Swimming Classes To Be Offered

The City of Wheeler Swimming Pool will be offering several classes of swimming lessons this summer. The courses offered will range from advanced lifesaving to beginning swimming.

Classes will be offered during three different sessions, with some extra courses between sessions. The schedule is as follows: June 9-13,& 16-20 - Advanced

Lifesaving

June 16-20,& 23-27 — Jr. Lifesaving, Intermediate Swimmer, and Swimmer

July 7-11,& 14-18 - Advanced Beginners, (oldest) Beginners, and (youngest) beginners

July 21-25, & 28-Aug. 1 — Advanced Beginners and Beginners

The fee for the lessons will be \$25 for all classes, except for lifesaving which will have the added cost of books for the class.

Instructor for swimming lessons will be Lyndol Loyd with Mandy Smith serving as assistant.

Classes will be taught for one hour during the ten day period of lessons. All classes will be taught in the morning except for the advanced lifesaving course which will be taught at night from 7 to 9 p.m.

This year private lessons can be scheduled by special arangement with the instructor. Private lessons will be scheduled on a first come first serve basis due to limited teaching time. The fee for private swimming lessons will be set at \$40. Private lessons will be for 30 minutes during a ten day period. The time for the lessons will be set by the instructor and the student.

The pool will also be offering a ladies swim time. The ladies swimming time will start the second week of June and will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 12 to 1 p.m.

Season Tickets will be available this year as in past years. For children 12 or under the cost is \$35 and for people over 12 the cost is \$45. Admission for the pool has also been set. Children 12 and under will pay \$.75 and people over 12 will pay \$1.50.

The pool may be rented at a rate of \$25 dollars for two hours for parties. The rate for large parties will be increased appropriately.

The tentative date for the pool opening will be May 31.

We hope that all will be able to come out and take advantage of our pool facilities this year.

Dear Editor,

Stas, for listening to me over the past Vanpool, Helen Sabbe, Irma Kirk, Elbert is the eldest brother of the late family at Twitty. 3 years on Smoking Problems in the Hospital, also I want to thank the the United States for their incouragement. I have been informed the petition I sent in is on the agenda for this month or next. I will be notified of the date. The only bill they stand on is #4801.

I had a visit with Mayor, Wanda Herd on the Smoking Problem in Hospitals. Mrs. Herd indicated that cigarette smoke did not hurt her health and, said, "This is a free country." I agree, but when that freedom abuse's sick, dying people, that is not freedom. The latest Reader's Digest, March 1986, shows cigarette smoking is effecting every human on earth.

The last 40 days and nights in this hospital, my wife and others were dying, I begged Hix and Dr.'s to let up on smoking. Barbour told me he had the habit. They went right on smoking. My wife died April 2, 1983. She could not stand filthy smoke. She was gasping for a clean breath of air. The Mayor asked me why I didn't take her out of this hospital if I didn't like the stinking smoke. Is that what you call a free country! That is your Great Society-Heathenism.

The mayor did agree the smoking should be corrected in the hospital. We know smoking violates the right of the people in this hospital. I agree with you we should look after the young, elderly, sick and dying, and keep this filthy smoke out of their lungs. I also agree we should look for more Industry and regroup and unite in the Name of Jesus Christ, the Son of the Living God. Also quit abusing the sick and dying, the crippled, afflected and the industry we have. I don't believe in monopoly, competition is good for all. We have places here that wanted a clean environment, where you can go in and have the finest food anywhere or shop and not have to put up with filthy smoking and cursing. Some groups, some news media, some individuals, and churches seem to say let's go out to so and so, and leave those other businesses behind that have worked hard to survive. They do have to make a living. How do you expect other businesses to come here? Work is scarce. Why don't we hire local people? No wonder we had a problem in the hospital this week. I don't blame Dr. Raine for not staying. I have talked to people coming out of the hospital this week. These people indicated to me they didn't like the smoking, but were afraid to speak out against smoking because they had some sick in this hospital. Is that what you call a free country? This is the same with some employee's.

I understand there is an epidemic of V.D. and Aids. I have asked the Dept. of Health to have employee's, administrator's, Dr.'s on down the line to show test for Aids and V.D. every so often. Hospitals are way overdue in this, especially in Wheeler.

I believe people should know about Morris. problems in the hospitals. We don't have to wait on law #4801 to be revised. If the board don't act, I believe the mayor has a duty to get this problem in order.

I know I am guilty of watching this filthy smoking in the hospital. It does kill! I haven't gone to Taiwan, but I walked the dirt streets, and board sidewalks in Wheeler, barefooted. People had a principle then, why did we lose it? A lot of people have been away for a long time they drifted back to Wheeler County among the finest people on earth. I to have seen the world in my mind and have also listened to the world talk. Taiwan is fighting for it's life the same as our sick and dying in the hospitals and care centers from filthy smoking.

I would be glad to talk to anyone on this problem. We are losing hospitals everywhere due to bad management. I will not recommend this hospital under its present conditions


