Wheeler needs a slogan; is the thought of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce board of directors and you will have the opportunity to write that slogan. Ther lill receive \$100 in "Wheeler Cash" for their efforts and the slogan will be printed on the picture post cards, which the Chamber is having printed.

The Chamber will sponsor a contest to select the slogan which best suits Wheeler. The entries will be numbered and written on cards; the slogans will then be judged with the writer's identity unknown to those judging.

Those interested in entering a slogan are urged to write the slogan and their name, phone number and address on a slip of paper and mail it to Slogan, % Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, Box 221, Wheeler, Texas 79096. The entries must be received in the office by Monday, May 5 1986. The Chamber will meet and select the winner the following Tuesday at noon.

Entries will be numbered before the envelope is opened and in case of duplicate entries, the first numbered card will be deemed the winner. Upon receipt of the \$100 "cash" for the winning entry, the individual gives up his right to the slogan and it then

becomes the property of the chamber for use any way the chamber choses. If no suitable slogan is received, the chamber may extend or discontinue the contest.

"Fruit Basket of the Panhandle" was the slogan used for many years, with the several producing orchards in the area. The fruit and other produce have been sold on the square for a number of years, making Wheeler known for its fruit. The orchards have "died out" and the slogan does not fit.

cards was the subject of the chamber meeting held Wednesday noon at Sparlin's Restaurant. The photographs were the work of Leo Shuler. Subject of the photographs were views of the courthouse; pictures will also be taken of the park and other locations over town.

The decision to have picture postcards for Wheeler was a decision made at an earlier meeting of the chamber group. Numerous businesses over town reported requests for picture postcards and none have been available of Wheeler for some time. The proposed cards will have one or several views from over Wheeler and will be sold, with any profits returning to the Chamber.

The event is scheduled to start at Wheeler School on Saturday, May 3, from 9 to 11 a.m. Proceeds will benefit the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation's programs in research, care and education. "Anyone who wants to ride bikes for health, fun and prizes can register," according to Frankenbery. "Participants will collect pledges for each mile they ride on a bicycle course."

Prizes in the Bike-A-Thon will be awarded to participants based on the

amount of money they collect and include T-shirts, athletic bags, head-set radios, AM/FM cassette recorders, and Sony Walkman's. Area grand prizes include a color television and portable mini televisions.

Cystic fibrosis is the No. 1 genetic killer of children and young adults in America. The disease produces thick mucus that blocks the lungs and intestines, resulting in lung damage and malnutrition. One in 20 Americans is an unknowing carrier of the defective gene that causes cystic fibrosis.

This year, Cystic Fibrosis Bike-A-Thons are being held nationwide in honor of Alex Deford, who died of cystic fibrosis in 1980 at the age of eight. The story of Alex's short, courageous life will be told on an ABC-Television movie airing on Monday, April 21st.

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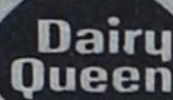

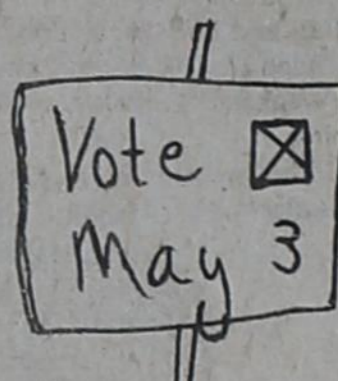
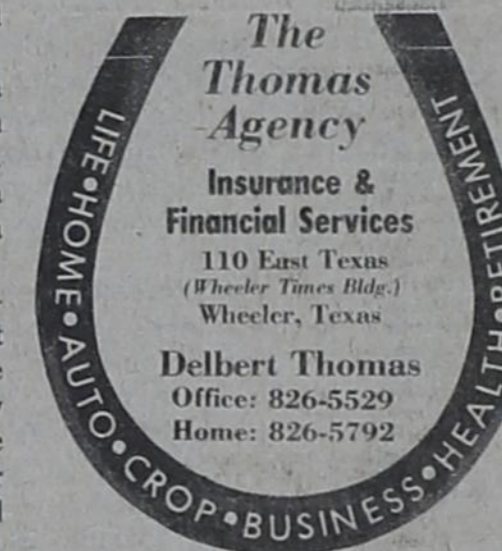
The prospective groom is the son of Mack and Sue Bentley of Wheeler.

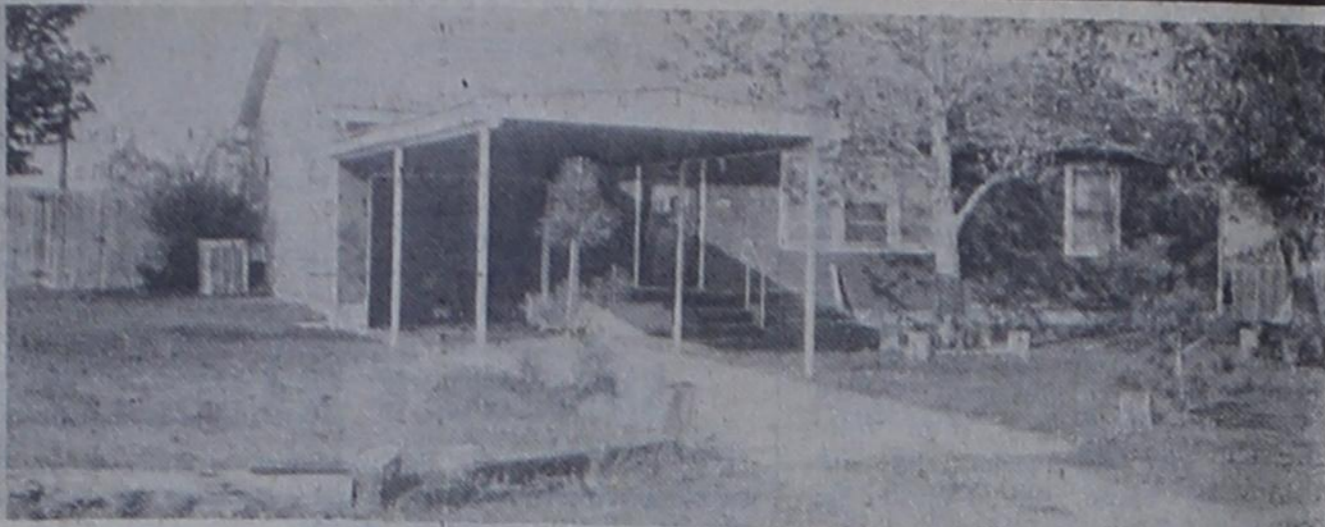

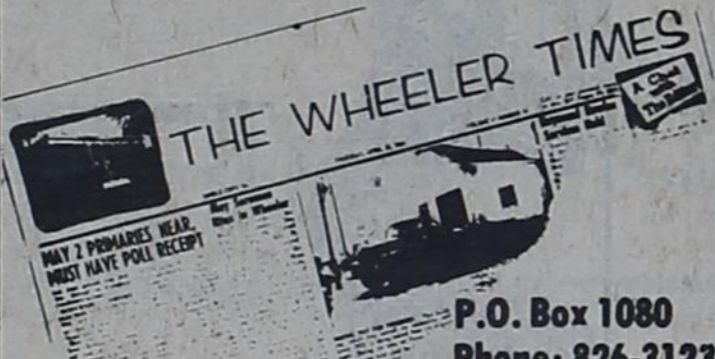

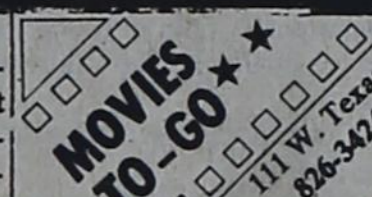

Pallbearers were: Tim Elliott, Michael Griffin, Dee Miller, Charles Newberry, Bill Owen, Frank Young.

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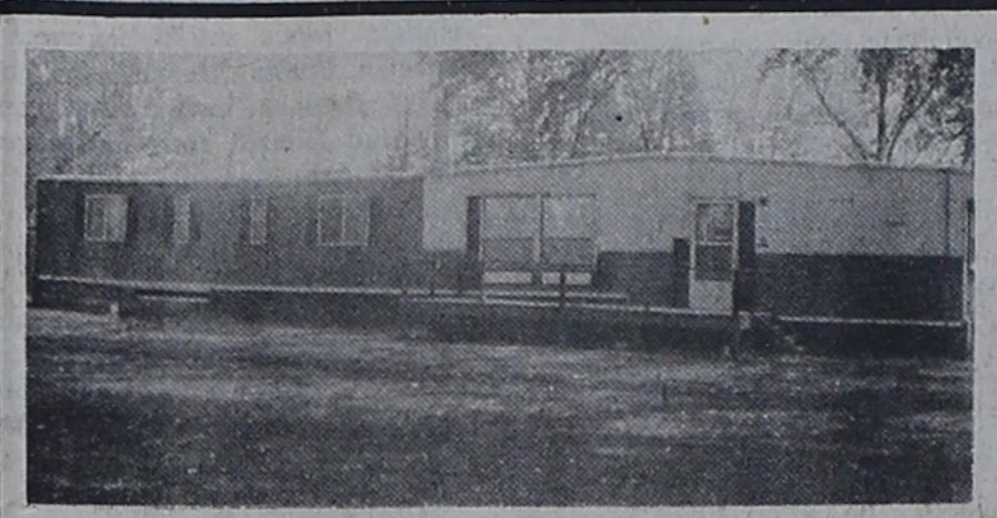

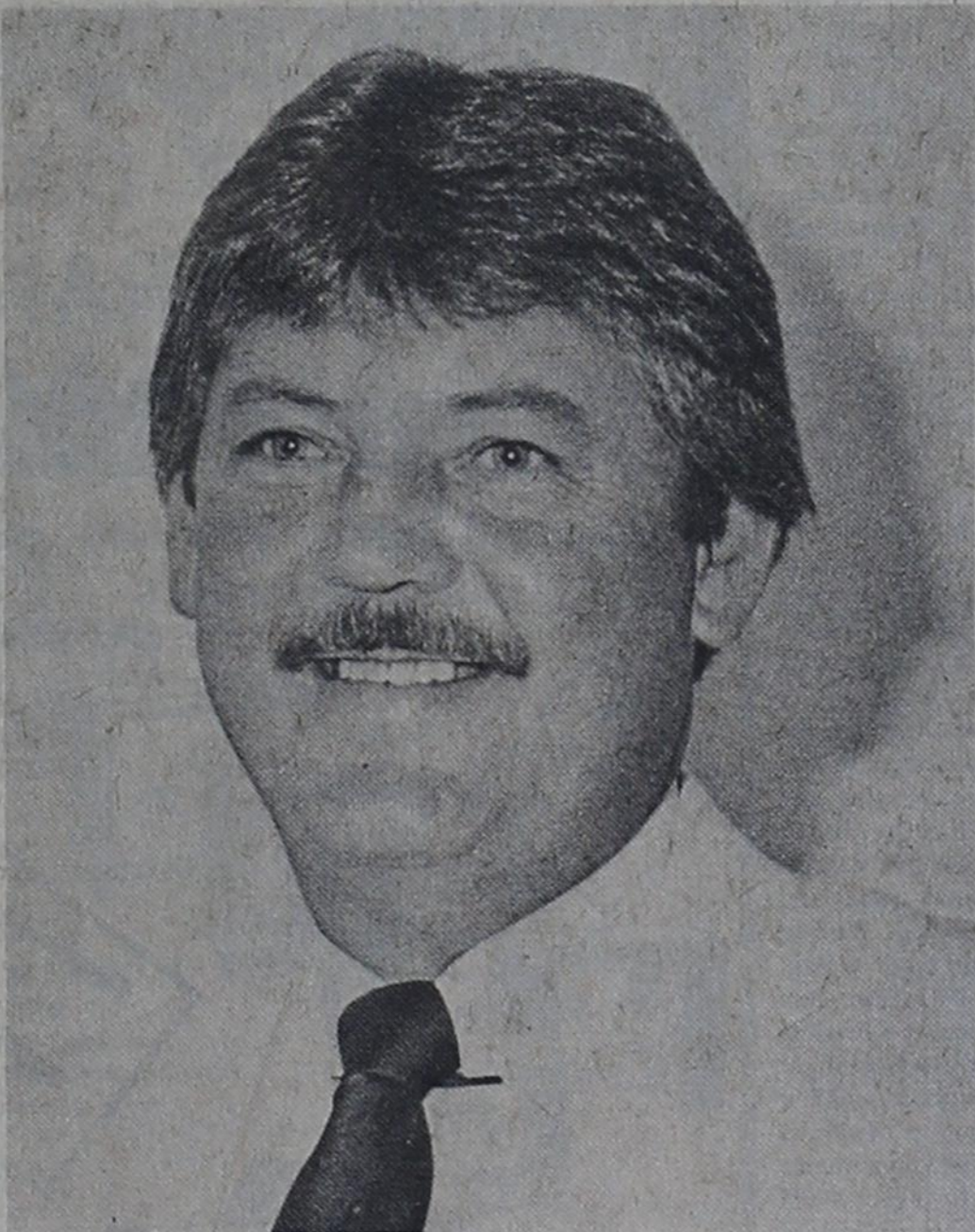

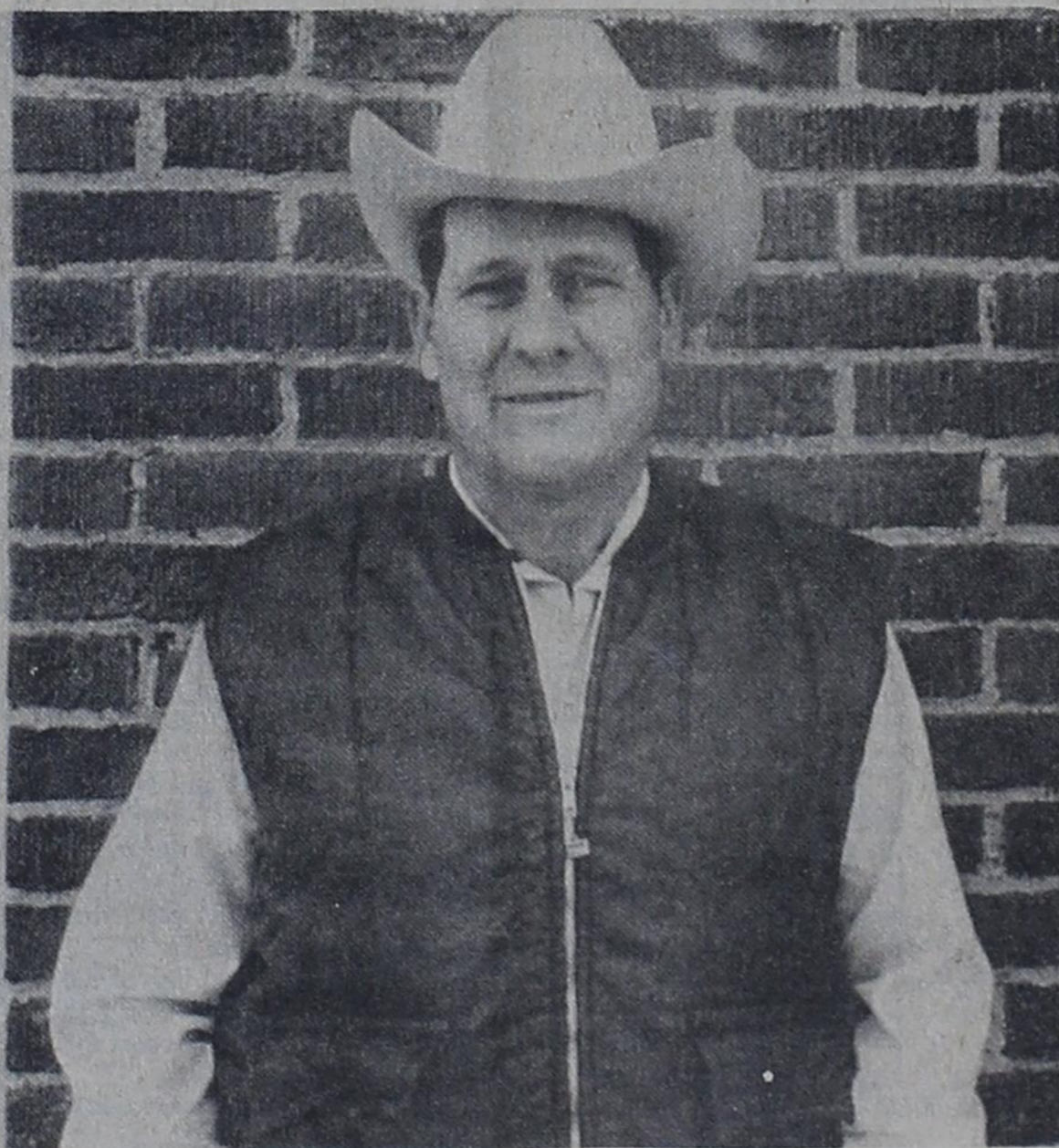

STAND UP TAXPAYERS OF TEXAS AND BE HEARD!

Dear Editor;

Since the election of Governor Mark White or is it Governor H. Ross Perot, there has been constant upheaval in the educational system in Texas. For you, the TAXPAYERS of Texas, who are unfamiliar with H. Ross Perot, he is the billionaire political conservative from Dallas whom Governor White retained to be the dictator of the Educational Reform Bill of Texas, House Bill 72. When White retained Perot, he allowed this man because of his wealth to dictate the way education in Texas should be handled, that is in a big business manner, failing to listen to educational professionals, reducing the power of the local districts who have no voice in the reform measures, but who will be held responsible for financing those reforms.

Let's take a critical look at facts and figures which have evolved as a result of this Educational Reform which are affecting each of us as TAXPAYERS: 1. Career Ladder—This is a system of merit pay intended for teachers who perform well in the classroom, and which has effectively destroyed the morale of the educators of the state. This, when fully implemented, will cost 3 hundred million dollars a year, with the state paying only 1 hundred million and local TAXPAYERS paying the 2 hundred million dollar balance.

2. Cost of Competency Test—This test given to teachers March 10, to prove competency was at a cost of 4.7 million to develop, score, and administer; An additional 21 million dollars was dispensed to pay salaries of 210,000 teachers who were taken out of the classroom away from student instruction to take the test. Furthermore, the publisher of the test demanded 2 million dollars in escrow to protect him if sued. Another 1.3 million dollars was needed to administer the retake test to those who failed on March 10. The retake test is scheduled for June 28. The total cost of the testing was 29 million dollars of TAXPAYERS money.

3. Subject Area Test—This test is to cover 60 different subject areas and is projected to cost 27 million more dollars. TAXPAYERS can add 21 million more dollars for salaries of teachers who again will be taken away from student instruction for the day of the test. Here again, our tax dollars will be footing the bill.

4. Teacher Unemployment—The state has projected 10,000 teachers will fail the test and be without jobs. Who picks up the tab for the teacher unemployment? TAXPAYERS!

5. New Accountability System—This deals with teacher documentation of all learning taking place in the classroom; This system is a detriment to the enrichment of individual student learning in that teachers are required to handle more and more paper work, thus taking away valuable and necessary prepartional and instructional time. Each student is an individual, and teachers must help maintain that individuality; students are people; they do not do all things in synchronization and this includes learning.

6. New Appraisal System—This state mandated reform deals with teacher evaluation and is to be implemented in the 1986-87 school year. Though the state mandated this system, LOCAL DISTRICTS are held responsible for funding.

7. No-Pass, No-Play Rule—This section states that students are not allowed to participate for six weeks in extracurricular activities if not passing all classes. This is not a positive reinforcement to the student, it is negative reinforcement. Six weeks taken away from any sport is almost the complete duration of any one season.
