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**Farm Bureau Convention Set For Nov. 25-28**

Some 1,600 Texas bureau voting delegates will decide policies for 1985 when the state's largest farm organization holds its 51st annual meeting here Nov. 25-28.

Theme of the convention at the San Antonio Convention Center will be "Our Greatest Reward—Freedom."

Voting delegates from 217 organized counties will adopt state policies for the coming year. Approved resolutions on national issues will be forwarded to the 66th annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation which meets Jan. 7-10, in Honolulu, Hawaii.

Dr. Joseph F. Boyle, of Los Angeles President of the American Medical Association, will be the keynote speaker. He will address the organization during the Nov. 26 general session.

TFB President S.M. True of Plainview will deliver his annual address during the same general session. TFB Secretary-Treasurer Roy Johnson of Desdemona will precede True with his annual report.

TFB Executive Director Warren Newberry will open the business session Nov. 27 with his annual administrative report. The business session will conclude on Nov. 28 with the election of TFB Board members

and the TFB President.

A young farmer and rancher breakfast will be Monday, Nov. 26 at the Hilton. Stanley White, Stephenville farmer and after dinner speaker, will be the guest speaker.

There will be five conferences conducted from 1 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Nov. 26. These include workers compensation and farm labor; federal farm program; agricultural financing; taxes and education, and water and transportation.

They will be followed at 2:45 p.m. by six commodity conferences. These include beef and sheep and goats; cotton and peanuts; dairy and poultry; wheat and feed grains; rice and soybeans and citrus and pecans.

Youth activities will include selection of a TFB queen from district winners; a talent winner from finalists and a free enterprise speech contest winner, chosen from district winners.

There are 13 districts in the Texas Farm Bureau.

The speech and talent find contest finals will begin at 7 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 25.

The speech winner receives a \$2,000 scholarship; the runner-up, a \$1,500 scholarship, and the four other finalists each receive \$1,000 scholarships. All other district winners are assured of receiving \$750 scholarships

The talent find winner receives a \$1,500 scholarship; the runner-up, a \$1,000 scholarship. All other district winners will receive \$500 scholarships

The queen receives a \$1,500 scholarship; the runner-up, a \$1,000 scholarship. Other district winners are assured of \$500 scholarships.

The Outstanding Young Farmer and Rancher Award winner will be announced during the evening of the queen competition.

The Outstanding Young Farmer and Rancher will receive one year's free use of a three-quarter ton pickup, compliments of Bird-Kultgen Ford Co. of Waco. The winner also receives expense-paid trips to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting, Jan. 7-10, at Honolulu, Hawaii, and to the AFBF's Young Farmer and Rancher Leadership Conference next February at Albuquerque, N.M.

### Teaching Your Teenager to Manage Money

The beginning of the school year is a time when many teenagers start renegotiating their allowances with their parents. For many families that means arguments about what it costs to "keep up" with the other kids, or what chores merit an increased allowance.

But the question of allowances for teenagers is not simply a matter of money. It is a matter of teaching teenagers some of the money management skills they'll need as adults.

Extension specialists who work in the area of family financial management suggest the following as good general practices for handling teenagers' allowances so they'll learn money management skills:

- \* An allowance should meet the teenager's actual needs and if your budget allows, also provide for a few personal desires, some money to share and some to save.

- \* Involve your children in determining their allowance needs by using a simple budget plan which includes both fixed and variable expenses, income sources and savings.

- \* Give teenagers the opportunity to earn some of their money, but you should not give them financial rewards for good behavior, grades or routine family chores. Your children's cooperation should not be put on a cash basis. However, you can work out a business arrangement so that they can earn some money by doing extra household work.

- \* Don't replace "lost" money your teenager intended for personal spending. If your children must borrow money from you, let them borrow against their allowances. This will teach them that it costs extra money to borrow and that the amount borrowed (plus interest) must be paid from future allowances.

- \* As teenagers increase their earnings from jobs outside the home, it may become appropriate to adjust or discontinue allowances, depending on their needs.

- \* Encourage your teen to save for long-range goals like Christmas gifts, big purchases, travel and college expenses. Encourage them to save first, not last, and to do so on a regular basis.

- \* Help your teenager open a savings or checking account and learn the kinds, costs, purposes and limits of credit.

On three separate occasions Hightower voted for an additional \$8.4 billion for U.S. participation in the I.M.F. loan program. The money went first to pay interest on bad loans which some private banks had made to questionable foreign countries.

The American banker considers a loan request made by a farmer or rancher very carefully, so why should all of us pay taxes to cover imprudent foreign loans a few bankers made? We play by the rules. So should international bankers.

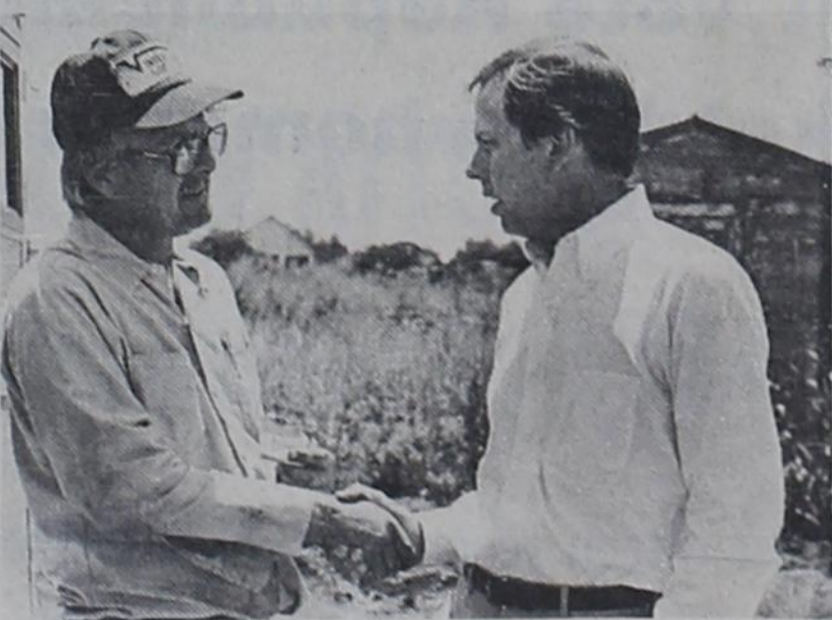
The I.M.F. bailout was a dangerous precedent to set and one I will never vote to repeat.

**Elderly File To Postpone Payment**

Taxpayers aged 65 or over can delay payment of property taxes on their homesteads.  
Elderly homeowners can qualify for the "over-65 tax deferral" by filing an affidavit at the Wheeler County Appraisal District office.  
If an elderly taxpayer has already been sued to collect delinquent taxes on his homestead, he can still take advantage of the tax deferral by filing an affidavit asserting age and ownership with the court in which the suit is pending.

According to Marilyn Copeland, chief appraiser of the district, after an

"over-65 deferral" affidavit has been properly filed, taxing units may not pursue or initiate delinquent tax suits on the homestead as long as the applicant owns and lives at that property.

Copeland said that forms for the deferral affidavit are available from the Wheeler County Appraisal District office. The form should be filled out and signed by the applicant and his signature witnessed by a notary public or other authorized to take oaths, she added.

Copeland stressed that elderly homeowners should realize that the deferral only allows payments to be postponed not dismissed. "During the period of deferral, the amounts of delinquent taxes, penalties and interest continue to add up," explained Copeland. "Once the applicant no longer qualifies for deferral—that is, if he no longer owns or resides at that homestead—all those accrued amounts become due and payable. Taxing units at that time may sue and foreclose on the accrued delinquent taxes, penalties and interest."

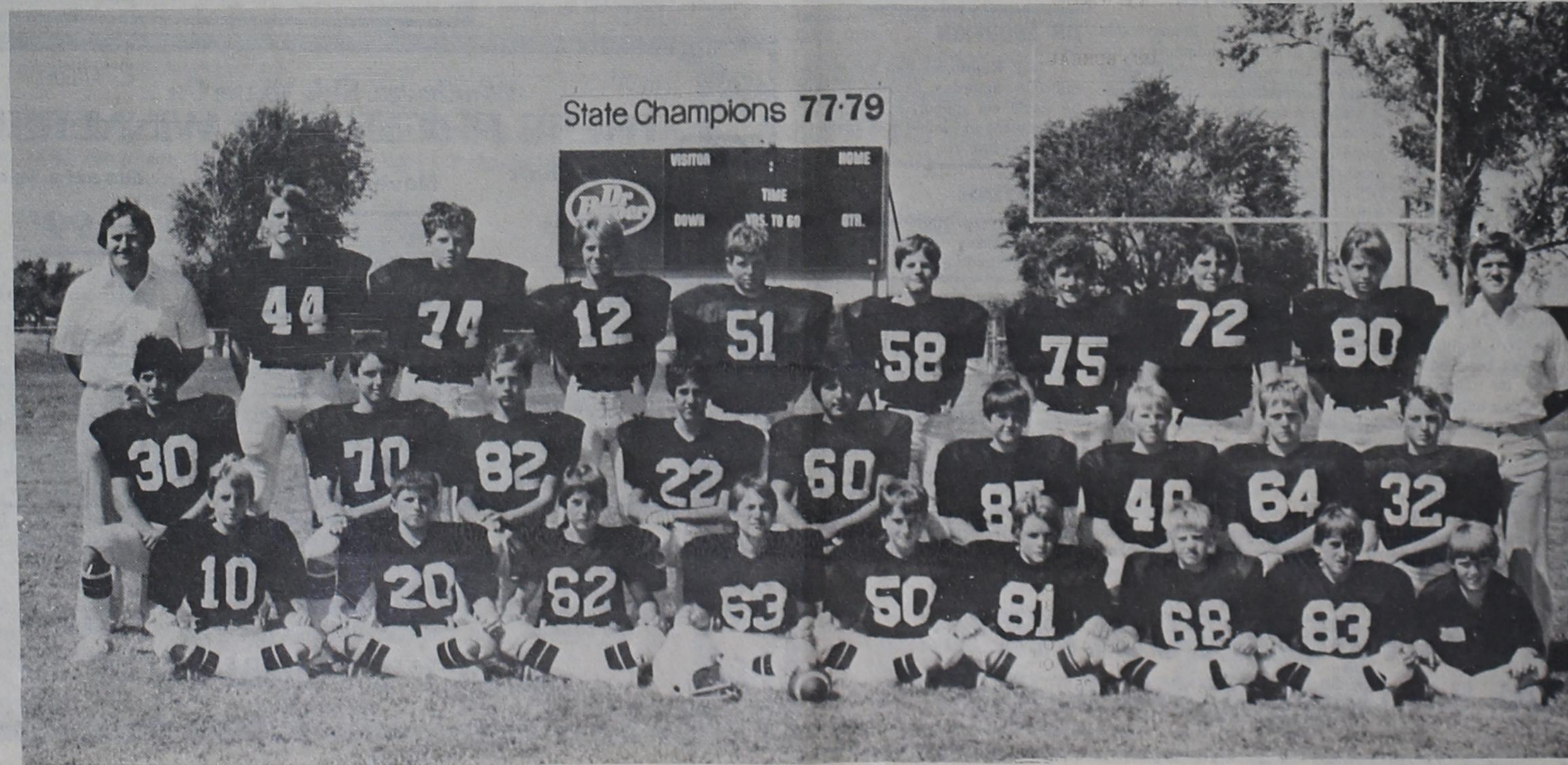

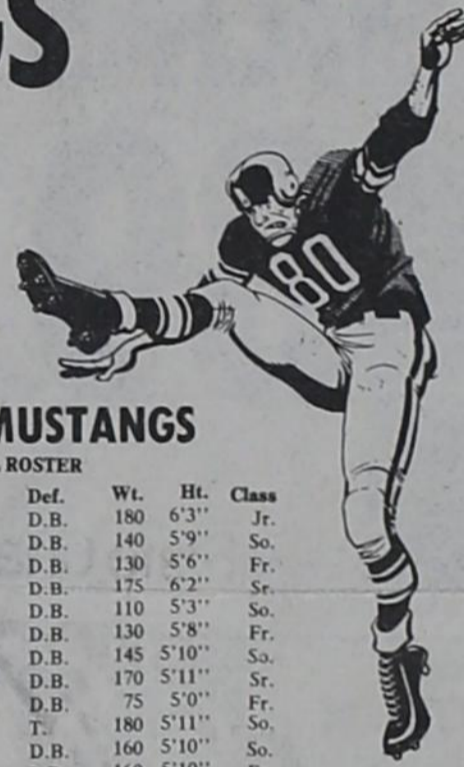

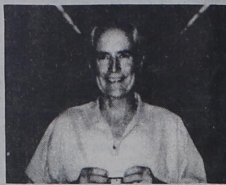
