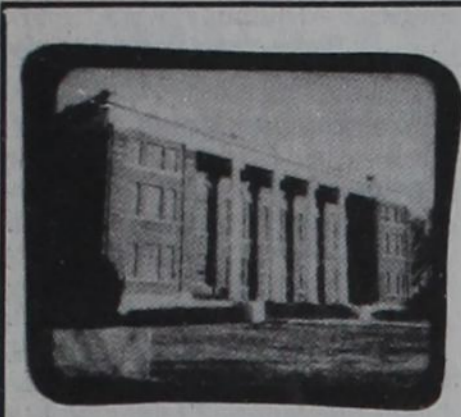

Wheeler County and the surrounding area will be the subject of a Ducks Unlimited film which was shot here April 8-11, 2000. The feature will be shown on TNN sometime in July. Prairie chickens and other wildlife were also filmed.

The film on wildlife in Wheeler County and surrounding counties will be broadcast on TNN beginning in July. There will be 13 episodes in the series.

Steve Reynolds of Memphis, Tenn., was one of the individuals responsible for getting the film crew into the area. In 1991 Reynolds was invited to accompany a friend to Wheeler County to participate in the newly organized annual Turkey Hunt. One trip to the area and he was hooked on the game, communities and fine people.

An article in "Outdoor Magazine" told of the excellent turkey hunting offered in Wheeler County resulted in Reynolds' first trip to the Texas Panhandle. The article was written shortly after the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce organized the annual turkey hunt.

Ducks Unlimited officials accompanying Reynolds this trip were Oran Richard, host of "The World of Ducks Unlimited" from Lafayette, La., and Don Young, Chief Executive of Ducks Unlimited from Memphis, Tenn.

Ducks Unlimited is an organization of 700-800 thousand members worldwide. The purpose of the organization is to protect ducks throughout their migratory area.

Overseeing the filming is John Barrett of Barrett Productions. Barrett is the executive producer of the film and is from Montana. He travels the world over and had returned from New Zealand to produce the film in

Wheeler county. Three other individuals helping with the film were Dennis Nadalin, cameraman; Chris Richardson, audio technician and Paulo Castillo, cameraman.

Heritage Beef Cattle Company and the Weatherly family own and operate numerous ranches in the area and are in the process of returning them to their original beauty.

Remelle Farrar, Canadian's Executive Director of Economic Development addressed the group on the importance of the region working together to develop the area as a whole as opposed to each community working individually. We have a wide range of wildlife, scenery and activities to attract tourist to the area. Working together we can attract the tourist dollar. Texas Prairie Rivers Association has members from Wheeler, Canadian and Miami. Since the organization of Texas Prairie Rivers Association, the area has been designated the second best place for birding in the U.S.

The chuckwagon brunch was served in the barn at Silver Springs to a group of local citizens and dignitaries of about 100 people. Bud and Tina Wright of Lubbock provided music for the gathering.

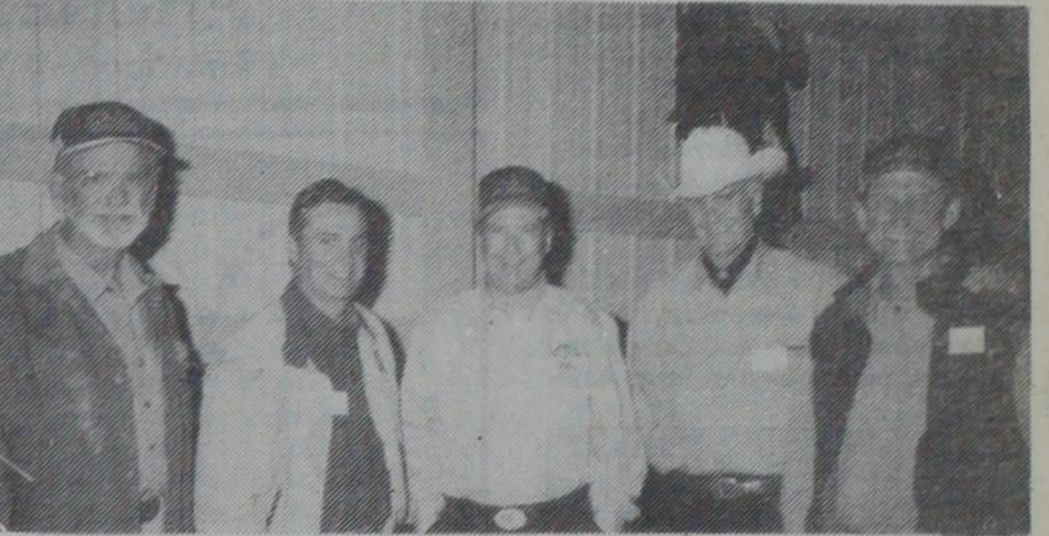

Wheeler I.S.D. Schedules Kindergarten Visitation

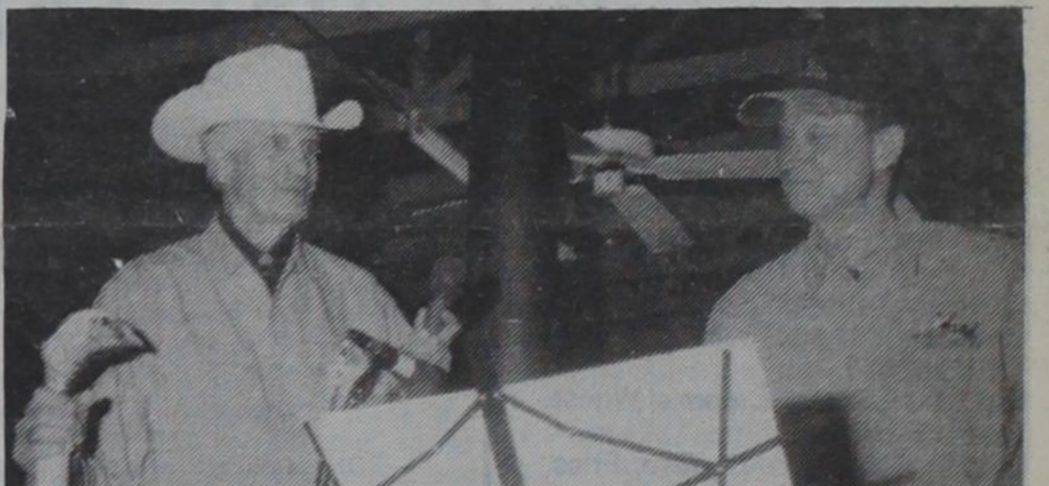

Old Mobeetie Museum To Host 2 Summer Events

The Mobeetie Jail Museum, Old Mobeetie, Texas is hosting two new events during the summer of 2000. The first event will take place on June 5, 2000 at 6:00 p.m. to celebrate the 125th anniversary of the first permanent Anglo settlement in the Texas Panhandle. On June 5, 1875 Fort Elliott, first called New Cantonment, was established on the Sweetwater Creek, about one mile from the Jail Museum. About that same date a buffalo hunters "hide town" was established about two miles from the fort, then thought to be just outside of the United States military lease. This "hide town" was called Sweetwater City or Sweet Town and grew to about 150 people in a short period of time. In 1877, a new survey revealed that the town was sitting on the government lease and was forced to relocate to land not included on the military lease, but was in fact much nearer to Fort Elliott. About this time, a civilian post office was sought by the residents of the new community. When denied the use of the name of Sweetwater for the new locations' post office by the United States postal service, the Indian scouts at Fort Elliott told the locals that their Indian word for "sweetwater" was "mobeetie". The relocated town was renamed "Mobeetie" and the post office was established. Under the protection of Fort Elliott, the Panhandle of Texas began to fill with settlers from the East who were looking for new opportunities in land ownership and wealth in the Texas Panhandle that was then safe from marauding Indians and outlaws. To recognize this anniversary a short educational program will be given at 6:00 p.m. and a barbecue dinner will be served at 7:00 p.m.

The second event will be the first annual Mobeetie Music Festival on July 28, 29, and 30, 2000. The event will feature Western Swing, Progressive Country, Bluegrass, and Gospel as well as other styles of music throughout the week end. The program is under development at this time. The weekend is proposed to begin Friday at 6:00 p.m. until midnight. On Saturday the event will continue at 11:00 a.m. until midnight. On Sunday morning a church service is planned featuring gospel music. The schedule for performers has not been completed and all time slots have not been filled at this time. 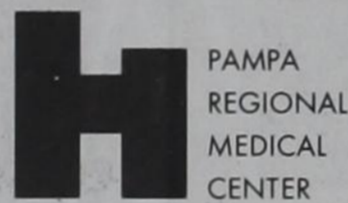

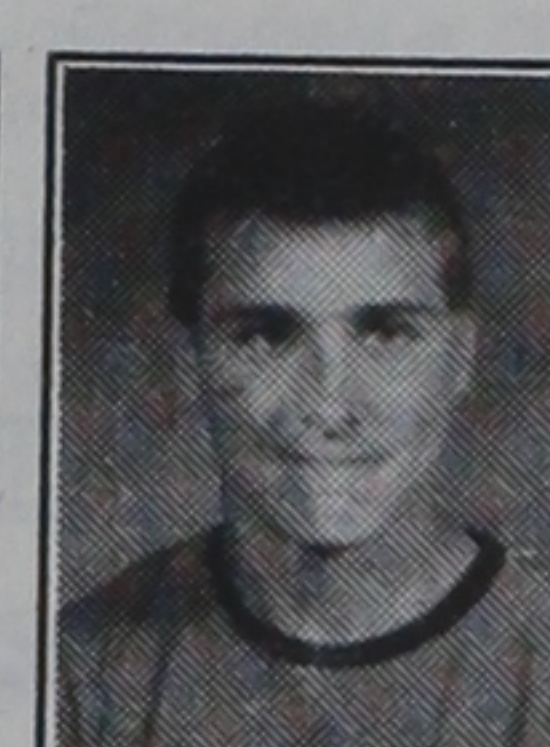
