Computer Team Enter State Meet

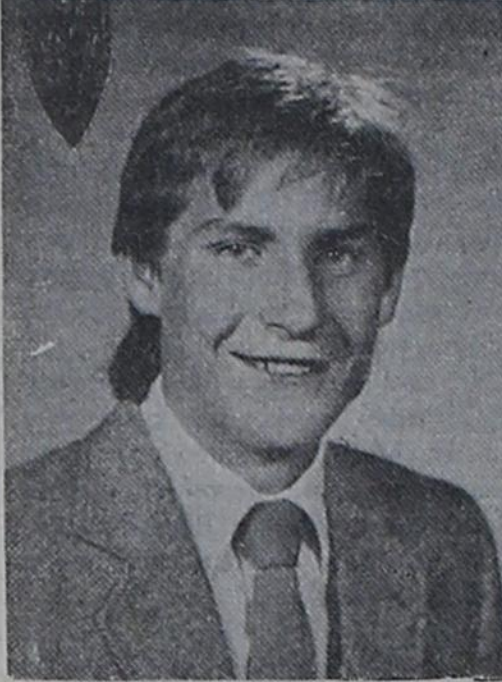
Four young men will represent Wheeler High School in state competition in San Antonio Saturday. The Wheeler Computer Team earned the right to compete in Amarillo at area competition.

Wheeler county voters will go the polls Saturday, April 4, to elect members of the boards of trustees for their respective schools. The ballots this year reflect an by the public in the operation of the schools. Wheeler has seven names on the ballot for the three positions open. Mobeetie has two positions open with four names on the ballot. Briscoe has two places open and two names on the ballot. Allison with two openings on the board has five individuals seeking the three year terms. At Kelton four vacancies are to be filled.

Wheeler school will hold their election in conjunction with the city election at the school. Two individuals have filed for Position 1; they are Jim Wright, incumbent, and Patti McNeil. Position 2 is presently held by Betty Hennard; she has drawn Laura Underwood, Melvin R. Coate and Jimmy C. Helton as opponents. Don L. Ellisor is unopposed in his bid for Position 3 on the board; Mike Smith is not

seeking re-election. Mobeetie Independent School District will be filling two vacancies on their board in the April 4 election. Jim Batton, Kevin Frankenberg, Greg Estes and Aaron Laverty filed for the placing on their names on the ballot.

The Briscoe Independent School District will hold an election on April 4, 1987 for the purpose of electing 2 trustees to fill 2 positions on the Board of Trustees. Both terms are full 3-year terms. Barbara Meadows and David Zybach currently hold these positions. Barbara Meadows has decided to not to seek re-election. David Zybach is seeking re-election. Mac Purcell is running for the position being vacated by Barbara Meadows. No other candidates filed to run. The election will be held in the High School building and the polls will be

Young People Need 4-H

4-H, the youth program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is aimed at developing youth through the involvement of parents and other adults who organize and conduct learning experiences in a community setting.

The United States has about 55 million young people between the ages of 5 and 24, but only one out of three of these now belongs to or has belonged to any character-building organization. 4-H is not just for the farm youngster -- it's for everyone. No matter what your child's interests or hobbies, 4-H has a wide range of activities and projects available to meet those interests. These might include photography, gardening, gun safety, energy conservation or housing plus the more familiar livestock, cooking and sewing projects.

4-H is an activity which parents and children can share, and this is what makes 4-H so special. 4-H is one of only a few organizations which promote the parent-child relationship. 4-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and focuses on the needs, interests, and concerns of boys and girls between third grade and 19 years of age regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, religion, handicap, or national origin.

Other advantages can be gained from becoming a 4-H member. 4-H provides an opportunity for leadership developed by working with and helping younger members on various projects while learning from older members. Also, 4-H presents an opportunity to serve others in the community. 4-H has a strong commitment to service, which should be emphasized when children are young.

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What's Up Doc?

SHIN SPLINTS

Question:
Doctor, when I run for long distances on hard surfaces I get shin splints. Can you explain what this is and what I can do about it.

Answer:
When a muscle is used extensively or abused, it begins to swell and becomes inflamed. The tissue surrounding the muscle is not flexible and does not expand. When the muscle expands inside this rigid container, pressure builds. This causes the pain. When this happens on the front of the leg, it is known as shin splints. This is caused by extensive use or abuse, and can only be alleviated by not using or abusing the involved muscles. Most shin splints are similar to yours, in that they are caused by running on hard surfaces. Treatment consists of decreasing, or better yet, discontinuing all running for several days. Heat should be applied and the leg should be elevated. Anti-inflammatory drugs may help with pain and swelling. When your condition is better and exercise resumes, do so slowly. Also consider exercising on a softer surface. Well constructed running shoes will also help immensely.

The employees of the Wheeler County Sheriff's office will have 6 holidays off a year. This is a Federal Law. Violation of this law the first time is a fine of 10,000 dollars and the second violation of this law is 2 years in the federal penitentiary.

To keep within the law, and the 40 hour week, with the same amount of men, designated shifts were set. All deputies are on call 24 hours if they are in the county, because my first responsibility is you the people of Wheeler County. No matter what comes up my first concern is you the people.

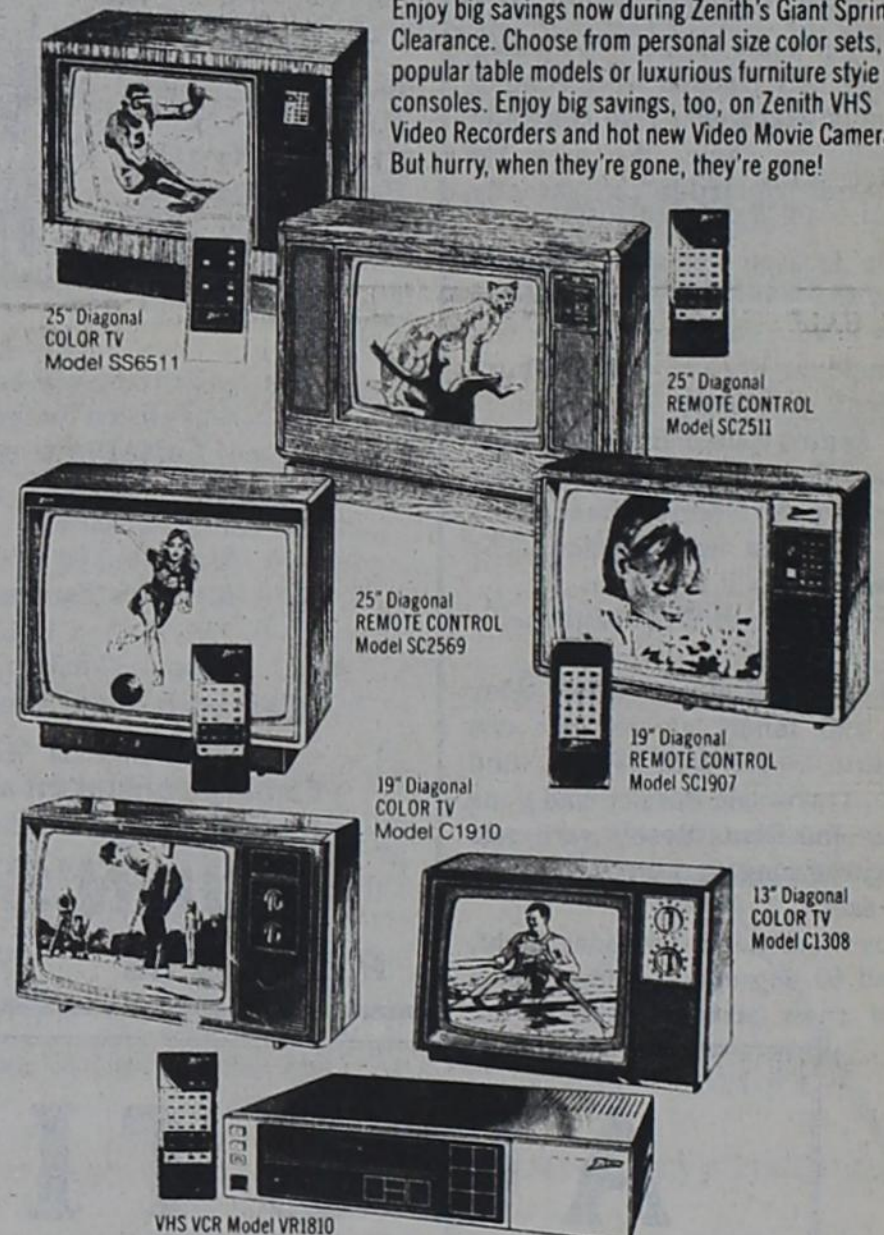

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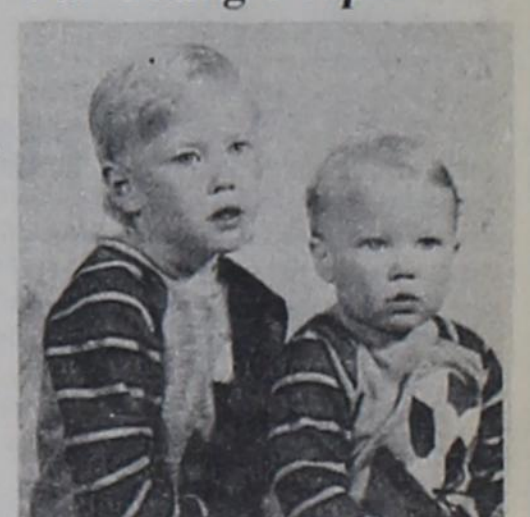

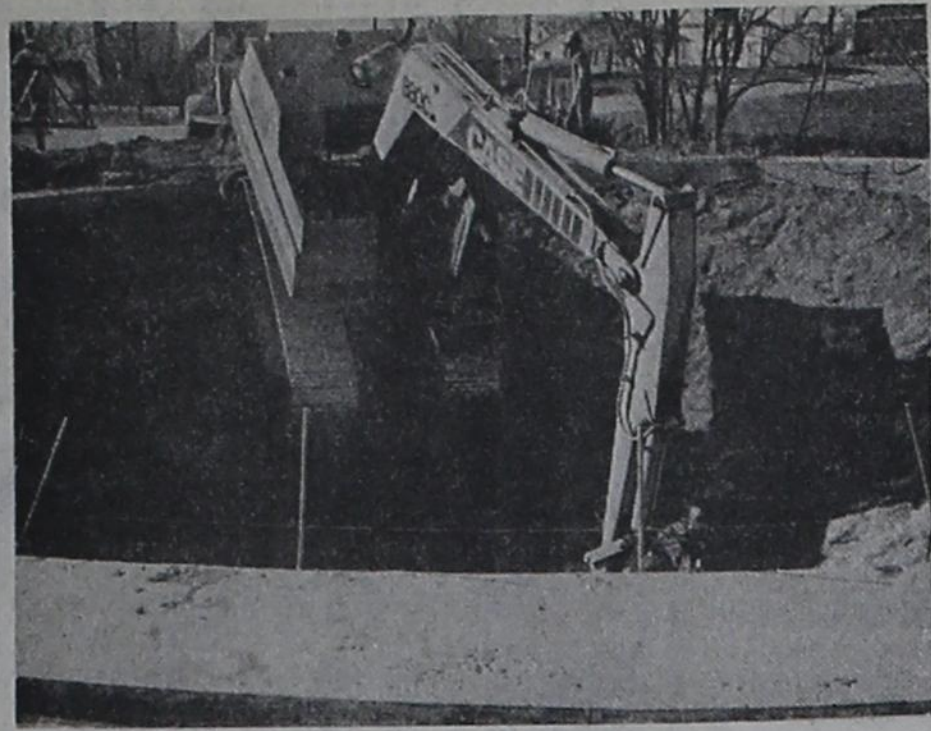
