COLTS WIN DISTRICT

Wheeler Junior High Football team stayed undefeated with a 25-0 win over the Phillips Blackhawks last Thursday night in Wheeler. The Colts won their Junior High District with a perfect 7-0 record. The District standings following last week games is Wheeler 7-0, Booker 5-2, Follett 3-5, Phillips 2-5, and Gruver 1-6 with one game to play. Wheeler plays Gruver in their last game of the year. Earlier the Colts defeated the Greyhounds 20-0 at Gruver. The game will start at 5:30 p.m. followed by the Wheeler J.V. game against Gruver J.V.

Wheeler Colts open the scoring in the first quarter with a 55 yard touchdown run by Bubba Smith. Sammy Zepeda added the extra point to give the Colts an early lead 7-0.

Shane Guest added another score in the first with a six yard run giving the Colts a 13-0 lead at the end of the quarter. There was no scoring in the second quarter but Wheeler had their chances. Penalties and fumbles kept the Colts out of the end zone.

In the third quarter Smith had another touchdown from 12 yards out. Wheeler led 19-0 at the end of the third quarter. Cory Cornett passed to Smith for a 35 yard touchdown in the fourth quarter to make the score 25-0.

Recovering fumbles for the Colts was Smith with two, Guest and Zepeda had one each. This was the third shutout for the season for the Colts. They have outscored their opponents 187 to 50.

WHEELER AND GRUVER CLASH FOR DISTRICT FOOTBALL CROWN FRIDAY

Even though there have been some unexpected results the past two weeks in District 1-1A football games, it was figured in all pre-season prognostications that the Wheeler Mustangs and the Gruver Greyhounds would battle for the district championship and this they will do Friday night on Nicholson Field.

The Claude Mustangs proved to be the nemesis to both Wheeler and Gruver as they blotted the Greyhounds perfect district mark with a 14-7 win last Friday night after spoiling the Wheeler Mustangs perfect season and district record the week before with a 18-18 tie.

Wheeler, still ranked 3rd in the state in the Harris Poll and now 10th in the AP, brings an 8-0-1 season record to the final game of the '84 regular season and Gruver is not far behind with a 7-2 record. The Greyhounds suffered a 26-7 loss to the Spearman Lynx early in the season.

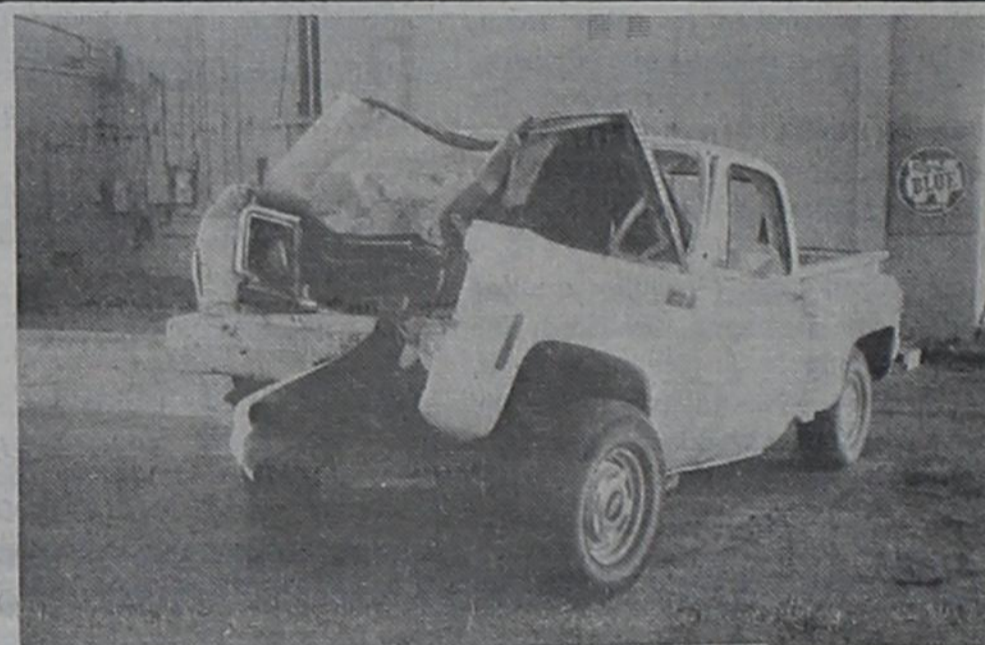
Mayors Meet

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Lovegrass Seminar

Fifty-one people from a wide area recently attended a lovegrass seminar held in Wheeler. They were Soil Conservation Service personnel from as far away as Temple, Texas. The seminar was conducted by two of the most knowledgeable individuals in the world on lovegrass, Dr. Dalrymple of the Noble Foundation of Ardmore, Oklahoma and Dr. Dahl from Texas Tech University. Many new ideas on the management of lovegrass was presented to the group. Also, a tour of nearby fields of lovegrass yielded practical suggestions on very specific problems facing producers in Wheeler County. Lavon Williams, District Conservationist for the Wheeler SCS office stated that it was the best seminar he had ever attended. Many questions on the establishment and management of lovegrass were answered. Williams further stated that he is planning a series of news articles on the material presented as he feels that most of it would be very beneficial to many lovegrass producers in Wheeler County. Any lovegrass producer with a problem is welcome to stop by the Wheeler SCS office and discuss it as Williams is confident that he or other members of his staff can be of assistance.

Computer Use

Interest in the use of computers in the home, business, and farm or ranch operations is steadily increasing. However, many people are confused as to what they should look for in a computer and eventually purchase a machine that is not suited to their needs or they do not buy one at all.

On Tuesday, November 20, the Wheeler County Program Building Committee will sponsor an educational program designed to help those interested in computers decide whether a computer can help them and, if so, what they should look for. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Wheeler School Cafeteria. Everyone interested in computers is invited to attend.

Dr. Greg Taylor, Extension Community Development Specialist at Amarillo, will explain what task can be performed by a computer and how these capabilities might be matched to the individual needs. Dr. Taylor will also be able to answer many of the questions people have concerning computers. He will be assisted by Mr. Terry McCasland, Vocational Agriculture Teacher at Wheeler High School. McCasland will demonstrate some of the programs he uses on the school's computer. This should give those in attendance an idea of what they can expect a computer to do.

The Program Building Committee has discussed sponsoring a computer operation course in 1985, if there is sufficient interest.

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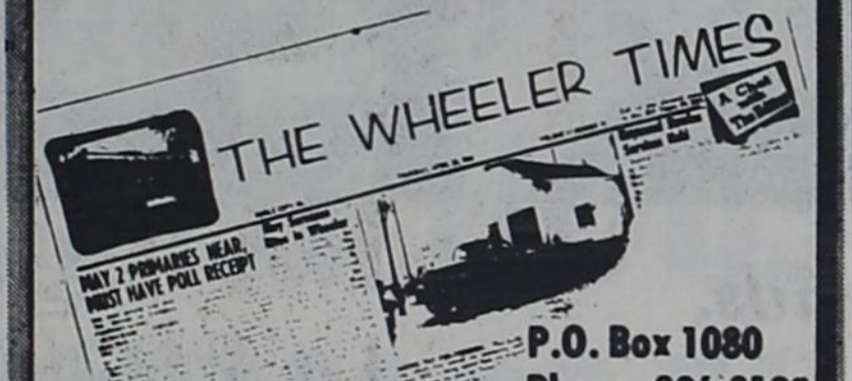

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Is Beer Linked To Cancer?
 What's all this talk about beer causing cancer?
 It's been known for a long time that heavy drinkers who also smoke cigarettes have significantly more cancers of the mouth, throat and esophagus.
 Wine in particular has been linked to excessive cases of esophageal cancers in several countries. Abusing alcohol can lead to cirrhosis which, in turn, may result in liver cancer.
 "Beer per oz. does not appear to have any special carcinogenic properties," says Dr. Guy R. Newell, director of cancer prevention programs at The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute.
 Beer was cast in a bad light recently when Japanese men living in Hawaii were determined to have more rectal cancers than comparable control groups studied. Researchers examining the role of beer conceded more work is needed since their initial findings might have been a statistical fluke.
 Dr. Newell notes the need for all people to practice moderation where alcoholic beverages are concerned. Anyone who combines drinking and smoking should stay alert to the first signs of cancer or any other health problem.

Facts To Consider In Selecting Dwarf Trees

Dwarf fruit trees—compact versions of apples, pears and plums—are finding a home in many Texas landscapes. Although they offer many advantages over standard-size trees, they also have their negative side. Before planting a dwarf fruit tree, you should carefully weigh the pros and cons. The advantages are:

- Dwarf trees require less growing space. For urban dwellers with small yards, this can be a big plus.
- Smaller trees are easier to prune, spray and harvest.
- Despite their much smaller size, dwarf trees are able to produce the same size fruit as standard trees.

Some disadvantages to dwarf trees are:

- Dwarfing stocks are sometimes shallow-rooted, making trellising or a similar means of support necessary to prevent uprooting.
- It may be difficult to find dwarf varieties that are suited to your climate and growing conditions.
- Some dwarfing rootstocks seem to succumb more readily to disease.
- Dwarf trees generally cost more than standard size ones.

There are a number of dwarf apple varieties which are recommended for Texas. There are also some recommended varieties for dwarf pears and plums. But, up until now, most horticulturists have advised against planting dwarf peaches because they feel that none of the dwarf peach varieties currently on the market are well-adapted to Texas' growing conditions.

When grafting dwarf trees, the fruiting part of the tree (called the scion) is dwarfed by a rootstock or interstem which has dwarfing characteristics. Ideally, both the variety of the tree and of the rootstock should be one well-suited to your specific growing conditions.

Colon Cancer Increases After 40

To the old adage about life beginning at 40 should be added the warning that this is the same age when colon and rectal cancers start

increasingly dramatically.

These are the cancers no one used to talk about. Educational efforts about early symptoms—especially rectal bleeding and changes in bowel habits—gradually are improving awareness of colorectal cancers, which affect more Americans than all other malignancies except lung cancer.

The importance of early detection cannot be preached enough, says Dr. Guy R. Newell, director of cancer prevention programs at The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute.

"More than 75 percent of all people affected with these cancers can be cured if they are found while in a localized stage and treated promptly" he says.

People should pay close attention to such risk factors as a family history of colon and rectal cancer or a condition known as familial polyps in the colon. Ulcerative colitis also predisposes for colorectal malignancies.

"Increasing evidence is being accumulated to suggest diets low in fats and high in fiber may protect people from colon cancer," Dr. Newell notes.

Common clues that also should be checked include unexplained diarrhea or constipation, bloody stools, watery bowel movements, cramps, abdominal pains and sudden weight loss.

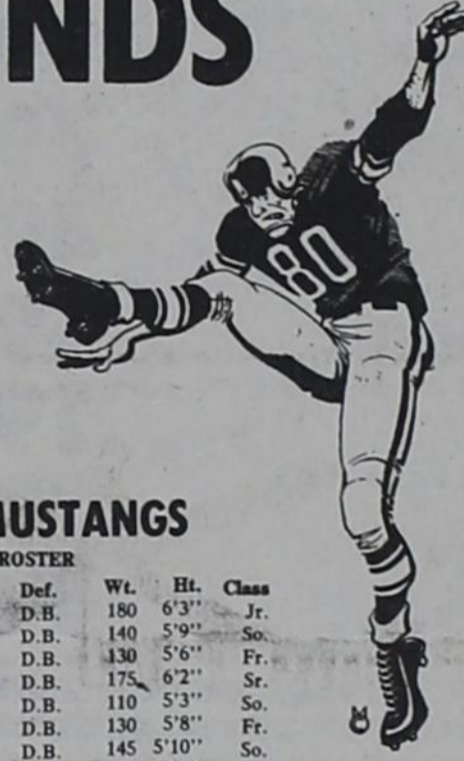
