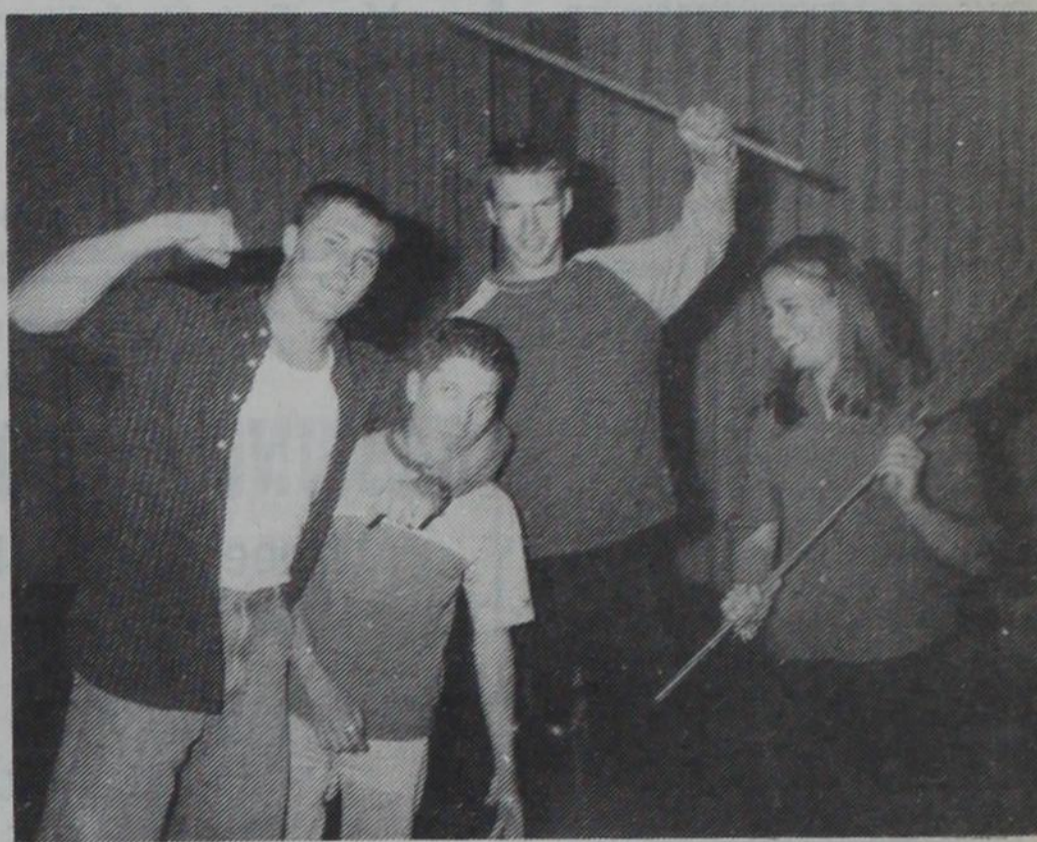
Admission will be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students.

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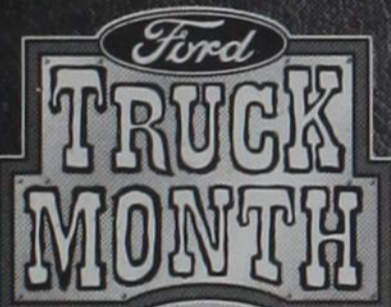

Greenbug Infestation Is Declining In S. Panhandle

Greenbug infestations are declining in the southern Texas Panhandle as a result of beneficial insect activity primarily the parasitic wasp. Fields that had populations of 300-500 per foot of row a couple of weeks ago are now virtually all mummies.

The northern Texas Panhandle continues to report moderate to heavy infestations of greenbugs without much evidence of parasitic wasp activity.

Russian wheat aphid infestation are on the rise in the southern Texas Panhandle. One field had as high as 20 percent of the tillers showing Russian Wheat aphid damage. These aphids could continue to increase in numbers through April into early May.

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Extension Update

OK! NOBODY IS PERFECT!

The woman who always looks so sleek and stylish probably has bulges too, she just knows how to downplay her deficits.

So can you, armed with a few strategies for finding styles that flatter you. If you are hippy or pear-shaped, you need balance therefore, enlarge the appearance of the shoulder area to de-emphasize the hips. Pull the focus upward with a pretty color or bold pattern near the face. Go for soft silhouettes. If full all over is your inheritance or apple-shaped is your body style, then lengthening and slenderizing is the goal you need to achieve for a sleeker you.

Long or short, keep the color scheme simple, always match hose to shoes for a seamless effect below the hemline. By doing this you create the illusion of elongating the body which makes you appear more slender. Example: A 3/4 jacket over a short skirt is chic with hose and shoes to match.

When you are all curves, with a small waist, the key is proportion. Choose fabrics that flow over the body. Moderate a too tiny waist with loose tops that hit lower on the hips. When defining the waist of an hour-glass figure, be sure belts or waistbands aren't too tight.

Ah, the petite frame - a small frame may be the envy of many, but it has its special problems too. For a petite frame the look for you should be one that is simple and not fussy. Stay away from oversized items that will overwhelm. Now you ask - what about accessories? If you are a woman of substance then large, bold accessories are for you but if petite is your style then the simpler the better.

When shopping for shoes, shop in the middle of the day. Feet are smallest in the morning and often swollen in the evening. A 1 1/2 to 2 inch heel is flattering to most legs.

Remember, regardless of your body style, if you are not wearing the colors that flatter your skin tone, especially around the face you have defeated the purpose of dressing to enhance your positive attributes. Wearing your colors makes your personal coloring come alive. Your skin glows, your eyes are brighter and your hair is filled with highlights. Worst of all the wrong color can be ageing. (Oh, NO!)

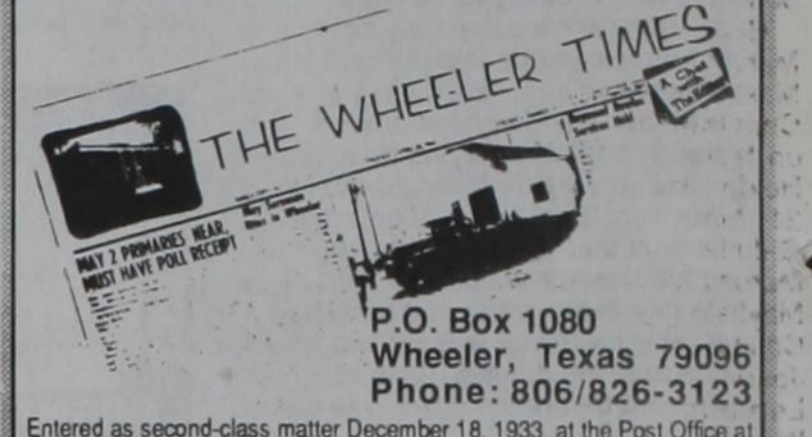

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?
Anyone who owned a home on January 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium, or mobile home. (Counties, cities, and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?
If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

Do I have to apply each year?
No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1999, you won't need to reapply for 2000 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 2000. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled during 1999, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

After school and on Saturdays, Blaine put on the hat of grocery clerk and stocker, learning his father's business from the ground up. Granddad Puckett also taught him the cattle-buying business and daddy has continued to wear that ten gallon hat all his adult life.

After graduating from Sayre High School, Blaine sported the hat of a student at Oklahoma A&M in Stillwater, majoring in Business Education. Then in 1935, his father sent him to Mangum, Oklahoma to accept the hat of manager of Puckett's Food Store. During this time, Blaine attended a dance one evening where he met a dark haired, Hazel eyed beauty named Ruth Evelyn Elsea.

County-Wide Burn Ban Adopted Specific Restrictions Implemented

The Wheeler County Commissioners Court adopted a County Wide Burn Ban EFFECTIVE MARCH 13, 2000 through JUNE 13, 2000. Specific Restrictions will apply. Those producers wishing to burn crop residue on land designated for Ag use will have to follow the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission guide lines as set out below AND contact the local sheriff's office or police department BEFORE ANY burning may be done.

GUIDELINES:
1. Burning shall be commenced and conducted only when wind direction and other meteorological conditions are such that smoke and other pollutants will not cause adverse effects to any public road, landing strip, navigable water, or off-site structure containing sensitive receptors).

2. If at any time the burning causes or may tend to cause smoke to blow onto or across a road or highway, it is the responsibility of the person initiating the burn to post flag-persons on affected roads.

3. Burning shall be conducted in compliance with the following meteorological and timing conditions:
a. The initiation of burning shall commence no earlier than one hour after sunrise. Burning shall be completed on the same day not later than one hour before sunset, and shall be attended by a responsible party at all times during the active burn phase when the fire is progressing. In cases where residual fire and/or smoldering objects continue to emit smoke after this time, such areas shall be extinguished if the smoke from these areas has the potential to create a nuisance or traffic hazard conditions. In no case shall the extent of the burn area be allowed to increase after this time.

b. Burning shall not be commenced when surface wind speed is predicted to be less than six miles per hour (mph) (five knots) or greater than 23 mph (20 knots) during the burn period.

c. Burning shall not be conducted during periods of actual or predicted persistent low level atmospheric temperature inversions.
111.221 Responsibility for Consequences of Outdoor Burning.
THE AUTHORITY TO CONDUCT OUTDOOR BURNING UNDER THIS REGULATION DOES NOT EXEMPT OR EXCUSE ANY PERSON RESPONSIBLE FROM THE CONSEQUENCES, DAMAGES, OR INJURIES RESULTING FROM THE BURNING AND DOES NOT EXEMPT OR EXCUSE ANYONE FROM COMPLYING WITH ALL OTHER APPLICABLE LAWS OR ORDINANCES, REGULATIONS, AND ORDERS OF GOVERNMENTAL
