Negotiations Under Way on Highway 84

The proposed widening of Highway 84, west, is reported to be drawing nearer in so far as the county is concerned. Of the 70 parcels of right-of-way involved in this project, all 70 have been approved by the County and sent to the State Highway Department for their approval of the valuations.

Of the 70 sent to the State, 38 have been returned by the State, approved, and of these 38, eight have been bought and the deeds signed. Negotiations on the remaining 30 are now underway by Judge Williams.

Judge Williams reported that it can not be determined just when the actual construction of the new highway will begin, as the right-of-way has to be purchased and cleared before a request can be sent into the State for funds for the construction.

The state uses a two-part program in proposing a new highway. First, funds are appropriated to pay for one-half the cost of the right-of-way, and then when it is purchased and cleared, application is made for the funds to construct the highway, the state paying 100 per cent of this.

According to Judge Williams, condemnation proceedings will be started in cases where negotiations fail, as soon as they fail, along with the negotiations to acquire other parcels.

The clearing of the right-of-way will begin on the purchased property soon after the deed is signed and bids are opened by the State. Improvements on this land can be bought by the public by submitting sealed bids on the improvements.

Led by a local SCS supervisor, the group visited and talked with Mr. Ronnie Ethridge on the Ethridge farm and Mr. Killingsworth on Mrs. Earl Darsey's farm on the advantages and disadvantages of the system.

The group also viewed several other irrigation systems in the county.

Cover Crops are For Your Advantage

"The dust won't blow this year," Man, don't you wish you could make that statement and mean it.

Well, you can bet your boots that the dust will blow this year, but there is a way to keep more of it on the ground. And that is by the use of cover crops during the winter and spring months.

Most farmers are sold on the use of cover crops as recommended by the SCS, Soil Conservation Service, and the majority of the farmers within the Blackwater Soil Conservation District plant Rye as a cover crop. The Rye is either drilled between the rows of low residue crops, (such as cotton or sesame), or seeded with a cyclone type seeder mounted on the front of the tractor with the cultivator. This seeding is usually done before the last cultivation and before the last watering. The Rye is watered up and is established before the crop is harvested. The Rye will not have attained enough growth to interfere with cotton strippers.

Rye is used as a cover crop most of the time, but Wheat and Barley are also used.

Some of the farmers who are now using cover crops in the Blackwater Valley SCD are Jr. Sutton, Gene Hamilton, and Joe McMaken. If you have any questions, either bring them to some of our neighbors who are using cover crops.

The purpose of a cover crop is to protect the soil from wind erosion during periods when major crops do not provide adequate cover, and to maintain or improve the physical, chemical,

soil. The cover crop can be killed when the land is put up in the spring by using sweeps, or turned under as green manure. This is usually done about April fool's day.

The use of cover crops can keep the first one to two inches of top soil on your land. Green manure crops are also used as cover crops, but green manuring is not effective in regions of less than 20 inches of annual rainfall. The average for Bailey County is about 17.44 inches. For this reason, Rye is chosen for a cover crop.

Besides keeping the land in place, cover crops prevent leaching of nitrogen and potassium and possibly other elements from the soils. Studies throughout the U. S. have shown that losses ADD TO PAGE ONE COVER CROP from leaching are reduced greatly by soil cover, especially on soils that are light and sandy. Cover crops also increase the rate at which water filters into soils. The leaves and stems catch the rain and the roots provide channels for the water to enter the soil. Improved penetration of waters does not mean, however, that more nutrients would leach away. The growing cover crop would absorb the nutrients and store them until it is turned in the spring.

Another feature that is important of cover cropping is that the ground will not freeze as deep when the water content of the soil is high and when there is a cover of vegetation on the land — therefore, the land will warm up earlier in the spring. This is especially important to cotton as all the farmers know who tried to plant early this year.

Tomatoes Ready To Ship

Ernest Locker, and his son, Ray, who are raising 120 acres of tomatoes this year, their 5th year, will be shipping their products sometime this week.

Their fields, 60 acres at the City Airport and 60 acres, one mile south of Progress, are bearing this product to top capacity.

Last year, Locker reported that his yield was about 22 tons per acre, and that this year's crop looked as though it would top that.

About Wednesday, trucks will begin to load off of the tomatoes at the airport, loading the ripe tomatoes to be shipped to the Arkansas area through the Smiting Bros. of Springdale, Ark.

The white ripe and pink tomatoes will be shipped to various cities in Texas and Oklahoma for immediate sale the morning after shipping from the local fields. The pink and white ripe tomatoes will account for about 9 per cent of the tomatoes shipped. Locker is the President of Bailey County Electric Co-op.

Early Testing Advised for Soil

Soil testing should be now in preparation for fall planting, reports Dr. Charles D. Welch, soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Early soil sampling is encouraged to avoid the fall rush that crowds the state's three testing laboratories. Samples now being received are mostly from pastures, small grain plots, lawns and flower beds, says Welch.

A total of 19,477 samples were received at the laboratories from January 1 through June 30 this year, compared with 13,191 samples for the same period last year. The soil testing laboratory at Texas A&M University received 9,349 of these samples compared with 7,248 last year, Welch points out.

As expected, a significant increase in tons of fertilizer applied has accompanied this increase in the number of samples tested explains the chemist. Established legume pastures are among the crops that will need fertilization this fall, the chemist points out. An increasing number of acres are being seeded to vetch, Crimson and White (See TESTING, Page 4)

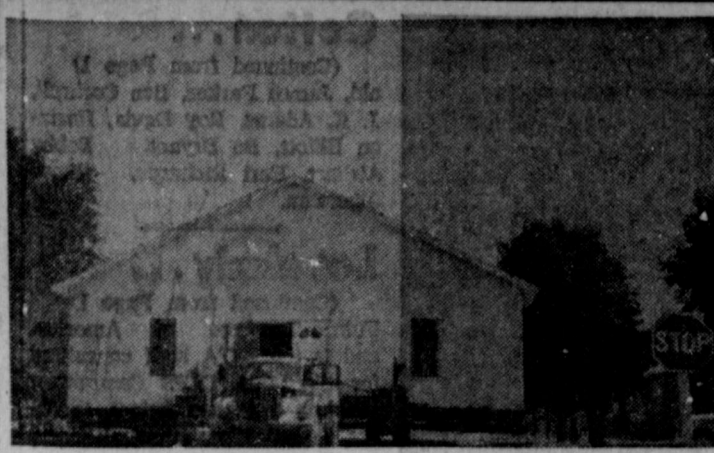

Liming is of special importance to East Texas and Coast Prairie farmers, reports the chemist. He says that three-fourths of the East Texas soils and one-half of the eastern Coast Prairie soils need lime, and it should be applied soon for fall plantings.

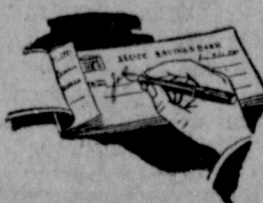

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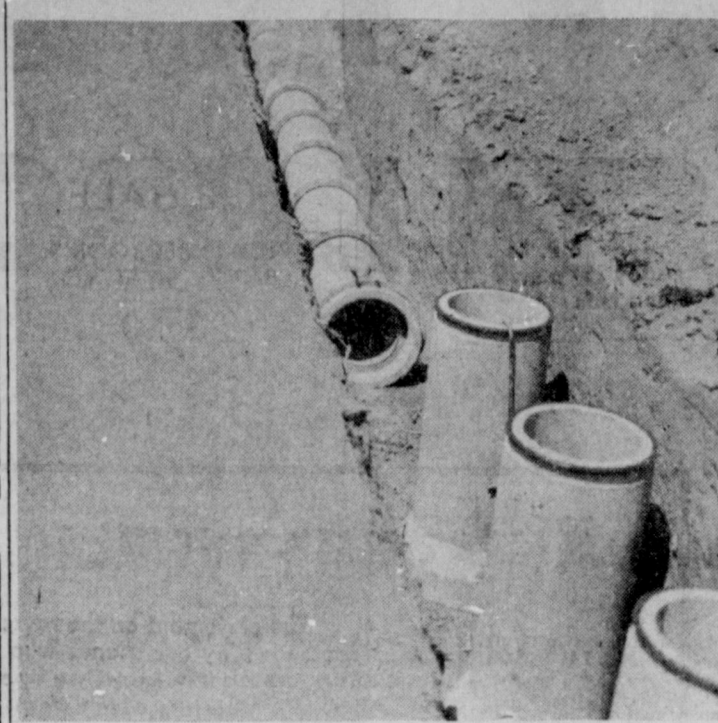
