Kilbourne To Perform At Shamrock UMC

Folksinger and recording artist, Ed Kilbourne, is coming to Shamrock May 16, 17 and 18. He will perform in concert and in worship Saturday evening May 16, at 8:00 p.m., Sunday morning at 9:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m., Sunday afternoon at 2:00 p.m., Sunday evening at 7:00 p.m. May 17th. Monday, May 18th, at 10:00 a.m. in the High School Auditorium and 7:30 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall of the First United Methodist Church.

With what one review called "a touch of Chapin, Croce, and James Taylor in his voice, and a whole handfull of Garrison Keillor in his stories", this popular folk-poet has turned out 13 record albums and made close to 5000 concert appearances over a career that spans both the years and the music from the 60's to today.

Born in Kentucky, the son of third-generation missionaries, Ed spent his childhood years in China, Japan and Korea before returning to the U.S. for college. Following graduate school, he made his home in Atlanta, Georgia, serving the Southeast as a minister and artist resource to the United Methodist Church. He returned to the laity in 1974 and continued to develop his career as a pop artist in Colorado. He finally settled back in the South in the late 1070's.

Although a lot of his performances are in churches, he doesn't want to be labeled a gospel singer.

"I'm a Christian and I'm an artist, not a Christian artist. I don't do gospel music as such; I use pop songs to tell gospel stories," Kilbourne said. "Since what I do is family oriented - telling stories and the like - lot of churches use me."

Ed is married, and he and his wife, Miriam, have two daughters, Jenny and Amanda. For six years now, they have made their home in the country, just off Fishing Creek, not too far from McConnell's, South Carolina.

All of Ed's performances will be at First United Methodist Church, Shamrock, except two. The Saturday evening performance will be at the Fields Ranch (this is primarily for youth only). Monday morning May 18th, will be at the High School Auditorium.

County Committee Positions Open

Eligible farmers in Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts counties are invited to become nominees for the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) county committee, FmHA County Supervisor, John D. Wolf III announced today.

As a result of the 1985 Farm Bill, two of the three members of the FmHA county committees must be elected. The third member is designated by FmHA. The county committee assists the FmHA county office in determining the eligibility of applicants for certain types of FmHA loans.

Generally, farmers who are residents of these counties but not FmHA borrowers are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA county committee.

"Farmers in these counties, serving on the committee, play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews," said Wolf. For this election one member will be elected for a term of three years.

Nominating petitions must be returned to the FmHA Wheeler county office by June 10th.

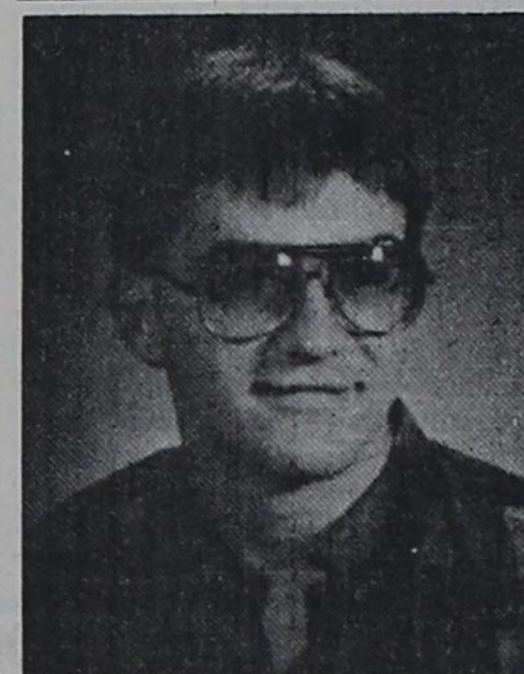
Turtle Race To Begin Baptist Bible School

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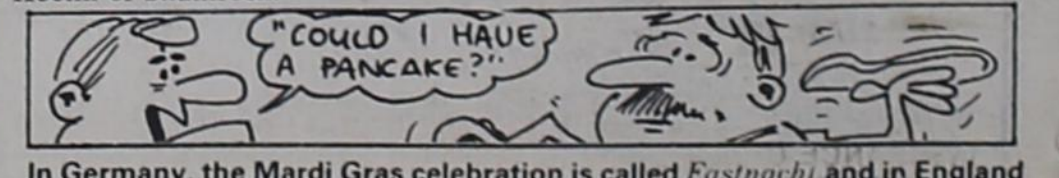
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Michele Keelin Qualifies For State

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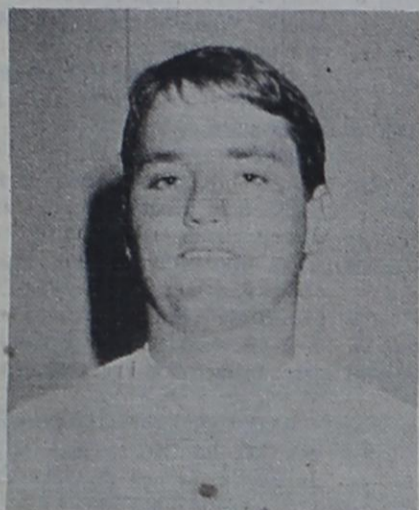

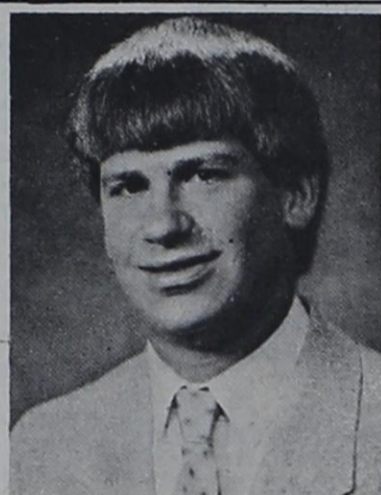

Dead Litter Management

CRP producers who have seeded grass into a small grain cover crop are reminded that this cover needs to be killed. There are basically two methods of controlling this cover crop mechanical or chemical. Mechanical involves shredding the cover crop to prevent the grain from maturing. The ideal time for shredding would be when the grain is in the soft dough stage. At this stage the grain would not be ripe enough to germinate, plus there is often insufficient time for the small grain to produce another seed head before hot weather kills the plant. Depending upon the growing conditions, a second and sometimes a third shredding may be needed.

With chemical control, a contact herbicide such as Glyphosate (Round-up) or Paraquat (Cyclone or Gramoxone plus) will need to be used. To obtain the best results with chemicals, the plant should be actively growing. A cover crop that is mature and in the process of heading out will require a greater amount of herbicide to achieve a good kill.

CRP producers may want to consider shredding their cover crop rather than spraying. Because of recent droughty conditions, it may cost less to shred than to spray. Some small grain cover crops have not produced sufficient forage to require any type of control. If a producer has questions concerning his dead litter, he should contact the local SCS office.

It was a struggle and I would probably never have made it but for the kindness and helpfulness of the Postal Clerks, Harry and Joe Clark. I shall always be grateful for their help.

There was not a paved road going through Wheeler. There was a bit of paving between Paducah and Childress. Some of the sidewalks were wooden mostly not any at all. Some of the business still exist. Maybe some
