Mr. Kennedy was born at Miller-ton, Okla. He was married to Mary Rodgers in 1948 at Pampa. He moved to Wheeler 10 years ago from Glendale, Calif., where he had lived for 20 years. He was retired from the street maintenance department at Glendale. He was an Army veteran of World War II and was a member of American Legion.

ECA Course Will Begin Thursday, March 19

The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service will offer an ECA, Emergency Care Attendant, course beginning Thursday, March 19. The course involves 40 hours of classroom and skills training. There will be no charge for the course, but the books will cost \$20. Instructors will be Dwight Tipps and Mary K. Christner.

Anyone interested in learning CPR, Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation, and the care of victims of illness or accident is invited to participate in the class. The knowledge of CPR would enable you keep the blood and oxygen circulating, if a person dies as a result of a heart attack or accident. The course will also instruct in the care of cuts, burns and broken bones.

If the heart stops and a person is not breathing, the brain cells start dying after 4-6 minutes. What would you do?

Enrollment will be at 6:30 p.m. at the ambulance barn at the corner of Highway 83 and Third St. in Wheeler--north of the Wheeler County Jail. Classes are usually on Monday and Thursday evenings—days are negotiable.



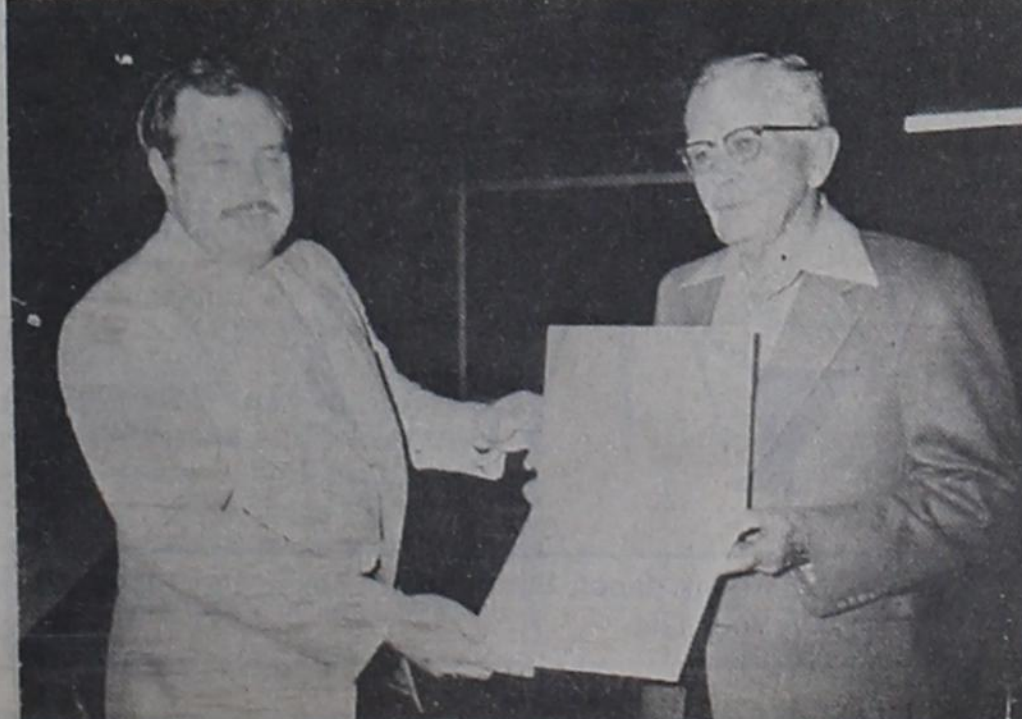

What's Up Doc?

Ulcers

Question:
Doctor, how has treatment for ulcers advanced in recent years?

Answer:

Many advances have been made in recent years. Several discoveries have been made related to diet and its effect on ulcers. With active ulcers, we have found that there are four major types of food or activities to avoid. These include (1) calcium (2) alcohol (3) smoking and (4) caffeine. The most potent stimulator for acid secretion in the stomach is calcium. So, milk products and other foods rich in calcium are detrimental. They feel good briefly as they coat the stomach, but in a short time, increased acid causes worse discomfort. One other dietary rule to follow views an ulcer as an open wound. Any food that would not feel good poured on an open wound on the skin, should not be poured on an open wound in the stomach. Examples include vinegar, hot sauce, or citrus fruit juices.

New medicines have probably been the most important advance made in the treatment of peptic ulcer disease. The first modern drug used in ulcer treatment was tagamet. Tagamet virtually eliminates secretion of stomach acid. With its release, Tagamet quickly became the most prescribed drug in America. About 4 years ago, a new drug was introduced with slightly fewer side effects. Zantac's use now approximately equals that of Tagamet's. They have a similar mechanism of action. A newer player in the game of ulcer treatment is Carafate. Its claim to fame is that it helps to preserve the protective layer that the normal stomach possesses. There are still newer drugs entering the field that may prove to have even better results.

For best results, all of these new medicines should be accompanied by the use of antacids. The last few years of research in this area have been very fruitful. With strict adherence to your doctor's orders, utilizing this new technology and understanding, one can heal most ulcers in under one month.

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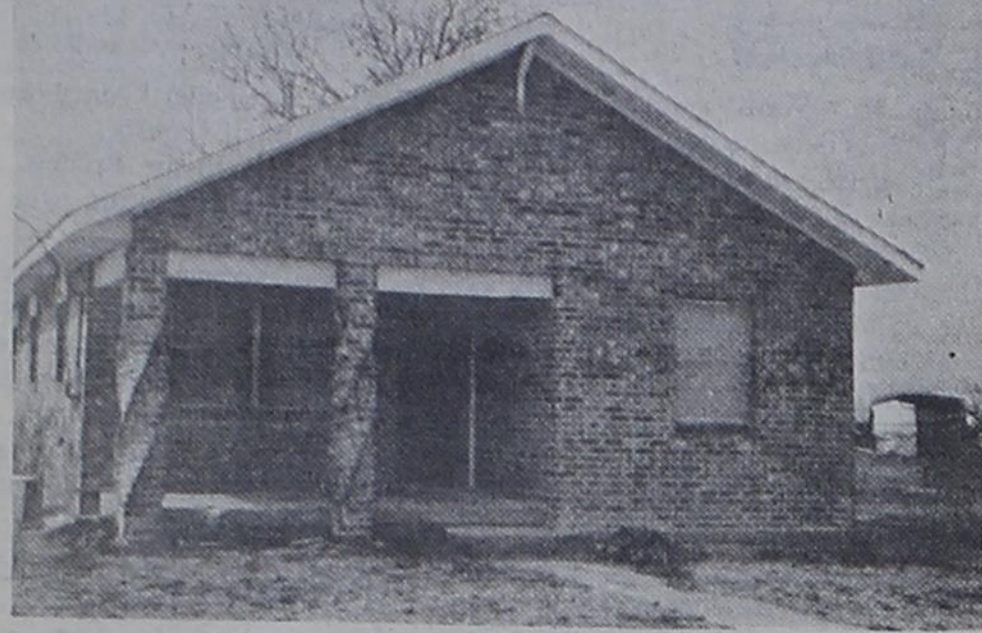
