Truck Accident, One Seriously Injured

James Goodlander, 24, of Wheeler suffered extensive head injuries when he was pinned under the cab of his 18-wheel truck after it rolled over in eastern Hemphill County Friday.

Department of Public Safety Trooper Johnny Carter said Goodlander was traveling north on FM 2654 about 5:45 p.m. Friday when he apparently turned left onto FM 33 and the truck, owned by Bill's Trucking Co., rolled over, pinning him under the cab.

"It happened right in front of a house, so we were notified immediately," Carter said.

Goodlander was treated for extensive head injuries and is currently in the intensive care unit at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

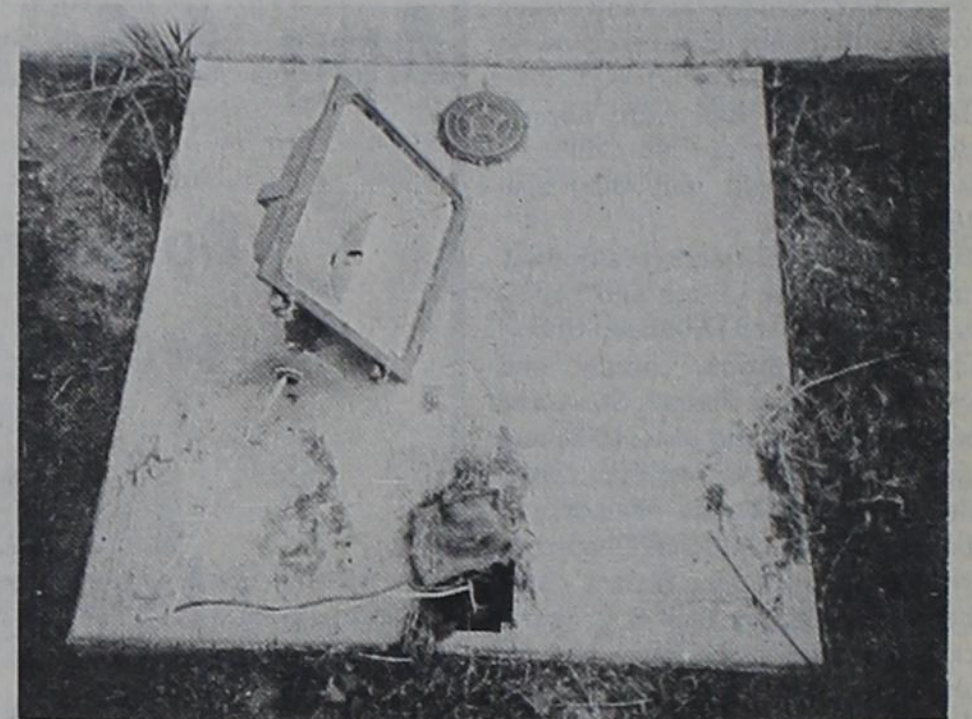

REWARD OFFERED: The light for the flag at Wheeler cemetery was destroyed and the flag taken from the pole. The damage apparently took place Tuesday evening. Damage was also done to the rock wall lining the main road into the cemetery. The flag and pole have been a part of the cemetery entry for the past six year; during this time the flag has been taken two other times. The lighting

was installed 1 1/2 years ago by the local American Legion Post. A vehicle was in the area of the pole and the damage to the wall was done when the vehicle drove over or through the short wall. A reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the individual and/or individuals responsible is offered; an estimate for the cost of repairs is \$300.

Park Improvement Is Planned

The "Shelter" for Wheeler's city park is still in the 'works' with the city to apply for a Texas Parks and Wildlife grant for the "Shelter" and other park improvements. The total package will cost around \$30,000.

The Park Improvement Committee met Thursday evening at the city of Wheeler meeting room to discuss the grant. The members went over the grant application and added a plan for the park improvements. The committee is composed of the "Shelter" committee and two representatives from the Wheeler city council.

The grant will be a 'matching funds' type grant. If received when the applications are reviewed, the city will receive 1/2 the amount of the money needed for the improvements and Wheeler will have to raise the remainder in cash or 'in kind' work. 'In kind' is the value of volunteer labor and/or materials.

In addition to the shelter, walk and bridge to the shelter, new 'monkey bars', merry-go-round and see-saws will be added. The electrical lines for the lights will be buried and the croquet courts will be re-constructed. The plans also call for the planting of some 25 additional trees in the area.

The walk to the "shelter" will run

from the south curb on Eighth Street, straight across the creek to the shelter. The curb will be laid down at the west end of the walk for the handicapped.

The plans and donors will be carried at a later date.

Zip 103 Will Observe First Anniversary

KEZP-FM 103 has been broadcasting since August 1, 1986. Our audience is very loyal and our ratings are excellent. Being the only locally live FM country station in the area has helped develop and enlarge the listenership. We debated at first about going automated or using a satellite music service for economic reasons, but quickly decided against it. We think we do a better job live and keep control of the station at home. Based on response, we made the right decision."

CRP Sign-Up No. 5 July 20 Thru July 31

A fifth CRP sign-up has been scheduled for July 20, through July 31. This sign-up will occur at the local ASCS office. To qualify for CRP, a field must have been farmed for at least two years between 1981 and 1985. This field must also be highly erodible. A producer bids his land into the program during this two week sign-up and must develop a plan of operations within 30 days if the bid is accepted.

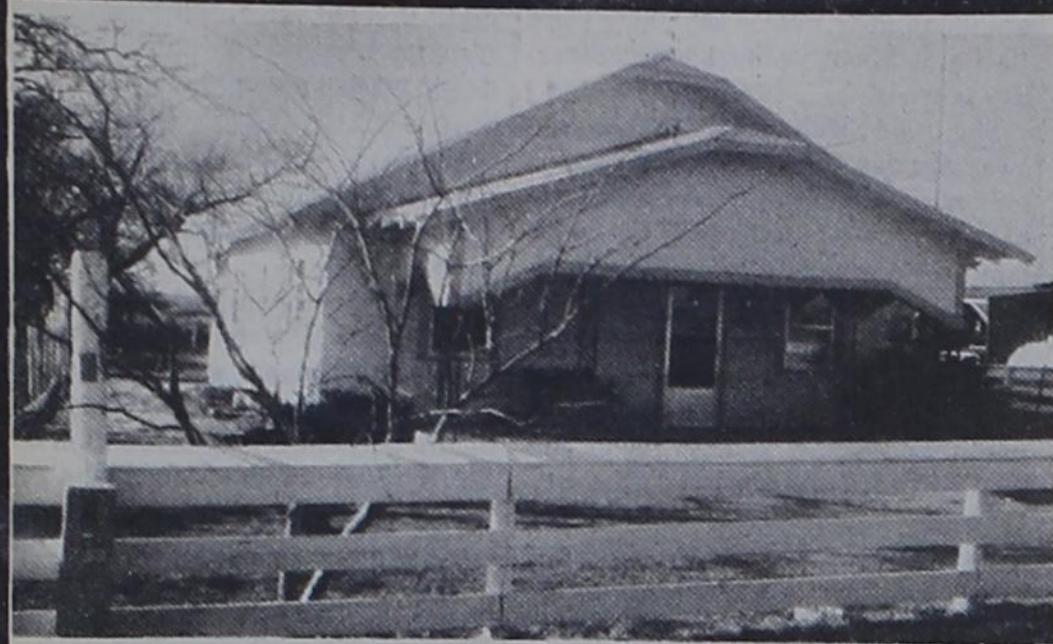

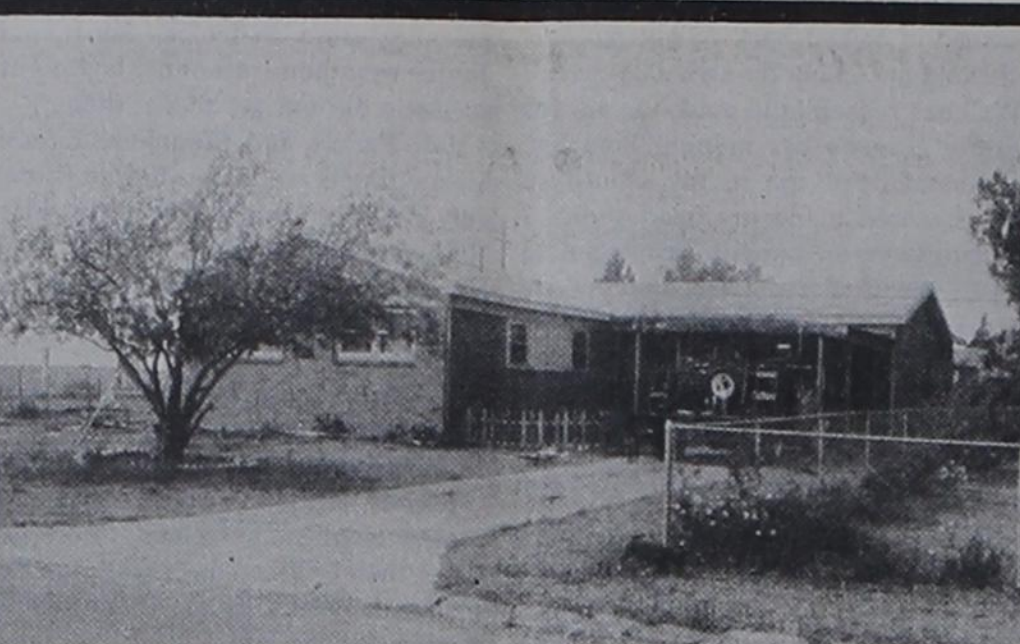

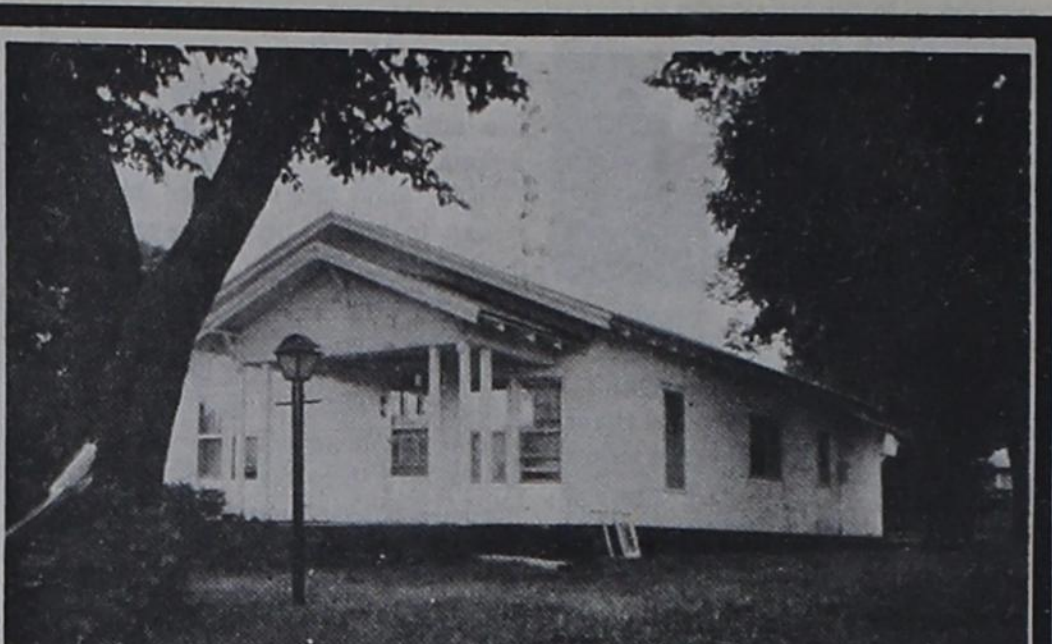

Under the CRP program, highly erodible fields are seeded to adapted grass species and maintained for ten years. These fields can not be hayed, grazed, or cut for seed for ten years. The only use from CRP land is wildlife, either for personal use or as a hunting lease. In return for not being used, the producer is reimbursed on an annual basis.

Wheeler County has approximately 40,000 acres already in CRP and is eligible for an additional 10,000 - 13,000 acres. Producers who are really interested in placing their land in CRP should keep these figures in mind.

AARP Gives Warning Against Solicitors

"Older consumers should be beware of telephone solicitors and door-to-door salesman claiming to represent the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP)," reports Texas State Director, Alice Korthauer.

Telephone solicitors claiming to be representatives of AARP have reappeared and are currently operating along the Texas/Oklahoma border and in the panhandle area. "The telephone solicitors," Korthauer says, "ask unsuspecting consumers if they want to invest in tax-free bonds paying ten per cent (10%) interest. If the older consumer responds positively, the telephone caller arranges an appointment for a later date with the salesman."

"AARP does not sell its membership services by telephone solicitation," stated Korthauer. She added, "nor do we have salesmen of any kind who call door-to-door on our members."

Korthauer suggests that anyone contacted by phone or by door-to-door salesmen claiming to sell AARP financial products of any kind—bonds, trust funds, estate planning services—should immediately contact their local law enforcement agency or the Better Business Bureau.

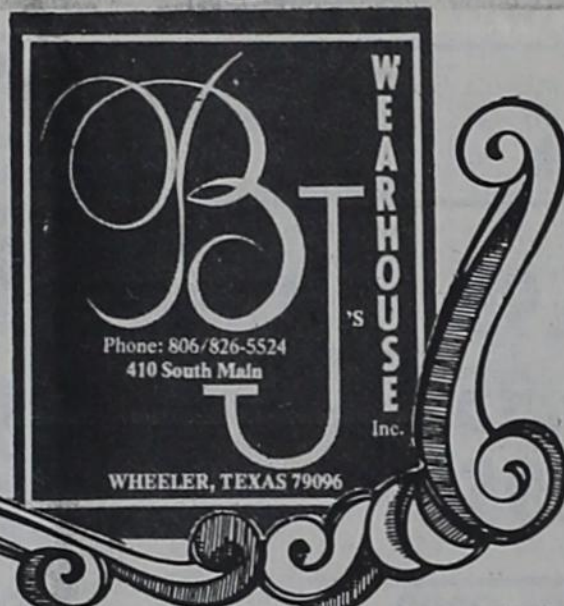

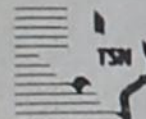

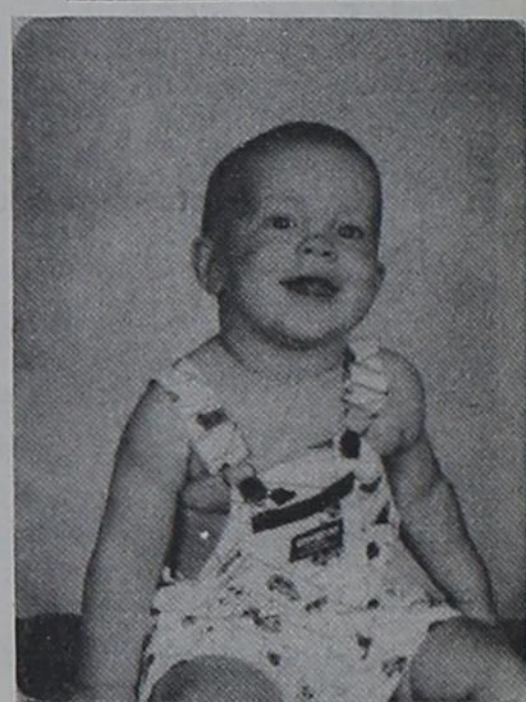
