ECA Course To Be Offered March

The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service will offer an ECA, Emergency Care Attendant, course beginning Thursday, March 19. The course involves 40 hours of classroom and skills training. There will be no charge for the course, but the books will cost \$20. Instructors will be Dwight Tipps and Mary K. Christner.

Anyone interested in learning CPR, Cardio Pulmonary Resesitation, and the care of victims of illness or accident is invited to participate in the class. The knowledge of CPR would enable you keep the blood and oxygen circulating, if a person dies as a result of a heart attack or accident. The course will also instruct in the care of cuts, burns and broken bones.

If the heart stops and a person is not breathing, the brain cells start dying after 4-6 minutes. What would you do?

Enrollment will be at 7:00 p.m. at the ambulance barn at the corner of Highway 83 and Third St. in Wheeler-north of the Wheeler County Jail. Classes are usually on Monday and Thursday evenings.

But just think. If we lost our electricity, we would be ruined. We couldn't buy gas, have lights, heat, or water. In other words, things would simply come to a halt for quite a while.

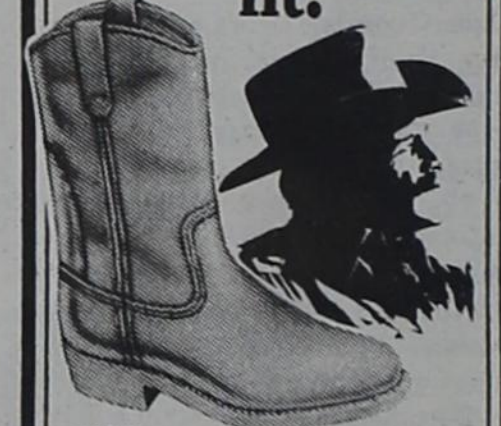

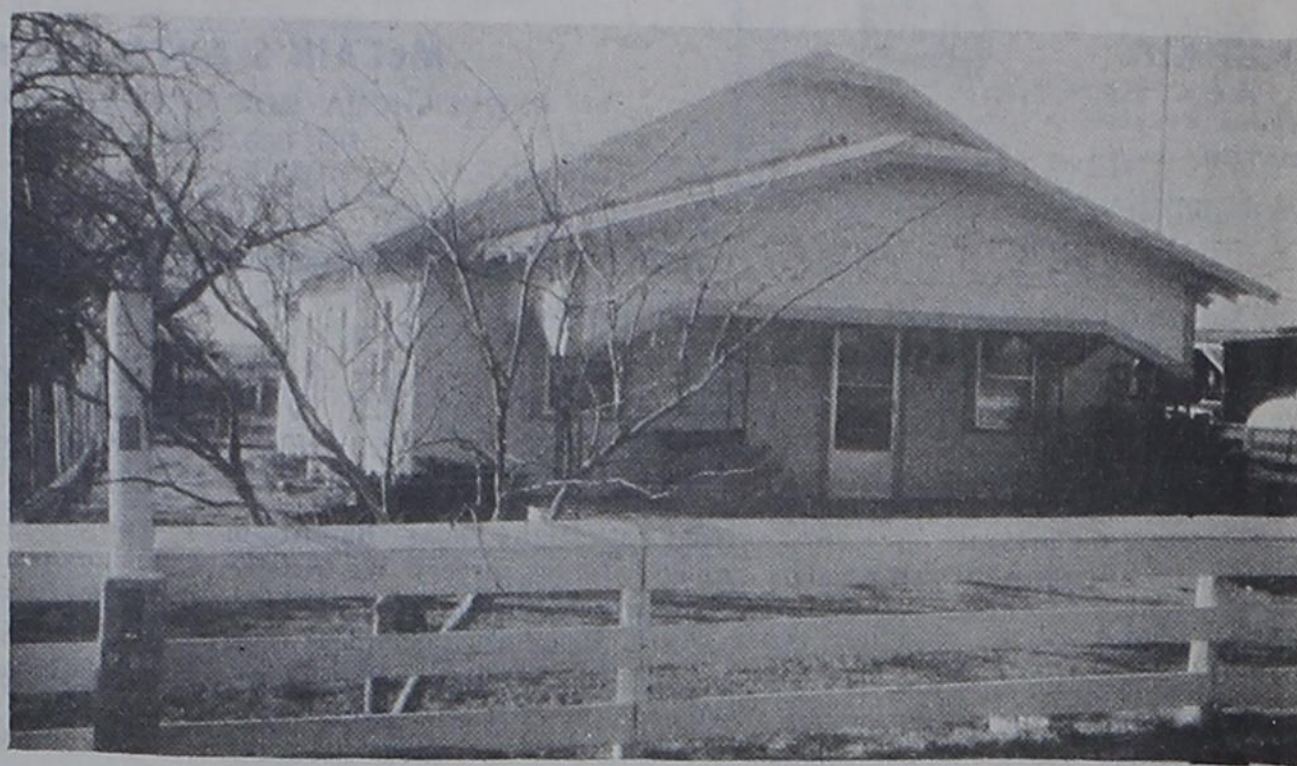

What's Up Doc?

Chickenpox

Question:
Doctor, I have children in school. Several of their classmates have come down with chickenpox. What should I look for and is there anything I can do to prevent my child from getting the disease?

Answer:
Chickenpox is a highly contagious disease. The majority of close contacts of an infected individual will contract the disease. The active form of this virus will appear 10-21 days after exposure, with 14-17 days most likely. An infected individual is contagious from one day prior to the appearance of the rash, until 6 days after the appearance of the last new lesion appears, or until after all lesions have crusted over. Within the first six days after exposure, a shot of Gamma Globulin will prevent or significantly alter the disease. Some adults get chickenpox and these cases tend to have more complications, although one can only get this disease once.

Shingles is caused by the same virus and tends to be a late complication of chickenpox, usually occurring years after the initial infection.

 "Irish Pride Forever," the theme chosen to spark Shamrock's famed St. Patrick's Celebration in 1987, will take on new meaning when proud

Irishmen by the score, most sporting Donegal beards, with beautiful colleens on their arms, arrive for the festivities March 13-15.

Irish pride begins to swell in this little oasis of the Eastern Panhandle as St. Patrick's Day approaches and celebration fever takes over...a phenomenon repeated 41 times since the first celebration in 1938.

It all began when George Nickel, an early-day postmaster homesick for his native Ireland, created the Irish tradition shortly after the turn of the century when he named the postoffice "Shamrock."

The late Glen Truax, a Shamrock High School bandmaster, gave it life in 1938 when Shamrock Boosters Club, a group of live-wire businessmen, latched onto his suggestion that a town with such a fine Irish name should capitalize on it with an annual St. Patrick's Day Celebration so grand it would attract thousands of visitors and world-wide attention.

That's why thousands continue the tradition year-after year by crowding into Shamrock to partake of the Irish-flavored program designed to please every Mick and Lassie.

In preparation to properly host the crowd of up to 20,000 visitors expected this year, city officials have donned their green underwear, the editor of the local newspaper is taking pills to turn his beard green and committee heads work night and day to fine-tune the program for the biggest Irish community celebration this side of the Emerald Isle itself.

In fact, as the final count-down begins everything in Shamrock is turning green, including the special edition of The Shamrock Texan devoted to the celebration and the colorful store banners and street streamers provided by Shamrock Kiwanis Club.

The head Irishman for the 1987 party is Jim Davis, aided and abetted by Assistant General Chairman Ray Morgan.

A pre-St. Patrick's Celebration banquet, featuring the appearance of Kent Hance, former U.S. Congressman, as keynote speaker, will open the festivities Friday night, March 13, at National Guard Armory.

Amy Hester, Miss Irish Rose of 1986, will provide vocal entertainment, and the Happy Hatters of Dumas will complete the banquet program.

The meal, catered by Butch Coghburn of Shamrock, will be served by members of Shamrock High School's Junior Class.

The Irish begin celebrating in earnest Saturday, March 14, with the Old Settlers Reunion, the hour-long street parade featuring the famed Hardin-Simmons University Cowboy Band and led by the green-clad Shamrock High School "Pride Of The Irish" Band under the direction of Darryll Kaire.

In rapid succession, visitors will witness and enjoy the Donegal Beard Judging, the Miss Irish Rose Contest, the 10-K-Run, the One-Mile-Fun-Run, an all-day carnival, TRA Team Roping, Barrel Racing, the Chili Cook-off, Water Polo and Pumper Races.

Events following the parade will be held at High School Auditorium beginning at 2:00 p.m.

A popular celebration feature will be the Ministerial Alliance Program in High School Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. featuring the Royalheirs.

The annual St. Patrick Celebration dance at National Guard Armory will feature the music of the Clyde Logg Band beginning at 9:00 p.m.

There also will be a Teen Dance at the Coca-Cola Building, 104 South Houston Street, starting at 8:00 p.m.

Sunday events will include a Cowboy Church Service featuring the Rev. Dennis McKinny at Yarborough Horse Sale Arena on U.S. Highway 83 at 10 a.m., TRA Team Roping finals at Brashear's Arena at 11:00 a.m. and Calf Roping at Sheriff's Posse Arena at 12:00 noon.

The Irish tradition continues to thrive in Shamrock and although Nickel and Truax have passed on, their names will continue to live forever in this quiet stop along Interstate Highway 40.

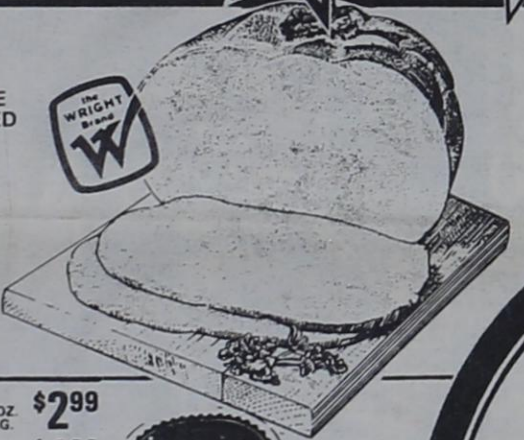

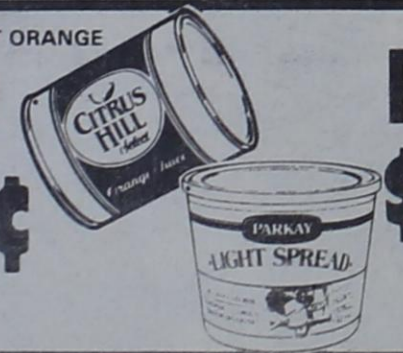
