### Farm Debt Restructuring

A farm debt restructuring program for farmers experiencing severe 10-28 financial difficulty can be in operation in most areas of Texas next week, J. Lynn Futch, State Director for the Farmers Home Administration 10-29 (FmHA), said today.

Debt restructuring is a key part of the farm credit initiatives announced by President Reagan on September 18.

Under the program, FmHA can set aside up to 25 percent of \$200,000, whichever is less, of an FmHA borrower's debt for five years without interest. For a non-FmHA borrower, the agency can guarantee part of a minimum of 10 percent of the existing debt. In both cases, the goal is to restore the borrower to a positive cash

Futch said FmHA field staff in Texas will be trained in the operational details of the new program.

Borrowers will begin receiving letters in a few days asking them to contact the FmHA County Office about an appointment to review their loan, the first step in the restructuring

**Teaching Your Teenager to Manage** 

The beginning of the school year is a time when many teenagers start renegotiating their allowances with their parents. For many families that means arguments about what it costs to "keep up" with the other kids, or what chores merit an increased al-

But the question of allowances for teenagers is not simply a matter of money. It is a matter of teaching teenagers some of the money management skills they'll need as adults.

Extension specialists who work in the area of family financial management suggest the following as good general practices for handling teenagers' allowances so they'll learn money management skills:

\* An allowance should meet the teenager's acutal needs and if your budget allows, also provide for a few personal desires, some money to share and some to save.

\* Involve your children in determining their allowance needs by using a simple budget plan which includes both fixed and variable expenses, income sources and savings.

\* Give teenagers the opportunity to earn some of their money, but you should not give them financial rewards for good behavior, grades or routine family chores. Your children's cooperation should not be put on a cash basis. However, you can work out a business arrangement so that they can earn some money by doing extra household work.

\* Don't replace "lost" money your teenager intended for personal spending. If your children must borrow money from you, let them borrow against their allowances. This will feach them that it costs extra money to borrow and that the amount borrowed (plus interest) must be paid from future allowances.

\* As teenagers increase their earnings from jobs outside the home, it may become appropriate to adjust or discontinue allowances, depending on their needs.

\* Encourage your teen to save for long-range goals like Christmas gifts, big purchases, travel and college expenses. Encourage them to save first, not last, and to do so on a regular

\* Help your teenager open a savings or checking account and learn the kinds, costs, purposes and limits of credit.



"During the period of deferral, the amounts of delinquent taxes, penalties and interest continue to add up," explained Copeland. 




