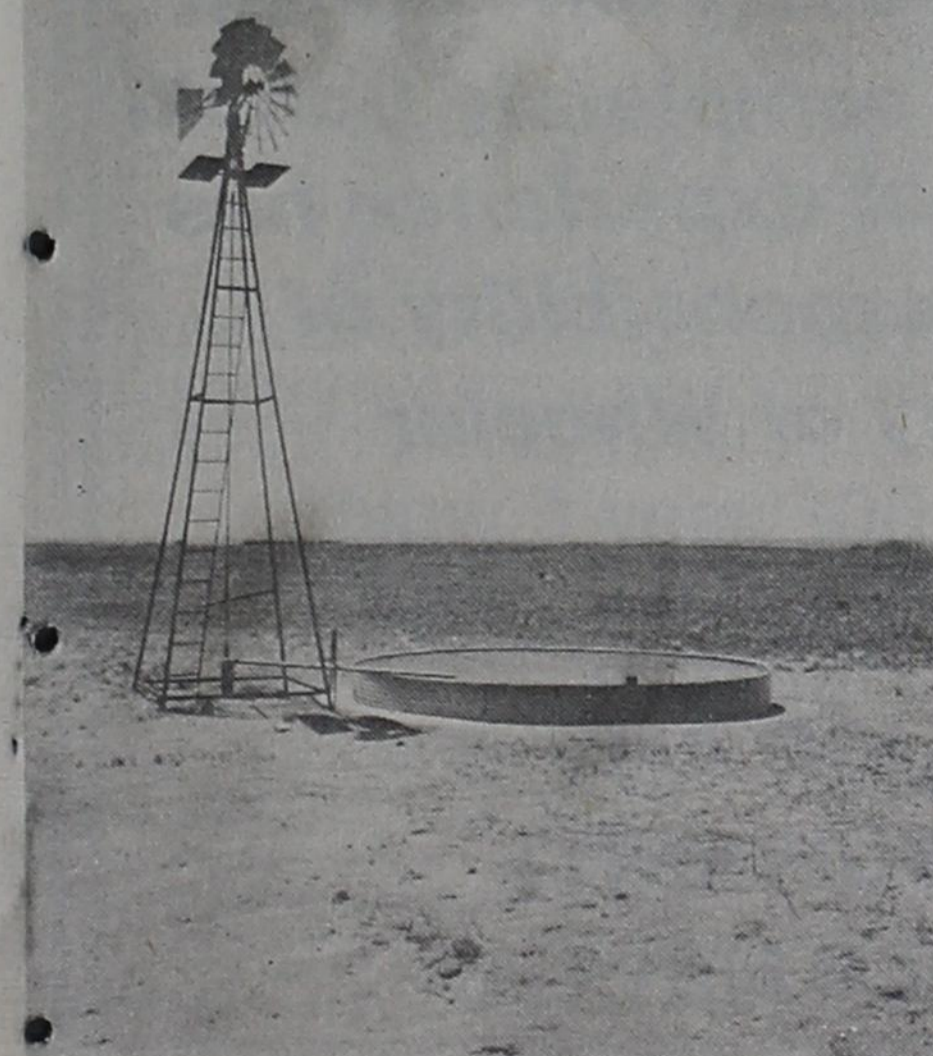
FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY

RABIES CLINIC IS SET SATURDAY, JUNE 9, ALL DOGS AND CATS MUST BE VACCINATED

The City of Wheeler will sponsor a Rabies clinic Saturday, June 9 at the Fire Station. The station is located behind the city office. At this time dog licenses will be on sale by the city; the clinic will be from 2 to 4:00 in the afternoon.

A state law, HB 1323 passed in 1979, requires all dogs and cats be vaccinated against rabies. The law reads: "The owner of each dog or cat shall have the dog or cat vaccinated against rabies by the time the dog or cat is four months of age or at regular intervals thereafter."

The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year. Offered at the clinic for dogs will be rabies, distemper and parvo. Offered for cats will be rabies and feline distemper. All vaccinations will be at a reduced price.

The licenses will cost \$1.00 for males and spayed females and \$2.00 for females.

For those people who have had their dogs vaccinated, but have not purchased a license, it will be necessary to take the animal and proof of vaccination to the clinic to obtain the dog license. All dogs in the City limits are required to be licensed.

Area citizens are urged to bring their animals in at this time to be vaccinated against rabies.

For those owners who are unable to bring their pets to the clinic, call 826-5821 between 8:30 and noon for an appointment to have the animal vaccinated.

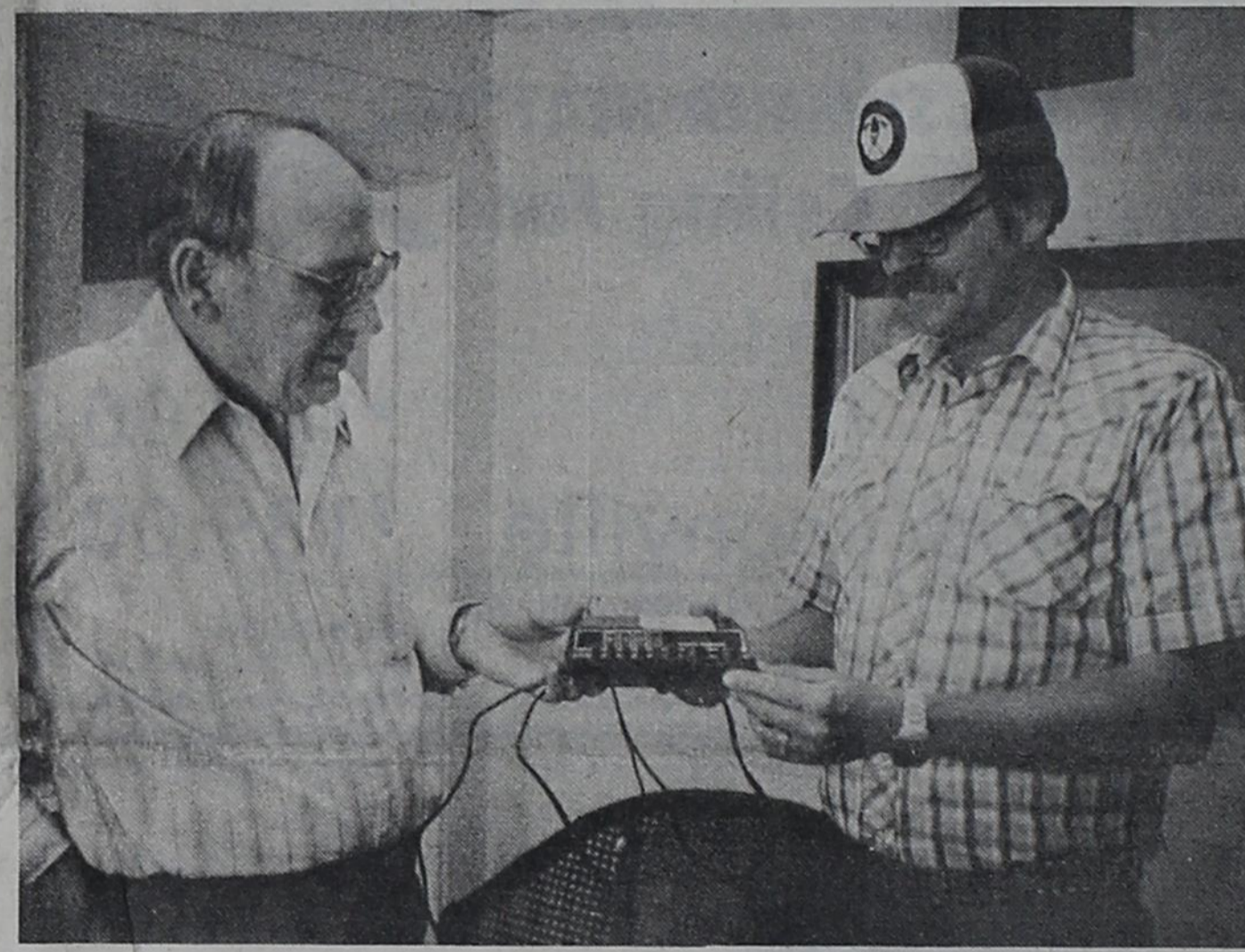
RIDING CLUB

All citizens are urged to be alert for severe weather.

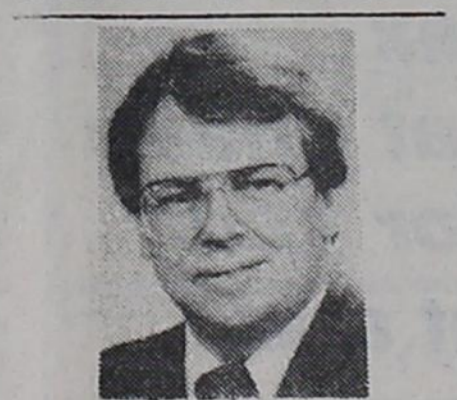

The kitchen was always the heart of our home. In the home where I grew up, and later in my own home.

The day started when Dad got the fire started in the cook stove in the kitchen. The older children grabbed the milkpails and headed for the cowpen to do the milking before breakfast. Mom and Dad went to the cook table and worked side by side fixing breakfast. One put the coffee on while the other fixed the oatmeal. Then Mom made a huge pan of biscuits, while Dad sliced home-cured bacon or homemade sausage. They always worked together cooking breakfast, except every few months Dad fixed pancakes or flapjacks as he called them, and made brown sugar syrup. This was a very special treat for everyone.

I still remember the good warm feeling as I set the table while Dad and Mom fixed breakfast. It was always my job to set the breakfast table, as soon as I was large enough to carry a plate and get it on the table.

Sis and I sang most of the time as we did the dishes after a meal. Mom was usually singing along with us as she put the milk away or stayed were the proud parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Forrester and Jeff's maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Neill of Athens, Texas.

After the evening meal, Dad and Mom always retired to the living room to read the daily paper. I guess they always got a daily paper. I can't remember them not getting one, yet someone had to walk a couple of miles to the mailbox to get it.

We children loved the kitchen so that was where we stayed, even after the supper dishes were put away. Some of the greatest times I remember were turning the lamp real low and telling ghost stories in the kitchen. Mom and Dad were in the next room, but it seemed they were in the next world as our stories got scarier and scarier. We usually got so scared we were afraid to move, and once, just as we got to this stage, a cat jumped on the screendoor with a loud meow. We all ran screaming to Daddy. They got a good laugh from that.

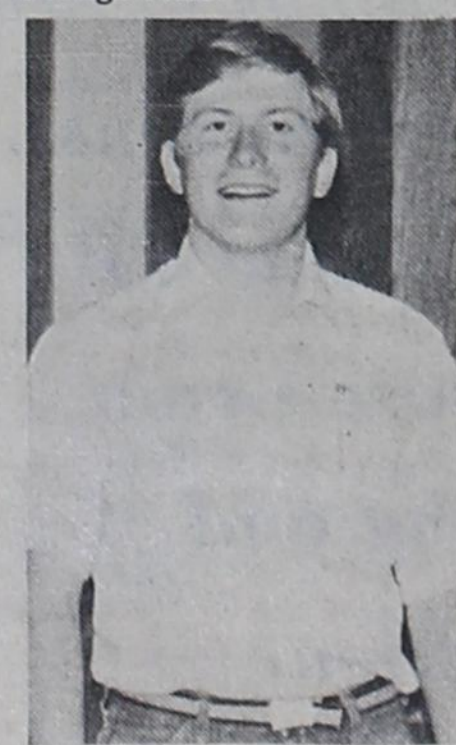

backed into the churn half full of buttermilk. Over the churn went and splash! Right in the middle of all that milk I sat. What a mess! We had to stop the dishwashing to scrub the kitchen floor as well as myself. We decided that game wasn't such a good idea and never tried that game again. But, oh, the laughs we've had remembering it since.

Most every Saturday, we kids were kept busy carrying coal scuttles full of coal to the kitchen. Also, buckets of water. Water was heated to the boiling point on the cook stove and we all got our hair washed. This was done in the kitchen with homemade lye soap. Of course, we had to have plenty of cool water so it didn't take so much hot water. We had to draw water from the well.

In the afternoon, the number three wash tub was brought in the kitchen and used for our bath tub. You were either scalded or frozen in those weekly baths. It was so much nicer in the summer time. We could just go swimming in the creek with the frogs, tadpoles, crawdads and wiggletails.

We also had to have hot water and plenty of lye soap to scrub the kitchen floor on Saturday. We just poured the hot soapy water a little at a time on the floor and scrubbed it with a broom. Then rinsed it with warm clean water. It was hard to keep those pine wood floors nice and clean. There were always lots of quick clean ups through the week. The big scrub job was on Saturday. Then if company came on Sunday the floors were nice and fresh.

We children always went barefoot in the warm summer months. It was nothing unusual to get a splinter in your foot from those fresh scrubbed floors. Then Dad got his sticker-picking knife and sat us on the kitchen floor and picked it out.

I can still remember that little sticker-pickin knife. Dad made it years before he had children of his own. Lots of tears were shed as the sticker was picked out if it was deep. Mom was often called into service to help keep a crying child still.

After I married and had my own family, when we went home to Mom and Dad's for a visit, we all spent more time in the kitchen than anywhere else.

When our first child was a toddler, we were at Mom's late one evening. Everyone was in the kitchen as usual. Mom was making biscuits for supper. The baby was just outside the kitchen door playing with the cat. Mom took a little wad of biscuit dough and dropped it on the doorstep for the cat. Before the cat could get it, the baby started in the house. He stepped in the dough and it squashed up between his toes. Very carefully, he came creeping across the kitchen to me, never letting his toes touch the floor. Those big innocent brown eyes looked up at me as he said, "Mother, I've been in the cowpen". Everyone laughed until they cried. The poor little baby didn't know why everyone was laughing. He did know what it felt like between his toes.

My own children were always in the kitchen with me as they were growing up. Their Daddy was on the floor with them a lot of the time especially in bad weather, teaching them to build things with their tinker toys or blocks. I was known to be on the floor with them for a good family game of marbles on cold winter days, or at the kitchen table playing dominoes with them. All our children could play dominoes before they started to school.

I don't know if my own youngsters snatched bites of sugar or not, but I do know they all loved cookie dough. I let them get by with snitching a few bites of dough just as Mom did me with bites of sugar. It didn't matter the happiness in my kitchen was what counted anyway.

Time moves so fast, its soon grandkids playing on my kitchen floor. Their parents gathered around, everyone laughing and talking at once. Amid all this confusion, my husband is sitting alone in a corner beaming proudly at the whole gang. I catch an inviting look in his eyes, so I go quickly across the room and sit on his knees. A tender smile, warm loving arms holding me close for a moment.

FED CATTLE SURVEY

More than four and one-half million cattle moved through feedlots in Southwestern Public Service Company's (SPS) service territory in 1983, the company's latest annual Fed Cattle Survey shows.

SPS serves a 700,000-square mile area in parts of the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern Kansas. The area last year produced 4,575, 821 fed cattle, 6% more than in 1982.

SPS surveyed 111 feedlots in the four states; 96 of the feedlots have a capacity of more than 5,000 head. Total capacity of the feedlots in 1983, 2,494,000 head, was down slightly from total capacity in 1982, when lots could carry 2,516,000 head.

The number of cattle slaughtered at packing plants in the SPS service area in 1983, 4,721,699, was 713,621 head higher than slaughtered in 1982, said Seth Thomason, SPS manager, agricultural and industrial power. There are 16 beef packing plants in the SPS service area, he said, with an annual slaughter capability of 4,942,813 head. "Requests for this survey come from all across the nation," Thomason said. "It's an excellent way for our kingdom, the heart of our

us to tell others about our area's capabilities in the beef industry, and it helps stimulate the area economy and create new jobs."

The survey lists each feedlot in the SPS area, and the lot capacities and number of cattle fed, by counties. Three counties in New Mexico, three in Oklahoma, and 27 in Texas are listed.

Charts of the capacity of feedlots, number of feedlots surveyed, number of feedlots custom feeding, and number of feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or more, are included in the report.

Copies of the report and survey are available at Southwestern Public Service Co. offices.

SPS also has produced a wall poster-map showing locations of all the major cattle feedlots and packing plants in the four-state area. The poster-map, about 23 inches by 27 inches, is suitable for framing. Similar maps were issued by SPS in 1976 and 1982. They have been used by bankers, ranchers and farmers, trucking companies, and feedlots and packing plants, government officials and others with a vital interest in the feed cattle industry, Thomason said.

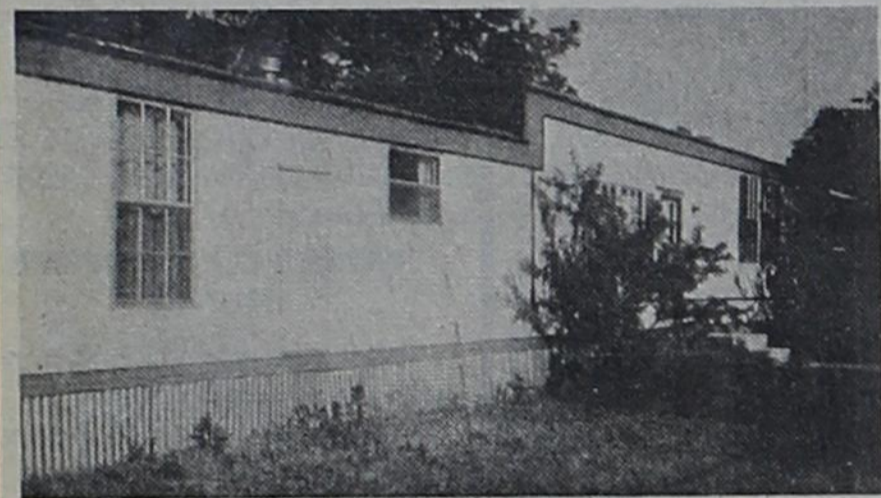

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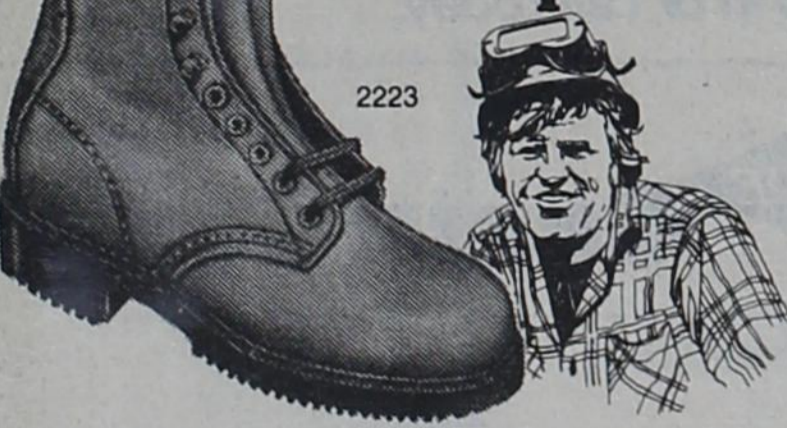
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TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Fertilize Your Tomatoes Underground For Big Yields

Whether you have already transplanted your tomatoes, peppers, and eggplants, or you are just thinking about it, you should start thinking about the best way to fertilize these plants for the best production.

Your transplants should be set at least 3 feet apart on raised beds in normal-to-high rainfall areas of Texas. In West Texas and arid areas where soil drains and dries quickly, plant on level beds. Immediately after transplanting, or as soon after as you can, place containers with several holes for drainage midway between the plants.

The containers can be planting pots, coffee cans,

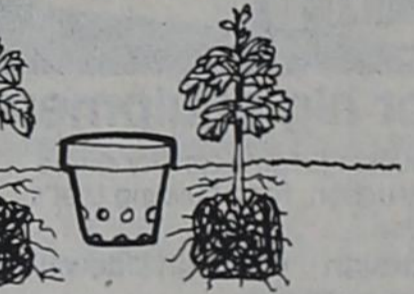
or plastic milk jugs with the tops cut off and holes poked in the bottoms. The lip of the containers should be aboveground.



When your plants first start setting tiny fruit, apply 1 to 2 level tablespoons of a general garden fertilizer or a nitrogen fertilizer, like ammonium sulfate, in each container. Fill the containers with water and allow the nutrient-rich solution to soak in. Refill the containers several times with water

to give the fertilizer a good chance to dissolve and move into the soil.

You are supplying nutrients more directly to



the roots of your plants using this method of fertilizing. Repeat the fertilizer application every 7 to 10 days.

This method will generally supply sufficient fertility to maintain good fruit size, high quality, and big yields throughout the harvest season.

Buffalograss: A Native, Low-Maintenance Turf

Want a yard you never need to mow, water, or fertilize? Though this may sound impossible, there is a grass that comes close to making this dream a reality.

No, it's not a new genetically-engineered grass bred in a laboratory. This wonder grass is none other than buffalograss, a native turfgrass that evolved on the prairie grasslands of North America, and which is gaining popularity for use around the home.

Because buffalograss is a native plant, it has evolved under the Texas conditions of hot, dry summers and cold, freezing winters. This means it will survive in your yard no matter what the weather, although it will not tolerate

any shade.

Buffalograss is not the same dark green color as the more typical lawn grasses. It is a little lighter green in color with a bit of a blue cast to it. The leaf blades are fairly narrow, so the turf takes on an airy appearance if not mowed.

Buffalograss is established from seed. It should be sown during the same period that Bermuda grass is seeded, which is from about April 15 to Sept. 1 in North Texas, with sowing starting a few weeks earlier in the spring and continuing

a few weeks later in the fall in southern Texas.

Because buffalograss seed is generally expensive, the seeding rate that is suggested will not produce enough plants to create a dense lawn right away. The grass's ability to spread by runners will fill in the gaps, however. Since the seed is hard and is generally slow in germinating, try to use seed that has been treated with a fungicide.

While buffalograss will survive in most sunny locations completely without any fertilizer or irrigation, a timely minimal application of either should produce a denser stand.

Water should only be applied when there is a danger of the grass turning

brown, which it does as a survival technique to make it through long hot dry periods. It is not dead and will quickly green up again when watered.

Since buffalograss does not usually grow over 4 or 5 inches high, you won't have to mow it at all. Should you decide to mow it, however, never cut it lower than 2 inches.
