





### Speech Pathologist

A new resident of Shamrock, Mrs. Vivian Cupp, has come here to serve as Speech Pathologist with the Eastern Panhandle Cooperative for Special Education. She fills a unique position; however, more unique is her own visual impairment. It was precisely Mrs. Cupp's lack of sight that guided her into the speech therapy field which calls for exceptional listening skills to determine problems. Mrs. Cupp completed her education at Fort Hayes State University in only four years and holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Education and a Master of Science degree in Speech

Legally blind by the time she was in her late teens due to a recessive disease which affects the detail visual acuity, her peripheral vision is normal. This vision difficulty makes it impossible for Mrs. Cupp to drive a car. Therefore, a person will need to be employed to drive her when she makes rounds to teach in the school districts outside of Shamrock. Other schools receiving Mrs. Cupp's services will be Samnorwood, Lela, Kelton and Wheeler. Whenever referrals are made, students will be checked for speech/language disorders by Mrs. Cupp. She will also survey all kindergarten students and new students.

Mrs. Cupp is a native Kansan with seven years experience in the Kansas Public Schools. Because her husband, Bob, was transferred to Texas as a driller for Slawson Oil Drilling Co., he consents to make a two-hour daily drive to and from work wo that Vivian may continue her career here in Shamrock. "I am pleased to be living in Shamrock and meeting the warm, friendly residents of your community; and I am looking forward to working in the schools here and in neighboring towns", she said.

ments from grades K-12. Basically, it dent spend more time on reading, writing, and arithmetic. Electives will be cut back and it will increase the mandated courses. The new curriculum plan will dictate to teachers how many minutes a day they must instruct in each subject area. Teachers will spend class time on English, math, the Arts, physical education, health science and history.

Chapter 75 spells out that junior high students must have a minimum of 45 minutes of classtime for each subject and must receive at least 12 units of credit. Nine and a half of these are used for required courses among them computer literacy, English, math, life science, earth science, physical education, and history.

It is very important that all ninth grade students and parents know the requirement for graduation from high school. This years freshman class will be the first to graduate under HB 246. The new curriculum bill also requires those students in grades 7 and 8 more than one year behind their grade level in reading to take a required reading improvement course and it must be taken in place of one of the electives.

At the high school level, students will have to have a minimum of 21 units to graduate. As in the elementary and junior high, these will be certain mandated courses required, depending on one of the three graduation plans the student selects.

Each student, regardless of the graduation plan, will be required to take the basic courses in English and language arts, math, science, social studies, hpysical education and health fine arts, and computer science.
