

Rabies Clinic

The City of Mobeetie will sponsor a rabies clinic Saturday, June 7, at the north room of the City Hall. The time will be 1:30 to 5:00 p.m.

Briscoe will sponsor a Rabies Clinic Saturday, June 7, at the Fire Station. The time will be 3:30 to 5:00 p.m.

The City of Wheeler will sponsor a Rabies Clinic Saturday, June 14, at

the Fire Station. The station is located behind the city office. At this time dog licenses will be on sale by the city; the clinic will be from 2 to 4:00 p.m. in the afternoon.

A state law, HB 1323 passed in 1979, requires all dogs and cats be vaccinated against rabies by the time the dog or cat is four months of age or at regular intervals thereafter.

The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year. Offered at the clinic for dogs will be rabies, distemper and Parvo.

Offered for cats will be rabies and feline distemper. All vaccinations will be at a reduced price.

The licenses will cost \$1.00 for males and spayed females and \$2.00 for non-spayed females.

For those people who have had their dogs vaccinated, but have not purchased a license, it will be necessary to take the animal and proof of vaccination to the clinic to obtain the dog license. All dogs in the City limits are required to be licensed.

Area citizens are urged to bring their animals in at this time to be vaccinated against rabies.

Landscape, Garden Help Available

Several Wheeler County homeowners will have an opportunity later this month to get expert help in solving problems with their landscape, vegetable, and crop plant problems, according to Don King, County Extension Agent.

On the afternoon of Friday, June 20, the Wheeler County Program Building Committee will sponsor a plant diagnostic tour by three specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The specialists, Dr. Bob Berry, Extension Soil Chemist, will visit as many homes or farms as time permits to diagnose plant problems and offer solutions.

Reservations will be accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis as long as location and scheduling will permit. Those who would like to have the team visit their home should contact the county Extension office at 826-5243 before 5:00 p.m. Friday, June 13. When they call in, the homeowners will be asked to give their location and the nature of their problem, said King.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, handicap, religion, or national origin.

We are asking you the people of Wheeler County to try your best and follow the rules listed below to make the 4th of July safe so everyone enjoy the celebration.

Once Again—it's time to purchase Fireworks!!!

The following rules and regulations set forth by the Wheeler County Sheriff's Office and the Wheeler County Fire Marshall.

1. FIREWORKS MAY NOT be sold or offered for sale to children under 12 years of age, or to an intoxicated or incompetent person.

ANY PERSON PURCHASING FIREWORKS SHOULD TAKE NOTE OF THE FOLLOWING RULES.

A. YOU MAY NOT explode or ignite

fireworks within 600 feet of any church, a hospital, a licensed child care center, or a public or private primary or secondary school or institution of higher education.

B. YOU MAY NOT sell at retail, explode, or ignite fireworks within 100 feet of a place where flammable liquids or flammable compressed gases are stored and dispensed.

C. YOU MAY NOT explode or ignite within 100 feet of a place where fireworks are stored or sold.

D. YOU MAY NOT ignite or discharge fireworks within or from a motor vehicle.

E. YOU MAY NOT place ignited fireworks in or throw ignited fireworks at a motor vehicle.

(Editor's Note: Gene Jones, an automobile dealer in Lampasas, wrote the letter below to a friend, concerning the friend's airport in another city. It says a lot about the importance of a quality airport to any Texas community. This entire article was taken from 2 Tac Bulletin, May-June 1986.)

"Dear Jim: It is generous of the folks who allow your business visitors to land on the combination airstrip, feed road, and mesquite pasture west of your town, but it certainly doesn't project a businesslike image for (your community).

"I am chairman of the Airport Advisory Board of the City Council of Lampasas and we have been upgrading our airport.

"We found that extending our runway to 3,800 feet has allowed an increased level of executive twin and pure jet traffic into Lampasas.

"These are the aircraft operated by the significant business interests and prospective industrial candidates. Not only does an adequate airport facilitate the investigative phase of industrial interest, but it is a big plus in most companies' operating analysis of a community.

"We have 15 enclosed hangars and a waiting list, an active flight training operation, and an FBO offering maintenance and fuel sales.

"We feel that this gives us the with-it look with respect to aviation, and that it reinforces our adequacy, previously established by school system, public utilities, banking, etc.

"Here's hoping for smoother landings at (your city). (s) Gene Jones."

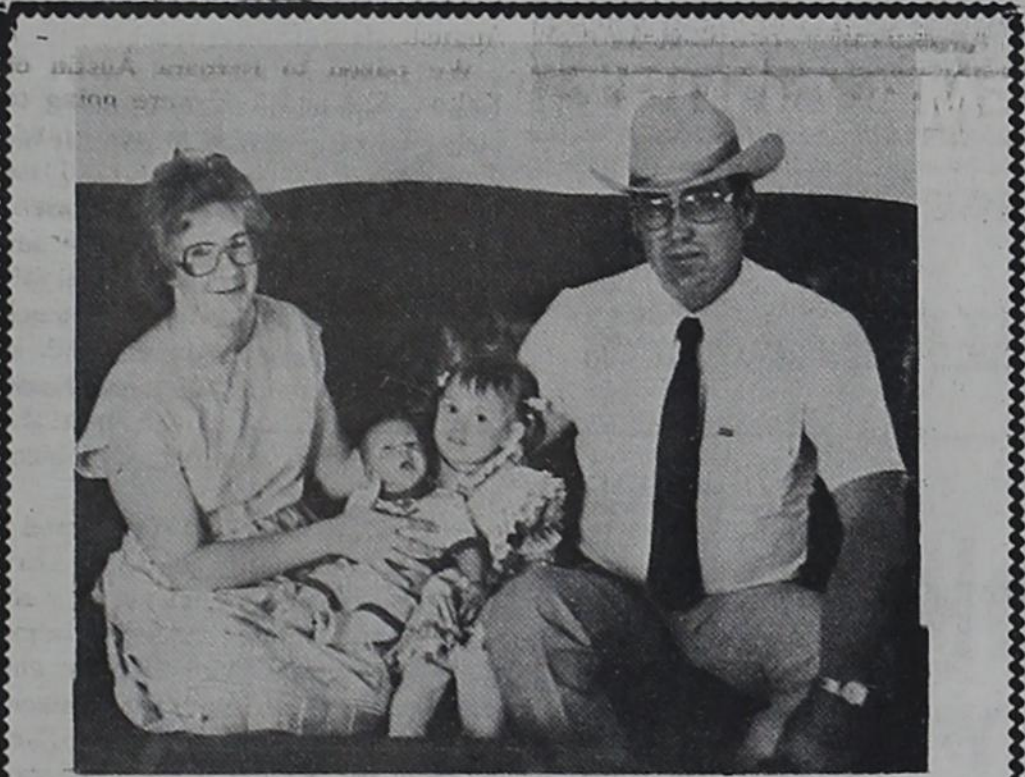
