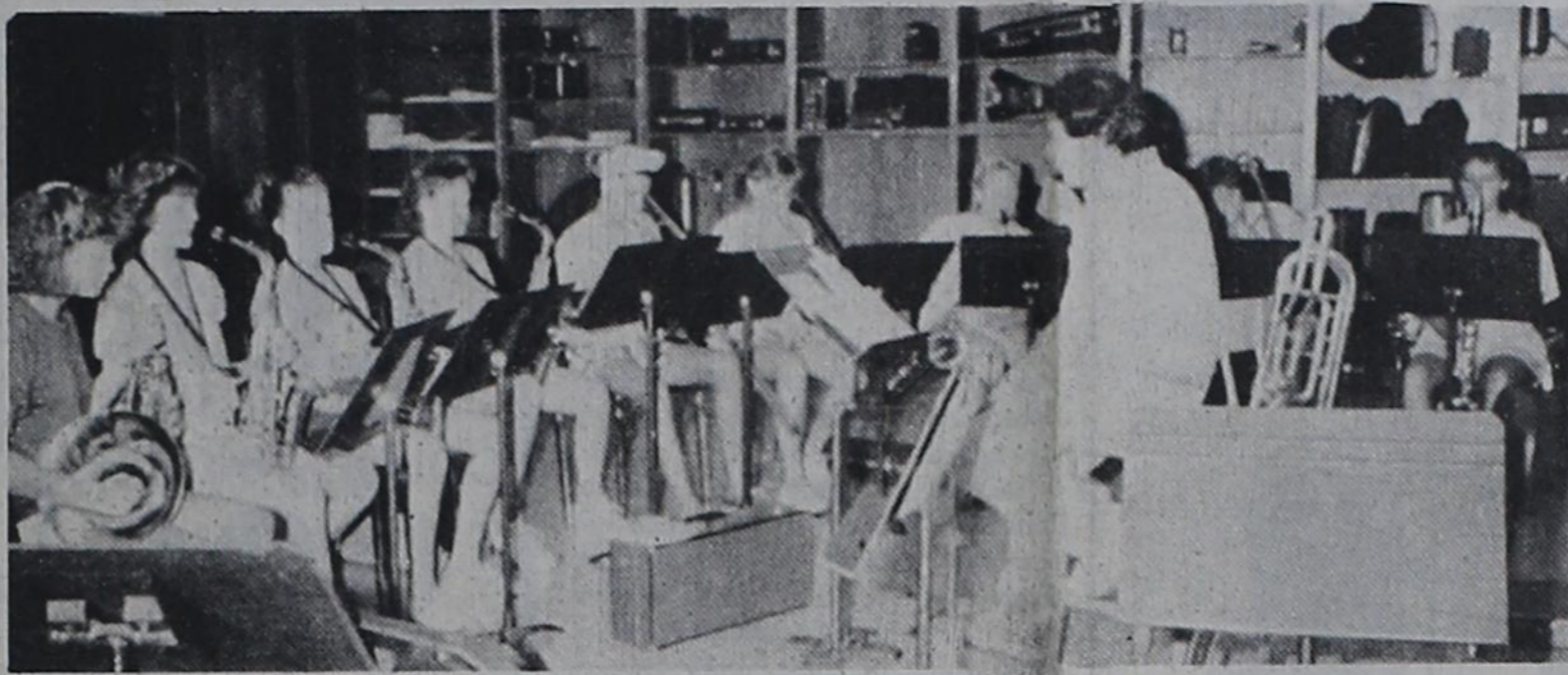

Continental Singers To Appear

The Continental Singers and Orchestra, an internationally recognized Christian musical group, will present a dynamic new program this Friday, August 14, at 7:30 p.m., in Wheeler at the High School Auditorium.

Centered on a theme of "Let There Be Praise!", their program celebrates the 20th anniversary of the group while integrating a portion of "Elijah" -- a powerful new musical that explores the life of one of the Old Testament's most well-known prophets.

Ken Waggoner, Executive Vice President of Continental Ministries, explains that both parts of the program reflect "our need to praise God as we see him make the impossible possible in our lives." He reflects that the existence of the Continental Singers "is a testimony to God's power. It's literally a miracle that a ministry like ours has lasted for 20 years. In Gospel music ministry, some groups barely make it 20 months let alone 20 years."

Cam Florida, Continentals' President and the producer of the program, concurs, "The purpose of any ministry or, in the case of the Old Testament, any prophet is to communicate God's word and point the people of their generation to God's

glory. Elijah did it in his time. The Continentals have been doing it for the past two decades and, we hope, in the decades to come." He further explains that "Elijah" is very appropriate to the anniversary "because God used an ordinary man like Elijah and did extraordinary things through him." He believes the same is true for the Continental Singers. "Every year ordinary kids tour all over the world and see extraordinary things happen in their lives and the lives of the people around them."

Featuring 25 vocalists and a 10-piece orchestra, the Continental Singers program, according to Waggoner, "combines the best of our past with the promises of our future. It's a musical celebration that highlights two decades of praise and joy from our most popular musicals, hymn medleys, and a few contemporary classics." Well-known for utilizing a variety of musical styles in their program, the Continental Singers will include songs and arrangements by some of today's top contemporary Christian artists.

Waggoner enthusiastically maintains that this year's program "will inspire, uplift, and challenge your heart... and your life."

In 1987, they will send out 18 tours to perform in all 50 states and approximately 32 countries throughout the world while overseeing 5 international ministries in Singapore, Hungary, England, Europe, and Latin America.

For those interested in touring with the Continentals as vocalists, instrumentalists, or technicians, auditions will be held after the concert.

A graveside service for Robert Wilson Edwards, a resident of Bend Oregon since 1935, was held at 11 a.m. Saturday, July 11, 1987 at Pilot Butte Cemetery.

Mr. Edwards died Wednesday, July 8, 1987, at his home following an extended illness. He was 74.

He was born in Wheeler, Texas, on March 10, 1913, to John R. and Matilda (Crause) Edwards. Most of his life was spent on dairy farms and ranches.

He repaired military vehicles in Bend during World War II. He moved to Madras in 1948 and worked for the Eastern Oregon Mills and Jefferson Plywood. He moved back to Bend in 1964.

On February 12, 1966, he married his wife, Betty, who survives at the family home.

Other survivors include four sons, K.D. "Scott" McLennan of Redondo Beach, Calif., James C. Edwards and Robert L. Edwards of Seattle; three daughters, Rosalie J. Matylinski of Metolius, Susan Thompson of Newport and Linda Vaughn of Myrtle Creek; and a sister, Pearl Williams of Wheeler, Texas. Also surviving are 13 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren. Four brothers and four sisters preceded Mr. Edwards in death.

Wheeler County Range And Pasture Tour Set August 20

Farmers and ranchers and other interested people in Wheeler County and the surrounding area are invited to take part in the annual Wheeler County Range and Pasture Tour on Thursday, August 20. The tour is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Soil Conservation Service.

Those making the tour will leave the parking lot at Maxey's Steakhouse at 9:00 a.m. The first stop will be two goldaster-control demonstration plots on the Duncan Ranch, southeast of Mobeetie. While in this area, there will be stops at new lovegrass planting to compare different methods of seeding lovegrass.

The last stop on the tour will be at Bill Atherton's to look at new and one-year old seedings of Plains Bluestem.

The group will also see different methods of weed control that has been used on the new grass seedings.

Lunch will be furnished by T.J. Bluestem Farms of Fargo, Oklahoma and Seright Enterprises of Elk City, Oklahoma.

After lunch, Dr. J. F. Cadenhead,

Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist from Vernon will discuss the importance of weed and brush control and chemicals available for the control of weeds, brush, and goldaster control.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve veterans and people of all ages regardless of socio economic level, race, color, sex, handicap, religion, or national origin.

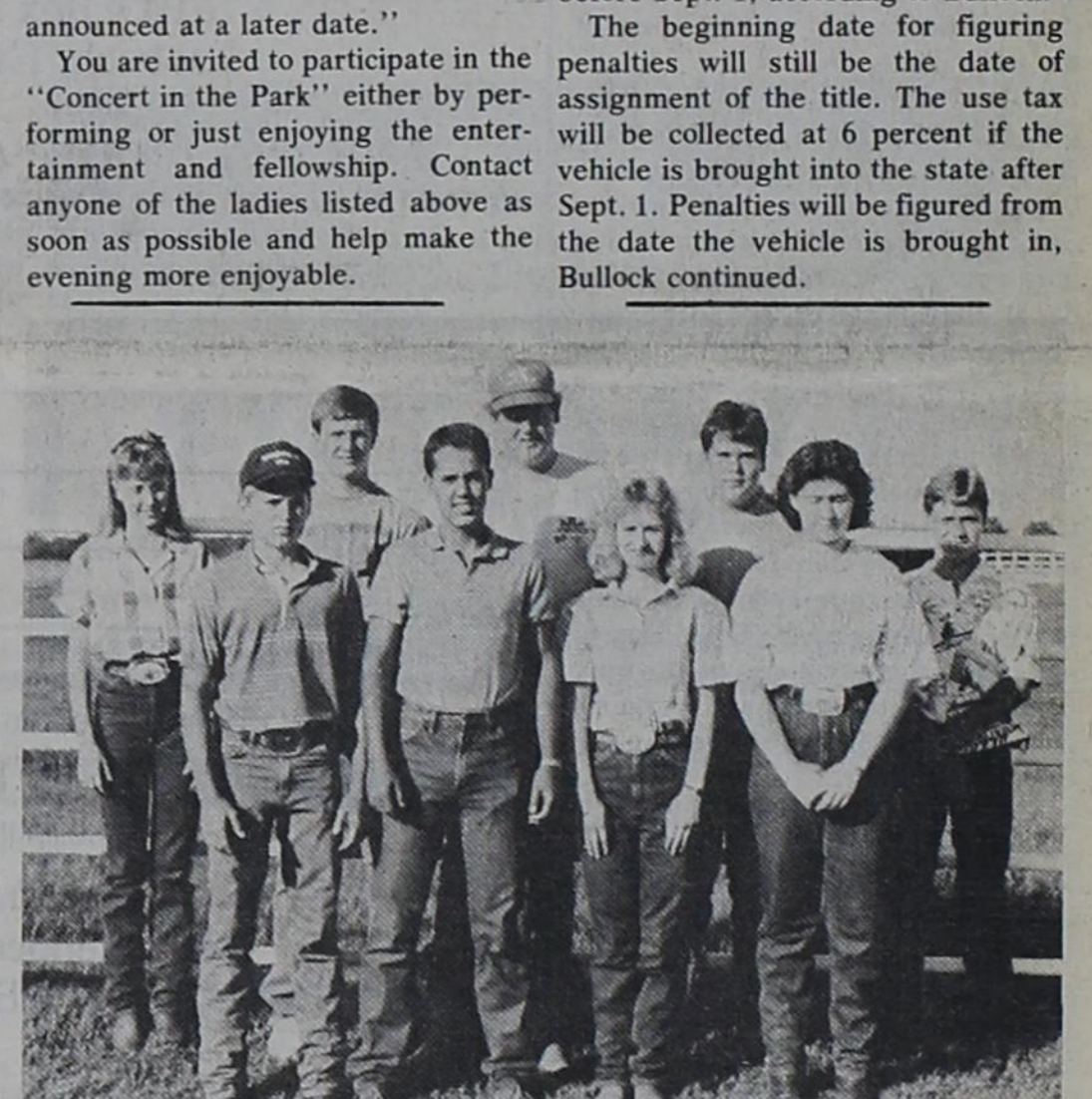

6% Motor Vehicle Tax Begins Sept. 1

Jerry Hefley, Wheeler County Tax Collector, received a reminder today from Bob Bullock, Comptroller of Public Accounts, reminding him of the increase in motor vehicle sales tax. The increase, recently passed by the state legislature, to 6 percent will go into effect on September 1.

If the title is assigned on or after Sept. 1, then the 6 percent rate must be collected unless a bill of sale or invoice is presented showing the delivery of the vehicle took place before Sept. 1, according to Bullock.

The beginning date for figuring penalties will still be the date of assignment of the title. The use tax will be collected at 6 percent if the vehicle is brought into the state after Sept. 1. Penalties will be figured from the date the vehicle is brought in, Bullock continued.

Information On Allison School Tax Valuation

Mr. James McCarley, chief assessor for the Hemphill County Appraisal District informed the Allison School District pursuant to 25.20 of the State Property Code, the estimated tax value for the 1987 ad valorem tax roll will be \$163,187,600. This represents a total loss from 1986 of \$91,136,995 as the assessed value for 1986 was \$254,324,595. The total value for the previous year, 1985, was 325,363,860. Over the three year period beginning in 1985 to present, the school district has lost a total of 162,176,260 in assessed valuation. This extreme loss in value is attributed to the sharp decline in the price of natural gas products which began in 1985. The taxes for the District have gradually increased while the size of the staff has decreased. However, quality education continues to be provided for the Allison Independent School District.

Notice of 1987 Effective Tax Rate

The purpose of this notice is to inform you about your taxes. The 1987 effective tax rate is a tax rate that would levy the same amount of operating taxes the taxing unit levied last year on property taxed in both years, plus the amount the unit needs to pay certain long term debts this year. The rate is calculated as follows:
