

# Local Water District Board Holds Special Meeting

The Board of Directors of the Wheeler County Water Supply District, meeting in special session, Monday, July 23, 1984, gave approval to a contract between the District and the Red River Authority for the acquisition, construction and operation of the Sweetwater Creek Dam and reservoir Project.

Under the terms of the contract, the Authority will issue its bonds to finance the construction of the project and the District will levy an ad valorem tax to retire those bonds and the interest on the bonds as such becomes due.

The Board of Directors also ordered an election to be held on Saturday, August 11, 1984, to provide to the electorate of the County and opportunity to approve the contract and authorize the levying of the necessary ad valorem tax. The Board also took official action to grant homestead exemptions in the same amount as that granted by the County and to also grant an exemption on the first \$10,000.00 of value of property owned by persons over the age of 65 years.

In addition to the approval of the contract between the district and Red River Authority, the board is also asking approval of a maintenance tax in an amount not to exceed four and one half cents to provide the district with funds for operation during the construction phase of the project.

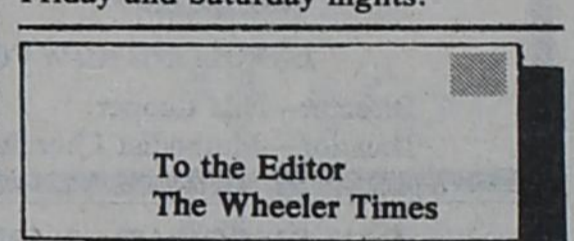
Entry in the rodeo is open to all youth who have not passed their 20th birthday before the opening day of the rodeo.

### LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

As a concerned citizen, taxpayer and voter of Wheeler County and as a former research biologist with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Waterways/Experiment Station, I have some questions and comments concerning the proposed Sweetwater Creek Dam Reservoir Project.

As a research biologist with the Waterways Experiment Station and as a student at Stephen F. Austin State University, I have participated in research conducted on 22 proposed reservoirs, most of which were very similar to the proposed Sweetwater Creek Project. I have also read and reviewed many other studies.

I would like to ask the taxpayer Wheeler County if they are ready to spend millions of our tax dollars to build a dam and reservoir which might not even fill up. In my opinion there has never been a complete flow study done on Sweetwater Creek. The last on site flow study done was in 1965. Contrary to reports by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce in the July 19 issue of the Wheeler Times, the physical characteristics of lakes, streams, and rivers can and do change drastically over a period of 20 years. I believe anyone who has been associated with the Sweetwater Creek area can tell you that the flow of the creek has changed due to damming of tributaries and siltation. I would urge each voter to drive out and look at the creek and ask themselves if the flow is capable of filling up a reservoir as large as the proposed one.

If the proposed dam were built and the reservoir filled, the lower end of the reservoir would probably have siltation problems within a few years. According to the graphs made by Freese and Nichols Inc., (1965), the area of the reservoir outside that to be excavated around the dam would average approximately 6.1 feet deep. This depth would not allow much room for siltation.

Are you willing as taxpayers of Wheeler County to spend millions of dollars to construct a dam and reservoir which may not be needed? According to the letter submitted by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce in the Wheeler Times, (July 19), the water levels are dropping each year. The tables used were taken from an eight county area, Armstrong, Carson, Donley, Gray, Oldham, Potter, Randall, and Wheeler counties. We are interested in Wheeler County. These other counties have different water needs and usage than Wheeler County. As for similar soil types, I believe a visit to the local Soil Conservation Service will contradict that the soils are alike.

The facts given by the Texas Department of Water Resources do not agree with the Chamber's letter. According to the information given by

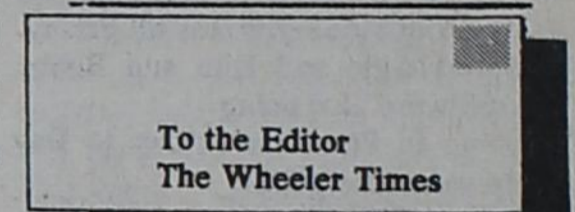

### DEAR FELLOW-CITIZEN,

There has been a question in my mind for some time pertaining to the proposed Sweetwater dam and lake controversy. In the last week as I have endeavored to get more information, my question has grown rather than diminished. In the things that have been written in the paper, information that has been sent in the mail, and what has been said in visiting with some about it, I haven't been convinced by anybody that there really is a water shortage problem. Maybe there is and maybe there isn't seems to be the thinking of some, and it there is we better make the necessary preparations to avoid a problem.

Personally, I think some of the people urging us to go for it are using scare tactics to cover their real motive for wanting it. I think some of them think that people will turn it down unless they convince them there is a danger of running out of water. It looks like we would have already been having the city caution us about using too much water on our lawns if it was as critical as some say it is.

Let me make it clear that I do not know whether we have a water shortage problem or not. Those who say we do haven't been convincing as far as I personally am concerned. Neither do I know for sure that scare tactics are being used to cover the true motives of some. These are just some thoughts I have on the matter, but my main concern has to do with my lingering question-Aren't we going to be facing a drive to make our town wet because of the popularity of alcoholic beverages at lakes, if we vote to get this project? I don't think there would be any question about it because we would be told how it would boost the economy of Wheeler. Some people, sad to say, are always more concerned about more money than they are about honoring God.

Surely, I don't have to produce the statistics or the Scriptures (both of which I am able to give) about the horrible results of alcohol in people's lives. If you have ever been close to a situation where a home was broken of lives on the highway were snuffed out by drunkenness, you probably hate booze as much as I do.

If my observations are "off the mark" and without merit, I invite a response to counter them. However, if they are justified, I think it is wrong to refrain from bringing this matter up now. Some of us, including a lot of the Senior Citizens who are being alarmed, by the talk of shortage, would rather not face a hot issue over alcohol in the days ahead if we can do something now to avoid it happening.

I am certainly all in favor of water. However, I would want just water, not water and booze. If they both are going to come as a package deal, I am against the dam.

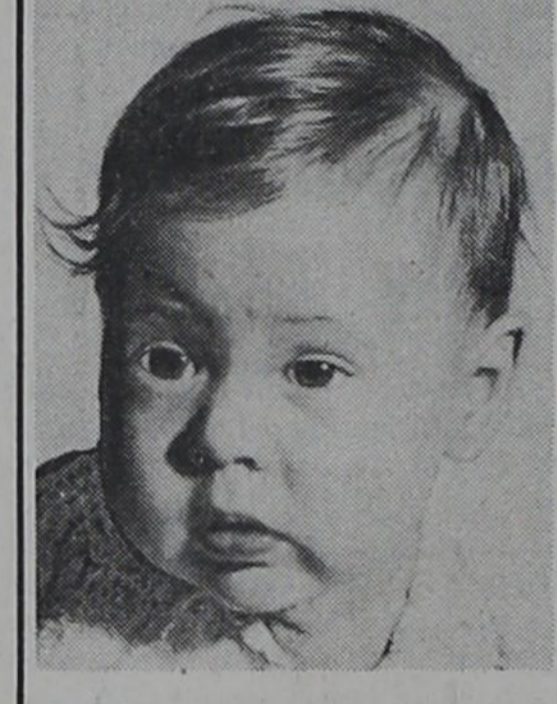

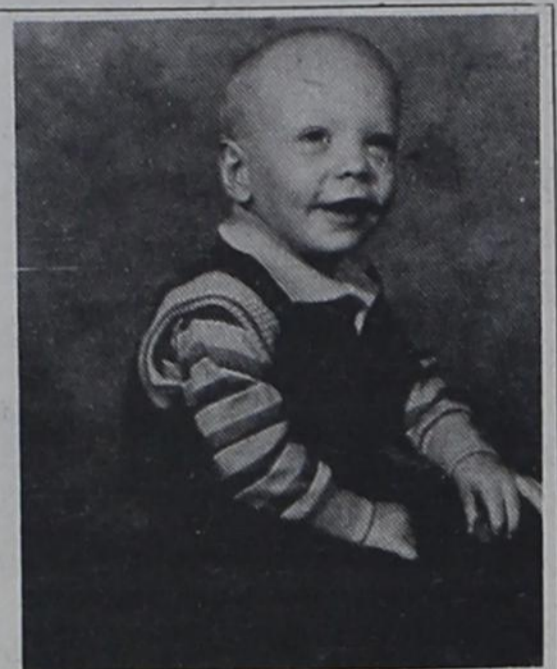

**HOW TO KEEP BRASS BEAUTIFUL**  
Despite its need for constant cleaning, most of us enjoy the rich

golden color of brass in hardware, lighting fixtures and furnishings. With little time to clean, however, it's important to prolong the effect of a polishing job and to keep brass looking good.

Solid brass is a fairly durable alloy of copper and zinc, while brass can take much harsher cleaning than plated brass. Use a magnet to test for

plating, a magnet will stick to the steel beneath plated brass, but not to solid brass.

Tarnish tends to darken with time, so it you want to see detail or have a lighter look in your brass, polishing is necessary.

First remove the old protective coating. Brass is usually sealed with clear lacquer, varnish or epoxy. Where the coating nicks or wears

away, it tarnishes from oxidation.

Since you typically won't know which sealer was used, experiment. Chemical strippers or acetone (nail polish remover) may do the trick. Wear rubber gloves, work in a well-ventilated area and use very fine steel wool (0000) to remove the coating without scratching the brass. Traces of residue left by the stripper should be removed with detergent and water.

For less harsh lacquer removal, make a bath from household products. Dismantle the piece before soaking in a mixture of the following:

- \* 1 part amonia to 2 parts hot water, or
- \* 1 part vinegar to 2 parts hot water,

- or
- \* 4 tablespoons baking soda to one quart boiling water.

For polishing solid brass, you can use a commercial brass cleaner in liquid or paste form. Liquid cleaners containing a very fine abrasive do a good job on the tarnish, but may leave residue in joints of carved areas if not completely removed. Both types of cleaner require elbow grease where tarnish is heavy.

Brass polish can damage wood finishes. So when cleaning brass hardware place, tape light cardboard snugly around it to protect the wood

underneath.  
Apply all polishes with a soft cloth in one direction, either along the length of the piece or in the direction in which it's been turned. Continue to polish with clean parts of the cloth so tarnish won't be rubbed back into the brass.

Homemade concoctions of ammonia, lemon, or a mixture of vinegar and salt will also remove tarnish. Submerge and soak the piece, then work with 0000 steel wool. When the tarnish is completely removed, polish with a soft cloth and a fine polish.

Brass plating is usually coated with a clear protective sealer which must be removed. The same stripping solutions for solid brass can be used on brass plating, they don't contain abrasives.

Since the thin coating of brass is easily removed from plated brass, don't buff, use vinegar and lemon, or use abrasives, like steel wool. Many mild commercial polishes may work on brass plating, but do a test patch when using anything stronger than detergent and water.

Use tung oil, commercial brass wax or lacquer to prolong and protect the polishing job. First make sure the brass is clean and free of fingerprints, polishing compounds and other substances. Since fingerprints will show up under the finish, wear rubber gloves when handling the piece. Use lacquer thinner to remove traces of polish and greasy fingerprints.

To apply a tung oil finish, place the brass in a 150 degree oven for 20 minutes before applying the oil with a soft cloth. Let the piece dry at least four hours. Apply commercial brass wax the same way.

Lacquer can diminish the brilliance of brass, but it may be worth the sacrifice to protect it. Brass may be either dipped or sprayed with lacquer. Do the job on a clean day when humidity is low. Speed up drying time by warming the piece with a lamp or hair dryer before lacquering.

For lacquer dipping, make a 50-50 solution of lacquer and thinner. Dip the brass, hang, and let it dry five to 15 minutes. Once you have lacquered a piece, avoid brass polish or ammonia-based cleaners. Instead, clean with a mild detergent, rinse, wipe dry and take a break from polishing.

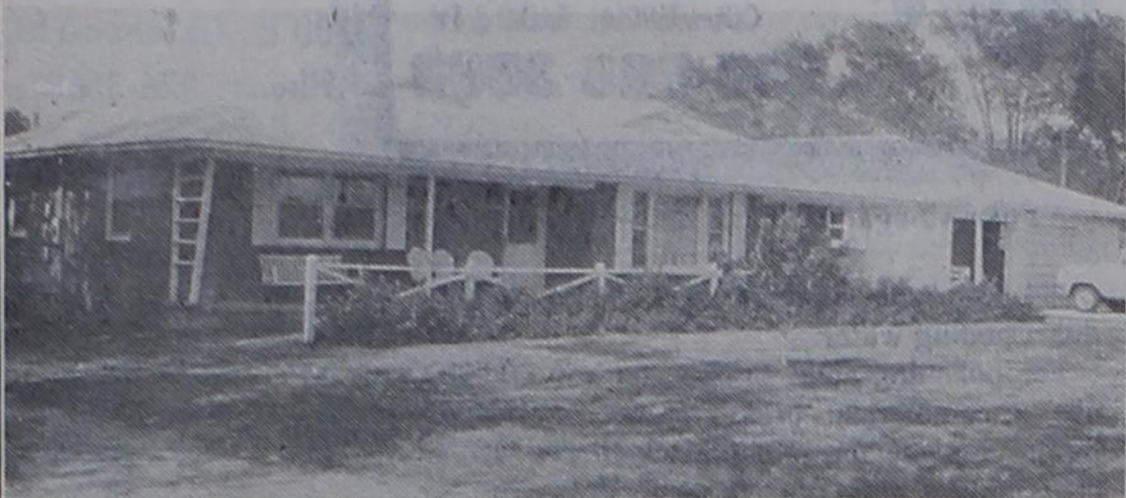

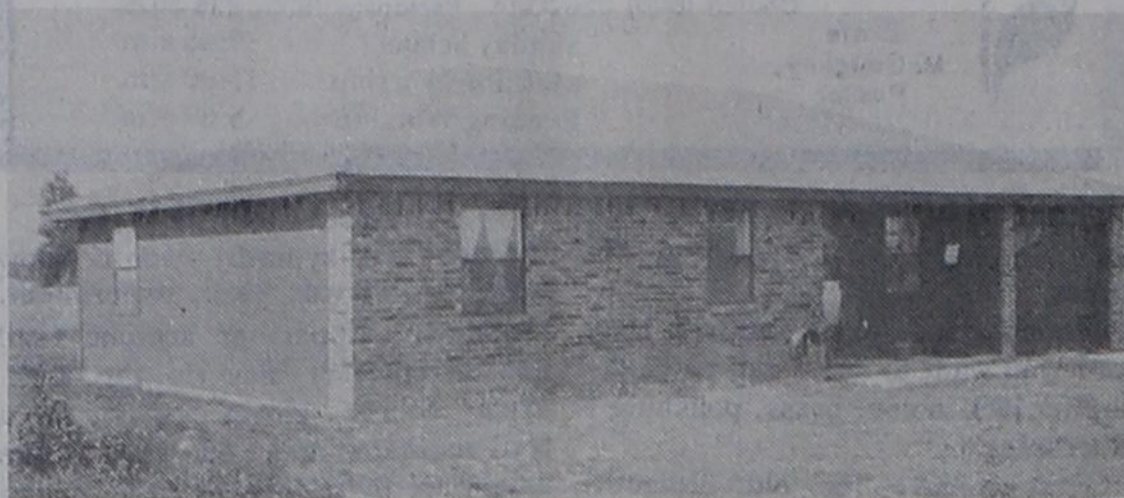

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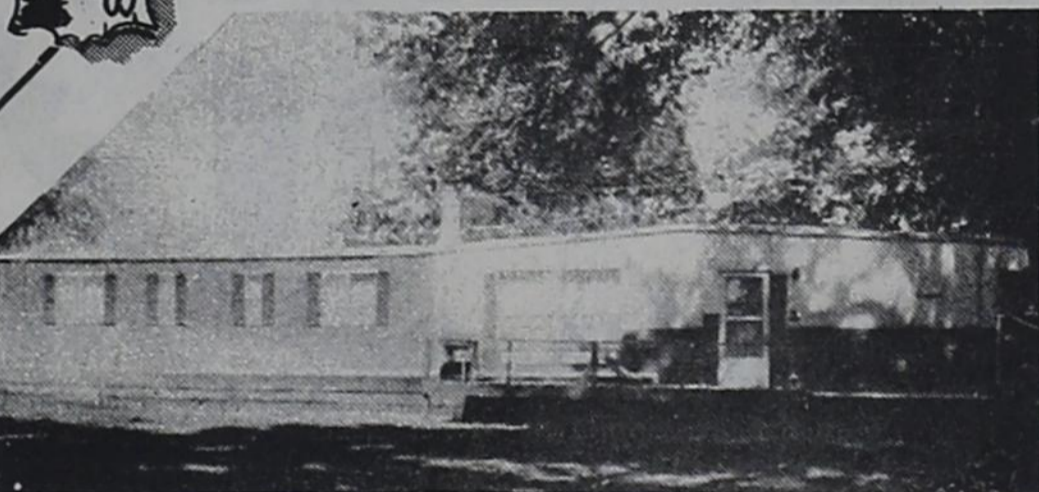

#### Grievance Procedure—Revenue Sharing Funds

The following instrument was executed by te Court:  
Grievance Procedure — Federal Revenue Sharing Funds

As the result of recently published regulations by the Federal Government the following suggested procedure is hereby submitted to the Wheeler County Commissioners Court for its consideration:

Under the provisions of Public Law 92-512, "State and Local Financial Assistance Act of 1972 (Federal Revenue Sharing), as amended, and specifically Subpart "E", Sections 51.50 through 51.70, the following procedure will be observed in the handling of any complaint alleging discrimination by Wheeler County, Texas.

Formal, written complaint alleging discrimination is to be filed with the County Judge, Wheeler County, Box 486, Wheeler, Texas 79096.

Complaint must cite specific section of Subpart "E" under which discrimination is alleged.

Complaint must cite day and date of such discrimination, individual, program or service involved in alleged discrimination together with circumstances alleged to have resulted in discrimination.

Upon receipt of such complaint, the County Judge will conduct an investigation into the allegation. Such investigation will include the interviewing and taking of testimony from persons involved or having knowledge of circumstances contained within the complaint.

The County Judge will submit to the Commissioners Court the results of his investigation and recommend to the Commissioners Court action to be taken in the matter.

The Commissioners Court either approves the recommendation of the County Judge or determines that further investigation is needed.

In the event it is decided that the matter should be investigated further, a committee is appointed by or from the Commissioners Court to conduct such further investigation. The Commissioners Court may act as a "Committee of the Whole" and conduct its own investigation.

Upon completion of its investigation, the committee submits its findings and recommendation to the Commissioners Court.

The Commissioners Court then makes final decision and the aggrieved is notified of such decision.

If the complainant is not satisfied with the decision of the Commissioners Court, the right of appeal to the Courts or to the appropriate Federal Agency is available.

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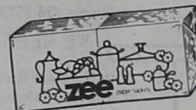

**4-H -- An American Invention**

An American invention, the 4-H program of the Cooperative Extension Service, originated near the beginning of the 20th century as a result of a vital need to improve life in rural areas.

In 1914 the Smith-Lever Act established the Cooperative Extension Service, an organizational entity of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the land-grant college system. Created by this act and subsequent legislation to conduct educational programs of an "informal, non-resident, problem-oriented nature", the Cooperative Extension Service provided the professional staff and support needed to direct the growth of the early 4-H program.

Today's 4-H program involves youth as the primary audience and adults and teens as volunteer leaders.

No single Cooperative Extension Service program is more widely known or recognized than 4-H. The technique of organizing boys and girls into clubs through which Extension programs could help youth learn practical knowledge and skills in agriculture, home economics, and related areas was one of the early innovations in education -- and it succeeded admirably.

4-H projects, strictly rural in the early days, have now been diversified to appeal to boys and girls in urban areas as well. They stimulate adults to apply new knowledge and often lead to a closer sense of partnership between parents and their children.

4-H clubs give identity to learning activities, enhance personal development through project work, establish a formal vehicle for involvement of adults, and develop an esprit de corps of great significance. Many clubs today join together in constructive community projects.

4-H clubs are open to all youth ages 9 to 19 without regard to socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

In addition to clubs, 4-H uses many other means of meeting the needs of today's youth. Learning opportunities are provided through informal groups,

A total of 4,073 students earned recognition on academic honor rolls at Oklahoma State University during the spring 1984 semester.

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**TEXAS GARDENER TIPS**

Knowing how to identify and control stink bugs, one of Texas' most common garden pests, can help ensure a healthy and productive vegetable garden.

Stink bugs are recognized by their broad, shield shape and by the disagreeable odor which they emit when disturbed. Adult stink bugs are about one-half inch in length and their color varies with the species. Some are green, some brown and others are marked with striking color patterns.

Stink bugs attack many vegetable and fruit crops, causing damage when they insert their piercing, sucking mouthparts into the plant tissue and suck out the juices.

Stink bug damage varies with different plants, but the general damage is the same. Symptoms among some of our most popular crops are:

**Peaches** develop a condition

**How To Identify And Control Stinkbugs**



**Tomatoes** attacked by stink bugs have small yellowish spots when they ripen. The flesh under these spots is hard and lumpy.

**Beans and peas** attacked by stink bugs show a small spot on the pods where the insect's mouthparts entered. The seeds either don't develop or have discolored spots on them.

**Okra and squash** often have a wilted appearance when attacked by stink bugs. Small fruit often drop off. Controlling stink bugs in the

home garden may be difficult. First, the bugs often quickly reinfest a garden after it's been treated. Second, stink bug damage can appear to be increasing, even though the pests have been controlled, because visible signs of damage increase as the plants continue to grow.

For best results, inspect your garden frequently. When stink bugs are found, an approved pesticide should be applied, with a reapplication made in five to seven days if the infestation persists. Effective chemicals cleared for use on most fruit and garden vegetables include Carbaryl (Sevin®), Malathion, and Naled (Dibrom®). Use only approved insecticides and follow all directions and precautions on the label.
