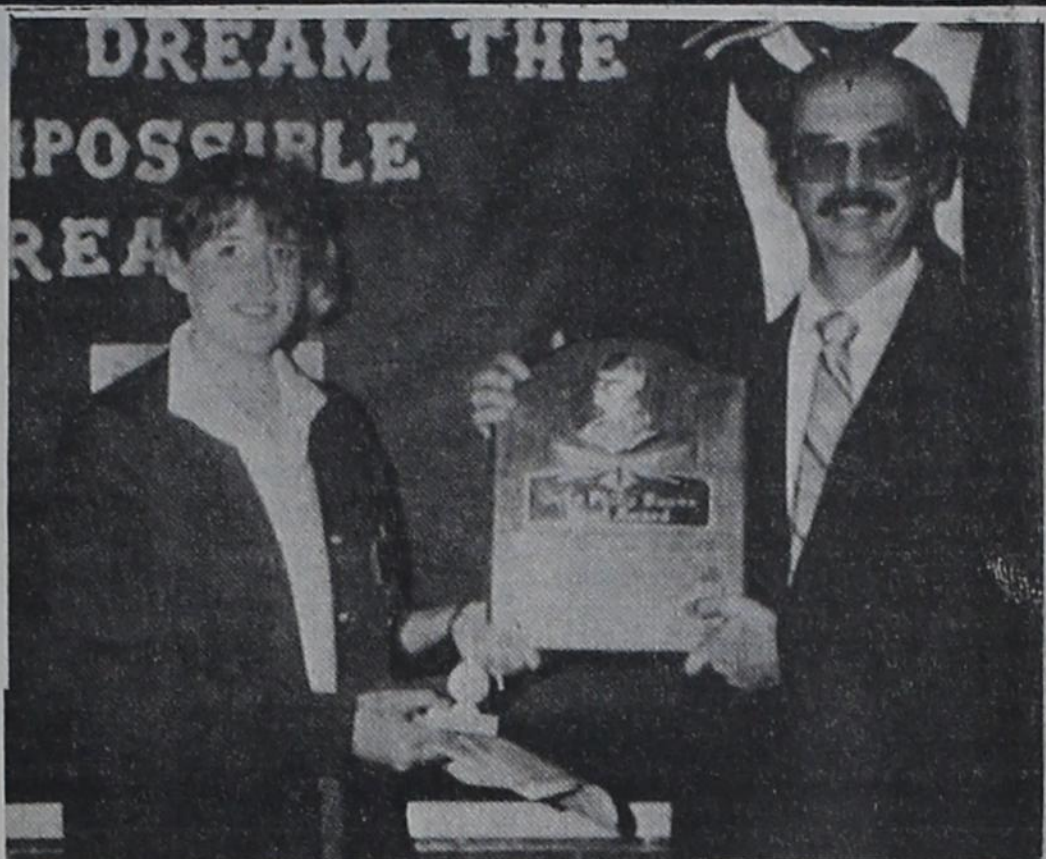

REGIONAL COMPETITION RESULTS

WHEELER MUSTANGS

The Wheeler Mustangs made a strong showing in the Regional Track meet in Levelland this past weekend. The Mustangs scored 61 1/5 points for a third place finish behind Sudan and Paducah.

Four individuals qualified for the State Meet in Austin.

Bubba Smith claimed two first place medals, in the process setting a new regional record in the discus, with a throw of 173’7”, to erase the previous mark which was held by Jim Verden of Wheeler, set in 1976. Bubba also won the shot put with a toss of 54’8 1/2”. Both marks were personal bests.

Danny Benefield brought home silver medals in the hurdles, with a time of 15.2 in the 110 m. high hurdles, and a 41.3 clocking in the

300m. intermediate hurdles.

Richard Smith placed 2nd in the discus competition with a throw of 164’8”, hrs. best of the year.

Hale Hughes placed 2nd in the 800 m. dash to earn a trip to the state meet with his best time of 2:01.8.

Grayson Benson placed 3rd in the pole vault with a leap of 11’6”, to qualify as the alternate to the state meet.

Cody Wiggins placed 5th in the long jump competition with his personal best of 21’2”.

Chad Bentley ran a good race in the 1600 m. run, to place 6th, with his best of 4:56. A brisk wind slowed the times considerably.

Richard Smith also tied for 6th in the high jump with a jump of 5’11”.

Competing also in the Regional Meet were Alfredo Gonzales in the 3200m run, 11:39; Chad Bentley in the 800 m. dash, 2:10, 400 m. relay team of David Jones, Rusty Ellisor, Grayson Benson, and Hale Hughes, 46.3; 1600 m. Relay of Jones, Benson, Bobby Sword and Hale Hughes, 3:33; Bubba Smith the 110 m. H.H., qualified for finals with a personal best of 15.3. David Jones in the 400 m dash with a time of 53.1, Bobby Sword in the 400 m dash with a time of 54.8. Bubba Smith in long jump with his best leap of 20’11 1/4”. Richard Smith in shot put.

The Mustangs will compete in a state qualifiers meet in Abilene this Friday. The State Meet will occur on May 15, 16 in Austin.

MUSTANGETTE TRACK

Mustangette tracksters completed their track season at the regional track meet this past weekend. Although

none of the girls qualified for the state meet, they saw many improved performances.

Kelli Sutton ran a season best in the 800 m. run with a time of 2:39.5.

Mindy Hardcastle placed 7th in the 100 m. hurdles with a personal best time of 16.9.

The 800 m. relay team of Angela Bradstreet, Lorrie Williams, Mitchie Loyd, and Tammy Helton clocked in at 1:54.53.

Liz Davis competed in both the 3200 and 1600 m. runs. Her times were 6:38.03 in the 1600 and 14:40.71 in the 3200.

The 1600 m. relay team of Mitchie Loyd, Kelli Sutton, Tera Henderson and Marcy Smith ran a season best time of 4:37.44.

Tammy Helton placed 5th place in the long jump with a leap of 16’2”. In the triple jump, she placed 6th with a leap of 32’9”.

Wheeler High School Tennis Team had five players that competed in Region 1-A Tennis Tournament on April 30 and May 1. In girls doubles Tammy Baker/Marlo Hartman defeated Kelli Swan/Tina Medrano (Anton) 6-4, 6-3, but lost to Delilah Alvarez/Lisa Dutchover (Balmorhea) 6-1, 6-1. In boys singles Cory Cornett lost to Omar Guardiola (Whiteface) 6-0, 6-0. In boys doubles Bobby Sword/Cody Wiggins lost to Jimmy Wiseman/Timmy Wiseman (Ft. Hancock) 6-4, 6-3.

Last names beginning P Q R S & T
Thursday, May 14, 2:30 to 3:30 p.m.

Last names beginning: U V W X Y & Z
Friday, May 15, 2:30 to 3:30 p.m.

Feel free to come on another day of the week of visitation if you cannot come on your child’s day.

The State of Texas REQUIRES the following before your child can be enrolled this fall:

1. Birth certificate-----certified copy, NOT hospital copy.
2. Immunization records verified by the physician’s signature (MMR after first birthday; polio and DPT on correct schedule.)

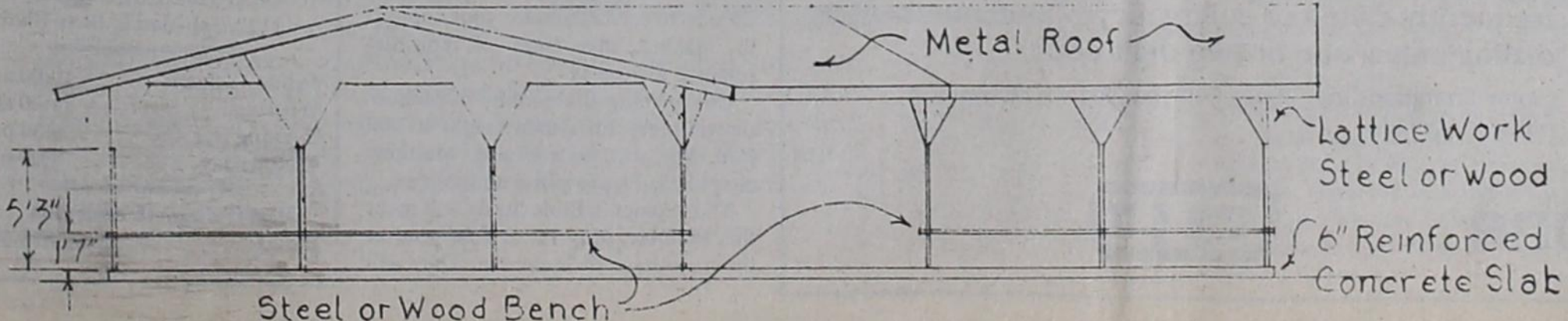
