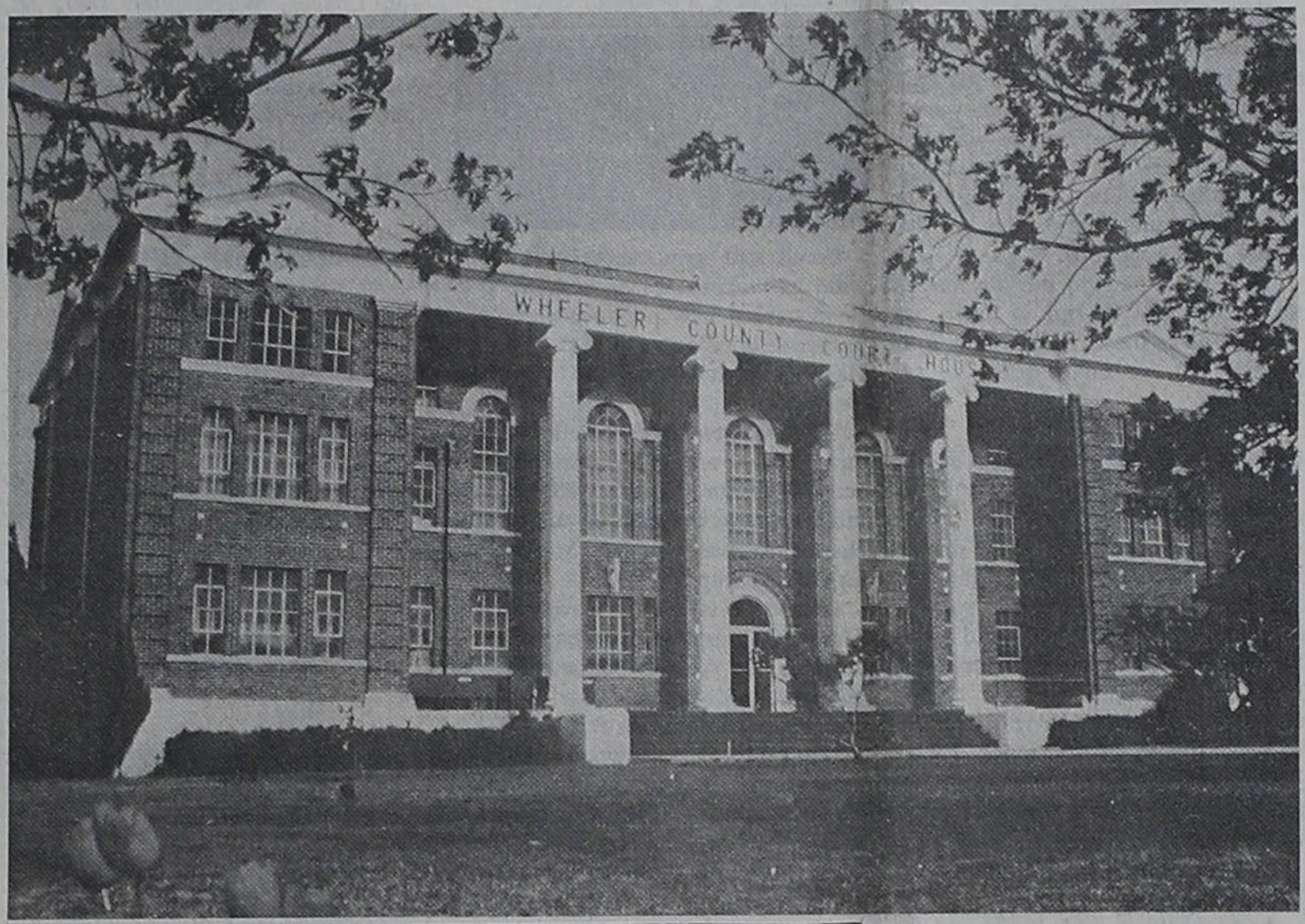

 Beef cattle producers in the Texas Panhandle will have an opportunity to see the results of the commercial feeding programs conducted by 10 4-H and FFA members in Wheeler and Hutchinson Counties.

The third year of the Panhandle Fed Heifer Program will climax Wednesday, June 4, when the heifers that have been fed by the boys and girls are weighed and evaluated.

The heifers will be on exhibit beginning on 10:00 a.m. at the Gouddy Sales Arena on the Tri-State Fairgrounds in Amarillo, Texas.

Mr. Bill Thorne, manager of XIT Feeders at Dalhart, will be on hand to evaluate and discuss the cattle. Thorne is well known for his expertise in evaluating fat cattle. He has consistently placed high in carcass contests held in the area.

This should be an educational experience for cattle feeders and producers. All interested people are invited to attend, according to Don King, County Extension Agent, Wheeler County.

### Swimming Classes To Be Offered

The City of Wheeler Swimming Pool will be offering several classes of swimming lessons this summer. The courses offered will range from advanced lifesaving to beginning swimming.

Classes will be offered during three different sessions, with some extra courses between sessions. The schedule is as follows:

June 9-13, & 16-20 — Advanced Lifesaving  
 June 16-20, & 23-27 — Jr. Lifesaving, Intermediate Swimmer, and Swimmer  
 July 7-11, & 14-18 — Advanced Beginners, (oldest) Beginners, and (youngest) beginners  
 July 21-25, & 28-Aug. 1 — Advanced Beginners and Beginners

The fee for the lessons will be \$25 for all classes, except for lifesaving which will have the added cost of books for the class.

Instructor for swimming lessons will be Lyndol Loyd with Mandy Smith serving as assistant.

Classes will be taught for one hour during the ten day period of lessons. All classes will be taught in the morning except for the advanced lifesaving course which will be taught at night from 7 to 9 p.m.

This year private lessons can be scheduled by special arrangement with the instructor. Private lessons will be scheduled on a first come first serve basis due to limited teaching time. The fee for private swimming lessons will be set at \$40. Private lessons will be for 30 minutes during a ten day period. The time for the lessons will be set by the instructor and the student.

The pool will also be offering a ladies swim time. The ladies swimming time will start the second week of June and will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 12 to 1 p.m.

Season Tickets will be available this year as in past years. For children 12 or under the cost is \$35 and for people over 12 the cost is \$45. Admission for the pool has also been set. Children 12 and under will pay \$.75 and people over 12 will pay \$1.50.

The pool may be rented at a rate of \$25 dollars for two hours for parties. The rate for large parties will be increased appropriately.

The tentative date for the pool opening will be May 31.

We hope that all will be able to come out and take advantage of our pool facilities this year.

There will be calf roping, team roping, bareback riding, saddle bronc riding and bull riding for the cowboys. The cowgirls will have barrel racing to compete in.

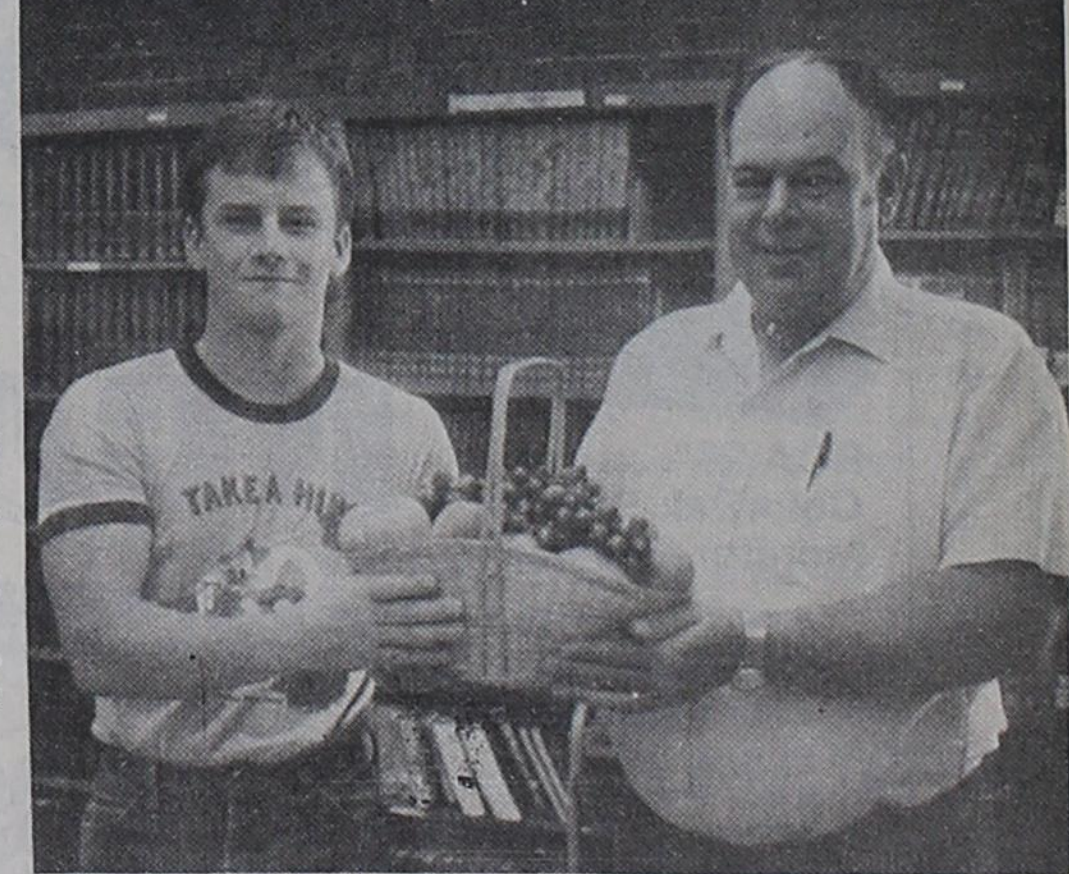
Admission will be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students.

### SHOPPING THE GARAGE SALES

You can tell it's spring—the garage sale sign are popping up all over. If you're planning on shopping these sales for clothing items, don't forget to take along a tape measure and a list of measurements of clothes that fit you and other members of your family. Since you typically can't try on the clothes at a garage sale, getting the right size is important. Clothes that are of the same size can measure differently in the chest, waist and hips. That's why your list of measurements and a tape measure will come in handy. Measure before you buy—even when the item is marked for size, so you can make sure you're not waisting your money on something that won't fit.

### SHOPPING FOR BARGAINS AT OUTLET STORES

More outlet stores and even complete outlet shopping centers are opening in many Texas cities. Because reduced prices are the chief feature of these stores, shopping at an outlet store can be a money saver.

Although you can get real bargains at outlet stores, the merchandise will vary in quality and some may have flaws. One way to tell what you're getting is to know what the labeling terms on this outlet store merchandise means.

Here are some of the terms used in many stores:

\* Samples—These garments may have been used by sales representatives. They typically come in small sizes and may be "shop-worn".

\* Irregulars—This indicates an imperfection in color, size, or fabric construction. The imperfections will not necessarily affect the wear of the garment and may not be visible. But make sure you know why the item has been labeled "irregular" before buying it.

\* Seconds—This term is applied to a garment with a visible tear, run, color loss or other imperfection.

\* Surpluses—These are generally "left-overs" either because they didn't sell well, or the manufacturer overestimated the number to make. End-of-the-season clothes and "odd lots" of broken sizes are also included in this category.

\* Mills-Ends are regular first quality fabrics that are from the end of a bolt of fabric. They usually come in short lengths and sell for a fraction of the

cost. But check end of bolt fabric for flaws or wrinkles that may not press out.

Outlet stores were once usually located in low-rent districts or near the manufacturing plant, but now may be found anywhere. There are even some books that list outlet stores throughout the state or nation so people can take advantage of bargain shopping while they travel.

But remember that there will be some trade-offs for low prices. The stores are usually self-service, have few or no fitting rooms, limited shopping hours, no alteration services, and allow no credit or returns.

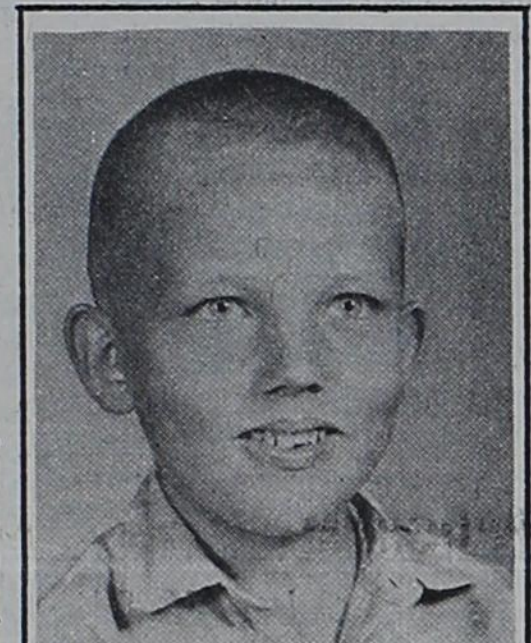

### Fed Heifer From Page 1

The Panhandle Fed Heifer Program was started three years ago to give 4-H and FFA members practical, hands-on experience in cattle feeding. The program was designed to operate as closely as possible to a commercial feed operation.

This year's feeding period began January 25, when the heifers were weighed, processed, and evaluated. The feeders selected their own heifers, and during the 130 day feeding period, they were responsible for the daily feeding and management of their cattle. The cattle in each county were fed identical feeds so that the results will be an indication of management ability.

Following the live animal evaluation, the cattle will be slaughtered and sold on the rail.

Final placings will be based on the feed conversion ratio, carcass value (as determined by quality grade and yield), and the feeder's score on a record book and test.

Several animal health companies and other agribusiness firms, as well as local businesses are supporting the program.

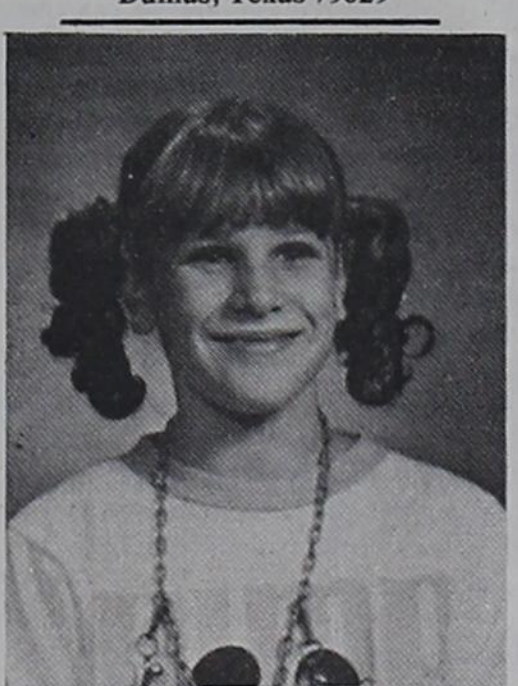
Braunstein's leap was a personal record for the 20-year-old athlete. He is a 1984 graduate of Wheeler High School where he was an All-District performer in basketball.

### Producers invited to insect scouting workshop

Cotton, corn, and sorghum producers in Wheeler County are again receiving a special invitation to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The first of two workshop sessions will focus on early and mid-season pests and will be held Tuesday, June 3, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview. Joe Don King, County Extension Agent, said. The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route south of the city.

The second workshop is scheduled for July 8, in Plainview and will cover mid to late-season crop pests.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by Extension, part of the Texas A&M University system.

In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators, and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield, and hold down production costs, King said.

The workshop will begin at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. James Leser, Extension Entomologist, outlining the scope of the training, and explaining general concepts of pest management, and sampling. Leser will then open the cotton pest section with information on trips. Cotton fleahoppers will be discussed by Greg Cronholm, Extension Agent-Entomology headquartered at Plainview. Dr. Pat Morrison will discuss sorghum pests. Aspects of pesticide safety will be presented by Mark Brown, Extension Agent-Entomology from Crosbyton.

The afternoon segment will open with a presentation on corn pests by Allen Knutson, Extension Agent-En-

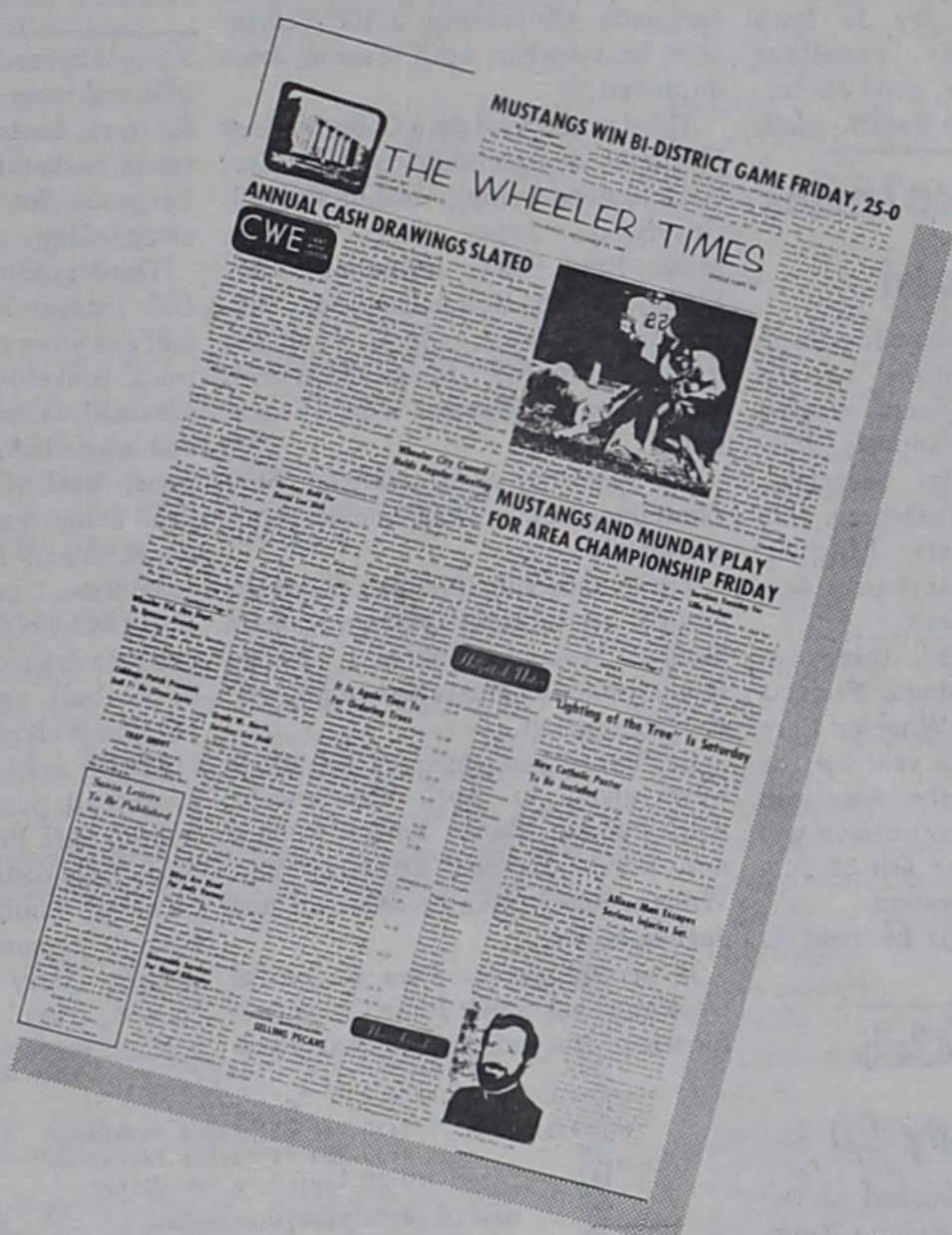
