## MUSTANGS FOOTBALL SEASON OPENS FRIDAY IN AMARILLO

The 1987 Texas schoolboy football season gets underway this weekend and the Wheeler Mustangs will make their debut in Amarillo when they play the Highland Park Hornets.

It will be a young Mustang team that takes to the gridiron for the 8 PM kickoff with only five of the starting positions being manned by seniors. Defensively the Mustangs will have the most inexperience and it has been on the defensive side that has caused the most concern for Mustang coaches during pre-season workouts.

This will be the inaugural game for the Highland Park Hornets in varsity competition. The Hornets played only a JV schedule last year but fashioned an 8-2 record and will compete in District 1-2A this fall.

At this point in time, the Mustangs are strongest on offense as from the quick guard spot out to the tight end position, the Mustangs return starters from the District 1-1A championship team. Two new faces will dot the offense in the backfield. Sophomore Shawn Bradstreet has nailed down the quarterback position and Shane Guest will be the split back or wingback according to the offensive set the Mustangs use.

The Mustangs challenged people from the 1 formation as they nailed down four consecutive district championships and trips to the playoffs but will be using the Wing T some in '87. "We are not as strong physically as we have been in the past so we won't be able to line up and run right at folks like we have been doing", head coach Preston Smith stated this week.

Coach Smith said he was concerned that the outcome of the Mustangs scrimmages with Gruver and Clarendon might give the Mustangs some false impressions of their strength. "Scrimmages are really misleading and right now we have a long ways to go to be a good football team, especially on defense", Smith said. "Our running backs, Grayson Benson and Bubba Smith, showed up pretty well but Gruver and Clarendon didn't play like Hobart and Panhandle will".

The Mustangs will be away from Nicholson Field for their first three games of the season. After the Highland Park game, the Mustangs travel to Oklahoma to play highly ranked Hobart and then to Shamrock for a clash with the county rival Irish. The Mustangs home opener will be against the Vega Longhorns on Sept. 25th and the Longhorn game will also be homecoming.

It won't be an easy chore defending their district championship when the Mustangs take on Booker, Follett and Sunray. Most fans haven't forgotten that it was Booker that whipped the Mustangs convincingly in district play and the Kiowas return that ball club nearly intact. The McLean Tigers will be the other district opponent for the Mustangs.

Fans might not be familiar with where the Highland Park school is in Amarillo. Highland Park is located at the intersection of US 60 and FM 1912 right across from the Iowa Beef plant.

## CLASSES BEGIN AT CHRISTIAN ACADEMY

In the A.C.E. program, all students work at their own pace on the level of instruction where they are able to perform. It is the old-fashioned, one-room school set-up. Slower students are allowed to perform in their academics at a level where they can master concepts that others with more capabilities have already comprehended while those faster students are permitted to move along to more advanced studies. Many of the students in W.C.A. are working one to two years above grade level.  
The Achievement Tests at W.C.A. show that the program works. This


