First, let me hand out a few "roses"

The Wheeler Ambulance was called to Mobeetie early Saturday morning (12:57 a.m.) to help a mother and new born child. When the ambulance arrived they found the situation under the control of Panna Jones, Mobeetie's resident EMT. Panna then

rode in the ambulance with the mother and baby to Shamrock.

The first "rose" goes to Panna Jones. Panna took the course a few years back and since she lived in Mobeetie is unable to be on the ambulance service on a regular basis. Since she did live in Mobeetie, she was given a "jump kit"-a box containing an assortment of items to handle a medical emergency, and a pager to hear when the ambulance is paged. If Panna is home, she responds to those calls in the Mobeetie area.

If you remember, Panna was in the last months of pregnancy when she felt she was needed in the night-time search for an accident victim in a field west of Mobeetie. Mobeetie and the Ambulance Service are fortunate to have a concerned, caring person, such again, Panna.

The second "rose" goes to Rose Jones Watson. Rose's skills she learned in the EMT course were put to the test Saturday afternoon. Rose responded and save the life of a friend's baby. Rose was visiting a friend's home when the baby's airway became obstructed; she cleared the airway and the baby started breathing.

One "rose" each to Mary Kay Christner and Dwight Tipps. These two spend untold hours of their time teaching courses-first aid, ECA and EMT. It was their time teaching that gave the two named above their training-training which we know saved one life. They deserve the whole bouquet.

The last "rose" for the week goes to the Wheeler County Commissioners Court. This group of men no need for an ambulance. in 1976 were told that due to changes in Texas Law, the funeral homes of the county could no longer furnish ambulance service to the county; a deadline was given. Unable to find any other group to take on the responsibility, the commissioners court brought in the instructors for the first EMT course, encouraged concerned citizens to take the course and purchased the ambulances and equipment necessary to operate an ambulance service. They have continued to "foot the bills" for equipment and training. They have helped with the expenses of training 7 paramedics and an unknown number of EMT's and ECA's. This group of men with the help of a number of volunteers make the county's volunteer ambulance services possible.

Minister Outlines Ways To 'Strengthen Grip'

Questionable new lifestyles...the 'tyranny of the urgent"...the shifting of the foundations - they're all a part of an emotional climate which makes many moderns feel that they are "losing their grip."

But minister Charles R. Swindoll, senior pastor of the First Evangelical Free Church in Fullerton, California, is offering an alternative to today's dizzying changes, confusing "overchoice," and moral uncertainty.

"There are some fixed points, and you don't have to be washed away in this tide of confusion," Swindoll says in a new film series called "Strengthening Your Grip". The series is to be screened at the First Baptist Church of Wheeler on Sundays, April 6 thru May 11, at 6:00 P.M. each week.

The series, challenging what Swindoll calls "the 80's, a decade of aimlessness," is based on his bestselling book by the same title.

In the first film, which deals with the problem of priorities, Swindoll calls for the recognition of the subtle but essential difference between the important and "the merely urgent." While the urgent "always makes the most noise," he notes, the important but less noisy issues usually need more attention than our hectic schedules allow. The popular minister, deals with

the topic of aging in the second film. He says no one needs to "shift their heads into neutral" merely because a certain age is reached. Known for his rapier-sharp use of

the language and his pithy illustrations, Swindoll has made many church audiences sit up and listen when he warns against "too much church." In the third film he affirms leisure

as an important part of life, warning both the workaholic and "churchaholic" that "fatigue is not next to godliness." Swindoll also warns that "too much

church" can insulate Christains from the real world, in the fourth film, "Godliness: The Perils of Hothouse Christianity." Film Five is on "Attitudes: Choos-

ing the Food You Serve Your Mind." Here Swindoll urges a mental diet of something other than "media clutter" for anyone wanting to improve their outlook on life.

In the final film, the author-minister deals with the crisis of authority which he sees in the land. Taking personal responsibility for quelling our natural rebelliousness offers the only hope for what he calls a "talk-back, fight-back

Loan Restructuring, **Lower Interest Rates**

Loan restructuring and lower interest rates for farmers were the primary concern of Texas Farm Credit System directors attending a national meeting in Denver, Colorado, this

Edward Breihan of Lubbock, chairman of the Farm Credit System national leader's number one topic for discussion was the plight of good farmers in the current depressed agricultural economy and how the Farm Credit System could help.

"Now that the Farm Credit Act of 1985 is behind us and our money markets have calmed down, we believe it is time to marshal our efforts toward helping those farmers with a chance of surviving," the board chairman said.

Discussion at the Denver meeting centered on the need for Farm Credit banks and associations to study ways to restructure debt for troubled farmers who borrow from the Farm Credit System. The directors talked about opportunities for more use of Farmers Home Administration, the government agency which can guarantee for Farm Credit lenders up to 90 percent of a qualifying farmer's loan. The discussion encouraged Farm Credit System support for federal or state funded interest rate buydown programs for farmers with a chance for

James A. Rogers, president of the Farm Credit Banks of Texas, who also attended the national meeting, pointed out that normal procedure for the Texas Land Banks and Production Credit Associations is to work with farmers and ranchers who have a chance of working out of their financial problems.

Rogers said that pricing the product is a key emphasis for the banks, right now, particularly because interest rates on Treasury bonds and Farm Credit bonds are down on the National money markets.

"The Farm Credit System is having difficulty lowering interest rates," Rogers said. "Most of this problem is because of debt portfolios at the bank level that still contain many high priced bonds from a few years ago and the continuing and growing loan

The Texas banks' board of directors has been working since September with the Farm Credit Administraion, its Washington, D.C., based regulator, to get interest rates lowered for the Texas Federal Land Bank.


The Texas board of directors first asked for a Land Bank interest rate reduction last September. "All requests so far have not been approved," Breihan said.

"We hope that with the continued stress on farmers and the increased need to help farmers in every way we can, that our regulator will rule favorably on our request this time," Breihan stated.

Also attending the Denver meeting were Texas District Board Members Ray Robertson of Dimmitt, vice chairman, Patrick Boyt of Devers, Billy Chesnut of Dalhart, B.L. Smith Jr. of Paducah, Wilmer Smith of New Home and Robert Vanwinkle of Sulphur Springs.

The Texas Farm Credit System is comprised of the Federal Land Bank of Texas and its 44 Federal Land Bank Associations, the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Texas, 28 Production Credit Associations and the Texas Bank for Cooperatives. Collectively, they have \$4 billion in loans outstanding to 40,000 of the state's farmers, ranchers, aquatic harvesters and 147 agricultural and rural utility cooperatives.

The Texas Farm Credit District is among the strongest in the nation with \$800 million in capital and surplus.





Texas law provides farmers and ranchers with a way to lower their property taxes, known as productivity valuation.

If you qualify, your agricultural land will be taxed on its capacity to produce crops or livestock, instead of its value on the real estate market. Productivity valuation can lower the taxable value of your land, and lower your property taxes as a result.

If your land has never received productivity valuation, you must apply to the appraisal district by April 30 to get tax benefits for 1986. You can choose from two types of productivity valuation.

If your land already receives open-space (1-d-1) valuation, you don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to reapply. But remember, you must apply every year for ag-use (1-d) valuation.


