represent you. Don't just visit with them when you have a "gripe"; an occasional "pat on the back" helps.


Linda Smith gave me her "Letter to the Editor" last week and I failed to get it in last week's edition of the "Times". Apologies, Linda.


Lucy Smith Monroe, 96, died Sunday, April 13, 1986.





Another 1.3 million dollars was needed to administer the retake test to those who failed on March 10, The retake test is scheduled for June 28. The total cost of the testing was 29 million dollard of TAXPAYERS money.

3. Subject Area Test—This test is to cover 60 different subject areas and is projected to cost 27 million more dollars. TAXPAYERS can add 21 million more dollars for salaries of teachers who again will be taken away from student instruction for the day of the test. Here again, our tax dollars will be footing the bill.

4. Teacher Unemployment—The state has projected 10,000 teachers will fail the test and be without jobs. Who picks up the tab for the teacher unemployement? TAXPAYERS!

5. New Accountability System-This deals with teacher documentation of all learning taking place in the classroom; This system is a detriment to the enrichment of individual student learning in that teachers are required to handle more and more paper work, thus taking away valuable and necessary prepartional and instructional time. Each student is an individual, and teachers must help maintain that individuality; students are people; they do not do all things in synchronization and this includes learning.

6. New Appraisal System-This state mandated reform deals with teacher evaluation and is to be implemented in the 1986-87 school year. Though the state mandated this system, LOCAL DISTRICTS are held responsible for
