHIP FUND HAS BEEN ESTABLISHED

A traffic accident claimed the life of Becky Brooks before she could become a missionary.

But as long as Southern Baptists send out missionaries, she will have a part in training them through a memorial scholarship.

Miss Brooks' parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Brooks of Paris, have established the Rebecca Ann Brooks Endowed Scholarship for Missionary Students at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. Students studying to be either home or foreign missionaries will receive scholarships for seminary education.

Miss Brooks was completing a master's degree in education at East Texas State University and planned to enter Southwestern in preparation for a career as a missionary teacher.

But on Oct. 13, 1985, a drunk driver swerved his vehicle into her lane, forced her off the road and crashed into her car. ETSU awarded her master's degree posthumously in May.

"Becky's lifelong ambition was to be a missionary," her father said, "but now she can't go. This (fund) will help others go and in some way let her dream live."

"There is no glory in this for us," said her mother, Corrine Brooks. "This is her insurance money and it's just the kind of thing Becky would want us to do."

Miss Brooks grew up in Wheeler

and Paris. She had lived in Paris 12 years and was an active member of First Baptist Church.

She volunteered as a Big Sister at Willow Creek Foster Home. Church members commonly saw her bring a carload of her "kids" to First Baptist, where they all sat together for church, her parents said.

"Becky was a very spiritual person who loved to give to others and who always prayed through her decisions," her mother said. "Her call to missions was the end product of a lot of prayer and searching."

Though no one in their immediate family has ever attended Southwestern, the Brooks chose to give the scholarship to Southwestern because "we wanted to help people who were going to be missionaries," her father said. "And since we have gotten to know what kind of people will be administering the scholarship funds at Southwestern, we are even more sure we made the right decision."

Southwestern, one of six seminaries affiliated with the Southern Baptist Convention, is the largest theological seminary in the world. One-third of Southwestern's 5,000 students are mission volunteers.

That spirit which will touch mission students throughout the future continues to influence her parents today.

The driver of the other car was sentenced to four-and-one-half years in prison. "We didn't feel that was enough of a penalty for taking Becky's life," Mrs. Brooks said.

"But in my mind I could hear Becky saying, 'you've got to forgive him—that's the kind of person she was.'"

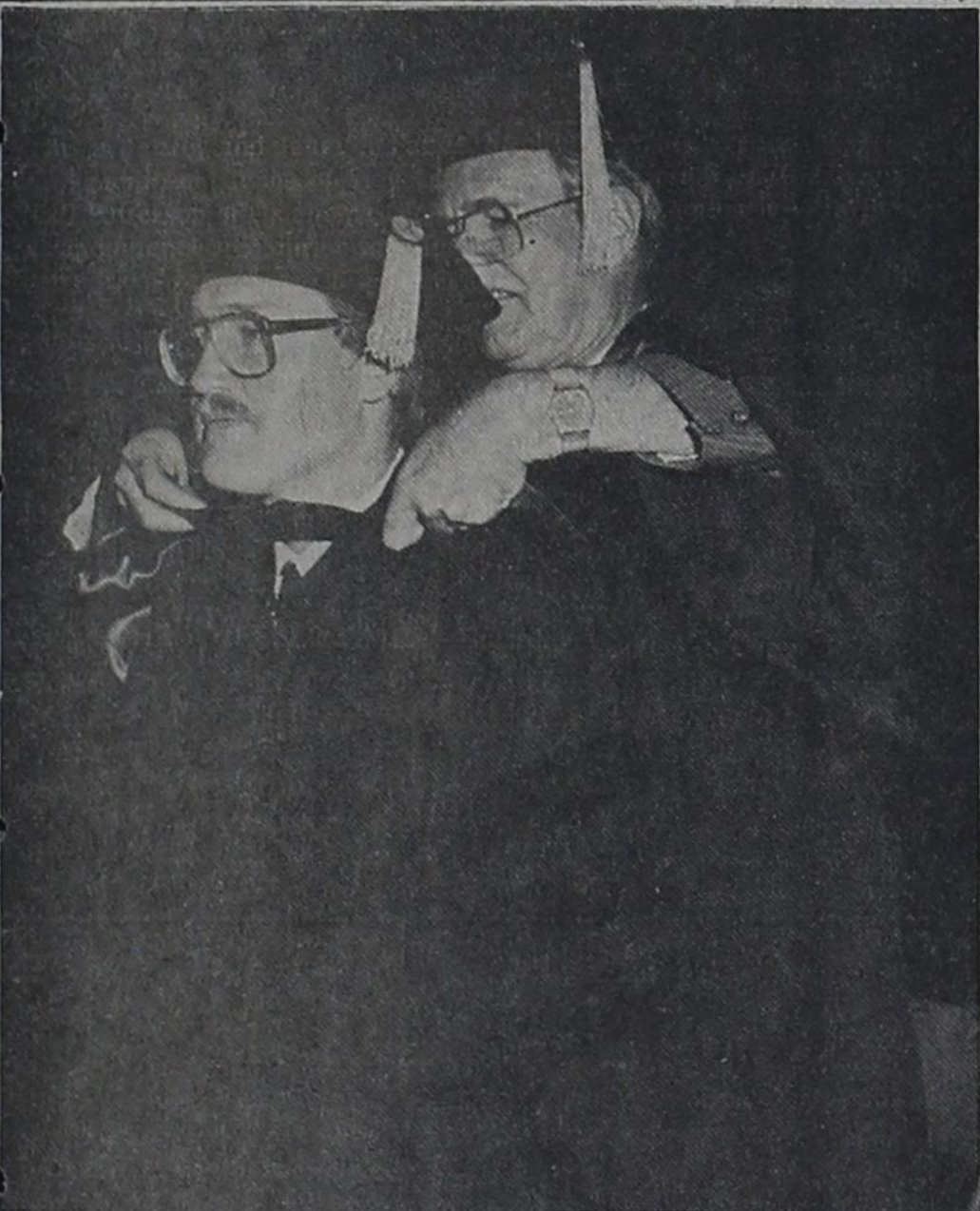

Current issues of Series EE Bonds held at least five years earn the average of semi-annual market-based rates in effect while they are held, or the current minimum guaranteed rate of 7.5%, if the average falls below the mark. Semiannual market-based rates change each May 1 and November 1. The rate for May 1 through October 31, 1986 is 7.02 percent, bringing the average rate for the 8 periods since the market-based variable rate program started in November 1, 1982, to 9.36 percent. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.
