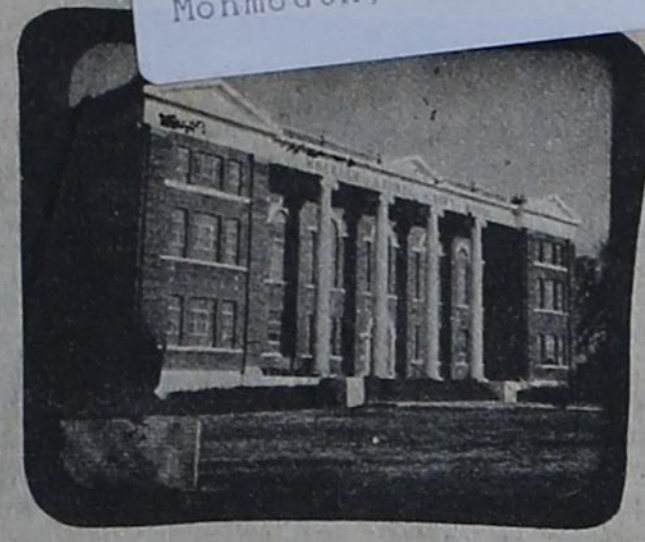

## FIRST ANNUAL 4th of JULY CELEBRATION

**CWE** CHAT WITH EDITOR

For your information, your copywrite office in Washington, D.C. does stay open and take calls until 5:00. I placed a call Thursday, May 29, and realized it was just two or three minutes until 5. I then placed a second call and found "our employees" still on the job. If you are wondering what I was doing still at work, it was 4 here.

The rains "let up" Tuesday, June 3, and I am sure the neighbors were glad to see Barbara and I out in the yard. It wasn't quite "knee high" but getting close. I didn't quite get in the 3.5 miles of exercise—dark set in and running out of gas was a good excuse to quit. Wednesday, June 4, I managed to complete the lawn and when we looked at the lawn Sunday, it was needing mowing again. All this rain has certainly caused the grass to grow.

Of course the grass is not all that is growing. Barbara and I got out first part of last week and planted some garden—between rains—and we had a nice stand of everything Sunday. Everything is planted now with the exception of the okra. I was really late planting this year.

The paragraphs above and "My Tale of Woe" were written for last week's edition of the "Times." The above paragraphs have been revised and the necessary information added to make them "current".

Jane Thomas and I worked rather late Thursday evening on the programs for the Tri-State Rodeo Finals in Amarillo this weekend. Shortly before we quit, "Junior" quit. I called the repair service Friday morning and we discovered a 35c fuse burned out.

The fuse was replace, but the fuse light remained off, indicating the problem was not corrected—according to the repair service. An additional part had to be obtained from Amarillo by bus and the light remained off. Testing equipment was then needed and Frank Coates was called to the scene. Testing with the repair service on one end and Frank and I on the other resulted in our finding that the 35c fuse had fixed the problem—the fuse light was burned out. All day, a number of long distance calls, parts ordering, shipping by bus and Frank's time wasted. It could have been worse. This was Friday instead of Tuesday or Wednesday.

At noon, I sent the paper with Jerry as usual and the "girls" pasted in and corrected at Shamrock before sending it on the Childress. I had not left enough room for all the copy they had and some of "cwe" had to be left for this week.

And now, back to "Junior"—the poor fellow was really sick this time. It was determined one of the boards has to be replaced—once again I had to call on Frank.

I called for the repairman from Compugraphic and decided to see if I could replace the board. The consultants said they knew of no reason why I couldn't install the new board.

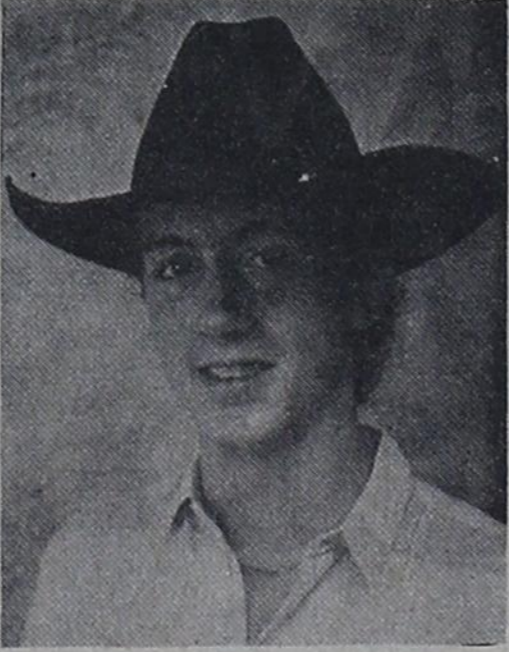

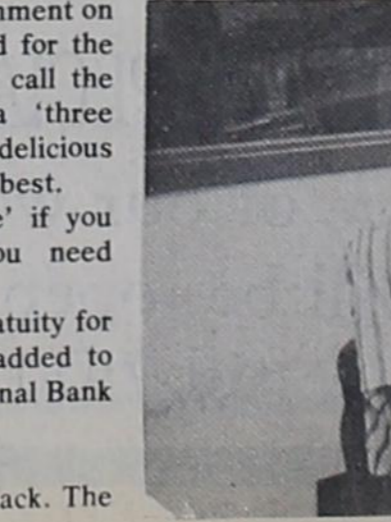

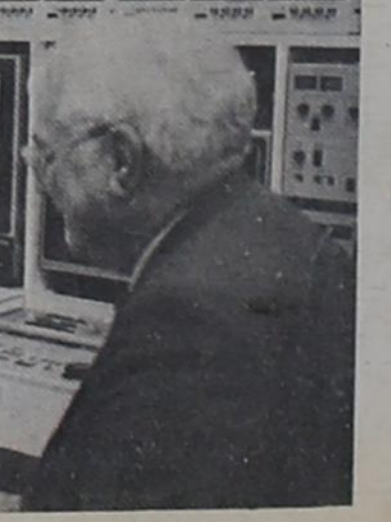

## Briscoe I.S.D. Accreditation Reaffirmed

The Briscoe Independent School District was monitored by the Texas Education Agency on April 1st and 2nd. The written results of that visit were received by the school on Friday, May 16, 1986.

Bill Hefley, Vice-President of the school board, Barbara Meadows, Secretary of the school board, Harold Salmon, Superintendent, Bob Downs, Principal, and Betty Kirk, Curriculum Consultant from the Regional Educa-

tion Service Center attended the Exit Conference on April 2, 1986, conducted by the two monitors from the Texas Education Agency. The Exit Conference Report referred to the Briscoe School as "Exemplary" and this was confirmed by the written results.

The District must offer Pre-Algebra skills and Personal Business Management courses each year to students. These were inadvertently left off of the student choice list for the 1985-86 school year and they have been added for the 1986-87 school year. The Lab/Field activities for Physical Science need to be raised from 38-39 percent to 40 percent. Elementary teachers in grades 1-4 have been alternating lunch room duty one day a week this year. Next year the District must seek volunteers from the community so that the teachers may have a duty-free lunch period each day.

The District received commendations in all other areas. They were as follows:

1. School facilities are made available for community functions which helps to keep patrons in close personal contact with the school.
2. The superintendent appears to be a strong Chief Administrative officer. He is commended for being closely involved with the District's instructional program. He is also well informed on all aspects of the instructional programs, the feelings and concerns of the staff, and day-to-day operations of the District. He maintains a high level of visibility throughout the District.
3. The District is commended for efforts to provide fine arts to its students. Students are encouraged to participate in correspondence courses for additional electives.
4. Guidance services are provided through a certified counselor who had provided individual profiles for each student tested.
5. The Board of Education is commended for providing adequate supplies and materials for student and/or teacher use in all subject areas and at all levels.
6. The District is commended for providing excellent library facilities, materials, and staff throughout the District. The library media services and materials are exemplary in all respects.
7. Commendation is given for providing excellent facilities throughout the school complex. Reportedly, all buildings are less than ten years of age. It was evident that excellent maintenance was being provided, and the school reflected an inviting atmosphere for learning.
8. The team was impressed with the outstanding custodial services pro-

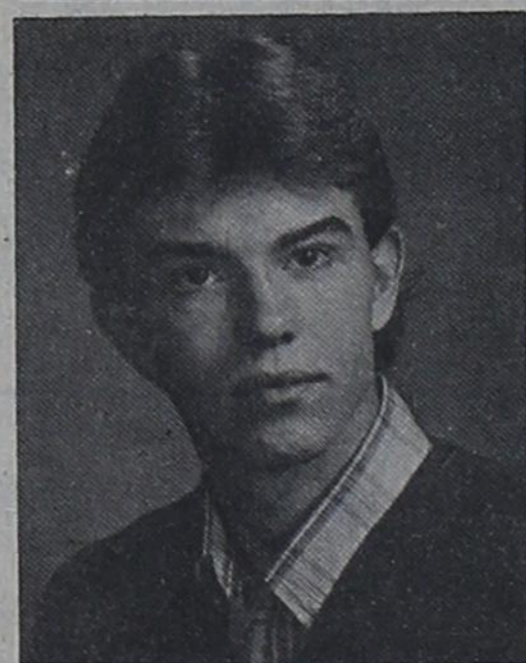
## Mobeetie School Receives High Ratings

Mobeetie School receives high ratings in the T.E.A. Accreditation visit which was April 2nd and 3rd, 1986.

The Briscoe Independent School District is currently accredited. It is recommended that the District's full accreditation be reaffirmed.

Curriculum documents were found to be available throughout the system.

The district has provided an outstanding laboratory facility for the purpose of teaching computer literacy. Several thousand dollars have been expended for the purpose of furnishing the facility with hardware and software.

Even though the counselor is in the district only one day each week, guidance services appear to be very good at Mobeetie. There is strong support from staff and administration and the needs of the children are being met.

The board of education is to be commended for providing an abundance of supplies and materials for student and/or teacher use in all subjects and at all levels.

The district is commended for providing excellent facilities for the educational process. It was not however that some areas of the school campus were not of the same tone as other facilities.

The team was very impressed with the outstanding custodial and maintenance services provided.
