His job description carries three different titles and he's on call 24-hours a day, seven days a week. As if that isn't enough, during the summer he takes care of mowing chores to earn extra money for a vacation trip for himself, his wife and four children.

Gruver police chief Steve Gaines wouldn't have it any other way.

"Gruver is a special place to me," remarks the soft-spoken law enforcement officer. "The people are friendly, helpful and willing to cooperate and that means a lot.

Steve and his wife, Marilyn, came to Gruver in 1979 from Hereford where he was a police officer there. He stayed in Gruver for about five months before returning to Hereford because of economic reasons.

"I was there for another six months, them came back," he laughs. "We wanted to raise our family in a small town -- but I wouldn't live in just any small town just to be living in a small town."

"We've got a progressive group of citizens here who support us," he declares. "And that makes for a good place to live and work and raise a family."

It's equally as obvious that Steve and Marilyn are concerned about their crew of four -- from Heath who is 11 down to Amanda who is 18 months. 


