## 'SHELTER' FUND GROWING

Pledges Needed by June 10, Deadline

The "Shelter" Fund is growing, but not fast enough. The time is running out and your donations are needed. Some comments have been made on the location of the shelter; the committee feels this location is the best to benefit the park and the people using the facility. A walkway and bridge across the creek are in the plans. The isolation from the road will help to keep the youngsters away from the street. Drive by and look, the distance from the street is not as great as you might think.

The "Park Shelter" fund is growing, but additional funds are needed soon. The cost is estimated in the neighborhood of \$15,000. If the July 4 deadline for having a structure in the City park is met, it will be necessary to have the money pledged by June 10.

The "Shelter" committee of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday evening and decided to accept bids for the construction. Both wood and steel construction will be considered. The design preferred by the committee for the structure will be a "C" shape. Specifications for the structure will be available Friday at 110 E. Texas in Wheeler with the bids to be opened Wednesday, June 10.

The need for a "shelter" was realized last year at the 4th of July celebration. A temporary shelter was built at that time to house the domino tournament. This resulted in the decision to build a permanent building which could be used by families for reunions throughout the year.

The structure under consideration is an angled steel or wood building, which could be used for a stage for activities at the park, such as the July 4th celebration. The location being considered is the southeast corner of the City park, just west of the ball park.

At the first meeting of the "shelter" committee, a July 4, 1987 goal was set for the completion of a structure. The new building could then be used for the Second Annual 4th of July Celebration.

Wheeler has an excellent park with lots of shade; a covered area for family reunions or other gatherings would increase the value and use of the park. No donation too small. An account

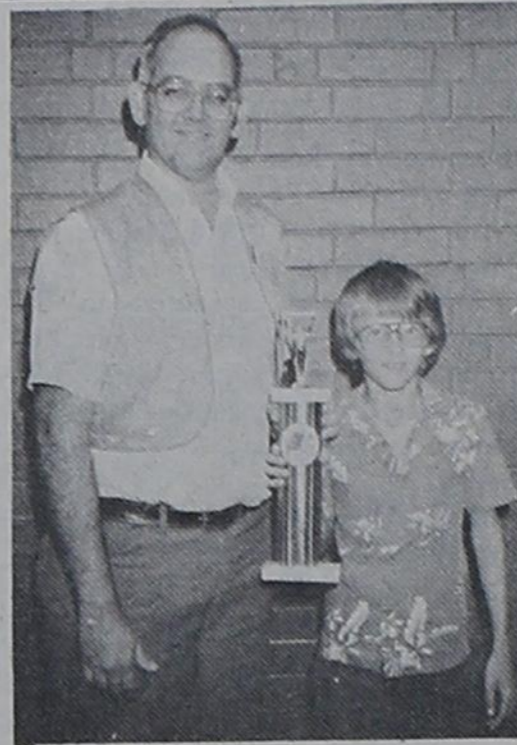
This clinic is conducted by Agape Home Health Services and it is sponsored by the Wheeler Senior Citizens and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The new Wheeler County brochures are so colorful and informative. My thanks to the Chamber of Commerce for the production.

Now I really have a surprise for you: how to rid your yard of dandelions. I am not responsible for this innovation, but a friend, Vera Blevins, brought the directions. It is simple enough. Pick the blooms and make jelly! The recipe follows:

Pick the flowers and discard all the leaves and to one quart of blooms add 4 cups of water. Boil 3 minutes. Drain. To juice add 1 package pectin.

1 teaspoon lemon juice or orange extract  
4 1/2 cups sugar. Bring to boil for 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Skim and pour in sterilized jars.

When boiling the flowers there is an unpleasant odor, but that goes away. The liquid is brownish but the lemon or flavoring will lighten it to almost clear jelly.

Mrs. Blevins tried this and brought me a sample. It's fun giving your friends a taste and letting them guess.

**Weed Control On Newly Seeded Areas**

Now that most grasses have been seeded for new CRP contracts, another problem arises - that of weed control. With all the recent rains, the grass seedlings should have a chance to become established, but the competition with weeds may present a problem.

If there is already a weed problem following the emergence of grass seedlings, spraying with herbicides can cause damage to the grass seedlings.

An alternative would be to shred the weeds when they become tall enough. This allows the newly established seedlings to receive enough sunlight for growth. The weeds should be shredded to a height of about 6" for maximum effect.

After the grass seedlings are past the 3 to 5 leaf stage, they may be sprayed with a post-emergence herbicide such as 2, 4-D or Banvel if necessary. This will control most broadleaf weeds.

For more information about weed control, contact the local Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler.
