
Rabies Clinic Set For Mobeetie Sat.

A state law, HB1323, passed in 1979, requires all dogs and cats be vaccinated against rabies by the time the dog or cat is four monghs of age or at regular intervals thereafter.

The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year. Offered at the clinic for dogs will be

Offered for cats will be rabies and maintain certain grade standards in feline distemper. All vaccinations will be at a reduced rate.

SANITATION COOKING KEYS TO AVOIDING SALMONELLA TO POULTRY

Proper handling and cooking are Walters, vice president for instruc- the keys to avoiding salmonella poisoning from poultry, says a Texas To be eligible for the president's Agricultural Extension Service official.

Dr. James Denton, a poultry marketing specialist, says a recent U.S. Department of Agriculture report "pointing the finger" at salmonella that almost four of every ten chickens A Wheeler resident making the vice sold to consumers are contaminated flu-like symptoms of fever, diarrhea and vomiting for two to seven days and may even cause death.

Denton points out that the poultry industry is aware of the problem and that proper processing eliminates 95 percent of the bacteria on a live bird. "Further decontamination would be prohibitively expensive or require certain techniques, like chemical dips She received a Bachelor of Science or irradiation, that the public might not accept," he says.

"Salmonella can be killed by heat She was among the 179 students during proper cooking," explains Denton, "and thorough washing of hands after handling uncooked meat can help prevent contamination."

Denton recommends that consumpotential salmonella problems with chickens: Maintain "clean" working areas for handling poultry, "cook" poultry thoroughly to kill bacteria, "Chill" meat as quickly as possible following cooking and serving.

All animal food products contain bacteria of one form or another, the specialist points out, and most of these are removed by proper cleaning and sanitation. "To grow and multiply, bacteria must have proper nutrients, adequate moisture, proper temperature and adequate time, says Denton. "Remove any of these ingredients will keep bacteria counts


"If poultry is to be stored under refrigeration, keep it at 40 degrees F. or less," advises Denton. "When keeping poultry warm for serving, hold it at 140 degrees F. or greater. Keep the holding time of poultry between 40 and 140 degrees F. to an absolute minimum."

The specialist emphasizes that the work area for handling both raw and cooked poultry should be kept as clean as possible. Also, every effort should be made to prevent cross-contamination or recontamination of fully cooked poultry meat with raw meat or bacteria from raw meat.

'Never use cutting board, platter, knife or other utensil or container that has been previously used for raw poultry meat without completely cleaning with soap and hot water prior to using them to handle or store cooked poultry meat," advises

Teacher Of The Year Formerly of Mobeetie


Juanice Evans, daughter of Edith Sims, was recently named Teacher of the Year for 1986-87 in the Monte Vista, Colorado School District.



Society honored rancher Tom Britt for a lifetime of conservation efforts during its annual Conservation Banquet Monday night at the Amarillo Garden Center.

Britt has hosted hundreds of bird wathcers to observe the elusive lesser prairie chicken including nationally known author and artist Roger Tory Peterson of the Peterson field guide series of books.

Bob White quail, deer, turkey and many songbirds also find suitable habitat on the Britt Ranch.

Native grasses have grown so well that seed companies have combined ten years to obtain seed. Britt said he attributes much of his success to giving first priority to the grass and
