

MUSTANGS WIN BI-DISTRICT GAME FRIDAY, 25-0

The Wheeler football team was as fancy as a button down white shirt Friday night. But that's the way the Mustangs dress for success.

Using a pair of bulls—Dicky Salyer and Toby Collins—to do the damage, Wheeler used a tackle-to-tackle running game to defeat a stubborn Nazareth team, 25-0, in claiming a Texas Class 1A bi-district schoolboy

playoff victory before 600 fans in Dick Bivins Stadium. Salyer, a hard running sophomore fullback, and senior tailback Collins, just as hard a runner as his blocking mate, pounded out 223 yards of

rushing between them, carried the ball 41 times, and in some way were involved in all but eight of the Mustangs' offensive plays in the game. "That's what they do, they just run from the tackles," said Nazareth coach Rex Minshew, who in his first season finished 10-1-1. "Wheeler is just a good ball club. You can't take anything away from them. We knew Collins could run, but Salyer was a surprise. He ran hard and tough."

The win of 10-0-1 Wheeler not only is sweet revenge from a 20-14 upset last year to Nazareth in this same game, but the Mustangs move into the area round of the Texas schoolboy playoffs next week against Sunday, a 28-19 winner Friday night over Valley View.

"Our offensive line and the way they blocked was the big difference," said Wheeler coach Preston Smith.

Indeed, the Wheeler offensive line—"all year they've run over No. 74 (tackle Darren Grimes) and No. 69 (guard Wadé Bentley)," said Minshew—was the reason Wheeler won the war of total yards 315-198.

Including in those 315 yards were the 122 Salyer earned on 22 carries and the 103 yards Collins totaled on 19 carries.

Nazareth, by no means out of the game until the fourth quarter, got a taste of what was coming its way on Wheeler's first drive of the game.

The Wheeler defense, nick-named Black Death and recording its eighth shutout in 11 games this year, got a little shock on the first play of the game as Swift quarterback Ricky Bacus found tight end Kevin Hoelting for a 38 yard pass down to the Mustang 25-yard line.

The Bacus-to-Hoelting combination, the most successful part of

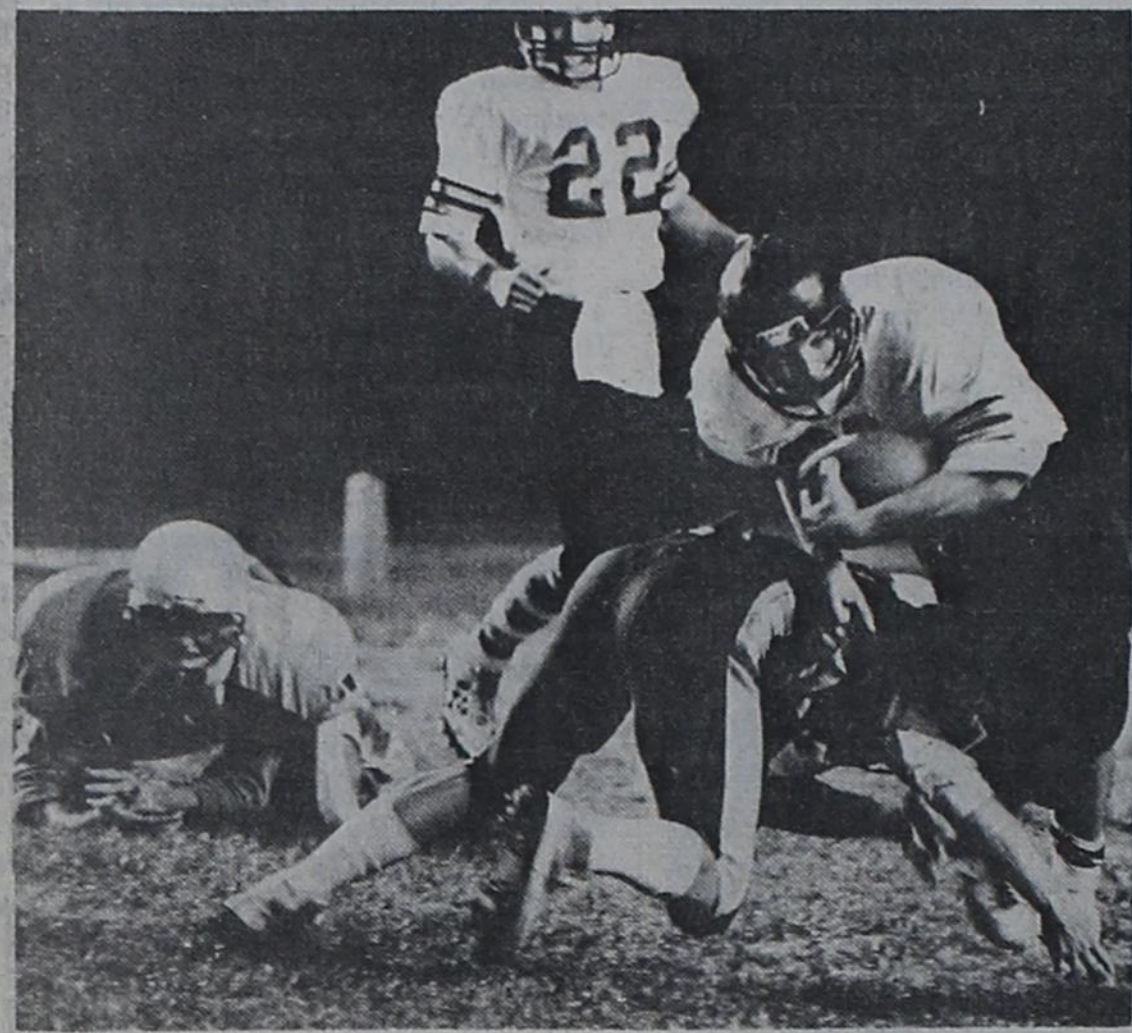

It Is Again Time To For Ordering Trees

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District is proud to announce that they are again taking orders for trees. They are especially proud to again offer Cheyenne pecan trees. These trees will be bare rooted, approximately four feet tall (after being pruned) and will be 1/2 inch or better trunk diameter. The response on these pecans far exceeded expectations when they were offered for the first time last year. The survival rate has been extremely good. The cost is \$11.00 per tree with no minimum order. Evergreen trees available this year include Ponderosa pine, Austrian pine, Eastern Redcedar and Afghanistana pine. These trees are 12-15 inches tall and are containerized, that is they arrive in the box in which they were planted. The box contains 30 trees which is the minimum order. The cost is \$50.00 per box. Deciduous trees (those which shed their leaves during winter) available are Russian olive, hackberry, honeylocust and green ash. These trees are barerooted and will be approximately two feet tall. The cost is \$0.50 per tree with a minimum order of 100 trees. Those individuals who have taken advantage of trees in the past will notice a slight increase in price. This is due to the fact that state tax must now be paid on these trees. Your SWCD Directors have chosen to slightly increase the price and absorb the tax to simplify the ordering process. Supplies of some of these trees is short so order now. Payment is required when order is placed. Contact your local SWCD Director or the Soil Conservation Service Office in Wheeler for further information or to place orders.

Travel was slow, due to the road conditions, but the victim was loaded in the pickup and carried back to the waiting ambulance.

Bates escaped with a minor cut to the face and fractured ribs. He was kept overnight at Parkview and released.

The Nazareth offense (78 yards), was good for 11 yards five plays later to the Wheeler 14 — the deepest Nazareth would drive all game.

"Three times we got inside the 20 and didn't score," said Minsheiw, "that hurt us."

Wheeler's defense, and a Nazareth holding penalty, gave the Mustang offense the ball with 6:07 to play in the first quarter and 80 yards to paydirt.

The Mustangs, ranked No. 3 in the state by the Harris Ratings, went a marching.

Wheeler tool 12 plays to travel the 80 yards — all runs. Eleven of the plays were split between Salyer and Collins as Mustang quarterback Steven Snapp, who was perfect of 4-of-4 for 76 yards, snuck in a 5-yard run.

Collins scored the first of his three touchdowns on a 3-yard run with 1:14

to play in the first quarter giving Wheeler a 6-0 lead as the point after attempt failed because of a bad snap.

"I thought they (Salyer) ran hard," said Smith of his dynamic running duo. "This was about what I expected."

Late in the first half Wheeler marched 72 yards on 13 plays — this time the big play was Snapp's first pass of the game, a 34-yarder to Larry Trevino. Collins again scored on a 3-yard run, and again the points after attempt failed.

Trailing 12-0, Nazareth took the second half kickoff and chewed 7:35 off the clock. But the Swifts' 53-yard 15-play drive to the Wheeler 15 ended when Collins and Robert Andis sacked Bucks on a fourth down play.

The Mustangs took advantage of Nazareth's first turnover early in the fourth quarter and drove 31 yards as Collins scored on 6-yard run with

11:09 to score in the game giving Wheeler a comfortable 18-0 lead.

Nazareth, paced by running of Chirs Gerber (30 yards on 17 carries) and Frarky Huseman (30 yards on eight carries), was forced to throw late in the game and found little success.

"We didn't want to get too high for this game," said Smith. "But we didn't take this game lightly because of last year."

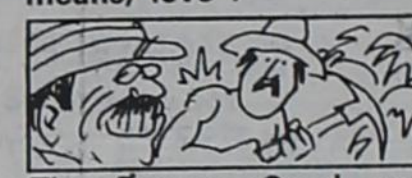

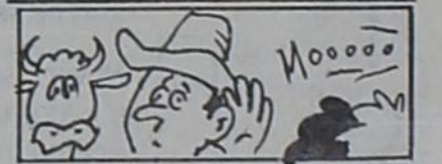

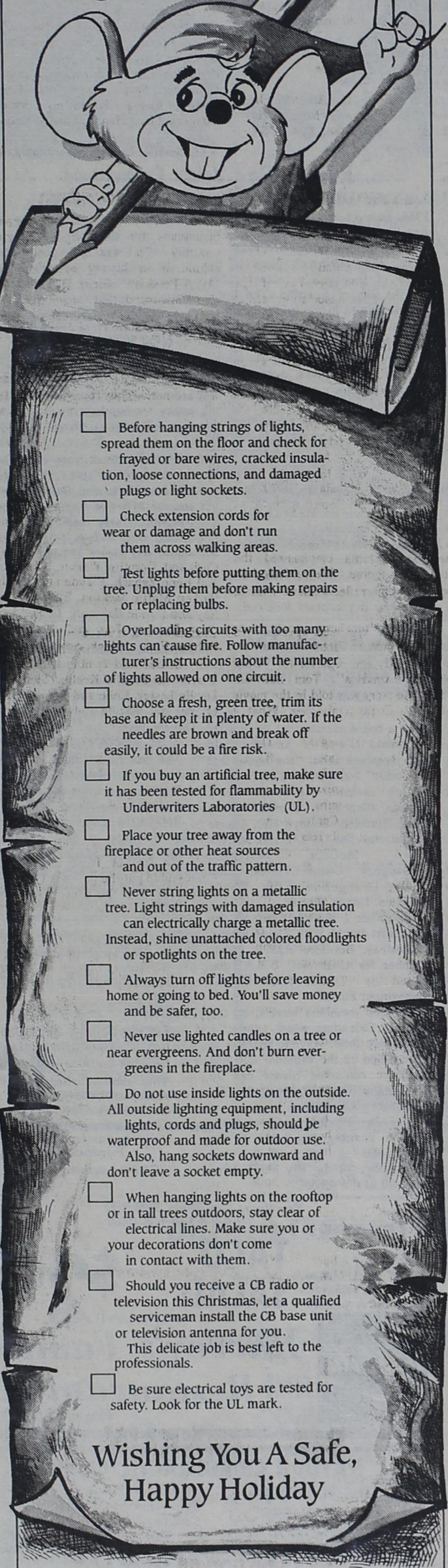

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

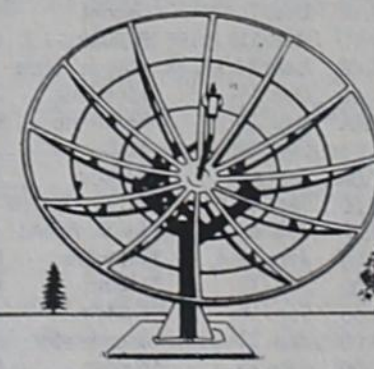

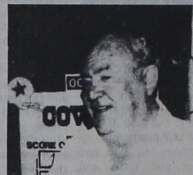
