The Texas Lions Camp is completely accessible to wheelchairs and its programs are adapted especially to serve children who are visually impaired, hearing impaired and physically handicapped.



The 5 and under and the 6-9 age



"Matching funds" means the city would have to raise \$15,000 of the money needed for the project. The city's part can be in money, materials and/or labor.

The grant application requested funds for the "shelter", the walk and bridge leading to the "shelter", a merry-go-round, monkey bars, see-saws, re-working of the croquet courts, additional tables and cookers, the burying of electrical lines at the park and the planting of additional trees at the park.

The recipients of the grant money will be announced in January, 1988. Should the city not receive the

grant, it is hoped to have enough raised for the construction of the "shelter".

The need for some form of covered area at the park was realized last year with the first of the "4th of July" celebrations. The drive to build such a structure was started earlier in 1987, but only \$6,300 has been donated and pledged toward the project. The cost of the project was bid at \$10,800 on June 10. While in this area, there will be stops at new lovegrass planting to compare different methods of seeding lovegrass.

The last stop on the tour will be at Bill Atherton's to look at new and one-year old seedings of Plains Blue-

The group will also see different methods of weed control that has been used on the new grass seedings.
