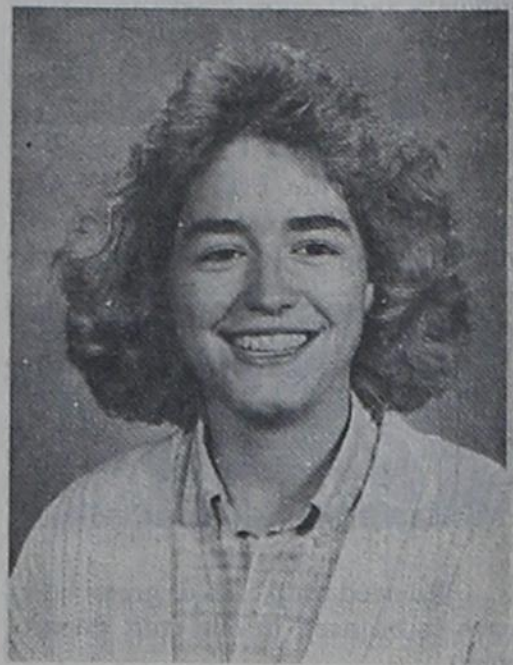

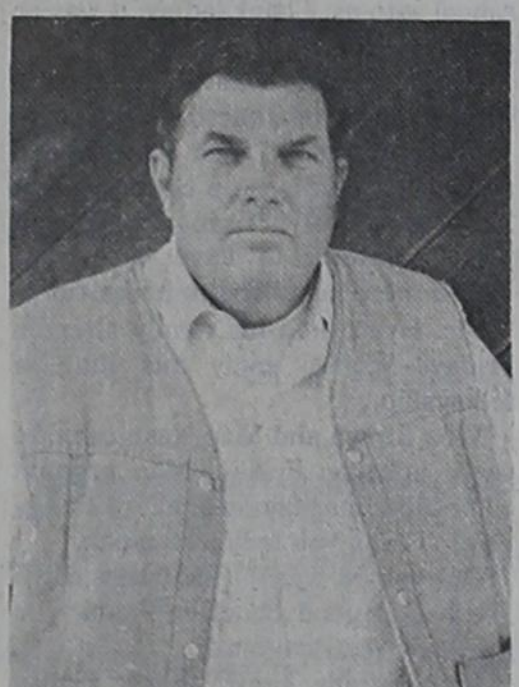

## MUSTANGS ARE SHUT OUT 18-0

The Wheeler Mustangs opened the hardest part of their 1987 schedule Friday night with an 18-0 loss to Hobart, Okla.

It was the first time since October 31, 1986, that the Mustangs were shutout. Wheeler, now 2-1, is expected to drop from its No. 4 statewide ranking when the poll is released; Hobart will likely remain lodged in its state's No. 2 position.

"We're stumbling around licking our wounds, trying to regroup," Wheeler coach Preston said Saturday

after the loss. "They just lined up some good football players and whipped us."

Wheeler's top two rushers—Grayson Benson and Bubba Smith—were stifled by the Hobart defense.

Benson, who in the first two games of the year had averaged 197 yards rushing per game, was held to just 52 yards on 19 carries; Smith, who's first two games saw him gain 195 yards on 31 carries, was limited to 53 yards in 11 tries.

In June of 1985, Rev. Cochran, joined Missionary World Services and Evangelism in Wilmore, KY as an associate evangelist. In October 1986 the Board of Trustees named Rev. Cochran as President of Missionary World Service and Evangelism. MWS&E is a missionary organization which ministers around the world in 16 different countries by sending work crusades to assist national and foreign missionaries.

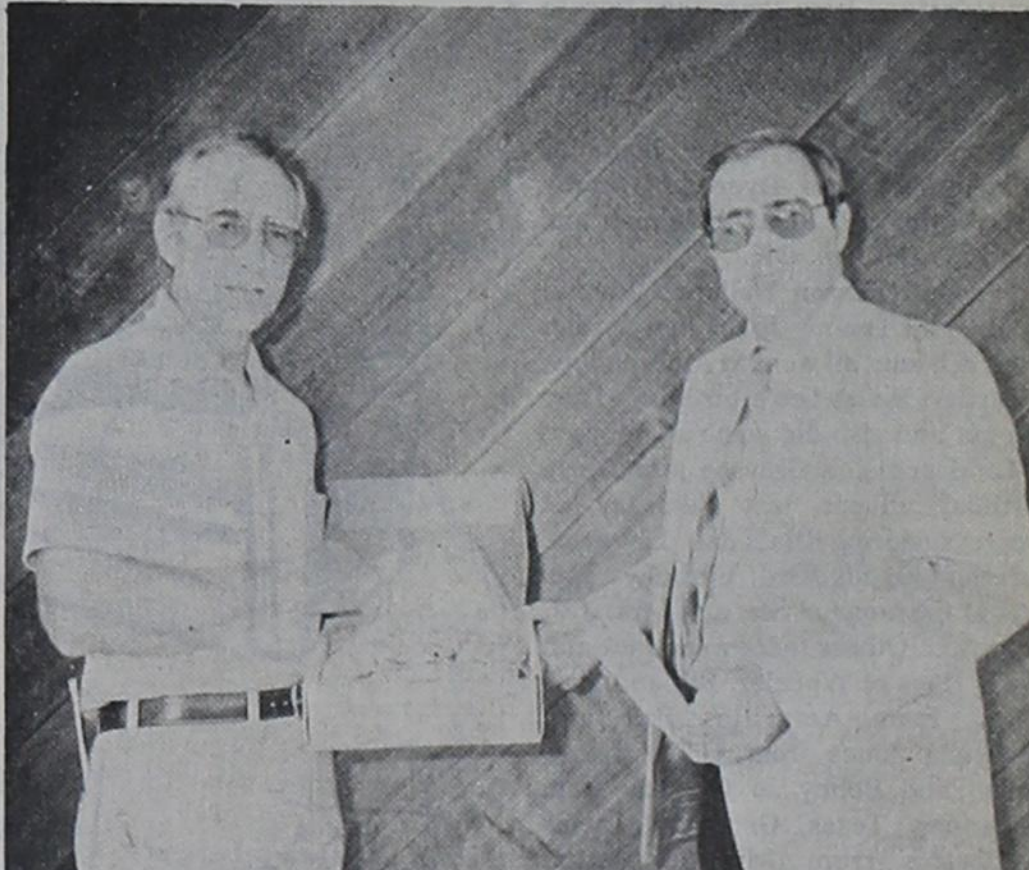
The Mustang defense was unable to

## Soil Conservation Election Is Called

An election for a director to serve in Zone 3 on the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation Board is scheduled for Oct 1st, 1987 at the Wheeler Soil Conservation Service Office announced Clarence Zybach, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 9:00 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also

live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district directors serve four-year terms of office.
