4-H RODEO WILL START NEXT WEEK

The Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo is scheduled for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 6, 7 & 8, 1987 at the Wheeler Rodeo Arena. Each performance will begin at 7:00 p.m.

Entry in the rodeo is open to all youth who have not passed their 20th

birthday before the opening day of the rodeo.

Stock for the rodeo is being furnished by Bill Hext of Glazier, Texas. Trophies will be awarded through 3rd place in each event in the 6-9 age group and buckles will be awarded for All-Around in this age division. Contestants must enter two events to be eligible for All-Around.

The 5 and under and the 6-9 age groups will compete on Thursday night. The 10-13 and 14-19 age groups will be Friday and Saturday nights. The contestants will be able to ride both nights, if they wish. In these two groups, Ralph Maynard spurs will be awarded to the All-Around 2-night Average winner. Contestants must

compete in at least two events each night to be eligible for the All-Around Average. There will be a limit each night of 20 steer riders, 15 bull riders, and 15 bareback riders.

This year, we are going to pay back money in the 10-13 and 14-19 age groups. Half of the entry fee will be paid back.

The following are the age divisions and events for the rodeo: **5 and under:** Stick Horse Barrel Race, Stick Horse Flag Race, Goat Ribbon Race, and the Stick Horse Pole Bending. **Age 6-9:** Calf Riding, Pole Bending, Barrel Race, Flag Race, and Goat Ribbon Race. **Age 10-13:** Steer Riding, Breakaway Roping, Barrel Race, Pole Bending & Flag Race. **Ages 14-19:** Bareback Riding, Bull Riding, Calf Roping, Ribbon Roping, Breakaway Roping, pole Bending, and Barrel Race.

A small house on a lot was generously sold for a nominal fee by Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Mitchell. Mrs. Lucille Tipps contributed significantly to the purchase of the location.

On August 15, 1982, the celebration of the Liturgy of the Word and Eucharist took place in the house and was Blessed by Bishop Leroy T. Matthiesen. The families entitled the house St. Mary's Church, because of their devotion to the Blessed Mother, Mary the Mother of Jesus. Later individuals and families gathered at the home of Dr. Louie and Gina Mendiola for a party.

Over the next several years, members continued a fund-raising project for the hope of a new building to be erected on the sight of the existing property of 701 S. Canadian, Wheeler, TX. Paul would be out of town. Chairperson of the parish (general) Council was Albert Hartman.
