

WHEELER WIN WWTG TOURNAMENT

MONA JENNINGS and IDA GOAD of WHEELER participated in the 53rd Annual Women's West Texas Golf Association Championship Tournament at the Wichita Falls Country Club in Wichita Falls, Texas on June 8-12, 1987.

Jennings's first round opponent in Match Play was Kelle Mobley of Midland (who won the WWTGA in 1984 & 1986). Mona won the match 2-up. She continued on to win matches with Carol Tidwell of Odessa - 4 and 3, and Penny Hughes of Farwell (Former WWTGA Champ in 1982) 3 and 2. Ida continued on in the Consolation bracket to win the First Flight Consolation. She defeated Bobbie Smith of Bowie 3 and 2 and Linda Koontz of Midland 2 and 1 for the consolation.

Pat Seward of Shamrock also participated in the tournament who won her first match and lost the second match.

Musical entertainment was presented by "The Mason Jars" and Bob and Liz Stiles.

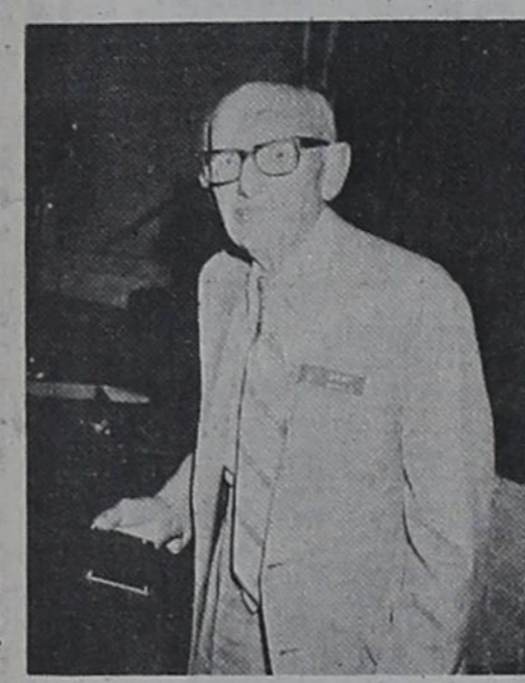
Elva Wood was called to the stage to give a report on the Ex-Student Memorial Fund and read the names of those who have passed away since the reunion of 1985.

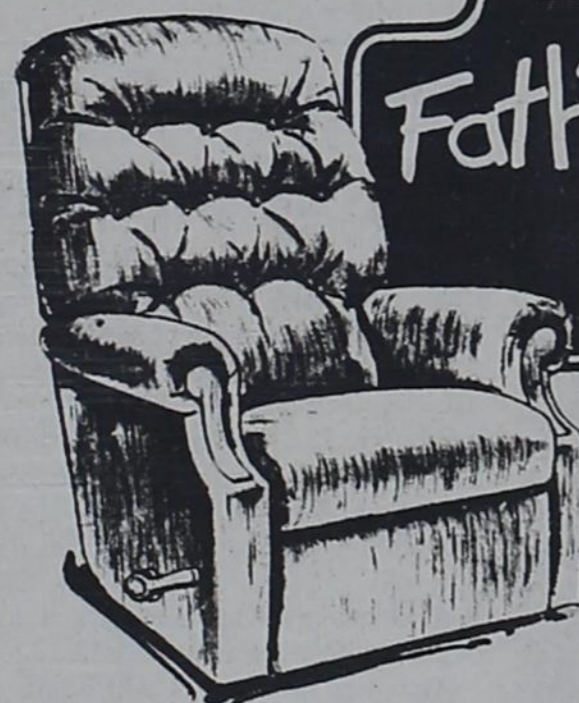

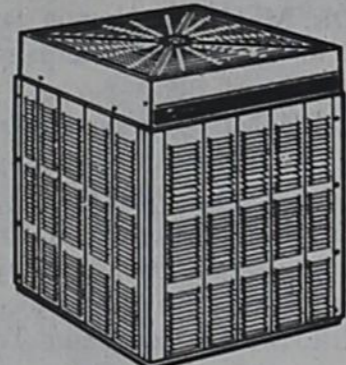

Mobeetie I.S.D. Adds Video Classes

The Mobeetie I.S.D., faced with curriculum mandates of House Bill 72 and a sincere desire to adequately prepare students for college, met the challenge and subscribed to the TI-IN Network, Inc. for the 1987-88 school year.

TI-IN is a private satellite network developed specifically to provide educational opportunities to public school students and teachers. The satellite instructional system, a cooperative venture with Region 20, Education Service Center, San Antonio, Texas, offers live interactive programming that includes such high school credit courses as mathematics, foreign languages, computer science, physics, psychology, sociology, art history, art appreciation, English IV (honors), research and technical writing.

Other features include a 400 hour annual inservice training and staff development program for teachers, administrators, and support staff, college credit courses; student enrichment viewing (classroom "field trips") designed to expand the horizon and enrich the experiences of students in grades K-12; remedial language arts and math classes; community interest programs designed to educate and enlighten; special classes for students preparing to take college entrance exams; and monthly reports from the Commissioner of Education.

TI-IN was presented to the board on the basis that it would offer a wide selection of classes for about the price of a teacher. The cost of the program includes a one-time charge of \$7,790 for equipment and an annual recurring charge of \$6,075 for subscribing and inservice programs for the staff. Additional costs include a \$240-\$290 per course per student per semester. The estimated cost for the 1987-88 school year is \$15,000 and thereafter the per year cost is estimated at \$8,000. To off set the additional budget increase, the district plans to eliminate one personnel unit through retirements and registration.

During pre-registration for classes for the 1987-88 school year, students were informed that TI-IN classes require careful attention. The instructors are master teachers in a television studio in San Antonio. Four special satellite connected phones can put the students on the line with their instructor. Students will hear their own voices over the air asking questions and they'll get their answer just as in any other class.

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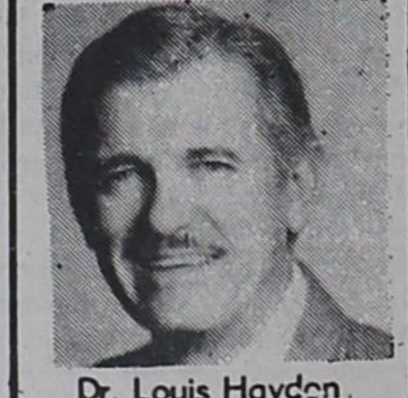

Citizens Asked To Help Protect Post Office

Texas and Oklahoma continue to be the target of post office burglars, according to Postal Inspector in Charge D.C. Strader, Fort Worth. Strader, whose area of responsibility includes the northern half of Texas (north of Austin) and all of Oklahoma, said that over 50 burglaries will occur within the boundaries of the Fort Worth Division this year if the current trend continues.

They attended the outdoor Theatre "Texas" at Palo Duro Canyon on Friday night. The governor of Texas, Bill Clements was present that night and Curtis had a small chit-chat with him. They also posed together for a picture. Something for his memoirs!

Most of the burglaries have occurred at post offices that are located in rural communities that have limited or no local law enforcement available for routine patrols at night.

"A majority of the burglaries do not involve the loss of postal funds, because very little money is kept overnight in post offices and postal stations. Safes and security containers, are used to secure the money and blank money orders which are kept overnight," stated Strader. "In addition to burglary-resistant security containers, we are continually adding and updating existing alarm systems where appropriate. However, we need for the residents of each city, town, and community to help us protect their post offices and stations from burglaries and vandalism."

Local postmaster, Marvin Walker, emphasized the need for citizen involvement. "Even though postal funds are secured in a safe, burglars who are unsuccessful in attempting to break into a safe will sometimes steal mail left in customers' post office boxes. Even when they don't steal mail, they sometimes just cause malicious vandalism. In either event, it does cost the Postal Service money to repair the damage incurred and for the Postal Inspectors to conduct an investigation. Our local tax money is also spent by our local law enforcement officers who incur expenses, because they are usually the first agency to respond, and they also provide valuable assistance in the investigations to the Postal Inspectors."

"But the most important reason for citizen involvement is because it causes a hardship to those whose mail is stolen or destroyed as the result of a burglary or a senseless act of vandalism," said Postmaster Marvin Walker.

Residents can help reduce burglaries and vandalism by reporting suspicious activity at or around the postal facilities which occurs after business hours. This activity would include such things as automobiles or trucks with license plates from outside the local area, unfamiliar people asking suspicious questions about the post office or amount of law enforcement patrol at night, or loitering in the post office box lobby or around the post office by groups of young people at night and on weekends when the post office is closed. This information should be reported to the local law enforcement agencies and to the postmaster or station manager.

Post office burglary is a Federal crime which carries a penalty of up to a \$1,000 fine or up to five years in prison, or both. The Postal Service offers a standing reward of up to \$5,000 for information and services leading to the arrest and conviction of any person responsible for the burglary of a post office. Any information about a post office burglary, or any crime committed against the Postal Service or its employees, should be reported to the local postmaster or the Postal Inspector in Charge in Fort Worth.

The 24-hour number for the Postal Inspector in Charge at Fort Worth is 817/885-1111. Postal Inspectors are also located at Dallas and Lubbock in Texas, and at Oklahoma City and Tulsa in Oklahoma.

"It's your community, your post office, and your mail," said Marvin Walker, "and we need the help of all our citizens in helping to reduce crimes against the Postal Service in our area."

Spring Results Of T.E.A.M.S. Test

The Spring results of the T.E.A.M.S. test, except the first grade, have been received by the school district and presented to the school board. The T.E.A.M.S. test is a norm-referenced test designed to measure how well students have been taught. The T.E.A.M.S. test is administered to grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11.

The percentage of students mastering the subject areas by grade are as follows: *
3rd--Mathematics 97%, Reading 97%, Writing 91%
5th--Mathematics 97%, Reading 76%, Writing 91%
7th--Mathematics 82%, Reading 79% Writing 61%
9th--Mathematics 71%, Reading 81%, Writing 52%

The eleventh grade students take the Exit level T.E.A.M.S. which must be passed before a student is eligible for graduation. Of the eleventh graders enrolled at Wheeler High School at the end of the school year, all students have passed both subject areas of the test and will be eligible for graduation when they have completed requirements for graduation.
