Wheeler County voters gave the "green light" to the Sweetwater Creek Reservoir, but voted down the

maintenance tax for the Wheeler County Water Supply District. 2260 voters went to the polls, this is 51

percent of the qualified voters in Wheeler County.

The two-part ballot apparently caused some confusion for the voters, as many failed to mark the second part of the ballot. Voters were asked to approve the construction of the Sweetwater Creek Reservoir Project and allow the levy of ad valorem taxes. The second part of the ballot would have approved the levy of a maintenance tax.

The narrow passage of the first part of the ballot indicated the desire of the voters to see the completion of the project. The contract with Red River Authority has been approved by the voters and the next step will be to obtain the permit from the state for the construction of the dam.

The second part of the ballot would have given the Wheeler County Water Supply District financial support. The board has no money and the cost of operation falls back on the county and city councils who appointed the members. The cities of Wheeler, Shamrock and Mobeettie and Wheeler County shared the cost of the November, 1983, election, voters were asked to give the Wheeler County Water Supply District taxing power to pay RRA an undetermined amount of actual expenses they had been out on the reservoir to date. The amount was not to exceed \$300,000. The vote would also have given the local board money for operation. The Red River Authority has since voted to not seek re-embursement for these expenses. (An exact amount was never determined but could possibly be just a little over \$100,000.) Voters Saturday could have been confused and felt they were again being asked to "pay back" Red River.

The Wheeler County Water Supply District met Monday afternoon, August 13, to cavass the votes. A large crowd was in attendance at the meeting. Chairman Pete Burton told those in attendance that the agenda would not allow any action other than the canvassing of the votes. Those present were told they could write to the secretary of the board and ask to be placed on the agenda.

The next step will be for Red River Authority to give "final approval" of

the contract and proceed with the obtaining of the permit.

The "Times" had printed the date of Monday, August 13, as the the date for the permit hearing to begin in

Austin. In checking with the Texas Water Commission Tuesday it was learned that the hearing has not been placed on the calendar.

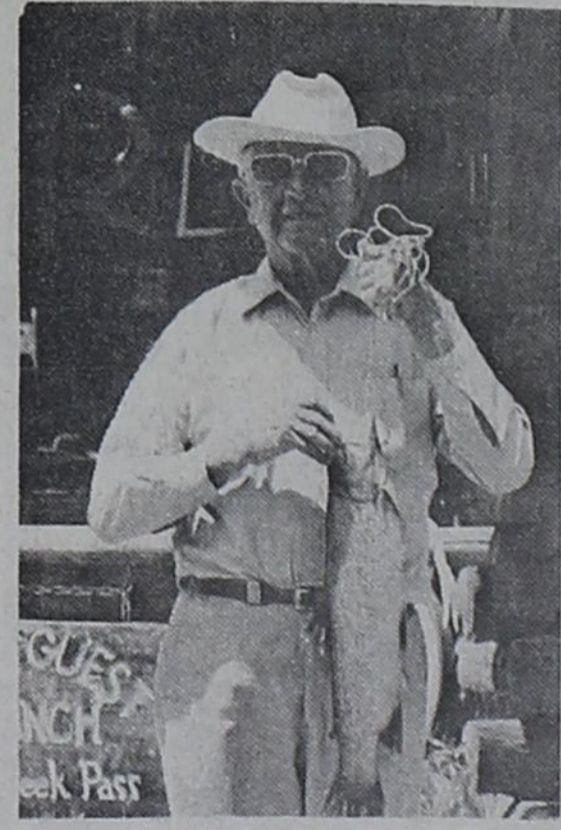

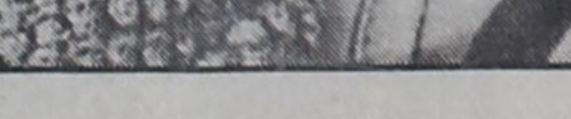

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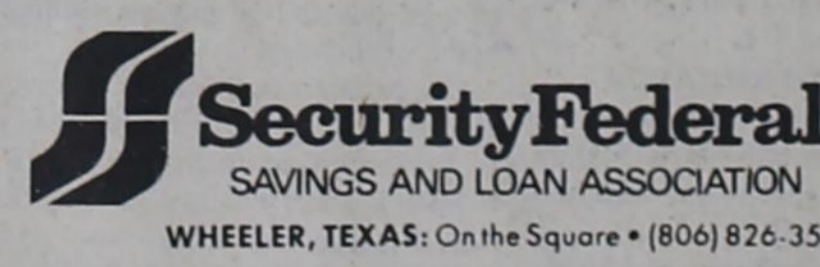

temporary line that has been set up in the plant until construction on the facilities is completed. John Parlette, Plant Manager, anticipates the buildings should be completed and most of the equipment in place within the next two weeks.

The plant, which is located 1 1/2 miles north and 1 1/2 miles west of Erick, Oklahoma, will plant, harvest, package, and market a variety of vegetables including squash, okra, redishes, cantaloupe, spinach, turnips snap green beans, and broccoli. More vegetables will be added as land becomes available. Some vegetables will be planted by Beckham Farm One and some by area farmers.

Beckham Farm One is a limited partnership backed by private investors. Two offices will be maintained: the main office in Oklahoma City which will handle the marketing, finance, and public relations; and the auxiliary office in Erick which will handle the day-to-day operations in the plant and fields. Company officials in the Oklahoma City office include Larry Sullivan, President; John Schill, Vice President-Finance; and Gerald Huaman, Vice President-Marketing. Company officials located in the Erick office are John Parlette, Vice President-Field Operations. Any questions or comments about plant operations (includes trucking and all aspects of plant work) should be directed to Mr. Parlette. Any questions or comments about the field (includes planting and harvesting) should be addressed to

Mr. Schueneman.

The plant at Beckham Farm One was constructed to handle 5,000 acres of fresh vegetables when operations reach full capacity. This year, company officials hope to contract approximately 400 acres to get the program started and next year expand to maximum acreage. The main growing season will be spring, summer, and fall. Two crops will be grown on each plot of land which should keep land and capital expenditures at a minimum; while at the same time

Whenever referrals are made, students will be checked for speech/language disorders by Mrs. Cupp. She will also survey all kindergarten students and new students.

Mrs. Cupp is a native Kansan with seven years experience in the Kansas Public Schools. Because her husband, Bob, was transferred to Texas as a driller for Slawson Oil Drilling Co., he consents to make a two-hour daily drive to and from work so that Vivian may continue her career here in Shamrock. "I am pleased to be living in Shamrock and meeting the warm, friendly residents of your community; and I am looking forward to working in the schools here and in neighboring towns", she said.

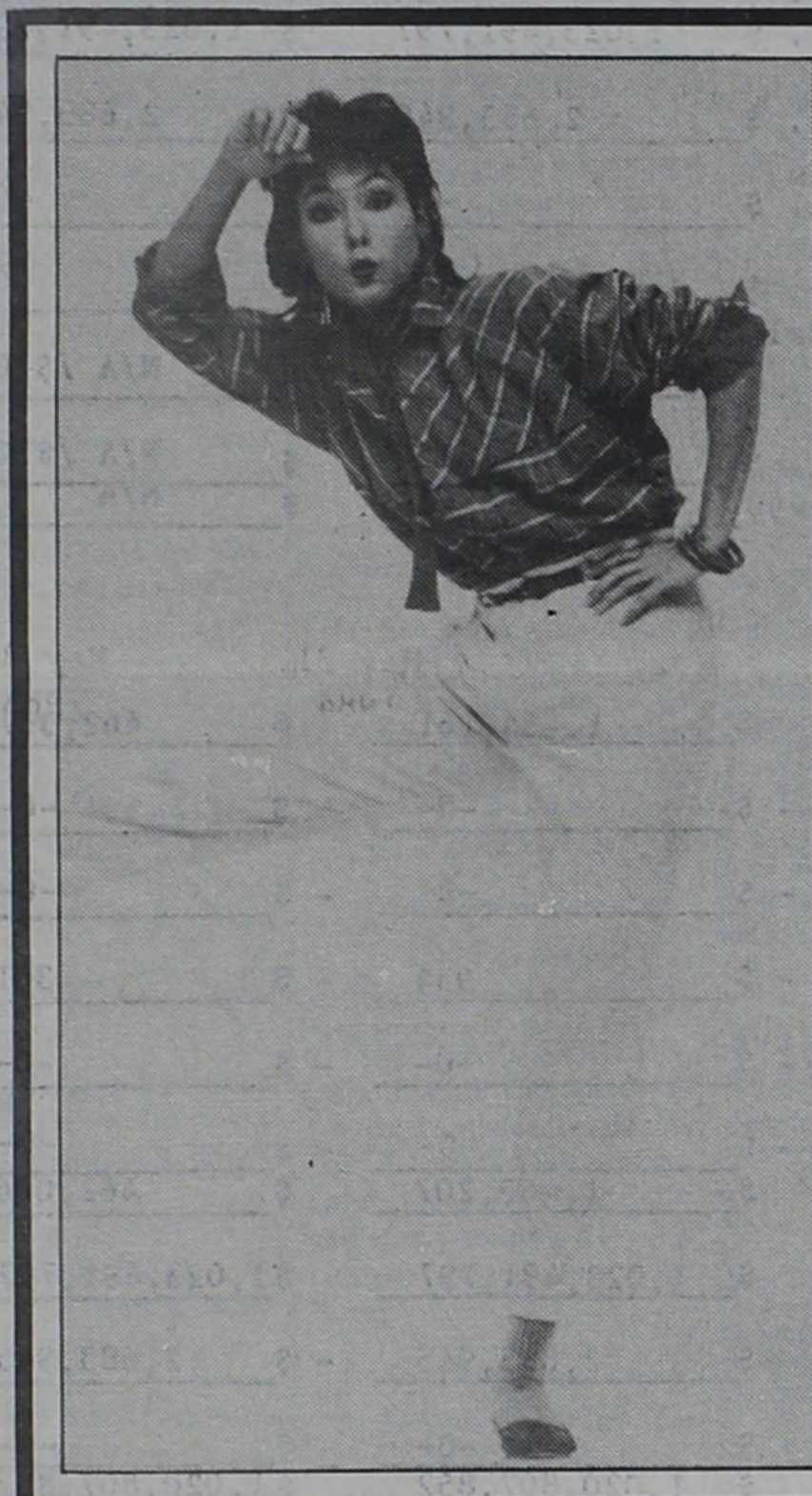

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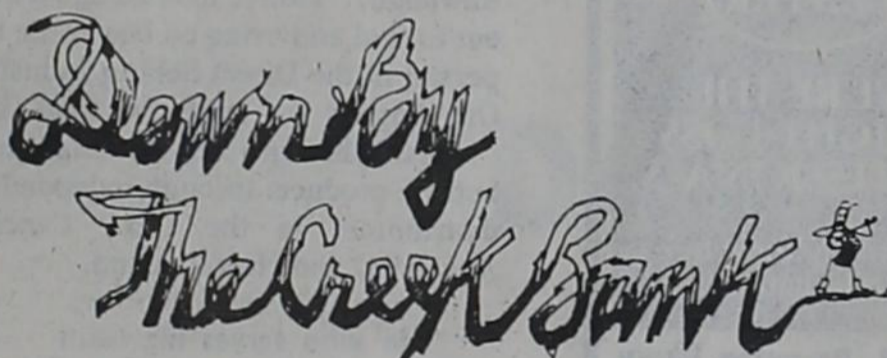

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QUICK ANSWERS TO CARPETING PROBLEMS

Shedding, sprouting, snags, shading, rippling -- these are all common carpeting problems which are explained and solved in "The Complete Book of Carpeting," a new booklet from the Du Pont Carpet Fibers Division, manufacturers of "Antron" nylon fiber.

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CURRICULUM CHANGE AT WHEELER I.S.D. GIVEN

On March 10, 1984, the new Back-to-Basics curriculum was mandated by the 67th Legislature. It is known as Chapter 75 on Curriculum of

the State Board of Education, Rule 19, Texas Amended Code. Chapter 75 mandated that the State Board prescribe 12 basic subject areas in the

curriculum and also prescribes the scope and sequence for those elements from grades K-12. Basically, it requires that every elementary student spend more time on reading, writing, and arithmetic. Electives will be cut back and it will increase the mandated courses. The new curriculum plan will dictate to teachers how many minutes a day they must instruct in each subject area. Teachers will spend class time on English, math, the Arts, physical education, health science and history.

Chapter 75 spells out that junior high students must have a minimum of 45 minutes of classtime for each subject and must receive at least 12 units of credit. Nine and a half of these are used for required courses among them computer literacy, English, math, life science, earth science, physical education, and history.

It is very important that all ninth grade students and parents know the requirement for graduation from high school. This year's freshman class will be the first to graduate under HB 246. The new curriculum bill also requires those students in grades 7 and 8 more than one year behind their grade level in reading to take a required reading improvement course and it must be taken in place of one of the electives.

At the high school level, students will have to have a minimum of 21 units to graduate. As in the elementary and junior high, these will be certain mandated courses required, depending on one of the three graduation plans the student selects.

Each student, regardless of the graduation plan, will be required to take the basic courses in English and language arts, math, science, social studies, physical education and health fine arts, and computer science. The degree of difficulty of these courses will determine the graduation plan.

Randy and Angie Fedric, brother and sister-in-law of the bride, attended the bridal couple. They each wore blue shirts coordinating with the wedding colors.

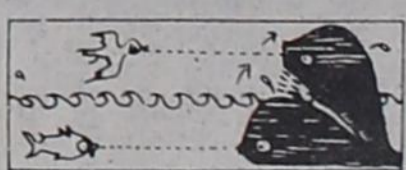
