'SPLASH DAY' Mon., June 1

The Wheeler Municipal Pool will open for the season on Monday, June 1 at 1:00 P.M. The day will be dubbed "SPLASH DAY" with no admission being charged. The facility will remain open until 6 P.M.

The pool will be under the management of Linda Smith and Lynda Wallace.

Regular hours for the pool have been announced for the summer. The pool will be closed on Monday. Hours for Tuesday through Sunday will be 1:00 - 6:00 P.M.


Admission for the afternoon at the pool will be 75c-12 and under and \$1.50-13 and over. Season tickets will be available. Prices are: 12 and under-\$35, 13 and over-\$45. A discount of \$5.00 will be given on each ticket with the purchase of 3 or more

tickets per family.

Swimming lessons will again be offered this year. The lessons are scheduled to begin the first part of June. The cost will be \$25 per child for 10 lessons. There will be two sessions per day—Tuesday thru Friday. The first session will be 11:00-12:00 and the second session will be 6:00-7:00 each evening. These hours are during the warmer part of the day and will be better for the youngsters. Please call or come by the pool to 'sign up' for the lessons.

"Ladies Mornings" will be Tuesday and Thursday from 12:00 to 1:00.

Preparations for the opening of the pool have been completed. Both pools were sand blasted and painted. The bath house has been painted both outside and inside.



'SHELTER' FUND GROWING

Pledges Needed by June 10, Deadline

The "Park Shelter" fund is growing, but additional funds are needed soon. The total to date donated toward the construction is \$2130.00. The cost is estimated in the neighborhood of \$15,000. If the July 4 deadline for having a structure in the City park is met, it will be necessary to have the money pledged by June 10.

The "Shelter" committee of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday evening and decided to accept bids for the construction. Both wood and steel construction will be considered. The design preferred by the committee for the structure will be a "C" shape. Specifications for the structure will be available Friday at 110 E. Texas in Wheeler with the bids to be opened Wednesday, June 10.

The need for a "shelter" was realized last year at the 4th of July celebration. A temporary shelter was built at that time to house the domino tournament. This resulted in the decision to build a permanent building which could be used by families for reunions throughout the year.

The structure under consideration is an angled steel or wood building, which could be used for a stage for activities at the park, such as the July 4th celebration. The location being considered is the southeast corner of the City park, just west of the ball park.

At the first meeting of the "shelter" committee, a July 4, 1987 goal was set for the completion of a structure. The new building could then be used for the Second Annual 4th of July Celebration.

Wheeler has an excellent park with lots of shade; a covered area for family reunions or other gatherings would increase the value and use of the park.

Hutto Appears Before Senate Committee



DIRECTORS MINUTES MAY 12, 1987

The meeting was called to order with the following members present: David Britt, Chairman, Daryl Snelgrooves, Vice Chairman, Louis Grayson, Member. Absent: Lester Leonard, Secretary; Dean Tipps, member.

Guests present: Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Lester, Mrs. Mildred Henson. Meeting called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Mr. Britt.

Minutes of April 13, 1987 meeting were read and approved as read.

Motion made by Louis Grayson, seconded by Daryl Snelgrooves to pay the bills as presented. All members voted yes.

Financial report given by Mr. Robertson.

Mr. Britt stated that the Smoking Policy had been put on the agenda at the request of the Board of Directors for the purpose of discussion and making a policy change in the designated areas for smoking. After much discussion and deliberation a motion was made by Daryl Snelgrooves and seconded by Louis Grayson that the Smoking Policy change be made as follows:

Designated areas be the front waiting room, the Cafeteria, the back of the office, Doctor's Lounge and the office in x-ray as long as patients are not in that office. It was also recommended that patient rooms be discontinued as designated areas and that efforts be made for the discontinuation of smoking by patients in patient rooms, most definitely visitors. It was suggested that if a patient is not able to get out of the room to go to the waiting room to smoke then they possibly should not be smoking in the room, but work with the patients with good communications.

The vote was unanimous in favor of the policy change as stated above.

Mr. Robertson reported on the Medicare Survey that was held May 6th and 7th, 1987 and stated that there were deficiencies noted. However, no out of compliance problems, and as soon as the typewritten form came back from the Texas Department of Health Certification Division, that the report would be made to the Board regarding the specific deficiencies and what department was involved.

The Administrator's Report: Computer update. Mr. Robertson stated the computer problems was on an improved basis, that all of the statements that were run for March were correct for the first time in months, and hopefully as stated before, week after week we would see a great improvement. He stated that we had approximately \$86,000 of insurance pending and about \$100,000 of dismissals waiting for the charges to be put into the machine so insurance could be filled.

He stated also that an agreement had been reached with Wilbarger General Hospital in Vernon, whereby we would send by overnight mail the Medicare claims to them for their input into their computer system which has a direct connection with Medicare reimbursement section in Dallas. He stated that the turn-around time from the date that the claim was put into the computer would be 10 days when payment would be received, and payment would come directly to Parkview Hospital as in the past. The charge by Wilbarger General Hospital for this service will be \$1.00 per claim.

Mr. Robertson stated that an individual had contacted him regarding the sale of the rent house behind Dr. Barbour's Clinic and asked if the Board would be interested in selling the property. The Board instructed Mr. Robertson to get together with the interested person to determine a price on a negotiated basis. The minutes revealed that the property was bought from Hyland Weaver for a price of \$15,000 for the lot and house, and therefore, this particular price was still adequate, however get with the interested party and bring back a report to the Board.

Mr. Robertson asked if he could attend the THA annual meeting to be held May 29, through June 2 in Houston, and the Board voted unanimously to grant this request.

There being no other business, the meeting adjourned at 10:10 p.m.
