Dead Litter Management

CRP producers who have seeded Shelly grass into a small grain cover crop are McCasland/Lori Vanpool (Wheeler) reminded that this cover needs to be lost to Adrienne Smith/Carrie killed. There are basically two methods of controlling this cover crop Boy Singles: Jason Beers (Wheeler) mechanical or chemical. 

CRP producers may want to consider shredding their cover crop rather than spraying. Because of recent droughty conditions, it may cost less to shred than to spray. Some small control.
